The Control of Insect Pests in Canada.

The Division of Entomology of the Experimental Farms Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has recently issued a bulletin by Dr. C. Gordon Hewitt, Dominion Entomologist, on "The Control of Insect Pests in Canada."

An account is given of the history of the war against insect pests in Canada and of the manner in which insect pests have invaded the country and it has been gradually opened up and cultivated. The manner in which the Dominion and Provincial governments are endeavoring by legislation and other means to prevent the introduction of insect pests into Canada and the increase and spread of those pests already here is described. An interesting summary of the various lines of work undertaken and carried on by the Division of Entomology at Ottawa is given and the general public will no doubt be surprised at the many problems which come within the scope of the Entomologist who are called upon to deal with insects in their relations to all the varied activities of man: insects affecting farm crops, fruit growing, forest and shade trees; insects attacking man's possessions and infesting houses; attacking domestic animals and livestock; affecting the health of man. All insects, however, are not injurious and the work of the Entomologist includes bees and beekeeping and the study of parasitic and other enemies which may be of assistance in obtaining control of insect pests.

QUEBEC GOES LIBERAL

Election Results are Liberal, 58; Conservatives; 18; Labor, 2.

Montreal, May 15—The Quebec provincial elections today resulted in the return of the Gouin government by an increased majority over that which it had in the last house.

By the redistribution act passed at the last session of the legislature seven new seats were added and while the opposition captured four of these, it lost two others, thus making the net gain in the Liberal majority in the new house three.

All of the members of the cabinet were re-elected, the only one to suffer defeat being the Hon. Chas. Devlin, who was, however, successful in Nicolet county.

Premier Gouin was elected by large majorities in both Portneuf and St. Johns.

Mr. Tellier, the opposition leader, was re-elected in Johette, but two of his leading lieutenants, Armand Laveigne and Jules Prevost, both of whom ran in two counties suffered defeat in one. Mr. Laveigne winning in Montmagny and losing in Montmorency, and Mr. Prevost suffering defeat in L'Assomption and winning in Terrebonne.

The good news comes from Halifax of the passing of a government measure to increase the teachers salaries by 25 per cent. The government will increase the grant by 12 1/2 per cent on condition that the districts give the other 12 1/2 per cent. Let N. B. do likewise soon.

SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND

We have received the annual report of the Halifax School for the Blind, an institution that is doing excellent work educating the blind. There were 135 pupils on the register Dec. 1st, 1911. The expenses of the year amounted to \$30,583.92, which were provided for by the contributions of provinces and municipalities and private donations. Among the year's graduates in the Literary and Musical department is Miss Heien Norman of Newcastle.
