THIS MORNING'S DESPACHES

Inauguration Ball in Washington. A Brilliant Affair. Fire and Loss of Life. Reprieve of Foster.

Washington, March 4. - The inauguration ball to-night was largely attended. A room off a building was expressly constructed for the purpose, 300 feet long by 150 feet wide, and costing \$40,000. It was complete in all its accommodations, and was profusely and elegantly decorated.

Portland, March 5. - The steamer Corinthia, from Glasgow, arrived yesterday afternoon with sixteen cabin and forty-eight steerage passengers. The trains are much delayed by the late frosts.

A dwelling house occupied by four families was burned in Cross street, last night, and a woman named Clark perished in the flames. The steamer Polypus, from Liverpool, arrived last night.

New York, March 5. - At ten o'clock last night the dispatch announcing Foster's reprieve, was taken to the larder and read to the prisoner, who was greatly affected by the joyful intelligence.

ANOTHER FIRE IN LISTOWEL. Large Number of Stores Burned.

Listowel, March 5. - A fire broke out this morning in John Livingstone's (merchant) store, and extended to the following stores: - John Livingstone, druggist; Freeman, Nixon & Co., merchants; Carson's Drug Store; Maynard's Millinery Store; Donnelly, dry goods merchant; Campbell's Boot and Shoe Store; Schuerder's Tinshop; Hackling's Drug Store and the Post Office, and Thompson, dry goods merchant, were all burnt to the ground since 7 this morning.

Guelph Monthly Fair. Census of the County of Wellington.

The usual monthly fair was held today (Wednesday), and was pretty well attended. The day was not uncomfortably cold, and the roads were in fine condition. In a large number of cases buyers met sellers on the road to market, and purchased at prices which could not have been realized later in the day.

There were very few milk cows on the ground-not more than half a dozen-which were sold at prices varying from \$20 to \$36 each. Working cattle were not well represented, and were worth from \$100 to \$140. There were a great many poor cattle on the ground, which were driven home again, but the majority of the good cattle found purchasers at from \$3.50 to \$4.50. Mr. Metcalf, and his neighbour Mr. John Sherratt, of Nichol, were on their way to the fair, the former driving a white heifer, and the latter a pair of prime steers. Mr. Sherratt sold his cattle for \$105, and the buyer was to mark them on the fair ground at half-past ten o'clock.

University Reform in Ireland.

Mr. Gladstone has recently introduced a Bill in the House of Commons, which is the subject of much discussion in Britain, and which, if passed, will effect very material changes in the constitution and working of Universities in Ireland.

Latest from Ottawa. There is a perfect rush of Senators and members of Parliament in Ottawa, and a grand scramble is being made to secure the highest seats in the House.

Hon. John O'Connor was on Tuesday sworn in Minister of Inland Revenue. It is thought that the office of President of the Council will for the present remain vacant.

It is understood that Mr. Tobin, of Halifax, will move the address in the House of Commons.

Ontario Legislature.

March 4. Attorney-General Mowat introduced a Bill to amend the Public and High School Act.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Pardee, the House went into Committee on the Bill to provide for the establishment of a hospital for the reclamation and cure of habitual drunkards.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McKellar the House went into Committee, and passed a Bill to provide for the incorporation of Immigration Aid Societies in Ontario.

Hon. Mr. Crooks moved the second reading of the Bill respecting the position of the Port Wharfy and Port Perry Railway Company under the Acts in aid of railways.

The House went into Committee on the Municipal Institutions bill, when a number of the clauses were adopted.
