

Analysing the Ice-Cream.

The general public is apt to run MUTT AND JEFFnow to the opposite extreme, and think that the earth was a brighter thing at all about these fearful hordes. What is life, in the summer, without an ice now and again? Yet this horrible person, the bacteriologist, comes along and tells you, cheerfully, that there are few things which bacteria love better than ter-cream. Some years ago-things a h little better to-day, we hasten to at -one of them analysed specimens of London icecream. With unconscious humour he pronounced it "not inferior to London sewage;" and London sewage has a good average of five million bacteria

to the cubic centimetre. The public shudderingly wonders whether it is actually introducing these bacteria into its sacred anatomy. Well, the truth is that each each of us has billions of bacteria inside him. and they are so useful that it is doubtful if we can get on without them. There are six different tribes of them in the mouth, and those we could very well do without. There are other tribes in the nose-you shoot out a whole village or two whenever you sneeze—and the air and food passages.

But the great majority of bacteria the scavengers of the earth. People rarely reflect what becomes of the vast itter of dead animals leaves, bits of paper, flowers, straw, etc., that is strewn over the face of nature every rear. You must thank the ubiquitous bacteria. Bodies would not even decay without their aid. Then there are the still pleasanter bacteria which attend to fermentation. The "bees." with which so many people are now making what by a very serious stretch of language they call wine, are clumps of bacteria yeast, and molds—three families which are very closely re lated. They play a great part in brewing, wine-making, and a hundred other things. It is a distinct type of bacillus that gives its flavour to your

favourite cheese. The First Living Things.

But of late years we have discovered other bacteria which can feed on inorganic matter, and these are in a sense the most interesting of all. They are the simplest organisms known, and they suggest to us the first living things that appeared on the earth. Myriads of them help agriculture by fixing nitrogen (from air or from manure) and so enabling the plants to absorb it. Whole colonies of them live amicably in the roots of plants like beans and co-operate with the plants. Batcheria do not normally die. The living body splits into two living bodes, and so the chain goes on. Some

divide thus every half-hour, and the reader who cares to do a little arithmetic will see that this means that in twenty-four hours one bacillus (a rod-shaped bacterium) will be multiplied into several billions! The rate of inreease is not phenomenally rapid in itself, but it is enough to sustain this prodigious population, in spite of man's inroads upon it .- John O'London's Weekly.

1 envelope Knox Gelatine

By Bud Fig

2 cups grape fruit juice 2 tablespoonfuls lemon 1/2 cup cold water

1 cup boiling water 1 cup sugar Soak Gelatine in cold water five minutes, dissolve in boiling water and add sugar. Strain, and when mixture begins to thicken add remainand when mixture begins to thicken add remaining ingredients. Do not pour into molds that have been dipped in cold water until jelly is ready to set in order to avoid settling of pulp. Cut in cubes and arrange in baskets made from grape fruit skins. "Titles" Debated by M. C. L. Institute.

BIGGEST ATTENDANCE FOR YEAR HEARS INTERESTING DIS-

The Newfoundland legislature should not petition the Throne to the effect that no further titles be granted in this Dominion, in the opinion of the Methodist College Literary Institute. The subject was fully and freely debated at last night's session and then decided by vote,—a small majority going for the Negative view. The debate was perhaps the most interesting, in point of speeches made, so far, this season. Eleven speakers from the floor, in addition to the six set speakers, in turn mounted the figurative tribune and expounded their views on the subject.

The set speakers were: affirmative, Rev. C. H. Johnson, Hiram Young and H. M. Wilson; Negative, R. F. Horwood, Clarence Scott and Capt. A Kean (substitute); and from the floor the following: James Bowden, William Drover, A. E. Hayward, A. Moores, C. F. Garland, Chesley Bowden, Leslie R. Curtis, Harry J. Wyatt, Wilson Clark, Thomas Soper and J. R. Smallwood. Of particular interest were the ingenuity of Mr. Curtis and the wit of Mr. Wyatt, as the leader of the affirmative pointed out. The presentation of the affirmative's case was half ridicule and half seriousness. Some of the speakers preferred to simply ridicule the idea of knighthood and nobility (the kind that is awarded.) Others, taking it seriously, pointed out the evils and corruption wrapped up in the custom.

The Institute was concerned mor with knighthoods than anything else. Hereditary nobility did not apply here Another point was that such titles as 'Doctor" of any particular degrees, "Professor," and such titles of learning, for which the holders had to pass examination, did not come into this debate. The only kind of title meant here was the kind that the King would estow, upon recommendation, on any Newfoundland citizen. 

Australian Showed up Well in Early Rounds Oritics Say Carpentier Never Looked Better.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Georges Carentier, 170, to-night knocked out George Cook, 189, the Australian, in

In the opening round Carpentier was the first to lead, scoring with both his left and right without a return. Cook tried for a right swing but missed. Considerable infighting followed in which neither man had any marked advantages. Cook took a nasty blow on the ribs, but himself scored well toward the close of the

Both men sparred cautiously at the beginning of the second round. Carpentier landed a left hook to the jaw and easily evaded an attempt at a counter. The Australian had the better of the infighting which ensued and twice sent home hard lefts which surprised Carpentier, who continually failed to find openings for his right. Up to the third round the bout appeared to be going in favor of the Australian. In the third Carpentier landed a light left to the chin, but at close quarters Cook fought hard. Carpentier's best work seemed to be at long range. Near the end of the round the Frenchman scored well with lefts and rights to the head and body and it was easily his round. The Australian caught Carpentier with a blow to the jaw after the bell had sounded and was cautioned by the referee. Early in the fourth round the fight-

ing was mostly at close quarters. Carpentier twive landed lefts on the head and Cook scored to the chin. The Australian then rushed Carpentier but only to meet with a straight left to the chin and a right to the jaw which floored Cook for the count. He was up on one knee when the refereo Jack Smith, finished the count of ten but was too late.

There was considerable betting prior to the fight with Carpentier the favorite at 5 to 2.

Carpentier's decisive victory is looked on in sporting circles as definitely disposing of recent reports that the Curopean champion was in poor physical condition, Cook put up a game fight for three rounds, but the superior ringcraft of the Frenchman, combined with his carefully-trained condition, soon told,

Ringside observers declared Carpentier had never appeared more fit and vigirous and had never exhibited greater skill, although he knocked out Joe Beckett, the English champion, in much shorter period of fighting than ie required to put Cook away.

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
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
