# NOTES AND COMMENTS.

It is such a common thing in England for the daily papers to criticize the mililary authorities that it probably does not surprise Gen. Herbert to find himself an attractive centre for newspaper criticism in Canada. General officers are of course no more infalible than other prople, and General Herbert has, of course, made mistakes like other people will. He is moreover energetic and aggressive in his methods to be popular with everybody. Still who doubts but that he is working night and day in what he considers to be the b st interests of the militia, and who can deny even if this wanted to that most of the attacks made upon the genera! were quite uncalled for. It is not likely that the g nerall is kept awake at nights by the attacks in the daily papers, but there is no denying the fact that these oft recurring criticisms are likely,

to have the effect of slackening the discipline of the force.

Our ginerals have always been the butts of criticism for the busy press, and misinformed scribblers have done their best to to hold them up to ridicule and contempt. Why this is so it is difficult to say if we cannot find an explanation in the gag clauses of Regulations and Orders which prevents even the general, we presume, from spraking in his self-defense. We hardly think, however, that the Canadian pless is so cowardly as this. Neither would we like to think that these criticisms are due to The fact of the general being an Englishman; but what in the world the are they due to?

Among the things which have brought the general within the range of press criticism since his return from England have been the appointment of the new Quartermaster General, the "Etna" salute at Montreal, and his action with reference to the military tournament organization at Toronto. As to the appointment of the Quartermaster General, there can be but one opinion in the force. A Quartermaster G.n ral's departm nt is needed, and it is advisable that its organization should be in the hands of a thoroughly experienced officer. Whether such a man could be found in Canada is perhaps a debateable question, but the chances of giving complete satisfaction in the position as between a Canadian militia officer and a staff officer of the Imperial service are twenty to one in favor of the latter. There are some features in the selection of Major Lake which at first sight appear a trifle fishy.

The great care to couple with the announcement of the appointment the statement that he is a Canadian, although he happened to be born here by accident, and the fact that he is a connection of the Abbott family led some people to doubt whether his merits were alone respon ible for his obtaining the appointment. Investigation into his record proves that Major Larke is a most experienced and competent officer, and anybody who knows anything at all about General Herbert: must know that he is not the man to lend his countenance to a political job.

As to the "Etna" affair over which the general was so roundly abused by a section of the press, and charged even with being animated by the narrowest of religious prejudices, there can scarcely be a military man in Canada who would not have done as the general did, had he happened to be in the same position. The I alian admiral, as a Montreal weekly paper points out, was no more justified insaluting the ruins of the St. Hellen's Island barracks than he would have been in saluting the ruins of the old asylum at Longue Pointe. Of course he has a right to burn harmless powder when and where, he chooses, so long as it does not conflict: whith the rules of the service with which he is connected; but it is coming to a pretty pass if foreign naval officers are to be allowed to fire salutes when and where they like in Canada and demand that the

As to the attaks madec upon the general with regard to the military tournament organization it is only necessary to say that they were based upon errorness information. We believe we are correct in saying that the general never forbade the Queen's Own Rifles to turn out as they had contemplated doing. parade, appear to have been merely actuated by their own good taste after learnin; that the tournament organization had no military status. It appears that most of the members of the organization are not even members of the reserve, having been bought out of the service for this American enterprise. Th y, of course, were British soldiers once, and expert ones; but they do not wear British uniforms now because they have a right to, but because there is no law prohibiting anybody that likes from sporting Her Majesty's livery. This, of course, is a shame, but there is no help for it, as was proved by the case of the sandwich men arrested in London for wearing the uniform of the Royal Marine Light Infantry.

# The Ammunition at Bisley.

Statements having appeared in the daily papers affecting the quality of the Martini-Henry ammunition issued to competitors at Bisley, it may be well to state that such preports should be received with some caution. It is almost always the case that if competitors fail to score as they think they should, the cartridges are pretty sure to be blamed, and the officals at Woolwich consequently, held to be answerable. Now, as a matter of fact, there have been very few fallures in this matter at Bisley this year, and the percentage on the number of shots fired is so small as to be scarcely worthy of remark. There were no doubt a few cases of miss-fire, and in one instance a competitor had no less than four miss-fires in seven rounds; an examination of the rifle, however, disclose the fact that, from snapping or some other cause, the point of the striker was defective and thus responsible for the ignition of the charge. On the whole the quality of the amouninition served out appears to have it en very satisfactory, and any falling off in big scores is to be attributed to defective strikers and springs and the unpropitious weather, father than to anything clse.-Broad Arrow.

# Bullet Proof Uniforms no Novelty.

Bullet proof uniforms, it appears, were known long ago to the Chinese. They were made of leather and wook in the north and paper and cotton cloth in the south of China. It seems ridicutous to call such combination armor, and yet they make an armor superior in amony instances to steel. Thirty thicknesses of alternate calico and paper will resist a platol bullet, or one from a rifl eat a distance of 100 yards.

A spearman who thrusts his weapon into it man clad in this kind of gaptment can heither wound his enemy nor extract his weapon, and if the enemy is an archer or armed with a long sword or javelin he is likely to lose his life for his mischance,—London Tit-Bits.

A special to the Mail from Ottawa says: The militia force of the Dominion and indeed the Canadian public, will be surprised before very many days have passed by the announcement from Ottawa of certain appointments and changes in high places in the staff made by Major General Herbert. The stories about serious disagreements between the Major General and the Government which have been current of late are absolutely without foundation. Before the Major General left Ottawa for his recent visit to England he had outlined the greater part of the reconstruction of the staff which he intended making. Since his return he has completed his scheme of reconstruction. which your correspondent has the best authority for stating has the complete approval of the Minister of Militia and Defence and of the Government. Mr. Patterson and Major General Herbert are in perfect accord. Your corraspondent has the very best authority for this statement. Its truth will be abundantly proved before very long by the official announcement of the changes in the staff. What these changes are to be cannot just now be stated in detail. Perhaps the most notable will be the appointment of an English officer, a friend of Major General Herbert, as quartermaster general for Canada. There has never yet been such an official, and now that such an importaut appointment is to be made it is rather likely that the general opinion among the officers and men of the militia will be that it should be given to a Canadian. As for the other changes in the staff, they will be such as to cause the greatest surprise among the military men of tthe Dominion. Hends are to be cutt off in quarters where this highhanded process of decapitation is most unlooked for, and transferences made which

will result in a rather exceping change

of the make-up of the staff. Major General Herbert's theory that the Canadian militia should have applied to it the methods of organization and government of the British military system is a theory which has already gained for the Major General no small degree of unpopularity he has persisted in his work of carrying that theory into force and impressing it upon the constitution of the Canadian militia The order-in-council appointing the new quartermester general who is to come from England, has not yet been finally approved of, but the appointment has been decided upon.

I am asked to send you the following letter which appeared in a local paper i Sir,-The proposition to establish a battalion of militia in Toronto which thall be distinctly English is one which should meet with the approval of every Englishmen. There are, however, one or two points in this proposed organization which are open to criticism. First, as to uniform, some of the promoters desire to adopt a grey uniform. Permit me to say that grey is not the English mational colour. It is worn by the Russians and the Americans, neither of whom a:e looked upon as England a warmest friends. Again, it is distinctly amateurish and unsoldierly. It is not etylish and attractive to recruits, a very important matter. It is passing out of use even among English volunteers i surely we should not adopt that which they discard. It has the further disadvantage that in case of actual warfare the battalion could easily be distinguished from regular troops, with whom it might be associated, and thus be marked for especial attack. I understand that the Department of Militin has recently refused the Prince of Wales' Rifles permission to wear this dress, so there is little chance of its being permitted in this case. The British colour is scarlet; no other nation uses it. It is everywhere a sociated with England's glory. The "thin rod line" is engraven on every Englishman's heart. Why try to substitute a grey one?

In the second place I do not think that it would be wise to adopt the proposed title, "St. George's Rifle," because there exist other corps of this name in England, Australia and elsewhere. Why, not have a new and distinctive name, instead of borrowing honours? I would like to see a light infantry regiment in scarlet uniform. Would not the Duke of York (Prince George) lend us the light of his countername?

I would therefore suggest that this new corps be uniformed in scarlet, and be styled the Duke of York's Light infantry Regiment. Such, at all events, are the opinions of, Yours, ets.,

I am sure I but reflect their opinions and desires when I wish you a long and prosperous career uader its folds um sure I express your desires and intentions when I hope that you will be true to it and honor it by your conduct as young Highland Canadian soldiers. Be worthy the confidence we all repose in you; live up to our good opinion of you all; never forget the duty you owe to the ladies, whom! I thank in the name of St. Andrew's society, for having given me the opportunity to present this flag to you. I shall now take this opportunity to make a personal remark. and I do so entirely on my own responsibility, and not officially. You are young soldiers soon to be men, and then take leave of this company. You will probably join the Royal Scots or some other volunteer corps and loose your individuality in their ranks. # ST. JUHN, N.B.

The St. John Sun thus describes the last of the Blake's three days' visit to this town.

Tuesday was a day that will long be remembered in this city. It was the last day of H. M. S. Blake in port: The anmouncement that three hundred men were to be landed and give an exhibition drill on the Barrack square and afterwards parade the principal streets brought out thousands of people. About Reed's Point many hundreds assembled to see the men land. The crowd of spectators rather enjoyed the joke and laughed heartily. The police proceeded to the Barrack square by way of St. James street. Everybody regrets that Vice-Admiral Hopkins has seen fit to make his visit to this port only cover three clear days. There are hundreds of people who were debarred from visiting the ship owing to the great crush on Sunday, Monday, and yesterday. The thousands of people who lined the wharves at the lower portion of the harbor last night enjoyed themselves, or at least seemed to. ### THE ROYAL MARINE ARTILLERY.

The record and organization of the distinguished corps that provides the garrison for the British Columbia defences.

Some surprise has been expressed that a marine corps should have been selected to proide the garrison for the nev British Columbia defences. This has doubtless arisen through a misconception as to the organization and raison d'etre of the Royal Marine Artillery and just at this time, the following article on the corps from the pen of Lt. J. M. Rose, R. M. A., published in the United Service Magazine, makes interesting reading:

I have been so often asked the question, "What do you Marine Artillerymen do?" that I am glad to have an opportunity of replying to it in these pages, not at any length, and not in a very perfect manner, but just jotting down a few details as they occur to me.

To begin with the men. Enlistment

for the RRoyal Marines is general, recruits being accepted at eight centres in England and Scotland, and at the four Marine Divisions. All enlist for a period of 12 years, and from these recruits men may volunteer for the Marine Artillery, if they have a minimum height of five feet nine inches and chest measurement in proportion to height. There is no lack of recruits of good intellectual qualities at this standard, and thus it is that only men of very good character are allowed to re-engage to serve for pension. For a further period of nine years.

They are well paid, and, as they are of exceptional physique and enlisted for long fervice, they are worth a careful training—and they get it.

. Their instruction commences with infantry drill at the Depot, followed by courses of musketry, naval gun drill and target practice, land service drills (consisting of field battery, garrison and siege artillery drills, and repository and laboratory work), and ending with an infantry field-training course. All these latter are carried out at the headquarters of the corps, Eastney Barracks, Portsmouth. The squads are examined by a field officer at the end of each course, and recruits are not passed to the next instruction till they have fully qualified in the preceding one; indeed, if they do not arrive at a fixed standard of excellence in haval gun drill they are no longer retained in the Marine Artillery. Having passed these courses, the recruit is now, after some two years' work, considered fully trained, and ready for his first ship, although on an emergency, or on general mobilisation, he may have been embarked after qualifying in infantry, mu-ketry, and naval gunnery.

If the recruit takes two years to train the young officer takes nearly four, receiving two years' theoretical training at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, accompanied by riding and gymnastic, instruction, a course of torpedo and one of gunnery in the naval schools, a short fire-master's course at Woolwich, and finally going through, at Eastney, a series of courses identical with those of the recruits. To obtain and retain his commission he has to qualify in twelve distinct examinations, eight of which are tests of his ability to handle men in the various branches of gunnery and infantry; and only after having done this he is also considered ready for service

Now ensues, for both officer and man, a period of constant readiness. They are marked 'first for sea," and know not in what hour, in what day, they may be despatched to any quarter of the globe; but great is the disappointment if the embarking telegram is only an order to join a ship of the First Reserve on Coastguard duty at Glasgow, Hull, &c., which are largely manned by marines.

The detachment having arrived on board a man-of-war, it would appear that the real work for which this long training has been necessary should begin; yet, as a matter of fact, only one page of one drill-book has any practical application in the new life—the one which refers to

the particular gun at which the man is stationed; yet evidently one must be trained in every type to at once confidently work a gun never before seen. Officer and man have a new class of duties to learn—for the officer a long trial of patinit well-disciplined inaction, while the man becomes as a blue jacket, and except for guard duty performs very similar work.

"What do you Marine Artiflerymen do, then, on shipboard?" Well, I know from experience that if I reply, "We work the guns on board ship," I shall be met with a second question, "But don't the blue-jackets work the guns?" and on my replying in the affirmative, by the second query, "Then what is the use of Marine Artiflerymen?" the answer is simple.

Let me go back to the origin of the corps. In the days of Nelson, when gunnery was first becoming an art, the naval officer had enough to do to teach the pressed man his sail-drill and seamanship, and had no time to study gunnery. Nelson first tried embarking Royal Artillery to work the guns, but this was found inconvenient, and in 1804 the Admiralty formed an artillery force to teach the lest of the Marines and blue-jackets how to manage the guns, the Marine Artillery companies having founded naval schools of gunnery, and instruction batteries at the Marine divisions were reduced to two.

However, guns and their fittings became more and more complicated, whilst sail-drill was still important, and in 1862 the corps of Marine Artillery was reconstituted in its present form-that is to say, a separate division of sixteen companies with a strength of some 2.700 men, and with headquasters first at Fort Cumberland, and then at Eastney Bartacks, Portsmouth. The Marine Artillery, then, was started to teach the Navy gunnery, but to-day, with mastless ships, the blue-jacket has time to be well instructed in gunnery. If, however, the abolition of masts has almost changed the seaman-gunner into an artilleryman. it has so so altered things that the Marine can do a very great deal of the work of the ship: he can signal, or pull a boat, and has been known to sail one, to heave the lead, or man the helm, and he is far less costly to the nation than the blue-jacket, who has to be trained from boyhood. Therefore a navy manned entirely by blue-jackets would be unnecessarily ruinous to the taxpayer. Yet the daily introduction of more complicated mechanism in the guns renders a body of highly trained gunners an indispensable portion of the ship's complement.

Thus I would argue that the greater importance of mechanics and steam and the lessening value of seamanship in so far as it concerns sail-drill and sails, has rather increased than diminished the raison detre of the Marine Artilleryman.

I certainly do not wish, however, to advocate any addition to his multifarious duties. He is now ambitious to be as good a seaman as a seaman-gunner at sea, as good a gunner as an artilleryman on shore, and as good an infantryman as

any in the service. That he has some claim to these titles is shown in peace by (1) in the annual competitions on hoard ship it is usual for guns worked by Marine Artillerymen under their own offleers to take prizes; (2) in the annual 10-inch M.-L. gun competition at Shoelanyness (the only opportunity given them of competing with the Royal Artillery), the gun detachment sent from Eastney is always well placed, and has ceveral times been first; (3) in all army rifle meetings and matches near Port-, mouth the Marine Artillery team is well known as being among the best: (4) on parade and in manocurres they are generally praised for their infantry drill.

So much for peace. Now let us examine how each instruction has been of value when put to the crucial test of war.

In their proper function, that of manning guns on board ship, they have taken part in every naval action since their formation, inluding in clater years the bombardments of Sevastopol, of Sveaborg, and of Alexandria. At Sveaborg, Marine Artillery officers were placed in command of mortar boats.

As infantry they have been engaged in almost every small war of their century of existence; in the larger war against against France they were absorbed by the requirements of the Fleet, and only landed as infantry in forming part of a Naval Brigade. They were in Canada, China several times, New Zealand, Ashantee' (where most of the preliminary work fell to their share). Zululand, Egypt and the Soudan: India alone has been to them a forbidden territory, but even there they have in solitary in tances done service, as in Burmah, for in tance, in 1886.

. That their land service artillery drill has not been wasted it well shown by examples from history. With field guns, they were employed as a field battery in the Carlist war in Spain; in 1839, in a mule-buttery with rope harness arranged by themselves in Mexico; in 1864, with a field buttery in China; and in a taule machine-gun battery at Suakim in 1885. In 1882, in Egypt, they were not upplied with guns ashore, but served as an infantry battation in all the actions of that brilliant campaign. Yet here again their knowledge of field artillery drill was utilised. In the advanced guard action about Tel-el-Mahuta on August 24 only two gans were present, belonging to the Royal Horse Artillery. The gunners of this division, after maintaining for five hours a duel against 12 Egyptian guns, became so exhausted that Gencial Willis ordered a few of the Marine A: tillery to assist them, who, from this time, shared with the Horse Artillery the severest labours of the day. Again, in the advanced guard action on August 28 at Kaspassin, "The shells from the encmy's artillery were chiefly directed upon a Keupp gun which, taken from the encmy at Mashama, had been mounted on a railway truck, and was worked by a gun detachment of the Marine Artillery under the command of Captain Tucker." Four Horse Artillery guns came up to reinforce them, but "their fire became so

slow from want of ammunition as scarcely to relieve the Marine detachment." Somewhat later these four guns were withdrawn altogether, and the Marine Artillery Krupp gun maintained the fight, as regards artillery fire, till its close at 7.15 p. m. On September 9, in the second action at Kassassin it was this same gun which fired the first shot on our side at 7.15 a. m. "This was directed upon a train bringing up some of the Egyptian troops." At the battle of El sseb. in 1884, the Marine Artillery captured a Krupp gun from the Arabs, which Major Tucker was again enabled to work with success, thus accomplishing twice within two years this exceptional feat of employing the enemy's own guns to aid in their defeat. In siege warfare they did good service in the batteries at Sebastipol, some officers also being employed as acting Engineers. It was in the Sandbag Battery that Bombardier Wilkinson won the Victoria Cross, for which deco. ation he was recommended by the Royal Artillery officer in command there. Colonel Dare Dowell also received the V. C. in the Russian War for saving a boat's crew of the Ruby in the action at Viborg—a fair share of these most esteemed deco. ations, considering the small effective of the corps.

For working guns of position in fortresses England has had little need of their services, but after the bombardment of Alexandria the Royal Marine Artillery landed from the fleet found suitabel employment in remounting guns for the detence of the town.

Formerly, when ships were commissioned, a detachment of Marine Artillery was sent first to mount the guns and rig the tackles and gun-gear, and it seems to me that in case of a great mixal war they will be found invaluable in organizing the artillery of the large "limers" which are retained by the Government to serve as additional cruis-

. They have frequently performed duties of some civil value. Returning from Egypt in 1882, a force of picked old solthers were sent to Dublin to aid in police work there, for which arduous duty they were publicly thanked. They were twice sent to Skye to support the police, and this duty they performed with so much tact that, on leaving, the men were entertained at a farewell banquet by the crofters, and parted with mutual regrets on both sides. After forming part of the garrison of Suakim from 1884. to 1885, a detachment of Marine Artillery was sent to form part of the garrison of Port Hamilton, a quieter but more salubrious duty.

The first trip to Sky. (November 11. 1884), illustrates the peculiar value of the Marines in our little wars—their "first-for-sea" organisation, which permits of battalions being sent on distant service at the very shortest notice. The detachment for Skye received its orders to go between noon and 1 p. m., and were on board H. M. S. Assistance by 8.80 p. m.—the Dockyard is an hour's march from Eastney—and the ship had cast off from the jetty at 4 p. m.; and this was done as quite an every-day occurrence of bar-

rack life. No apparent gap was left by the departing men; ordinary routine was not disturbed. One of the officers only received his order to start at 2.30 p. m.. and had thus only a few minutes in which to pack. A Marine is one morning tranquilly carrying out his ordinary duty on parade, and yet by night is starting for a little war in China, the West Coast of Africa, or the Soudan; or in peace, the young subaltern is airing his mess jacket at a dance given by the King and Queen of Honolulu, much to the admiration of Her Majesty, is hunting kangaroo, or flirting with Japanese " Moosmies " within a few weeks of finishing his drills on the Eastney Parade.

It is this state of daily readiness of a portion of the force for foreign service as well as the ready habit of the old Marine to "shake down" at once into a new position, which fits the corps so admirably for the garrison of the advanced posts covering a diembarkation and necessary for the formation of depots and magazines on the line of advance. Today, however, with the large increase in our first line of defence, there are not so many men available for this work as there were in 1882.

Now that there is a growing idea that that we ought to have a real short service system, a separate Indian and a separate colonial army, it seems to me that the Marine organisation is best fitted for the colonial army. If the system of garrisoning the coaling stations and colouisl posts were alone carried out, it would set free the Army for the performance of its already too onerous duties at home and in India. For this the corps of Royal Marines would have to be considerably increased; but it has never suffered from lack of recruits, and if the colonies could be induced to aid in bearing part of the expense it would be in immense stride in the cause of Imperial Federation. Though somewhat adopting the French system, our Marines, unlike theirs, would be still available for reinforcing the fleet after a battle, and in peace for effecting the ordinary reliefs to the detachments embarked.

As adding yet another accomplishment towards fitting the corps for the defence of naval ports, a squad of Marine Artillerymen with four officers has undergone an extensive course of submarine mining with the Royal Engineers at Chatham, and these are still keeping up their practice at the Submarine Mining Depot (R. E.) at Gosport; and all officers of the Royal Marine Artillery have, as already stated, qualified in torpedo work on board H. M. S. Vernon, the rincipal naval school of submarine mining.

The signallers of the corps are trained in both Army and Navy methods, so as to be fitted to keep up communication between a fleet at sea and a military force on land.

t In considering the difficulties of dual control in the defence of a harbour fortness, who is naturally so fitted as a Marine officer is to arrange minor details acquainted as he is with the discipline and routine of both the Navy and Army.

I have thust ried to answer the question. "What do you Marine Artillerymen do?" by showing how they are trained, what they have done in the past, what they are trying to do now, and what they might do in the future. There are some things they do not do, "but that is another story," and its details may readily be obtained elsewhere.

# ECHOES OF THE BISLEY MEETING.

The bi-medalist is no new aspirant for Queen's Prize honours. Coming to Bisley with a considerable amount of local fame last year, he was one of Maj Pollock's runners up in the final stage, tieing with Comber for second honours only two points behind the winner. He is, we are told, a mason by trade being employed in this occupation, as foreman, by the London and North-Western Railway Company. After his marvellous success in the first and second stages, it is singular that Stocks should have fallen to pieces so utterly at 900 yards as to put on only three magpies. Another example of the glorious uncertainty of rifle shootingthat uncertainty which constitutes its principal charm.

An arralysis of the constituent elements of the Queen's Hundred shows that it comprises 43 representatives of English, 45 of Scottish, and five of Welsh corps, whilst seven rank as Colonials, within the meaning of the term under N.R.A. rules. With the exceptio nof three engineers, one artilderyman, und one yeoman, the whole of the Hundred are infantrymen. There are 11 officers, 31 staff sergeants, colour sergeants, sergeants, and lance-sergeants, 17 corporais, and 41 troopers, gummers, suppers, and privates.

It is interesting to note that there is a steady unintenance of the number of officers entitled to the Queen's badges, which they are precluded by the regulations from wearing. In 1891 ten officers shot into the hundred; last year there was an increase of one, this year the number is the same as last year. As with the officers so with the other grades, history comes very near to repenting itself. Last year the sergeants of all categories were 39, corporals, 11 and privates 39.

Comparing the aggregate scores in the three stages of the Oueen's Prize with those of last year we find that Sergequit Davies takes the blue riband with three points less than Major Pollock. The former's aggregate was 274 the latter's 277. The man that whipped in the Hundred last year did so with 224; this year's last man compiled one point less. This year's figures show that there was a general and fairly uniform falling off in the Oueen's totals.

\* \* \* \*

The superior character of the shooting last year in the Oueen's first stage to that of this year is shown by the fact that whereas there were then 50 scores of 90 and upwards in the Three Hundred, there were only 26 of these figures last week. Then scores of 84 were at the bottom, whilst a considerable number of 83's were included this year. As a set-off to the foregoing, better scores were made in the Alexandra and St. George's. In the former contest some scores of 56 came in the prize list as against 58.8 this year whilst for Vase, withough there was an h.p.s. at the top, scores of 28 came in at the bottom. At this meeting nothing under 30 takes a prize.

Despite the lower scoring in the Queen's the prize-winning totals in the several aggregates were higher than in ,1892. In that year the Hop Bitters prophy fell to an aggregate of 152 points; this year the top scorer made 158, and although six prizes have been added to the 95 last year, it took one point more to come in at the tail end of the list. Again, in the All-Comers aggregate the number of prizes was increased from 95 to 101. Last year's winning scores ranged from 187 to 166; this year it took 189 to win the Chark-Kennedy Cup, and 177 to come foot. The totals in the Grand Aggregate show still better results in favour of the meeting just concluded, Under the same conditions except that in 1892 the prizes numbered 125 as against 101, the Canadian trophy, which goes nominally to the top scorer was won with 330 points whilst It required 635 to win it this year, and ten more points were required to take the minor prizes in the series. These comparisons prove beyond possibility of illispute that the all-round shooting was better this year than last.

• • • •

In no class of competition has a greater advance been made than in that which was conducted at the Morris Tube range during the fortuight. With the well-known tube fitted in Martini-Henry rifles, on an open range at 200 yards, actual distance, eight full scores of 28 points

were registered, whilst to secure any prize in the series nodess than 27 points had to be made. The absolute accuracy obtainable at open ranges with the Morris tube by the marksman who has the skill to gauge the wind and the steadiness to hold the rifle firmly, suffices to account for the patronage etxended to the somewhat remote but exceedingly picturesque part of the N.R.A. grounds reserved for this and kindred kintls of shooting.

However the Bisley Meeting of 1893 may prove to have been successful or otherwise in( its financial pects has been i,t n(ot the deast pleasant of the four there, The eawther, with one or two exceptions, was of the most agreeable kind from the visitor and spectator point of view, and to judge from appearance on the later days of the second week there was a better attendance of the public than on the corresponding days of previous years. On the last day the camp was really lively, although a good many of the compe-Altors-those whose interest in the meeting was bounded by the Oucen's and St. George/s-had shaken the dust of Bisley from their feet.

. . . .

The charming weather of Saturday, together with the attraction afforded by the final stage of the Oueen's, sufficed to draw quite a fittle crowd of people to the long range firing points in the afternoon, whilst the gathering in the umbrella tent later to witness the distribution of prizes was both numerous and enthusiastic. The scene outside the ropes at the 900 yards pange reminded one in a small way of the grent gathering that used to form up behind the barrier when the shooting was going on at the final distance at Wimbledon.

The prize meetings of the National Rifle Association, ever fertile in surprises, afforded another in connection with the destination of the Oucen's Prize. It was thought by many that it might go to Liverpool, perhaps Scotdand, or even stop in London, but hardly anyone gave a thought to the chances of its going to Walet. As with many other matters, it is the unformseen that happens in connection with with rike shooting; and the unexpected contingency of the premier honour of the Bisley Meeting being carried off to the Principality occurred. There was intense joy over the result among Welshmen; of Bisley (where they seemed to spring from the ground on Saturday), in London and especially at Llanelly, there were wild demonstrations of delight when the news of the success of their compatriot was recei-

# The French Commander of the Siamese Fleet.

A Paris paper has obtained some information about the commander of the Siamese fleet, Commodore Armand du Plessis de Richelieu, a descendant of a Protestant branch of the great cardinal's family. It has been discovered that a Danish noblemku, Armand du Piessis de Richelieu-probably the same-kept a bar about six years ago at Bella Vista, a suburb of Corrientes, in Argentina, which was much .patronized by Indians and cowboys of the Paraguay border. He lived in a humb e hut with his wife, who appared to be a lady much above her situation. A pair of dogs, called tiggros, accompanied them. Later on he became military instructor in Paraguay but he made enemies there and was expelled, the French residents in particular being most bitter against this descendant of the Huguenots. Whereever he went he carried a beautiful Remaissance inkstand and a brace of holster pistols, which he said belonged to the cardinal. Our French contemporaries rather savagely express the hope that if ever he is capitured by the good saffors of France he may be hanged as a common pirate. Another journad says that he springs from a younger branch of the Du Plessis family, which remained Protestant when the senior branch-the ancestors of the eardina.—became Catholic. After the Edict of Nantes the younger branch emigrated to the Cape, where it is said still to exist.

# A Nickle-Steel Cannon.

There is being built at the Washington gun foundry, located at the navyyard here, a hickle-steel gun in which great interest is felt by experts in ordnance. The nickle-steel forgings are on hand, and as soon as the new patent furnace is constructed the work of assembling the gun will commence. This patent furnace will create a departure from present methods in assembling thod is more simple and economical than that now practised, besides being less hazardous. Under they new plan proposed to assemble the gun in a horizontal position, and by the simultaneous application of intense heat to the jacket and a stream of cold water to the tube, it is expected the operation will be attended by less of the uncertain expents of gun assembling than has

been the case heretofore. When constructed the gun will be tested with different charges of powder to ascertain whether it will bear the strain better than guns known as all-steel. Many experts believe that the same advantages obtain by the use of nickle in armour plates will be extended to ordanance constructed of the same materials. After the capacity of the gun has been thoroughly tested by the ordanance men, it will be used for experimenting with powder. The tests will be watched with great interest by. all persons interested in the developt ment of heavy brdnance.—Philadelphia Ledger.
