





It may be possible, therefore, for a non-periodim omet, one that has not been "capred" by the solar system, to visi other suns than ours and shed their substance in remote regions of the tellar universe, hence the life of a ometary wanderer may be a matter of millions of years. 

Important Matters.

public statements of the views held on them by those who see them from different view points would be very valuable. 1st. The Hon. John Harvey has rendered untold services to this city by his efforts to suppress Tuberculosis and by calling attention to the dangers of spitting and foul six. dangers of spitting and foul air. A student from a New York Hospital, with a tendency to lung trouble, came to us last summer and has wintered down north with us. His bedroom window has never been closed, and the entire frame has been out for the last month. He has not only survived, but is twice the men he was and is as excellent protest against the theory that cold air hurts us as any I know anywhere. Yet that that theory is still held to is only too patent along this coast. this coast. Not nearly sufficient attention has, however, been yet paid to the danger of infection through the mouth and food. There are many who now hold that tuberculosis is contracted far more through the tonsils and stomach, and so through the glands taking lymph from the bowels than through the lungs. Very import ant experiments on very extensive scales have of late been made to show that pulmonary or lung tuberculosis is secondary to infection of the bowe glands. It behoves us to lay much stress on the washing of cups bowls and plates, spoons, etc., used by consumptives, and separate outfits being used. The dangers of meat and foods is well known I fear, however, that only very, very thorough cooking can be looked to help to eliminate this danger in this Colony, as there is no way yet to certify to the health of cattle in the out

I would wish to very earnestly commend to all families that have infected members in their houses, to pu aside special vessels and food utensil of every kind for their use, and I and the more anxious to do this, as in a catechism I had printed and circulated in thousands, I laid no stress on this source of danger. It is a very rea one, and personally I am now to accept the theory that it is quite as important as those to which s much attention has of late been paid.

Destruction of Seals and Effects of

Northern Outports.

The second thing I want to hear the public to discuss is the serious effec the destruction of the seal herds i having on the Outports. We have jus had a most delightful visit from Capi Alpheus Barbour and his crew in th Neptune," and we fully realize wha it means in St. Jonh's, and the one of two outport towns from which th sealing crews come, when a steam comes home with her bunting up, an her rockets announcing she has been successful. We rejoice with these that rejoice, and such must be the result of the circulation of so much noney as comes to St. John's when over a quarter of a million seal pelts are brought in. But we can't help seeing the other side—and that has a very serious aspect indeed. As Capt. nen from all round our harbour had to actually go to his ship asking for ϵ carcass, a carcass for dog food; yes and for food for their families, for meat is a luxury here in winter. To me this was a pitiful sight. There was a time when the harbour could have given them all the carcasses they might need, and when we could have sold them a load of fat to boot; there was a time when traders and merchants found it worth while to supply their dealers with seal nets for the retura they brought from the local fishery. The best proof that the local seal fishing is no longer remunerative, is in the fact that this is no longer done. The few men who still fish for seals get little or nothin in return for their outlay, beyond th orders will soon be issued forbidding fact that they do have some dog food and some skin boots-where must go without because their mone can not even buy any. It has struck me very forcibly in another way also Every year now as I leave for Lab rador more and more of our friend on the coast beg me to put them dow for a pair of skin boots, if I can. have been these last two or thre from Conche to Kirpon, and at th mill in Canada Bay, simply because we must otherwise send to St. John's for skins. There can be no denying this was not the case even so recently as 18 years ago. But beyond this there are places that when I came here first were nice little settlements, where as one journeyed along our lonely rounds one found bright hearths, and heard merry voices, and got a cheerful welcome; just such a place was North West Point, in Hare Bay. Now only deserted, tumble down huts greet one there, for there are no longer any seals to depend on, and one hurries past the spot, which to its loneliness has thus added a sense of graveyard desolation. The seal fishery along the coast and at the

outports was, so it seems to me, just that annex of the cod fishery, or that complement of it, that nature provided

Then the meat and fat even are a 'dernier ressort' when starvation threatens. If these seal herds, that are now so seriously threatened, are not permitted to recuperate what they have already lost in past years, the day is not far ahead when life will be practically impossible in the far north, unless mines and factories can be started and kept at work. Prevention of Consumption.

Dear Mr. Editor.—I am tempted to write to you on, two or three subjects which need more consideration to my mind, than they have yet received, as they are of far more importance to the Colony as a whole than some at present think, and a few public statements of the views held. of any other source of income being provided if the seals are exterminated. They are already almost gone from the shore and bays. It is a terrible thing to believe, and a fact one dare not state publicly, if one were not fully convinced of it. But the fact is that where the seals are all gone a large part of the population will have to follow them and go too, i.e., as far as any of us down here can see at present. It would sound very unpatriotic in St. John's if we were to divert our attention from trying to make vert our attention from trying to make it possible to live here and in Labrador, and instead used all our efforts dor, and instead used all our chords to send away as many families as we could to Canada. Several families have gone already to places like Edmonton, and to British Columbia, and the West and on my view to the Pacit monton, and to British Columbia, and the West, and on my visit to the Pacithe Coast a year ago those I heard of were all doing well, just because they are desirable settlers. But it is the disappearance of the harp seals that is making it so increasingly difficult for the cod fishermen to live If seem or the cod fishermen to live. The Peat Problem. The last matter I am going to rouble you with, Mr. Editor, is the Peat Problem, that is a very hopeful aspect of life here. We have shown clearly to ourselves primarily, and partly to our friends and neighbours the economy and effectiveness of pea-or fuel. If there is any sceptic in the matter who chances to be visiting St. Anthony I shall be delighted to give him a practical proof of the heat ng power, lasting power, cleanliness and cheapness of peat fire, that I think n a very short time would send hin tome to look for a peat bog for him telf near his own home. We had the cleasure of convincing Capt. Barbou nd Capt. Whitely and some of their rew of the efficiency and cheapness f a peat fire on an open hearth. closed stove now heating the room m sitting in, simply couldn't fail to lo the same for anyone else. Like nost things new, however, one has to earn to handle it to get the best reults, and we have experimented in very way. The first thing is to cu s deep and long a straight drain hrough your bog as you can make is you cut down you can throw up our brickets of fibrous roots onto the surface, when dry they are as goo lmost as kindling but burn much too uickly to last. As you get down owever, the texture becomes much loser and the peat more useful. One ay sunning, and then turned nee, and another day's sunning, and the already to house. We ay sunning, and then turned ove

find it well worth while to run up lov flakes to allow the air to circulate un derneath, as then a rain shower in n way hurts your material. But tha is by no means necessary, and in Iceland and Ireland I have never seen lone. We house our supply right by the marsh, as then we can easily ru t home on slides at no cost in winter But we are now running a light raiload track right to the cuttings, and the trolly once started will almost run hemselves to the end of our new wharf, or can be switched off to the various houses. It takes men ever ere now on an average three hours to haul a load of wood out, and to get wood you can only cut and haul two loads a day, whereas you can bring home a load of peat in half an hour and the actual cutting and drying of little moment when you get a win er fuel supply in two or three days which you can easily do; we use pear cutters from Ireland, but at first use mly the straight square shovel sharp ned. Some dry wood is necessary tart your fire in a stove. But with liberal supply of peat you can disense with any other fuel in a stove or pen fire place after the first settin in fire. To make a hot, cheerful fire ve put the brickets in carefully with dir spaces right up through them while if we are going to leave a fire or a long time, we shake them down altogether, and thus you can as it were, turn up or down your fire like kerosene lamp. 



Parsley Good to Purify System-Value of Vegetables.

The French have a saying that parsley is a broom to sweep the stomach." Lettuce is a nerve food. Radishes build tissue and are rich in phosphorus, also in iron.

Horseradish contains a higher per centage of sulphur than all the other vegetable roots, spinach ranking next in value. Spinach also contains a large proportion of iron.

A mayonnaise dressing with lettuce is especially desirable for thin people. but for over plump French dressing is to be recommended. The action of vinegar on the digestive organs, however, is not to be considered. The acid of lemon juice is preferable.

While apples are a most excellent fruit for brain building, which phosphorus aids in, the humble pumpkin desecrated to the uses of pie and jack o' lanterns, holds the prize. Pumpkin rates 2.79 in phosphorus, while apple

When in search for this special element take up a pumpkin diet. But as winter squash would stand the same analysis, it can be used as a vegetable in many varities and thus the needed phosphorus supplied. Cucumbers rank next in phosphorus value to pumpkin, being 2.08.—From the Vegearian Magazine.
