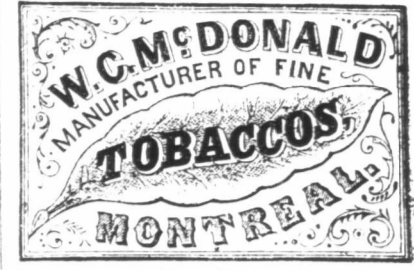

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FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT.

A Train Capizes on the Grand Trunk Railroad.

Several Cars Smashed and the Engineer Killed.

The Grand Trunk train due here at 9:55 Sunday morning, was delayed six hours at Port Hope by an accident which resulted in the death of the engineer and the destruction of a large amount of property. The train was a freight train moving in the opposite direction had reached the station at 6:30 o'clock a.m., and was drawn up on a side track.

WAITING FOR THE EXPRESS TO PASS. The air was bitter cold, and in his anxiety to get under shelter the brakeman who opened the switch forgot to shut it again. Fatal negligence in less than 15 minutes a human life had paid the penalty of his carelessness.

The passenger car left Forest City station under good headway, and was moving at the rate of fifty miles an hour when the locomotive struck the switch, reared up like a wounded animal, turned completely over, and fell upon the engine, which was spinning in the air. The tender followed suit, and both were smashed into.

A SHATTERED MASS OF RUINS. The forward trucks of the baggage car were torn off, allowing the body of the car to plunge up half a dozen times; and the rear trucks of the second-class coach were smashed in a similar manner. The rest of the train remained on the track.

The only persons injured were the engineer and the brakeman. The engineer was killed, and the brakeman was severely injured. The wreckage was cleared away shortly after noon, and another train brought the passengers on to Port Hope.

THE CRIMINAL CARELESS BRAKEMAN. A few minutes after the accident occurred a man was seen to leave the freight train and run rapidly toward the wreckage. He was the miserable brakeman whose negligence had caused all the mischief. The bystanders gave chase, and half an hour later the frightened wretch had been dragged from his hiding place up town and taken to the lock-up.

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THE CITY RECORD.

A peddler named James Ward, formerly of this city, has been fined \$10 and \$12.70 for a Berlin magistrate, for peddling cloth without a license.

Frederick Hurst, a lad employed to attend to a circus saw, had his hand badly injured on Saturday. He had to have two fingers amputated.

A lunatic, taken to the Court House on Thursday under examination before Judge Mackenzie, escaped from his keeper, and has not been heard of since.

The Ontario Government are to be asked by the city to pay \$4,000 as their share of the expense of constructing the Queen Street sewer, which drains the Provincial Asylum.

After a discussion as to the advisability of sending delegates to the Dominion Board of Trade, the Corn Exchange on Friday decided to send Messrs. Spratt and Baird as their representatives.

The City Council have agreed to lease twenty acres of the marsh for twenty-one years, at a nominal rent, for the establishment of a sewage works by the city, and also to exempt the works from taxation while the lease lasts.

James Vincent, keeper of a disreputable house, was fined \$2 and costs on Monday for knocking a man down, who told her to mind her own business when she asked him why he didn't vote for the Grin candidate in East Toronto.

Hon. Alexander Morris, Conservative, was elected on Saturday by a majority of 43 over Mr. Loya, Green Party, in the riding of Toronto in the Local Legislature vacated by the elevation of Hon. M. C. Cameron to the Bench.
