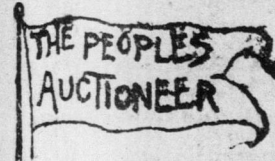

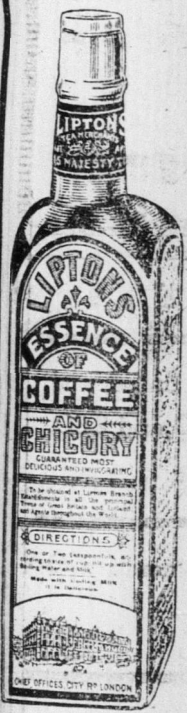
**DIOGENES.**

Next Sunday there will take place  
the fourth celebration of a new inter-  
national holiday. In all the calendar,  
there are but two other international  
holidays, and yet this most remark-  
able holiday was created with a single  
postage stamp, according to the  
story of its founder, Miss Anna Jar-  
vis.

Five years ago, Miss Jarvis used  
this epoch making postage stamp to  
carry a notice to a Church paper.  
This notice asked for the observance  
of the second Sunday in May as  
"Mother's Day," and requested that  
every son and daughter who wished  
to honor motherhood should wear a  
white carnation on that day.

The next year that same notice was  
inserted in a Philadelphia paper and  
copied by other newspapers all over  
the country. The result was that the  
new holiday became at once so popu-  
lar that last year Mother's Day was  
observed, not only in every nook and  
corner of our own country, but also  
in Europe, in parts of China, Japan,  
Africa and South America. Florists  
completely sold out their stock of  
white flowers; churches held special

dreds! Plenty of stars, roses, sun-  
sets, rainbows, brothers and sis-  
ters, aunts and cousins—but only  
one mother in all the wide world—K a t e

services; and mayors and governors  
issued proclamations urging that  
the day be observed.

The wonderful growth of this hol-  
iday is absolutely unique. There has  
been no organization and no litera-  
ture, except one small pamphlet, to  
push it. It all grew from that one  
little notice. Even Miss Jarvis, whose  
love for her own mother inspired her  
to send that first notice, has never lec-  
tured or actively propagated her  
idea. The response has been entirely  
spontaneous.

The only explanation of this lies in the  
fact that the world is coming to real-  
ize the beauty of motherhood and is  
eagerly glad of this opportunity to  
give the mothers of men, honor due.

The observance of the day is per-  
fectly simple. The wearing of the  
white carnation, or any white flower,  
is the chief ceremony. The Churches  
hold special services with appropriate  
sermons, and make a great effort to  
get out all the older people. If you  
are at home with your mother, you  
are supposed to observe the day as  
hers in every way you can think of.  
If you are away from her, you are  
supposed to come home if you can,  
and if you can't, to write her a special  
letter. Kindness to "somebody's  
mother" in lieu of your own, is also  
recommended.

"Soldiers, sailors and statesmen are  
nationally honored," said Miss Jarvis,  
"but the mothers who went into the  
Valley of the Shadow of Death to  
bear them, are forgotten."

Let us all join in the observance of  
our new holiday, and make this no  
longer true.

ROME, May 5.  
Premier Giolitti announced this after-  
noon that an Italian squadron had  
seized and occupied the island of  
Rhodes without opposition. A large  
body of troops had disembarked from  
the transports.

A Government Bill providing for an  
increase of life-saving appliances on  
vessels, which the Minister of Com-  
merce will shortly introduce, will ap-  
ply not only to Dutch ships but to all  
foreign vessels embarking passengers

MONTREAL, May 5.  
That the two largest coal fields in  
the world have been discovered on  
Canadian soil is the belief of Capt.  
James, a member of the Canadian ex-  
ploration party aboard Capt. Ber-  
nier's Arctic vessel. He says that the  
fields are located in Baffin's Land,  
and in spite of the high altitude will  
be workable all the year around. The  
coal is so easy to be secured that it  
can be dug from the surface with a  
shovel.

PORTSMOUTH, May 5.  
The seamen of the Olympic, who  
quit the vessel after the firemen's  
strike, were allowed to go on Satur-  
day by the magistrates sitting at the  
police court, where they were tried  
on a charge of mutiny. The magis-  
trates decided that the charges were  
proved against 54 mutineers, but ex-  
pressed the opinion that it would not  
expedite matters to fine the defend-  
ants under the circumstances which  
had arisen prior to the refusal to  
obey orders. The magistrates dis-  
charged the seamen and hoped they  
would return to duty.

HALIFAX, May 5.  
A wireless message was received  
here on Saturday night stating that  
the Cunarder Uttonia, from Southamp-  
ton for Quebec and Montreal, was 98  
miles southeast of Sable Island with  
a damaged propeller, but proceeding  
to Halifax under her own steam. On  
Sunday afternoon she was reported ap-  
proaching the harbor. Tugs went  
out to meet her, and to-night the dis-  
abled steamer was towed to the quar-  
antine grounds, where she anchored  
for the night. Her passengers, who

number 1,018, will proceed to Mon-  
tré by rail.

WELSH DISE-  
TABLISHMENT.

London, April 29.—The Welsh dis-  
establishment bill, which has passed  
its first reading, is not so drastic af-  
ter all. It abolishes the connection  
between church and state, and nulli-  
fies the ecclesiastical law in Wales,  
but differing from the French law, it  
leaves the cathedrals, churches, epis-  
copal palaces and parsonages to the  
church, with all their money endow-  
ments since 1602, which have an in-

from the church is \$905,000 a year.  
Incidentally the bill helps the reform  
of the House of Lords by unseating  
four spiritual peers.

THERE NEED BE NO ANXIETY.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—As Neptune's non-arrival is creating some comment, we beg to give particulars as to what we have heard of her since sailing:—

1. A letter received from lighthouse keeper at Port au Port indicates she was within one mile of his light on 21st March, and he saw her then till 28th March.

2. Wire received from operator, Sank Harbour, 6th April, saying:—"Steamer off here undoubtedly Neptune; has three masts, funnel amidships; and on 9th; Steamer not seen since 6th; went north."

3. We since hear from Mr. Garcin of Bonne Bay a boat was seen off Trout River later in month, and this was undoubtedly Neptune working her way north.

4. Captain William Bartlett of Viking, after his arrival here, called and informed us that he had seen smoke of a steamer off Point Riche which he took for Neptune about 26th April. The ice was very heavy inside where smoke was and he thinks she must be jammed.

5. There was no other steamer on land side of ice this year except Joyden, and Captain Barbour reports ice very heavy and thinks Neptune may be jammed there for some days yet.

The ice is very heavy off the Straits this year and the boat may be jammed there for some time. We think there need be no anxiety and think the Press need send out no alarmist reports.

Codfishing West.

Most of the fishing schooners that were there have gone to the Grand Banks. A number of vessels are supplied and ready to sail for the Grand Banks but cannot get bait. Herring are scarce in Fortune Bay.

In a Serious Condition.

At 2 o'clock to-day the condition of Dr. Keegan at the Hospital was unchanged from yesterday and not as good as could be hoped for. He is gradually sinking while he continually suffers the most intense agony from his knee. Dr. Stewart, the specialist, is now in attendance and has held consultations already with visiting physicians from the city with a view to the amputation of the leg of the patient. In this direction a final consultation will take place at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

ICEBERGS DRIFTING SOUTH.—Two large icebergs were in sight from the signal station this morning, about 10 miles drifting south. Masters of shipping should beware and keep an eye out for these.

FRENCH SHORE ICE-PACKED.—At present the ice is very heavy and close packed along the French Shore, particularly from Griguet north. Business people had messages in the city to-day from St. Leonard's saying that there was no open water to be seen anywhere.

SHELTERED AT TREPASSEY.—The s.s. Kite, Capt. Carroll, which left Channel for here on Friday morning, put into Trepassey yesterday. She was forced to harbor owing to the strong head seas and snow storm that prevailed. She had not left there up to this morning, as she was spoken to by the Portia. 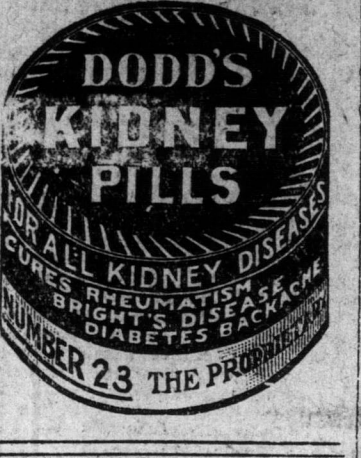

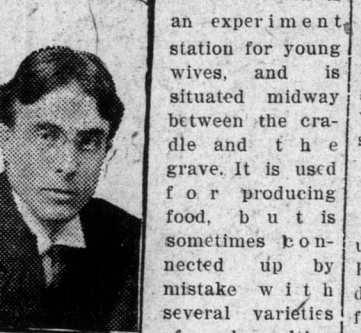

The kitchen is an experiment

 food, but is

 mistake with  
 several varieties  
 of pole-vaulting  
 stomach ache. The kitchen used to  
 be a popular place of resort for wo-  
 men who were married to an appetite  
 which never said die or diet, but now-  
 adays the only articles of furniture  
 to be found in the kitchen are a steel  
 range with the asthma, a portable  
 pantry made out of soap premiums,  
 and a hired girl, armed with a dead-  
 ly sponge cake. Very few house-

wives loiter around the kitchen to any  
 extent these days. Some of our best  
 known society women don't know

**CHAPTER IX.—AT BAY DE VERDE.**  
 Although I have made different  
 tours of this district before this one  
 of which I now write, I had never  
 been on shore at Bay de Verde prop-  
 erly. I had been in the office in the  
 steamer, but had not landed. On this  
 particular trip one of the chief ob-  
 jects in view was to visit this place  
 and for a little while at least see its  
 homesteads and other features of in-  
 terest. Thus, on the steamer anchor-  
 ing, I boarded the mail boat and in a  
 short time soon found myself among  
 the people on shore. The only guide  
 or rather safe guide, that a traveller  
 can have in such cases is the mail  
 man, for there is not any danger of  
 one losing his passage while that of-  
 ficer is about. (Close to his heels) I  
 therefore kept and followed him in  
 his journey to the post office. In  
 passing I noticed that the place was  
 very congested, but it presented one  
 of the busiest scenes I had looked up-  
 on, from the standpoint of a fishing  
 port. It is really and truly a fishing  
 centre, and all the surroundings pertain  
 to the prosecution and curing of  
 our great industry. Large flakes,  
 capable of spreading many hundreds  
 of quintals of fish, meet the eye, and  
 trim skiffs and boats lie moored in  
 the offing. In every direction sails and  
 nets were spread out for drying, and  
 everything indicated a busy spot, and  
 a widely a satisfactory voyage.

The mail man went in a straight  
 direction from the wharf to the post  
 office—or to the annex that is used  
 for a post office. In following him I  
 kept looking for some sort of a  
 building that would likely be a post  
 office, hence my wonder when, after  
 passing through the town, and al-  
 most to the back of it, I saw him  
 turn into a narrow yard and pass or  
 toward a small house, and entering  
 by the back door of a linhay saw him  
 deliver the mail to the postmistress.  
 In wonder I stood. Could this tiny  
 space really be the post office of such  
 a centre of trade as Bay de Verde  
 could it? No! surely not. There  
 must be a mistake somewhere. This  
 department of about eight feet by  
 six, in the back house of a very small  
 dwelling, could not be Bay de Verde's  
 post office. Neither the fittings of the  
 apartment, nor the appliances in  
 sight, seemed to indicate a postal de-  
 partment. But the officer delivered  
 the mail, and in return another was  
 received, and then the tour to the  
 ship was begun. While this was be-  
 ing done I stood in wonderment and  
 thought upon all that I had heard of  
 Bay de Verde, and of all the business  
 interests it possessed, and of all the  
 keen political contests it had witness-  
 ed; and as the lady in charge of the  
 office impressed me as being very  
 competent and kindly, and one no  
 likely to get displeased at a little  
 matter, I decided to make sure of my  
 ground and not be under any mis-  
 apprehension as to the real post of-  
 fice. I therefore said to her: "Is  
 this really the post office proper of  
 Bay de Verde?" To which she an-  
 swered: "Yes, sir." "It is?" I re-  
 joined. "Yes, sir, it is," she politely  
 continued. I responded by saying  
 "Alas for Bay de Verde."

In the meantime I kept my eye on  
 the receding form of the mail officer  
 and seeing that he was on the alert  
 I wished the fair postmistress adieu  
 and hastening out, overtook my  
 guide. To see the more public build-  
 ings of the place was out of the ques-  
 tion, as mail boats, like time and tide,  
 wait on no man. From the size and  
 architecture the churches and schools  
 gave the impression of stability and  
 comfort, and seemed to say to us, in

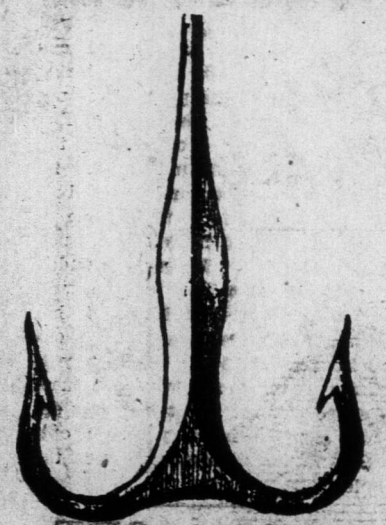

## To-Day's News. The Police Court.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Captain Rostron of the Carpathia, interviewed at Gibraltar said the allegation I was using the wireless to my own advantage after the wreck of the Titanic is a wicked lie. Rostron warmly defended Ismay, declaring he behaved irreproachably on board the Carpathia and concluded by saying he remembered seeing distinctly two mast head lights at three o'clock on Monday which appeared nearer the Titanic than the Carpathia was and at daybreak saw two other ships about eight miles away to the North, while the Carpathia was picking up survivors.

Special to Evening Telegram. ROME, To-day. According to official despatches from Rhodes, capital of the Island of Rhodes, which Italian forces seized on Saturday, troops landed at some distance from the city. They immediately advanced, driving Turkish troops before them, the noise of the bayonet. Meantime, Admiral Viale summoned the Governor of the city to surrender. The latter replied he possessed no means of resistance. Accordingly he abandoned control of the city under protest. He added he had no power to issue orders to the garrison, which, however, shortly afterward retired to a position outside the city. The division landed at Rhodes without opposition. Much enthusiasm over the achievement is felt at Rome where the operation is described as part of the plan to isolate Constantinople. It is stated the territory will be restored when Turkish troops withdraw from Tripoli.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. At the annual banquet of the Royal Academy, President Poynter paid a warm tribute to the late Edwin A. Abbey. Referring to Frick's purchase of a Rembrandt from Lord Feversham for \$250,000, Sir Edward recommended the passage of a law requiring the owners to give the Government an option on valuable art works before selling them to outsiders. The Premier said the country could not view with equanimity the sale of great paintings to go abroad. At the same time they could not expect British taxpayer, on whose shoulders rested so many heavy burdens, to enter into competition with the millionaires of the world.

Special to Evening Telegram. OYSTER BAY, To-day. The controversy between Taft and Roosevelt took a new turn on Saturday night. "He stands guilty of approving and encouraging fraud which deprives people of their right to express their will as to who shall be nominated," wrote Roosevelt of the President. Roosevelt asserted that Taft knew he was making an untrue statement when he said that the former President had expressed an opinion that the anti-trust law ought to be repealed. He also again contradicted the President in regard to the "Harvest Trust" case, saying that Taft at a Cabinet meeting and in private conversation with him "repeatedly and emphatically approved of the course actually taken."

## Cadets Parade.

The C. C. G. Lieut-Col. Conroy commanding, held church parade yesterday morning and attended last Mass at the R. C. Cathedral. Despite the disagreeable weather that prevailed there was a large turn out of members. During the Mass, Chaplain Rev. Fr. Sheehan, ascended the pulpit and preached a eloquent and impressive sermon. After Mass the Battalion reformed ranks and returned to their armory, the band discoursing excellent music.

The meeting was brought to a close with the Benediction by the pastor.
