The New Government.

Now that the long continued political excitement is over, and a Reform Government installed at Ottawa, some information as the standing and antecedents of the new Ministry will be acceptable. Of the thirteen departments, five have usually been filled by gentlemen from Ontario, four from Quebec, and two each from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Of the Ontario Ministers, Mr. Mackenzie, Mr. Blake, and Mr. R. W. Scott are familiar enough names to our readers. We pass on therefore, to the Minister of Finance, Mr. Cartwright; member for Lennox and now in his 39th year. During the ten years he has been in Parliament he has acted to a considerable extent independently of party.

Mr. D. A. Macdonald, has been in Parliament since 1857, is a staunch Reformer, and represents Glenora. He is a brother of the late John Sandfield Macdonald, and is a thoroughly good businessman. Mr. Christie, the Secretary of State, has been in public life since 1851, at which time he represented the then County of Wentworth in Parliament.

Mr. Letellier de St. Just, the Minister of Agriculture, has an excellent reputation as a speaker, and has been thoroughly consistent as a politician. He was Minister of Agriculture in the Macdonald-Dorion Government of 1863-4, and holds the same office in the present Government.

Mr. T. Fournier, the Minister of Inland Revenue, is a lawyer, some fifty years of age, a Liberal and member for Bellechance in the Commons. Was first returned to Parliament in 1870, and has his laurels as a public man yet to win.

The Ministers from New Brunswick take the appropriate duties of "Marine and Fisheries," and "Customs." The first of these offices is filled by Mr. A. J. Smith, member for Westmoreland. He was a member of the New Brunswick Legislature from so early a date as 1852 until the Union. He was a member of the New Brunswick Government from 1856 to 1863 and again in 1866, for a short time.

Mr. Isaac Burpee, the Minister of Customs, is a merchant and manufacturer of St. John, first elected to Parliament last year. As a merchant and manufacturer, he will be better fitted for the practical duties of the office of Minister of Customs than a physician could well be.

Eromosa Township Council.

This Council met at the Centre Inn on the 3rd inst. Members all present, the Receiver in chair. After the minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed, the Council proceeded to business. Messrs. D. Rea and Dunbar were appointed a Committee to settle with Messrs. J. Hamill and G. Duffield about some land required to improve the road at the centre of the 4th Concession, between Lots 25 and 26. An account of \$7.38 from J. Horsman, and another of \$6 from J. H. Hacking were ordered to be paid. The timber on the side road between west halves of Lots 15 and 16, in the 5th Concession, was ordered to be sold to J. B. Allan, \$8 were granted to Mrs. Waller, \$6 to Mrs. Macer, \$8 to Rosa El and \$5 to Thomas Bolton, in diligent persons Permission was granted John Nickle to cut a ditch at the side road between the east halves of Lots 20 and 21, in that Concession, on condition that he put the material removed from the ditch on the middle of the road and level and finish the whole in a workmanlike manner, for the due performance of which he was to have his statute labor of next year remitted. \$20 was ordered to be paid to Mrs. Peavey for keeping Margaret Thomson, in terms of an arrangement made with Erin Council. The Clerk was directed to get 250 copies of the minutes, by-laws, etc., printed and ready for distribution at or before the day of the next nomination.

A by-law was introduced and passed after the usual number of readings to repeal By-law No. 2 of 1869 for regulating the Taverns and Shops in the Municipality wherein spirituous and fermented liquors were sold, and enacting a new and more a stringent By-law for the same purpose. The matter respecting the opening of the side road between Lots 30 and 31 in the 1st Concession was referred to the Council for 1874. The Council on motion adjourned to meet at the Centre Inn on Monday the 1st of December next. J. A. DAVISON, Tp. Clerk.

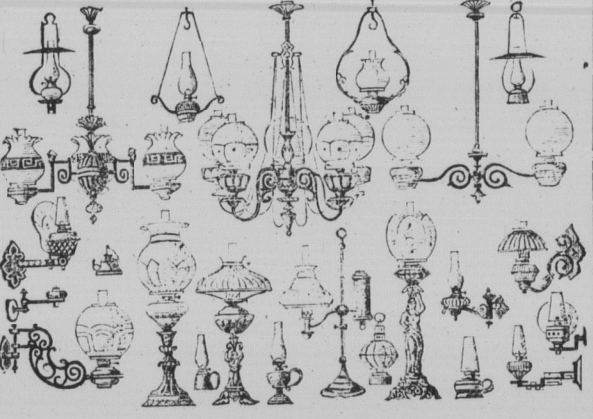

**THE GREAT STORM IN AUGUST.**—The great storm which swept a portion of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Atlantic shores of Nova Scotia, Cape Breton and Newfoundland on the 24th and 25th of August last, destroyed a grand total of 1,122 vessels. Of these 485 were small fishing schooners, but in the list all sorts of vessels are enumerated. Two hundred and twenty-three lives are definitely reported as lost, and the most moderate estimate of the numerous cases in which people were injured or totally destroyed. Some of the marine towns of New England suffered terribly by this disaster. Boats were lost, lives sacrificed, and capital sunk to a most disastrous extent. Storms equal to this in force and duration do not often occur on our coasts, and in a few years their coming will be so announced by the Signal Service, that the disasters will fall immeasurably below those recorded in relation to the blow of August.

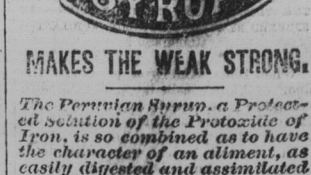
