



If an article costs 70 cents, and the purchaser hands the salesman a dollar bill, it goes without saying that the latter will give back to the customer the 30 cents change. The law of the land lays it down as a fundamental principle that the pur-chaser is entitled to his change. It would appear to be a waste of time, if not downright silly, to argue, or even go through the formality of stating, such a well understod business axiom. Still it may serve a point to keep the axiom clearly before us just now. If the shopkeeper does not give us back our change we can put him in jail. No honest man ever dreams of keeping back change. When Frank Smith (now Sir Francis) kept a retail grocery store many years ago he was very punctilious in seeing that his customers got full weight, good measure and the correct change. It is to the practice of these and similar fundamental principles of honesty that he owes the

It is therefore with a great deal of surprise and much regret that we witless the same gentleman, in the fullness of years and when honors en noble his name, becoming a party to the breaking of a sound and honest business principle. We refer to the hon gentleman's conduct in advising Mr. Pearson not to give back to gas consumers the change to which they are entitled. 




