



tains. At this lake, which he afterwards called McLeod's Lake (out of compli-ment to one of the Northwest partners), he left three men to form acquaintance with the Indians, and in November re-turned with his remaining three men to the portage at the foot of the mountains, where he had left the fourteen. At this portage he passed the winter of 1805-0. In the month of May, 1806, he sent two canoes loaded with furs to Athabasca, with a report of his proceedings, and went again up the mountains with six men and a clerk named John Stewart, and reached McLeod's Lake by a devious course to the south. In this course he and reached McLeod's Lake by a devious course to the south. In this course he touched Fraser River, which takes its name from him, but which he then sup-posed to be the Columbia. He went up a tributary of the Fraser River and called it Stewart's River. Doubts n.w. arose in his mind as to the Fraser, which he called the Great River. About 120 miles up the Stewart River he built an other house, and called the place New Caledonia. Here he left Mr. Stewart and two men and crossed westerly into the open country and built another house near a lake which he called Fra-er's Lake. He was now with four men in the midst of Indians who had never before either seen or head of the "pale house mear a lake which he called Fra-ser's Lake. He was now with four men in the midst of Indians who had never before either seen or heard of the 'pale face." On the border of this lake he witnessed an Indian ceremony which after the lapse of half a century, was as resh in his mind as if it had occur-red much later. He was taken by the Indians along the lake border to where they had a very large burying ground, when one of the chiefs of their tribe was being buried. An immense number of warriors assembled, and after a most solemn and impressive ceremony Mr. Fraser was invited by signs to approach the grave. He did so, and gave immense satisfaction by engraving his name on a post which had been planted over the remains of the departed warrior. From this lake Mr. Fraser returned and passed the with what furs had been collected to Athabasea, and asked for an increased force of clerks and goods. In the fall of 1807 he received two cances loaded with goods, and two clerks, named Jul-ius Guesnel and Hugh Jones (the former was afterwards an M. P. for Montreal). These gentlemen brought despatches from the company recommending Mr. Fraser to trace with all possible speed the great ricer to the sea, they being ap-prehensive that the Americans would get ahead of the British in that quarter, particularly as in the previous year, 1806, Captain Lewis and Clark had gone down the Columbia, and were extending Amer-ican autority along the western coast of America, and Astor on the part of the Americans also was looking anx-iously towards that decision. The com-pany therefore urged Mr. Fraser to spare no expense in achieving the object of their desires. In the summer of 1807 Mr. Fraser built another trading house on the Fraser River, in about latitude 54-4n May. 1808, he started from Stew-art's Lake with four cances and 16 men, exclusive of Messrs. 
Large Decrease in Loss of Working Days Last Month.



Two Hundred Bodies Already Recovered by Rescuers.

"I have read some about airships and navigation in the clouds," said Br. Berry, "and it seemed quite natural to have a couple of aeronauts dropping in on us

a couple of aeronauts dropping in on us-about supper time. "I tell you," contin-ued Br. berry, in his jocular way, "those Americans seemed mighty glad to strike solid ground again. It was a good thing, too, for they were real nice chaps. I helped them pack up their balloon, gave them some supper, and when they would not remain all night, I carted them into town. The hotel, of course, was closed. "After pounding on the door for a while some person yelled 'Who's there?" "The latest arrivals from the clouds," I replied.

"Tell them to anchor alongside, and Il be down in a minute, was the ans-wer I got," said Mr. Berry, who further declared that he did not attach any great significance to the arrival of the aeronauts until he discovered that all Caledonia was talking about it.
