HAMILTON, ONT.—The Board of Education have selected a site on Sophia street for the proposed new school.—The recommendation of the Board of Works to engage Mr. F. B. Rae, of Detroit, to make an estimate of the cost of installing an electric light plant, was struck out by the Council at its meeting on Monday last.—A new surgical wing is to be erected to St. Joseph's hospital. Mr. A. W. Peene, architect is inviting tenders until to-day (Thursday) for the erection of two houses on Hughson street south. Building permits have been granted as follows: O. A. Horning, pr. 2 story brick dwellings on Grove street, between Wellington and Liberty streets, cost \$4,000; John Lowery, pr. 2 story brick dwellings on Emerald street, between Cannon and Robert streets, cost \$2,000; Mrs. Reid, 2 story brick dwelling on Rebecca street, between Mary street and Ferguson avenue, cost \$1,200.

The same architects are preparing plans for a row of stores to be erected on the old Erskine church property. The build-ing will be erected to the height of one Ly at present, but it is the intention to add four or five storeys later on, for the accommodation of a first class hotel. A large warehouse on Common street for Mr. James Wilson will also be erected from plans prepared by Messrs. Dunlop & Heriot.—Messrs. Perrault, Mesnard & Venne, architects, are preparing plans for a number of large buildings to be erected this summer, among which is a new theatre, which will cost in the neighbor-hood of \$75,000. The site has not yet been selected by the promoters, but the corner of Bleury and St. Catherine streets is spoken of, also the site of the present Theatre D'Opera Français, corner of St. Dominique and St. Catherine streets; should the latter site be chosen, a row of stores would be erected on St. Catherine street in connection with the project. A resolution has been adopted by the promoters of the permanent fever hospitals. recommending the Local Board of Health to proceed at once to select a site, in order that the architects may estimate the cost of dramage and water supply. The architects chosen are Messrs. Perrault & Mann.—New tenders are asked by the Superintendent of Waterworks until the 8th inst. for supplying and erecting a double horizontal turbine and power pumps. The sum of \$45,000 has been subscribed toward the reconstruction of the Montreal General Hospital. - Mr. Resther, architect, has prepared plans for a new armory for the Mount Royal Rifles. A site has been selected, and work will be commenced at an early date.-Mr. L. J. Seargeant, General Manager Grand Trunk Railway, invites tenders until May

31st for stores of various kinds required by the company at Montreal, London, Hamilton and other places, for twelve months from 1st July.

TORONTO, ONT .- At the meeting of the Council on Monday last, it was decided to issue debentures for \$50,000 to provide funds for the erection of new school buildings in various parts of the city - The City Engineer has reported to Council that the cost of constructing a system of waterworks for the island would be in the neighborhood of \$60,000. regard to the application of Mr. Frank Turner, C E., for permission to construct a system, he recommends that the city own and operate its own works on the island, and that the request be not granted.—An asphalt pavement is recommended on Winchester street, from Parliament street to Ontario street, at a cost of \$7,440.—The Toronto Golf Club have about completed the purchase of 30 acres of the Fernhill estate which the club has had leased for a number of years. It is the intention of the club to erect a new club house and make other improvements thereon. - We learn that the New England Theatre Company, of Boston, Mass., has purchased the Davidson property on the corner of Spadma avenue and Sullivan street and propose to creet a first-class modern theatre, at a cost of \$100,000. Mr. H. Bridgewater, is acting as agent for the company, in Toronto. It is reported that Messrs. Darling, Sproatt & Pearson, architects, will pre-pare the plans, and that it will be a threestory brick structure, with brown stone facings.—The Ontario Legislature have sanctioned the following railway subsidies: \$3,000 per mile to the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Railway Company, from a point near Irondale easierly for a distance of fifteen miles; \$7,500 per mile to the Northern & Pacific Junction Railway Company, for a spur line from a point near Burk's Falls, to connect with the navigation of the Maganetawan River, a distance of about one and a half miles; 3,000 per mile to the Ottawa, Amprior & Parry Sound Railway Company for a line from Barry's Bay, a distance of thirty five miles: \$3,000 per mile to the Ontario & Rainy River Railway Company, from a point near Land Lake to a point near Moss Township and Kawawiagamog River, a distance of 35 miles.—Tenders will be asked by the Board of Works for Siemens & Adams meters, to be manufactured in Toronto. -An item of \$15,000 to purchase two diamond drills for mining has passed the Ontario Legislature.—

The public school building at Watford, Ont., was destroyed by fire on Monday last. Insurance, \$2,200. W. C. Clift's store at Aurora, Ont., was burned a few days ago Loss, \$3,800; insurance, \$2,600 Moore & Macdowell's extensive saw mills near Edmonton, N. W. T., were burned on the 28th inst. Loss, \$9,000; no insurance.—A five-story brick and stone building situated on Notre Dame street west, Montreal, and owned by Laporte & Marin, was destroyed by fire a few days ago. The loss on the building, including stock, will be in the neighborhood of \$150,000, which is partially covered by insurance.—An hotel at Cheltenham, Ont., occupied by Mr. Oakes, was burned last week; insurance \$1,300.—A. McKeigan's residence at Strathroy, Ont., and Fawcett's sash and door factory, were destroyed by fire on the 28th April. Loss on factory, \$3,000; no insurance.—The

Town Hall at Brampton, Ont., was destroyed by fire on Tuesday last.—J. C. Morden's store and residence at Greensville, Ont. was burned recently. Loss, \$2,500; insurance, \$1,500.—The pattern shop of the Royal Electric Co., Montreal, together with the 15,000 horse power incandescent light machine, was destroyed by fire on the 1st inst. The loss will leach \$60,000, which is covered by insurance.

STONE-WORK.

Stone walls are measured by the perch (2434) cubic feet). Openings less than 3 feet wide are counted solid: over 3 feet deducted, but 18 inches are added to the running measure for each jamb built. Arches are counted solid from their spring. Corners of buildings are measured twice. Pillars less than 3 feet are counted on 3 sides as lineal, multiplied by fourth side and depth.

It is customary to measure all foundation and dimension stone by the cubic foot. Water tables and base courses by lineal feet. All sills and lintels or ashlar, by superficial feet, and no wall less than

18 inches thick.

The height of brick or stone piers should not exceed 12 times their least thickness at base.

TORONTO JUNCTION SEWERAGE SYSTEM.

Mr. Willis Chipman, C.E., has published his final report on the sewerage system of the town of Toronto Junction, showing the total length of sanitary sewers to be 6.57 miles; of combined severs 0.27 miles; and of storm sewers 3.96 miles; number of manholes, of which 11 are double, 143; flush tanks, 26; catch basins, 100; lampholes, 440. The average cost per foot of sanitary sewers was \$1.78; of combined sewers, \$4.21; of storm sewers, \$2.45; of sewer system, \$2.08. Mr. Chipman, in his report makes acknowledgement of the assistance rendered to him by ex-Mayor Pears, ex-Chairmen Hoover and Wright, Mr. Abrey, Town-Engineer; Mr Leigh, Town Clerk; Mr. Cleminer, Town Treasurer; and Mr. A. L. McCulloch, C.E., Resident Engineer.

The flow of water through new cast-iron pipe was recently measured by S. Ben-Russell, of the St. Louis, Mo., Water-Works. The pipe was 12 inches in diameter, 1,631 feet long, and laid on a uniform grade from end to end. In a letter to John C. Trautwine, Jr., Mr. Rsusell states that as there was an opportunity to make some pretty accurate measurements of the discharge of the pipe, he had the necessary observations carried out and found that under an average total head of 3.36 feet the flow was 43,200 cubic feet in seven hours; under an average head of 3.37 feet the flow was 46,700 cubic feet in eight hours and 35 minutes. Making allowance for loss of head due to entrance and to curves it was found that the value of c in the formula $v = c\sqrt{r} s$ was from 88 to 93.



Businessin glass shows some disposition to improve, but notwithstanding this fact, jobbers find it difficult to supply the demand, only to the depleted condition of stocks, and very few new supplies being received.
