There are objections to the general practice of medicine, however, by females, and they quickly present themselves to every thinking mind; but equally as great are they to the general and exclusive practice by males. There are certain limits on both sides; but, so long as a lady prescribes only for her own sex, or is governed in her practice by good sense and natural modesty, there is no more reason why she should be excluded from the al profusion than from a place in the streets er a seat in the church. Nay, more; she is demiles, and society cannot well spare her. There are diseases peculiar to herself, that are hurrying mds of mothers and daughters to their graves, or boving them in linguring terments, from the reprojessive the sufferers feel to calling a male physician. It is useless to say that this is oversmalest modesty. There it is, and hundreds of a softer much from the fact.
