New York, Sept. 26.—One of the biggest crowds that ever put to sea went down on the Sandy Hook lightship to witness Sir Thomas Lipton's second challenger Shamrock II. and the white filer Columbia, which successfully defended the America's cup against his first trophy hunter two years ago, struggle for the yachting supremacy of the world. But the excursion fleet returned disappointed. The wind was never more than nine, and sometimes as low as three knots, was too light and shifty to carry the contestants over the 30-mile course in the time allotted by the rules. At the end of five and a half hours, the prescribed time, the race was officially declared off. The Columbia was still seven miles from the finish line. The Shamrock was hull down astern of her, the experts estimating her distance behind the Columbia at over three-quarters of a mile. Americans will have reason to congratulate themselves upon the result of the first trial. The Columbia was headed but once in the 25 miles covered and then Shamrock showed the way for only five minutes. In the windward work the Columbia beat the Shamrock seven minutes and fifteen seconds to the outer mark and increased her lead somewhat in the broad reach for home.

While the test was unsatisfactory, the yachting sharp who has been skeptical up to this time as to the ability of the Columbia to snecessfully defend the cup is more confident tonight that it will remain on this side of the Atlantic yet a while longer. The Boy Tells Straight Story of the Events on Wednesday

A coroner's jury yesterday found that Ah Sin, the Chinese boy who was accidentally shot at the residence of Mrs. Bayne, 134 Chatham street, came to his death by a gun shot wound accidentally inflicted. Coroner Hart presided and the jury consisted of Samuel Eastough William William

death by a gun shot wound accidentally inflicted. Coroner Hart presided and the jury consisted of Samuel Eastough (foreman), Andres Johnson. William Johnston, Percy Raymond, George Snider and Keyworth Harrup. Mr. J. M. Bradburn appeared on behalf of the father of the dead boy, and Guy Bayne, in whose hands the gun was when discharged, was not represented by counsel. Wong Duck, father of Ah Sin, was present and was very much affected, his sobs interrupting the taking of evidence, and he was barely able to speak when called to the witness stand.

The first witness called was Dr. Hasell, resident physician at the Jubilee hospital. He told of the arrival of the Chinese boy at the hospital and the condition of the wound. At that time the boy was unable to make a statement. The wound must have been inflicted by a gun shot at very close range, as the skin had been burned by the flash of the powder. It could not have been self-inflicted. He would say that the arm was beside the body when shot and the boy must have received the shot somewhat to the back, as the front part of the arm was intact. The shot could not have been fired from the front.

Constable Handley told of being called to the house and finding the wound.

Constable Handley told of being called to the house and finding the wounded boy. He and Sergt. Hawton assisted the doctor in dressing the patient, who was then taken to the hospital. The boy was not in a condition to make a statement. One shell in the gun had been discharged and this and the loaded one which was also in the gun were stuck fast in the breech. The gun was hard to open.

'Mrs. Bayne was called and gave evidence to the effect that Guy and Sin were on the best of terms—in fact, they all thought a great deal of the dead boy. He was, however, very mischievous and childlike, and was in the habit of playing with Guy. It was a practice for Sin's father to leave fish at the house before they were up in the morning, and she or Guy gave Sin the money for his father. She related an instance in which the dead boy had admitted tampering with an old revolver which she kept as a reife. This led her to think it possible that while Sin was alone in the house he might have gone to Guy's room and in handling the gun might have cocked it. She personally telephoned to the police to acquaint them of the shooting.

This was all the evidence, and Dr. Hart, in summing up, said there were three verdicts the jury could bring inmurder, manslaughter or accidental. As there was no malice shown, a verdict of murder would hardly be a correct one, and it was for the jury to saw whether the fact that Guy Bayne had left a loaded gun in a house where there was a mischievous boy and a little girl, constituted criminal negligence and justified a verdict of manslaughter.
