## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

## ONITARIO.

There is unanimity in one respect in the repoits recened regarding the lumber matket. All agree thai there is not the snap about the demand that was antictpated. It is admitted that prices have abnut reached their limit under present conditions, and corseyuently consuaners are only buying for their immediate requirements, feeling that in the near future they may be able to purchase stock at lower prices. Besides, the demand from the building trade has been somewhat backward owing to the high cost of materials of all kinds and to rumors of probable strikes. In the leading cities of Ontario abreements have recently been entered into with the trades unions which will ensure no interruption to building operations from strikes this season, and it is possible that from now on the development in building may be on a more satisfactoty scale. Pine, hemlock and hardwood lumber have all felt the effects of the above condtions, and the market is, if anything, weaker. In Othawa the trade is surrounded by so many uncertainties that it is almost mpossible to gauge the future course of the market.

## QUEHEC AND NEW bRUNSWICK.

The present outlook is that the shipment of lumber from the St. Lawrence this season will be lighter than usual, owing to the destruction by the Ottawa fire of a large quantity of export lumber. The tendency of the export trade is towards higher prices, as the owners of the burned stock will no doubt seek to ieplace it by purchases from other sources. It is reported that holders of certain stocks mimediately marked up their prices as the result of the fire. Lecal trade in Quebec and New Brunswick is not all that could be desired. In Montreal the erection of several proposed buldings has been deferred until next year, when it is thought lumber prices will be lower. The demand from the Eastern States has also fallen off.

## UNITED STATES.

The lumber trade of the United States is quiet. At wholesale points some weak. ness has been shown, but at manufactur ing centers the situation is sisid to be stronger. The east is sull waiting for lower prices, and until dealers at disirluting points ire given some hope of being able to replenish their stock at reasonable prices, they do not feel disposed 10 sacrifice their present holdings.

This has brought about what might be termed a deadlock. Spruce and hemlock are selling at slightly lower figures, and it is prubable that this will stinalute build ing operations in the eastern coties, as these comprise the chief building woods used in the east. Hardwood prices ate being well mamtained. ljasswood seems to lead in demand, but new stock is enpected to come on the market shortly. Shingle stocks in the eastern caties are low, and best is inch white pine sells at $\$ 4$.

Reports from the British market do not speak very encouragingly of the outlook for the season's trade. The consumption has not improved as might be expecied with the advent of spring, and it is teared that there will be considerable difficulty in keeping stocks fiom accumulatins as the season advances. Some importers of wood goods are buying at the weekly auction sales owing to the high prices asked by shippers in exporting countries. There are, however, some favorable features to the market situation. The stocks of Canadian pine and spruce deals, etc., at the Surrey Commercial Docks at London are considerably leis than one year ago. Of pine deals there were on Apnl 30 th of this year 323.999 pieces, and of spruce deals 162,706 pieces, against 360,357 and 355,305 pieces respectively one year ago. The stock of pine battens shows an increase of 40,000 pieces, but spruce battens are 120,000 pieces less than one year ago. It is also satisfactory to note that in no class of Canadian lumber bas there been a decline in price during the past morth; on the other hand, some varicues have advanced. At Glasjow second quality pine deals are about eight shillings per standard higher, selling at $\mathcal{L}_{19} 185$ 9d to $\neq 21$ 6s 3 d for broad, and $\mathcal{L} 16$ los for undersized. Fourth quality pine deals have advanced about four shillings, while red pine deals are firmer at 6,15 as $6 d$ to 2,10 tos per standard. In square and waney tumber there has been some improvemen:, elm and ash selling about two shillings per cubic foot higher than one month ago. Quebec burch has also undeigone an advance of about one shilling per cubic foot.

The recent disastrous fire and its bearing on the lumbering industry in the Capital are still the nost absotbing subjects of interest in com. mercial circles. in some quarters the spread of the fire is atributed to the presence of the large areas of lumber in the manufaciuring district of the Chaudere, and near the residenual section furlher south. Hence there is an agitation on fout to so arrange the fire area and secure piling ground outside the city; Others suggest that the lumber be permitted to remain within the city limits, but at a safe stated dis ance from fireproof structures. Mr. J R. Booth, the leading lumberman interested, has enteral a vigorous brotest to the proposal for removal. Answering the argument that the lumber was in the greatest degree responsible for the fire, he claines that its rapid spread was made possible by the streets of shingle-roofed frame houses, with which the burned area was in a great part built up. Other cities have came through worse fires than Ottawa, he claim, and theugh lumber was a great factor therein, few chatged it with being responsible for the conflagration. In English and American cities the lumber is piled some" hat the same as in Oltawa, but, being surrounded by fireproof structures, the danger is reduced to a minimum. Mr. Booth has a large following of business men and others, who recognize what his and other lumbering concerns hinve done to build up and support Ilull and Ottawa. They believe accondingly that be should be encouraged rather than discouraged, which will be the case if he is compelled to pile at a greater distance than heretofore.
Discussing the subject himself, Mr. Booth states that his present piling space is totally inadequate to contain the output ot his mill, which is again manning night and day. He will for various reasons be deprived of at least piling space for $30,000,000$ feet, and to relieve the pressure he will have to have resource to
increased shipments by rail and water. Unless increased shipments by rail and water. Unless he is permitted to use the remaining ground at
his disposal, the lumber king states, he will be his disposal, the lumber king states, he will be compelled to shut down his mills, throwing
Soo men out of employment. It will take at least a year and large capital to fit up yards at he distance proposed by some, and in the meantime the mills would be idle, depriving hundreds, now without a home, of their employment for that time. The council is thus called upon to face a serious problem. Many
maintain that the driving out of the lamber inmaintain that the driving out of the lumber in-
lerests wiil not affect the city, as other industries terests wiil not affect the city, as other ind hasties giving steadier cmployment and paying higher vages will succeed the lumber mills. As past jears has proven the fallacy of this prophecy. Several mills have shut down and nothing in the industrial line has taken their places, while hose industries wiped out by the
fire were many of theme dependent on the lumber mills.
Mr. Booth states that the fire will only affect the export trade temporarily, and only to the extent of the export lumber wiped ous by fire. Owing to shortage of piling space, his shipments must be largely increased, and hence any pressing shortage in the English and American markets will in a degrec be satisfied.
Gilmour \& Hughson's mill, which escaped the fire, is running full time, and the W. C. Edwards mill is being operated night and day to satisfy the increa ed
