PETROGRAD, Nov. 16. An official announcement made pub-lic here to-day records a Russian vic-tory over the Turks in the vicinity of ulkuabad in Persia, 150 miles south-

North of the Somme the enemy did not renew his attack against our front. South of the Somme we attacked dur-ing the night the eastern part of Pressoire occupied by the enemy, but where French elements still resisted with admirable energy. Thanks to this tenacity and magnificent resist-ance we threw the Germans from the village after a fierce struggle and un-ler a fierce bombardment. Pressoire is again entirely in our hands, and the gains of the 7th of November are maintained everywhere. According to information, the Germans employed troops belonging to three different divisions. Heavy losses are the only result of this serious enemy failure.

LONDON; Nov. 16. General Maurice, chief director of military operations at the War Office, in an interview with the Associated Press to-day, predicted the British gains in the Ancre Valley were only a forerunner of further equally im-portant advances which will be made on the western front during the win-ter months. 




