THE accompanying is a likeness of the editor and proprietor of the "Jubilee Philatelist."

Mr. Bertrand was born in Prescott, Ont., in 1874. At the early age of 12 he became interested in philately and was soon in possession of a very good collection, to which he has kept adding ever since and has thus gathered 7000 varieties among which are some of the rarest stamps. In his Canadian page very few blanks are to be found.

After several moves he finally settled in Smith's Falls, where he started the Smith's Falls Stamp Co. in 1896. Mr. Bertrand's stock was then of quite an extent but not sufficient to satisfy our restless philatelic friend and in June 1899, he added the

G. C. Keith Stamp Co.'s stock to it; a few weeks after he also purchased the Jubilee Stamp Co. With such a stock one can easily judge the amount of work Mr. Bertrand had to do, and although assisted by two clerks it was impossible for him to keep up the whole business so he sold part of his stock to the former proprietors of the G. C. Keith Stamp Co.

In October 1899 he presented the philatelic world with a new paper, the "Jubilee," which has since won the title of best, largest and most popular stamp paper in the old Dominion. It has up to date published 7 numbers and if we are to judge of its future by its past we have no doubt of its success.--THE EDITORIAL STAFF

ENGLISH LETTER.

The chief event of the month has been the philatelic auction in aid of the war fund and those who were present all pronounced themselves well pleased with the afternoon's entertainment, the catalogue for which the modest sum of 1s. was asked, was handsomely printed in gold with a photo of Queen Victoria. No less than 250 different people contributed to the catalogue amongst whom may be mentioned, The Duke of York, M.P. Castle, Baron de Worms and many other well-known philatelists, one name was specially noticeable viz. A. W. Batchelder of the New England Stamp Co'y. showing the sympathy our American friends extend to us in times of trouble.

Some very fine stamps were sold, the gem of the sale being a 3 lire Tuscany unused which realised the prodigious sum of £93, a similar stamp realised at auction one month before £62 although in this case there was less margin, the catalogue also contained an unused pair of the 1d. black V.R., two £5 Great Britain used and a third unused and two 5s. St. Vincent with star, there was also a set of Trinidad 1891 ½, 1, 2½, 3, 4, 6d. and 1s., all surcharged 9d. issued in commemoration of the visit to the island of the Duke of York, there are only three other sets in existence these being in the possession of his Royal Highness. The total amount realised by the sale was over £1000. A leading photographer took a photo of the assembly during the sale by flash-light and copies were for sale at 3s. 6d. part of which sum goes to the fund.

A 10d. black Canada 1851 laid paper realised £51 at auction last month.

Kipling's 'Absent minded beggar' was of course sung and a collection made, which on being examined was found to contain a 10 penny piece kindly dropped in by some German gentleman, this was at once put up to auction realising 5s. whereupon someone suggested that all who had bid for it should pay and so the humble penny became 15s. A Kruger sovereign realised £2.

The well-known German firm of Senf. Bros. have introduced a great novelty into their monthly journal by reproducing all the illustrations in colors and as there are 100 it gives the paper quite a gorgeous appearance and considering the difficulty this entails the illustrations

are remarkably well executed although of course they cannot always get the exact shades required; the English authorities unfortunately will not allow any illustrations in colors.

Gibbons' new catalogue is now on sale and although it is by no means perfect in its pricing yet it is gradually becoming nearer the mark, and it would be impossible to allow a 50% discount on some of the better class stamps. They have now left out of their catalogue all printers proofs and stamps that should be perforated but have by some means found their way to the public in an imperforate condition, this means that some very highly priced stamps are not excluded from the catalogue, no doubt to the disgust of their various owners as they will now be more difficult of sale.

In 1887 Garabia stamps embossed head which were to be had a few months ago for a very small percentage over face value are rising very rapidly and cannot now be had for less than 80 per cent over face so there is still good profit to be made by those who keep themselves well posted up in stamp matters. A complete sheet of these stamps every value recently realised over 70 per cent at auction, and I heard of a private sale last week at 110 per cent over face value.

NOTES ON STAMPS.

BY JOHN PELTZ.

The 1870 30c. black of the United States is reported to have been found with the secret mark, which was generally believed to be missing in this and the higher values. This secret mark consists of the shading below the label containing the words "Thirty Cents" extends almost the whole length of the label, while in those printed in the National Bank Note Co., there is very little shading close to the shield containing figures of value. Now, what I would observe is this: It does not seem unlikely that now the 30c. has been found with both varieties the other high values, namely 24c. purple and 90c. carmine also exist with the secret marks. I offer the above suggestion to those who hold a quantity of these stamps, to study them and see if they could make any discoveries.

What I would like to see is the formation of an organization or society to protect publishers against advertisers who do not pay their advertising bills. That is, they

send an ad. to a philatelic publisher, not accompanied by cash, but request him to print it, they promising to remit for ad. as soon as it has been printed. Now, most publishers put faith in these assertions, but alas! very few receive any payment after the ad. has been printed. This leads me to state that a society should be organized called "Philatelic Publishers' Protective association." Any honest advertiser giving satisfactory references would be admitted, and for him ads. could be printed on credit. The dues could be fixed at 25c. or 50c. per year. Now get together, publishers, and discuss the above project. How about it?

The "Evergreen" is also at our desk. Philately month by month is very good but we think a little more reading matter ought to be added.

"Bi-monthly" is also welcomed although a very small visitor.

What's the matter with the "Advocate" has it given up "exchange?" We have sent them copies of our paper regularly and have not been favored with the March or April numbers.

Some Hints About Advertising.

BY J. SYDNEY DALTON.

Some advertisers think it peculiar that, although their goods and stock is very good, they cannot get good returns from their ads. and have not a good business by mail. But it is not the fault of the goods or the collectors it is the fault of the advertisements and the way they advertise. An advertisement well worded and put in a good large space and made attractive will be answered by many more collectors than an advertisement put into a small space and cramped up even though the latter may contain better bargains than the former.

Some advertisers believe in putting a two inch ad. in a one inch space. This is one of the worst mistakes it is possible to make as he will, in time, find out. Put a two inch ad. in a one inch space and put the same ad. in a three, four or even six inch space and see what the result will be. Although it will cost more for the six inch space the loss will more than be made up in returns.

An advertiser will often get discouraged because for the first three or four months he advertises, the returns from his ads. are small, but keep on putting them in and you will soon get known and your returns will each month get larger. It takes some time to get known but once you are known you are not soon forgotten and will soon secure a good trade.

It is to the disadvantage of the advertiser and much to the disadvantage of the paper if space is limited.

Dealers that intend advertising all the year round should make a contract with some good advertising medium (such as this paper) for six months or a year and insert an ad. each month.

Don't send advertisements to papers that charge about 20c. per inch because it is not good enough to charge more but send it to some paper that charges 35c., 50c. or 75c per inch and that you know is good and that has a good circulation.

Always answer the returns from your ads. promptly, in this way you will secure the trade of some that would prefer to have the goods sent promptly than having to wait till the dealer got good and ready to send them.

Send your ad. to the paper early so that you can get a good position.

Try to get your ad. on one of the cover pages even though it costs a little more. It will catch the eye of the collector as he looks through.

Send your advertisement to a paper that is well printed and set up a good showy ad.

Always write out ads. plainly so as to avoid mistakes being made for sometimes a whole ad. may be spoiled by a mistake in price or something as bad.

If these few hints are carefully followed out it is not likely that an advertiser will go far wrong and the writer hopes that this advice may be of use to some who are suffering in some way through advertising.

After having been away two years from the old capital I resolved to see once more its old walls and its antique houses. On Monday, February 19th I left Montreal with a few friends "en route" for Quebec. We arrived only 1 hour and 20 minutes late (!) and as soon as we stepped out of the cars we were surrounded by a crowd of howling cabmen who were yelling in an ear-splitting manner and all we heard for the next ten minutes was "cab sir," and "wageen monsieur." At last we made arrangements with one of them and he triumphantly showed us to an old shabby "rig" which he had assured us was the best on the stand. At last we arrived to the summit of an awful steep hill known as "Palace Hill"—why it is thus called I do not know. I didn't see any palaces around a sure thing, and after fifteen minutes drive in the old "bone-shaker" we were soon among the "old folks at home."

It was so very cold that I did not go out till Wednesday. That day I met several old acquaintances and finally struck a college mate. He showed me around the city, in 80 seconds, and as I had not seen any stamp shop I asked him if there was any in town. He told me there were several and he proceeded to show me a few.
