Deadly Mystery Ship.

IDENTITY OF THE "VICTORY" OF THE MERCANTILE MARINE.

One of the secrets of the war against the Hun submarines—the identity of the deadly mystery ship Q5-was revealed this week at the ceremony of unveiling a tablet in the saloon of the tramp steamer Lodorer lying in the Thames of Greenwich, with a cargo of sugar on board. Owned by Holder Middleton, and Co. the Lodorer was, up to October, 1915, an ordinary tramp steamer, but on that date her destiny changed, and onward till the signing of the armistice she was foremost in the most brilliant feats performed by the nercantile marine in the history of the war-feats which hand her down to history as the "Victory" of the mercantile marine. The tablet is a plain brass one recording the vessel's name, the name of her owners, and the fact that she was engaged in anti-submarine work for over two years. Then follows the name of her commander, Gordon Campbell, V.C., and the officers and men who served under him-all of whom gained disinction which are recorded on the brass. Vice-Admiral Sir A. Duff, in unveiling the tablet, said over 180 mystery ships had been employed, and apart from the submarines sunk. their moral effect was very great.-



Prince to Visit Canada.

To Open New Parliament House

With the approval of the King, the rince of Wales will visit Canada during the year. According to an official statement, it is expected that His Royal Highness will leave England in August, in order formally to open the new Parliament Building at Ottawa. The Prince of Wales, who spent a considerable time with the Canadian troops in France during the war, was a guest at a dinner given by the Canadian Club during the week to honour Lieut.-General Sir A. Currie, commanding the Canadian Army Corps. Responding to the toast of the Royal Family, His Royal Highness said he was glad to take the opportunity of saying that he was going over to Canada very soon, (Loud cheers.) He hoped to sail in less than three months time. He was looking forward to the visit very much, as he was sure he would see many old friends again and he hoped to make many new friends as well. It was true that he would be setting foot on soil that was new to him, but somehow or other Canadian soil had wandered over all the batlefields of Flanders, which were the scenes of the exploits of the Canadian battalions, and the memory that their gallant dead rest there would seem to have a just claim to be regarded as the very soil of the Dominion itself. The message therefore he had to send to all ranks of the Canadian corps who were still on this side of the Atlantic, was a very simple one,

and it was-Au Revoir. (Cheers.) This will be the first official visit paid by the Prince to the British Dominions overseas. It is interesting to recall that the King in July last, addressing the Dominion and Indian members of the Imperial Conference, stated that, after the war, the Prince would visit the overseas States of the

Installation Ceremony at St. Paul's. With all the pomp of knightly circumstance, the Prince of Wales was, in St. Paul's Cathedral yesterday, installed as Grand Master of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, the Order which is peculiarly associated with the King's Dominions overseas.

The Knights Grand Cross, having assembled in the little chapel of the Order, stately with banners of the living and memorials of the dead, the Grand Master took his seat in the

stall next to that of the Sovereign. Booted and spurred, as a proved night should be, the youthful Grand Master wore khaki under his "mantle of Saxon-blue satin, lined with scarlet, silk and gold, with two tassels of the same colours, and having on the left side the Star of the Order." He was preceded by the Duke of Con-naught, similarly robed except for the

regalia of the Grand Master. While the congregation sang "For all the saints who from their labour rest," the Knights Grand Cross marched in slow procession from the western door to the choir. They included men whose names became familiar during the war-for instance, General Monash, General Currie, General Birdwood, Admiral de Robeck, Admiral Burney, Lord d'Abernon, Sir George Buchanan, Lord Finlay, and Lord Inchcape. 

President Taft was presented with the gold pen with which the signatures were inscribed on the various documents; while the pen with which the Treaty of Vienna was signed is preserved in the family of Viscount Bangor. Mr. Ward, who afterwards succeeded to the title, was private secretary to Lord Castlereagh at the time of the signing of the Treaty, and managed to gain pos

session of the pen. In the Berlin Museum may be seen two historic pens-that with which Queen Louise of Prussia signed her last will and testament, side by side with the pen used by William I. of Prussia in his famous letter to Queen Augusta, informing her of the vic-

tory of Sedan. Among other historic pens may be mentioned that used by Charles Dickens just before his death, and which was sold in an auction-room for £19.10s., although £40 was paid for the well-worn gold pen used by "Boz" for many years. The quill pen used by Wellington when writing to Queen Victoria in 1844 brought only five and a half guineas, while one of Sir Walter Scott's pens, selected by elists's writing-table at Abbotsford, only realized three guineas more.



The counter proposals submitted by the late enemy, the text of which was not published in detail, were, in essence, a virtual rejection of the Allied terms. The reply of the Peace Council to these counter proposals, was, in effect, a refusal to consider them, though one or two minor modifications in the original treaty conditions were made. In the counter proposals, the Germans, instead of suggesting a revision, practically demanded a brand new Treaty, and assailed the territorial settlements, made by the Council, in all directions, a claim being made that no frontier changes should take place without the consent of the populations, these being, so far as the European frontiers were concerned, mainly German or friends of Germany. Typically German this. Further in the counter proposals submitted, Germany repudiated the manner in which the League of Nations was organized, but notwithstanding, had the audacity to ask for a mandate to govern her lest overseas possessions. Other proposals suggested, particularly that of financial reparation, were of the Prussian brand. As monetary compensation against the Allies' bill for damages and loss, Germany offered to pay five thousand million dollars in eight years and approximately twenty thousand million in an indefinite period, in other words as may be convenient. Hon. Tasker Cook and Surveyor Clark returned from the scene of the stranded "Ferm" by the s.s. Wren. The steamer is ashore at Knight's Cove Point, about 11/2 miles from King's Cove, and there is a possibility of refloating her, if the weather conditions hold favorable. The deck cargo of 360,000 feet of deals has been salved and piled at King's Cove and the work of removing the balance of the 840,000 feet, which comprised the cargo, from the hold is now in progress. This is expected to take about ten days, when it is believed she can get off the rocks. The engines and boilers are intact and as far as can be judged at present, the ship is not extremely damaged. The crew will be paid off in a few days and come on here. The tug Ingraham is at the wreck assisting in the salving opera-





expressed his deliberate conviction that of the social unrest now prevalent throughout the world, eighty per cent. must be ascribed to the fall in the purchasing power of money. However this may be in general, it is safe to say that the dissatisfaction which it taking shape in the formation of the Middle Classes Union in England is mainly due to this cause. When the money unit falls in valueand the fall which we have been experiencing in the last few years is beyond all precedent—the adjustment which in the course of time restores normal relations is nowhere so slow as in a large section of what may be called the middle classes. In the case of the wage-earner there is a painful interval, but on the whole the time of his suffering from the dislocation of prices is not apt to be very long. Salaries are far slower than wages to respond to the pressure; and incomes from interest-bearing investments do not respond at all. The government official, the college professor, the permanent employee of almost any firm or private corporation, has to pull through as best he can on his old salary, or a salary but little increased, while the prices of everything he needs for himslf and his family have gone up to unheard-of heights. The hardship is truly a grievous one, and the wonder is that the complaining is not louder and more insistent than it is. It must be remembered, nevertheless, that the forces of adjustment, though slow-working in this domain, are yet constantly operative—that the grievance, however serious, is not of a permanent nature. Whether by any scheme of automatic adjustment, such as that proposed by Professor Irving Fisher, relief could be obtained with out inviting troubles more serious nteresting questions of the day.






