STANDING RULES
FOR THE
CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT
OF THE
Newfoundland Church Society.

NAME.

1.—The name of this Society shall be "THE NEW-
FOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY."

OBJECTS.

2.—The objects of this Society shall be, (1) to contribute towards the maintenance of the Clergy and Licensed Lay-Readers, (2) to assist in the erection, enlargement, or repairs of Churches, Parsonages, or School-Rooms, and in the purchase of Land for Glebe or other Church purposes, (3) to provide for sale a supply of Bibles, Prayer-Books, School-Books, and other Religious Books and Tracts, and (4) to create and maintain a separate fund for assisting the Widows and Children of deceased Clergymen of this Diocese.

MEMBERS.

3.—The members of this Society shall be, (1) all persons who shall have paid to their Clergyman or the Treasurer the two preceding years the annual

sum of ten shillings for the objects of the Society; and (2) all Clergymen who shall have officiated in Newfoundland or Labrador the two preceding years with the Bishop's licence.

4.—All members shall have power to vote at the annual and other general meetings.

OFFICERS.

5.—The officers of this Society shall be (1) the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, President; (2) the Venerable the Archdeacon and the Rural Deans, Vice-Presidents; (3) a Treasurer; and (4) a Secretary; the last two to be chosen by the members of the Society at the annual general meeting; but in case of resignation of office, or removal, of either Secretary or Treasurer, during the interval between two Annual Meetings, the committee shall appoint a person to act in either case, until the next Annual Meeting.

MANAGERS.

6.—The Committee of management shall consist of the officers of the Society, and certain Lay-Members, elected as Representatives in each of the Deaneries; viz., four elected by Members of the Society resident in the Deanery of Avalon; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Conception Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Trinity Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Notre-Dame Bay; two by Members resident in the Deanery of Placentia Bay; and two by Members resident in the Deanery of Fortune Bay.

7.—The election of Representatives shall be as follows:—On some day in Easter Week, in the year 1859, and in every succeeding fourth year, a Meeting of the Members resident in each mission, shall be convened by the Clergyman in charge at some convenient hour and place, of which notice shall be given (with the Bishop's consent) in each Church in the

Mission, on some Sunday in the previous month; at which Meeting the Clergyman, or in his absence, some other person then to be chosen by the Members shall preside, and the Members present shall vote *seriatim* for the prescribed number of Representatives.

8.—When the voting (which may be continued, if necessary, six hours, but not longer) is completed, the presiding Officer in each Mission shall report the result to the Rural Dean, and the persons who have obtained a majority of votes in the Deanery, shall be elected Representatives; provided that every person to be a member of the Committee must be a Communicant of the Church of England.

9.—The Rural Dean shall report the result of the election in his Deanery to the Secretary in St. John's, the first convenient opportunity.

10.—The new Representatives shall be convened by the Secretary at the Michaelmas Quarterly Meeting; until which time the former Representatives shall continue in office.

11.—As often as it shall become necessary, from the death, absence from the Colony, resignation, disqualification, or refusal to serve, of any of the Representatives, to appoint another or others in their place, a special meeting of the Members, in the Deanery where the vacancy has arisen, shall (as soon as the Rural Dean, or, in his absence the Clergyman next senior in standing in the Diocese may in his discretion appoint) be convened in like manner as the Easter meeting, when the required Representative or Representatives shall in like manner be elected.

12.—The President, or a Vice-President, and six other Members of the Committee shall be competent to manage the business at every meeting duly convened.

13.—All Clergymen of the Diocese holding the Bishop's license, shall be *ex-officio* honorary Members of the Committee with the right of speaking, but not, with the exception of the Officers, of voting at its Meetings.

TRUSTEE.

14.—The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the Trustee of this Society, and shall have power to let or to take houses or lands, and to receive all rents and interest of monies as the same shall fall due, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer for the time being, taking his receipt, and handing it over to the Committee.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

15.—An annual General Meeting of the members and friends of the Society shall be holden in St. John's on the second Thursday after Trinity Sunday, or as soon after as the Bishop may appoint. The Secretary shall give notice to each of the Clergymen in St. John's, who shall publish it (with the Bishop's consent) in his Church on the previous Sunday.

16.—At the annual general meeting a report on the state of the Society, with the Treasurer's accounts duly audited, shall be submitted by the Committee, to be printed, or otherwise, as shall be then and there determined by the members.

17.—A special general meeting may be convened at any time, (1) by the President; (2) by a Vice-President and six members of the Committee; or (3) by any twelve members of the Society whose payments are not in arrear; provided notice of such meeting be duly given as in the case of annual general meetings.

18.—The Chairman shall not vote at any general meeting, except in the case of an equality of votes.

COLLECTIONS.

19.—It is expected that a Collection for the various objects of the Society will be made every year by every Clergyman in the Diocese, from every head of a family and every adult member of the Church in his Mission, assisted if need be by his Church-wardens and other respectable Members of his Congregation.

20.—Every Clergyman shall transmit to the Secretary, a list of the Contributors to the objects of the Society in his Mission, with the amount of their several payments, and to the Treasurer one-fourth at least of his whole Collections on or before the last day in every year, or as soon after as practicable.

N.B.—This Rule does not apply to the Clergy of St. John's, who shall send in the whole of their Collections to the Treasurer.

21.—All Clergymen who have collected as far as possible from every head of a family, and from every adult Member of the Church in their missions, towards the objects of the Society, for the two years immediately preceding, and who have remitted to the Treasurer one-fourth of the whole Collections, shall be entitled to assistance from the funds of the Society towards any of its objects in their own Mission; provided that no Clergyman shall make a collection for his own maintenance separate from, or independent of the general collection; and that pew-rents and assessments be not considered as part of the said collection or collections.

GRANTS.

22.—It shall be the duty of the Committee to determine from time to time on the appropriation of the Funds, by making grants towards the objects of the Society under the recommendation and sanction of the President.

23.—No Clergyman declining or neglecting to col-

lect for the Society, or to transmit a list of the contributors and their payments, and a fourth-part of his collection (as directed in Rule 20) shall be entitled to receive any grants from the Society, for himself, or for any of the objects of the Society, in his Mission; provided that where a collection has been duly made, and the list with the fourth-part of the collections transmitted for the two previous years by his predecessor, any Clergyman newly in charge may, before sending his first annual collections, ask and receive for any of the objects of the Society, excepting only his own maintenance.

24.—It shall be competent to the Committee to make grants in the usual manner to any Mission, in connection with the Society, which supports its own Clergyman; and any such Mission shall be held to be in connection with the Society whose Clergyman subscribes ten shillings, and makes a collection in his Mission, annually towards the general funds of the Society.

25.—If a Clergyman leave his Mission before the time for sending in his annual collection, the Committee shall have power, on the recommendation of the President, to grant him a sum which shall appear equitable.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

26.—In the absence of the President, the Archdeacon, or, in his absence, the Senior Vice-President shall take the Chair at all meetings of the Committee or Members, and shall have a casting vote.

27.—The Treasurer shall receive all monies forwarded to him for the objects of the Society, and shall pay or disburse the same as determined by the Committee, and shall furnish to the President and Committee a statement of accounts up to the day appointed for auditing the same.

28.—No money shall be paid or disbursed by the Treasurer except on a written order, specifying the amount to be paid, and its object; which order must be signed by the Chairman of the Committee at which the grant was made, or in his absence, by the Senior Officer of the Society in St. John's.

29.—The Committee shall meet for despatch of business in St. John's, on the first Thursday after every quarter day, at 2 o'clock, P.M.

30.—A special meeting of the Committee may be convened at any time, either [1] by the President, or [2] by two Vice-Presidents, or [3] by any five members of the Committee; provided due notice of such meeting with its objects be given the day before to all the other members of the Committee in St. John's.

31.—At a special meeting to be holden seven days before the annual meeting, the Committee shall appoint two of their number to examine the Treasurer's accounts up to that season, which accounts examined, approved, and signed by the auditors as correct, shall be submitted to the Committee to be by them incorporated in or appended to the next yearly Report and so presented to the members at the next annual general meeting.

32.—The Committee shall fix the salary of the Secretary, and shall provide for all the contingent expenses of the Committee and the Society.

DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

33.—The Secretary shall summon and attend all meetings of the Committee and Members, and shall arrange the business, and record minutes of the same to be signed by the Chairman. He shall prepare the annual report, and superintend the printing of the same; shall conduct the correspondence with the Clergy and others on behalf of the Committee; and

shall be responsible for the safe custody of all books, receipts and papers belonging to the Society.

PRAYERS.

34.—All meetings of the Society, or of the Committee, shall be opened and closed with the prayers used at the meetings of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, or others provided for the purpose by the Bishop of the Diocese.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

35.—These Rules may be altered, repealed, or added to by the Members assembled at any general meeting; provided the proposed alteration has been stated in writing by any person intending to propose it to the Secretary at least a month before, for the information of the President and Committee, and that assent has been given to it by the President and a majority of the whole Committee convened for its consideration; and provided also, that it shall be competent to the President to propose any alteration to a general meeting, notwithstanding such alteration may not have received the assent of the Committee.

NEW DEANERIES.

36.—New Deaneries created by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be allowed to elect Representatives; provided that in every Deanery there shall be at least two resident Clergymen, and ten Churches and Congregations.

NOTE.—While it is expected that every Clergyman in the Colony will make a yearly collection for the promotion of the objects of the Church Society, and impress upon every individual under his Pastoral charge, the obligations by which he is bound to contribute thereto, year by year,—the system of the

Church Society does not require any Clergyman to withhold the ordinances of the Church in any case of refusal or neglect to pay towards his support.

The above rules were agreed to by the President and Members of the Church Society at an adjourned special general Meeting held on Friday, July 16th, 1858.

PROCEEDINGS,

At the Twenty-fourth anniversary of the Newfoundland Church Society holden at St. John's in the Cathedral Sunday School building on the 22nd June, 1865. The chair was taken at half-past seven o'clock, P. M., by his Excellency the Governor, supported and assisted by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop, President, who requested the Rev. G. M. Johnson, to open the meeting with the usual prayers.

After prayer, the business of the evening commenced with the reading of the Report and of the Treasurer's accounts, after which the following Resolutions were proposed, seconded, and carried unanimously:—

Moved by W. V. Whiteway, Esq., seconded by F. J. Wyatt, Esq.,

1. That the Report now read with the Treasurer's accounts be adopted and published.

Moved by Rev. T. M. Wood, seconded by the Hon. the Chief Justice,

2. That the devout thanks of this meeting be humbly offered to Almighty God for His mercy and goodness to the Church Society during the past year.

Moved by Hon. R. J. Pinsent, seconded by Rev. C. Medley,

3. That this meeting hears with satisfaction that a new Mission has been commenced for the benefit of settlers in the Bay of Islands, and regards this further attempt to add to the number of self-supporting Missions already existing as a step of great importance in the advancement of the Church in this Diocese.

Moved by Hon. Judge Robinson, seconded by J. Tunbridge, Esq.,

4. That in consideration of the smallness of the amounts returned from many of the Missions in co-operation with the Society during the past year, and the lack of any return at all from others

this meeting would impress upon Churchmen throughout the Diocese the great necessity which exists for increased union and exertion to enable this Society to carry out its sacred and important objects, and to supply the deficiencies which may arise from the further diminution or withdrawal of the bounty of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts.

Moved by Hon. the Attorney General, seconded by Rev. J. F. Phelps,

5. That this meeting desires to record its grateful sense of the obligations under which the venerable Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts and for Promoting Christian Knowledge have laid this Colony.

Moved by Rev. F. C. Jagg, seconded by Edwin Duder, Esq.,

6. That the thanks of the Newfoundland Church Society be given to the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop for his counsel and assistance, and to the Treasurer, Secretary, and Committee for their services during the past year, and that W. H. Marc, Esq., be Treasurer, and Rev. G. M. Johnson, Secretary, for the ensuing year.

Moved by W. H. Marc, Esq., seconded by E. L. Jarvis, Esq.,

7. That the cordial thanks of this meeting be respectfully tendered to His Excellency the Governor, for having consented to become Patron of this Society and a subscriber to its funds, and for his kindness in having presided on the present occasion.

Notice was given by the Rev. G. M. Johnson that at the next Annual Meeting he would move for certain alterations in the "Standing rules of the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund," viz :—

Rules 4, 5, and 6, to be amended by the substitution of the following as the future rules of that Fund in place of Rules 4, 5, and 6, as they stand at present.

Rule 4. All Clergymen of the Diocese holding the Bishop's license may secure the benefit of this Fund by contributing within six months from the 1st day of July, 1858, or within six months from the time of obtaining their license from the Bishop, (in which latter case their first contribution shall become due on the 1st day of January in the year following their being licensed) as follows :—
(1) Unmarried Clergymen and Widowers without a child, one pound

(£1) per annum : (2) Married Clergymen and Widowers with a child, two pounds (£2) per annum.

Rule 5. Subscriptions shall be due in advance on the 1st day of January each year. Thirty days grace shall be allowed, but every Clergyman, neglecting to make payment within that time, shall forfeit his claim upon the Fund, to be recovered only upon payment of arrears, with ten per cent thereon, before the following 1st day of January.

Rule 6. Any Clergyman neglecting either to subscribe according to Rule 4, or to pay his annual subscription within the time limited by Rule 5, may secure the benefit of the Fund, at the option of the Committee, by the payment of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for each year from the 1st day of July 1858, or from the 1st day of January following his being licensed by the Bishop, or from the day on which the last annual subscription he paid was due.

Rule 7. To be expunged, and Rule 8 to be altered in such parts of it as are dependent on Rule 7.

REPORT FOR 1864.

At the time of presenting their last Annual Report your Committee were able to address the meeting then assembled in the following words :—" The Committee have great pleasure in being able to assure you, and the members of the Church generally, that however short of what may be, and it is humbly hoped will be effected by its instrumentality, the affairs and prospects of the Society were never, on the whole, in a more satisfactory and promising condition, whether as regards the funds contributed, or the purposes to which they are and will be applied." Your Committee regret they cannot on the present occasion repeat the same gratifying announcement. Regret was indeed even then mingled with the expressed satisfaction--" regret of a never ceasing character that so many of the Missions were still kept from that communion and co-operation which, if productive of no immediate and material benefit to separate Missions, in respect of Income, Church, or Parsonage House, would assuredly strengthen the Church spiritually and increase its efficiency, and bring down the blessing promised to those " who are of one mind in a House." In regard of this latter benefit, your Committee may indeed speak with satisfaction to themselves, and in a way that they are assured will be satisfactory to this meeting also, for, with reference to the number of Outharbor Missions in connection with the Church Society, there is still an increase, and hence your Committee are encouraged to hope that when the present season of difficulty and distress from

failure in the fisheries, under which the Colony is now so severely suffering, has passed by and gone, the Society will be able to look back upon the present year as one of real gain, albeit in a pecuniary view it is not a year of advance.

Your Committee are thankful to be able to state that the Missions, of the returns from which the income of the Society was made up for the year 1863, have all contributed the required proportion of their collections for the year 1864, while three Missions have sent in returns and money for the year to which this report refers, who had not done so in previous years, so that your Committee trust there is still ground for present congratulation, as well as encouragement for the future. The list of Missions contributing, with the amounts contributed, for the years 1863 and 4, which appears below, will give an exact account of the present position of the Society as compared with that spoken of in such cheering words in the extract already quoted from the last year's report, and will shew that the Church Society is only suffering as all other interests must suffer in this colony from the depressing influence of the past two years scarcity.

The following is the list of Missions which have made returns to the Church Society during the two past years, with the sums against them each year contributed:—

It will be seen hence, that the total income of the Society for the year 1864 from the regular collections of the various Missions in connection with it, has been £874 16s. 4d. against £912 10s 7d., the amount arising from the same sources for the year 1863; a much

more trifling diminution of income than might have been expected after a year of such ill success in the prosecution of the various fisheries on which the wealth of the Colony depends. It will be remembered in explanation of the smallness of the amount appearing against most of the Out-harbor Missions that the fourth of the actual amount collected in all places except St. John's is all that is required to be paid over to the Treasurer for the general purposes of the Society; the three-fourths remaining wherever the Clergyman chooses to retain it. In St. John's the whole amount collected is paid over to the Treasurer; in the first place for the maintenance of the Clergy in St. John's, and then for appropriation to the general purposes of the Society.

The total expenditure appears to have been during the past year £711 19s. 3d; during the previous year it amounted to £704 12s. 3d; an increase for 1864, of £7 7s. 0d. The total income of the year, including interest on balance in the Treasurers hands, has been on account of the year 1864, £907 6s. 0d. For the year 1863 the income of the Society was £1025 9s. 1d.

CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Your Committee are pleased to be able to report that this Fund continues to prosper. During the past year two Clergymen, who have left the Diocese, have discontinued their subscriptions, while six others have become subscribers. The total number of Clergymen entitled to its benefit is now 37—having been 33 last year, of these three are absentees and the remaining 34 are still labouring in the Diocese. Your

Committee cannot help expressing their regret that all who shew themselves ready to take advantage of the benefit of this fund, which was originated and fostered in its beginning by this Society, do not give the Society in return the benefit of their support and co-operation, a benefit which the Society desires not merely for the sake of union, (a great blessing in itself, and the source of great blessings,) but also for the benefit of each separate Mission,—an advantage which will surely follow, if not immediately, yet certainly in the course of years; as may be proved fully by the statements of receipts and expenditure of the Society extending over the whole period during which it has been in existence. To subscribe only for the sake of personal security and benefit, is a principle under government of which a missionary spirit can hardly be sustained; and yet the Clergy here are all agents of a Missionary Church, and this Society the agency by which only, so far as the efforts of Churchmen in this colony avail, can missionary work be carried on. The income of the Fund for the year 1864 has been from subscriptions of the Clergy £88 8s. 0d. Collections, £103 0s. 9d. Donations, £17 12s. 0d., and interest on Loans, £104 19s. 8d.,—Total £314 0s. 5d.

The capital Fund has now reached the amount of £2397 2s. 8d., having increased after payment of a pension of £40 to Mrs. Moreton by £274 0s. 5d. during the past year. By the mercy and goodness of Almighty God no death has occurred among the Clergy of this Diocese, during the past year, and one claim only exists against the fund, being the only one which has arisen since its first formation.

SOCIETY'S BOOK DEPOSITORY.

It will be remembered that in the last Annual Report the desirableness was suggested of devising some

means whereby the expenses of the Depot might be lessened, with a view to a wider circulation of the books, for sale of which it is established. Your Committee have now the pleasure of informing the Clergy and members of the Church of England that arrangements have been made (since the late removal of the Depot), by which some considerable saving has been effected in the expense of conducting the business, and that as a consequence of this, a great reduction has been made in the prices of all the books kept in stock. For the future 15 per cent will be the highest average rate that will be charged on any of the books imported, while many of the books upon the Society's list will be sold at the same price currency at which they can be purchased sterling in England, that is to say at 20 per cent less in St. John's than at the Society's own offices in London. The Committee desire to repeat the information conveyed in the last Report upon the subject of Educational Books, viz., that the Sub-Committee of the Depot have added to their stock "a supply of the Christian Knowledge Society's excellent Reading and other School Books, Grammars, Geographies, English Histories, &c." These have also been greatly reduced in price, and it is believed will be found as low in cost as those which can be bought elsewhere, and more durable in use. Books have been sold from June 30, 1864, to April 30, 1865, to the value of £232 5s. 2d.

The Depository is still carried on by Mr. J. T. Burton, (who has removed to No. 164, Water-street,) under the direction of a Sub-Committee of the Church Society, and it is hoped that the change of premises and consequent reduction of prices, will render the establishment more efficient and useful than before.

The Bishop has not undertaken any extensive jour-

ney during the past year, having been detained in St. John's by the departure of the Rev. Mr. Kelly. His Lordship did, however, pay a short visit to Conception and Trinity Bays in November last, in the course of which four Churches and two burying places were consecrated with the usual solemnities. The Churches were those of Carbonear, Salmon Cove, in the mission of Bigus, and Heart's Delight and Scilly Cove, both in the mission of Heart's Content. This mission it is gratifying to the Committee to observe, in addition to having lately built these two Churches, still continues to support its Clergyman without any extraneous aid.

The Bishop wishes it to be mentioned here that all these Churches have been assisted from a fund placed at his disposal for that purpose by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

One of the burying places referred to is a spacious Cemetery for members of the Church of England, in the parish of Harbor Grace, at a small distance from the town, in conformity with the requirements of a late Act of the Legislature.

Many Churches are in the course of erection in various parts of the Island, and several will, it is hoped, be consecrated in the course of His Lordship's approaching voyage of visitation to White Bay, the French Shore, Labrador, and the older established Missions between Twillingate and St. John's on his return.

The Parsonage Houses referred to in the last Report are progressing very slowly in consequence of the depression in the business of the country, which is so severely felt in most of the Outharbors.

Accounts have been received this spring from the Rev. R. Temple, whose presence at this meeting last year will be remembered, and who was then on the eve of setting forth to occupy White Bay as a new

sphere of missionary labor. The Committee have much satisfaction in stating that he has been well received by the people, and has met with as much favor and success as could be expected in one short year. They prefer however leaving him to speak for himself on this subject, believing that his own words will be far more interesting than any account the Committee could themselves communicate. He writes as follows, in a letter to the Bishop, which must be understood to be more or less of a private character, but which, it is hoped, may on this occasion, be submitted as being very encouraging and gratifying:—

JACKSON'S ARM, }
White Bay, May 8, 1865. }

MY LORD,—

An opportunity at last occurs of sending tidings. I hasten to send a word or two, although I have nothing to reply to but your Lordship's letter of last September, which reached me in February.

As the time is approaching at which we may hope to have the pleasure of a visitation, you will doubtless be anxious to know if the winter has made any change in my opinions or convictions, and I am sure will be glad for me, and with me to hear that an unusually mild winter has enabled me to pursue my travels constantly, while the Bay having been filled with ice, has offered means of transit which might otherwise have been difficult. I have visited every part of my mission since Christmas, even Engelee, from which indeed I am but just returned, having walked considerably more than one hundred miles and been rowed in punt the rest.

In all these various journeyings I must acknowledge a most merciful guiding hand furthering my humble effort, for His glory, not for my own worthiness, but as a weak instrument of His Church and work; so remarkably indeed, that I cannot say that I have once been delayed in a journey against my will more than a day or two, but by seizing every opportunity as it offered, have carried out almost to the letter the original plan of journeying laid down at Christmas. And in all places have I found lodging and bed, except twice when forced by a breeze of wind to encamp in an uninhabited cove and sleep by a watch-fire three nights. The people continue as kind as ever, and the first words of greeting always are—"So you are come at last; we thought you were never coming, now you must stay a good spell." And when I say how impossible that would be, it is with the greatest difficulty that I can make them comprehend the

distance I have to travel, the number of people, and the time it will take me to perform one circuit. Even now I am hoping to pass across the Bay to-day, (if the string of ice now running up does not prevent the vessel in which I take passage) and arrive at Seal Cove, which place I left on Feb. 16, and have been travelling ever since without resting more than a week in one place, except Engelee, in which I stayed two weeks. Owing to the blockade of ice in White Bay, few or no seals have been caught this winter, and the poverty is increased. Had not Mr. Lot Brett of Joe Batt's Arm, Fogo Island, assisted the people on credit, at the risk of their non-payment, they could not have withstood the starvation which would have come upon them; but a helper was raised up in time of need. You will not be surprised then when I tell your Lordship that my share is very scanty, and I hope you will neither be surprised when I affirm my determination, under God's grace, to take the Mission nevertheless, for better for worse, so long as the people desire to receive me. So many are the places, and so seldom do the times come round of visiting each settlement that it would be useless, and worse than useless, to build a house of any kind for myself in White Bay, at present. Therefore the great cares of house-keeping and the chief expenses of a clergyman are done away with, and as I find myself quite able to partake of fisherman's fare, let it be fish, or bird, or seal, or none of them, I shall easily persuade those who desire my services to build me a small room adjoining their house, in each harbour, by degrees, and those who pay, whether much or little, will alone have, and expect my services. I shall make the ways of paying so easy, that the poorest man can do something, therefore unwillingness to receive me will prove itself by its carelessness to contribute to my support, and surely if I have served a man twelve months and he pays me nothing, I am no longer bound to be at his call for any purpose; neither would it be fair toward those who help with their scanty means, that others should reap what they sow. I write in this manner, that your Lordship may direct me if I err in my opinions. From the time I commenced to the present, I have received about £25 from the people; and as the twelve months are not yet expired, I estimate my first year's salary at about £30, excluding board and lodgings. This will satisfy me if I can continue it, but whether or not, my purpose is to have such patience as God may please to afford me, and when White Bay casts me out, to migrate northward, where the people are better off, and more numerous. But if your Lordship could and would, send a deacon to St. Anthony's Bight to minister to Hare Bay and as far as Quirpon, I could visit him once a year, or make an occasional change of duty with him, and he would obtain a far better salary than I shall do here. The people there almost always do well with the seals; so they have this year; and it will be a great sorrow to me if so fair a portion of the shore should

fall to the lot of teachers who would encroach upon my flock, who are all, I am thankful to say, reconciled to the Church, or at least (which is enough) to me as their minister, and to my residence among them. I am happy to find improvement in every respect in my people, and I am pleased to see a respect and affectionate obedience where it would be least expected.

Your Committee naturally pass from mention of the Rev. Mr. Temple's labors, to the announcement that a mission of a similar nature has been undertaken to the Bay of Islands and other parts of the Western Shore by the Rev. Ulric Rule, who was ordained in December last, and has since that time been serving in the Cathedral Church and among the fishermen of the small settlement of Quidi Vidi. The pleasure spoken of by the Committee last year in voting £25 for the commencement of the White Bay Mission has again been experienced in the appropriation of a like sum to the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Rule in the Bay of Islands Mission. The Rev. Mr. Rule has gone forth under exactly parallel circumstances to those under which Mr. Temple undertook the Mission of White Bay, viz., a small grant (£25) from the Society for Propagation of the Gospel, and trusting to the people among whom he labours for all additional necessary support. There are now six missions in this diocese, maintained, (with the exception of £100 from S.P. G. per annum divided between Salvage and Pinchard's Islands,) out of resources raised among the people of those missions, viz., Greenspond, Heart's Content, Pinchard's Island, Salvage, White Bay and Bay of Islands. Your Committee would remark here that this duty which has, in these instances between the Clergy, Church Society, and people of these several missions, been voluntarily taken up, must in all probability fall shortly upon members of the Church in other Missions, as it is expected that in the course of the present year an immediate or prospective reduc-

tion will be made in the income which has heretofore been granted to all, or almost all, the old established Missions of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, while there is very little hope of new grants being made to new Missions, on at all the former scale. All clergymen on the list of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, have been called upon to make certain returns to that Society (which has resolved to reconsider during the course of the current year, all its terminable salaries and grants, with a view to a more equitable apportionment of its funds among the continually increasing number of claimants, and to such reduction in particular grants as may be practicable and expedient,) and there is no doubt that considerable changes in the way of reduction are in contemplation, for which it behoves Clergy, Church Society, and all belonging to the Church of England, to be prepared.

In reference to this announcement by the Society, the Committee have been informed by the Lord Bishop of this Diocese, that he has lately published in England a Plea for Colonial Dioceses in general, and for this one in particular, to which is hoped may have the effect of preventing any large diminution of the Society's grant to the Church in this Diocese, under our peculiarly trying circumstances, which it must be acknowledged are exceptional and different from those of almost any other Diocese.

An extract has already been submitted to this meeting giving an account of the Rev. Mr. Temple's work in White Bay. The Committee believe the subjoined extracts from the Reports to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel of the Missionaries at Hermitage Bay and Morcton's Harbor, will be read with interest. The Rev. Mr. Colley writes as follows:—

Our daily prayers in the Church at Hermitage Cove are Morning 8 A. M.; Evening, 5 P. M., with the exception of Wednesdays and

Fridays, when we have Evening Service at 7 P. M., to suit the fishermen, who by that time have generally completed their day's work, and are glad to close it with attendance at the House of God. "It seems good" say they "to end the day by going to Church, we feel comforted like." Of course during the summer months we are obliged to postpone our evening service until after sun down; and even then many times they are not ready, not even in from the fishing ground, yet there are few Wednesdays or Fridays when the greater portion are not there.

Pass Island—March 14th, Monday.—All the fishermen stayed in from sea until after morning prayer. We then arranged about building the Chapel School, the material for which was landed last year, and would have been up could we have procured a carpenter. In the afternoon I returned to Grole—said evening prayer—baptized two children.

Tuesday, March 15.—Early morning prayer and Holy Communion, all the fishermen remaining till after prayers, and then went to sea, with the exception of a crew for me. They began the day well and I hope had a good day fishing.

March 20th.—Good Friday. The morning being moderate, row boats and skiffs full of men, women, and children came from all the surrounding harbors to join in the service of this holy day. During prayers the wind changed to the North East, and before we left the Church had increased to a gale so that the people could not return home. Mr. Gallop, Messrs. Newman & Co's. agent, with his wife and some of the clerks, having a very good boat and a stout crew, made a venture, only to return, most of them drenched to the skin with the spray.

Easter Sunday was a beautiful day, and although the people were caught on Friday, and as I half thought would be baulked for a time, a goodly number came and our Easter Hymns were sung, I hope, with glad and thankful hearts, but our Easter joy was somewhat saddened by the death this morning of one of the Hermitage planters. Few persons can perhaps understand our feelings upon the death of a neighbour, and that neighbour the poorest of the community. We are so linked together, and the deaths are so few, that we feel as though our brother or sister or friend had been taken away. On Tuesday I buried J. R. who has left a widow and three children, all unprovided for as the world would say, but no, thank GOD!—Kind friends will take the children, and the mother finds a home with her mother and brother.

Pushtrough.—St. Philip and St. James' Day.—Full morning service.—Baptized three children, and administered the Holy Communion to 33 persons, and collected 15s. 2d. at the offertory. One of my flock, a trader, afterwards gave me an order for £10 towards the "Chapel School" we are building here.

Monday, May 2. Morning prayer early. Went on to Little Bay.

Called on the fishing ground to invite the fishermen to haul up and come to prayers. They soon obeyed my summons, and by the time I had had a cup of tea, were ready to join me in the offering of prayer and praise.

Friday, May 21. Set sail for Cape La Hune (from Rencontre.) but could not go beyond the mouth of the harbor, wind and sea much too high, and besides the long heavy swell there was the rebound of the shore, which made it like a pot boiling furiously. Spent the day in visiting and conversing from house to house, prayers, catechizing and reading.

Saturday, May 22. After prayers returned to Rencontre for Sunday, because there and at New Harbor I can collect the greater number of people. There is also a chapel school in each place.

Sunday, May 23. I spent a little time with each person who was about to partake of the Holy Communion for the first time. Full morning service. Baptized five children, and administered the Lord's Supper to twenty-six persons. Prayers in the afternoon in New Harbor. It was a beautiful day, and all appeared glad and thankful for the holy services they had joined in.

The following is the extract referred to from the Rev. Mr. Chamberlain's letter:—

During the year 1864 I have celebrated divine service 236 times so that when pastoral visiting occasional services and the great distance I have to travel is taken into account you may easily understand that but little time is left for repose. The number of baptisms is rather below the average. I only celebrated ten marriages during the whole year which is a very small number and to be accounted for by the wide spread poverty in which the country is steeped. The number of burials is ten but I have only given those at which I have officiated. The total number by licensed and unlicensed readers will probably number over a hundred or more.

The Church at Exploits Burnt Island is rapidly approaching completion. I am hoping his Lordship the Bishop will feel justified this summer in setting it apart for the service and worship of GOD by consecration. The Church at leading Tickle is a very neat looking building and is clapboarded, double floored, and partly shingled, but not ceiled inside. The people have assured me they will use their best exertions to get it completed before the Lord Bishop's visit and they hope his Lordship will consecrate it upon its completion. The Church at Shoe Cove the Bishop has also promised to consecrate this summer. It is to be dedicated to St. Paul, and is an extremely neat building.

We have had a very mild winter this year and travelling has been unusually good. I have been enabled to visit several harbors, some of them three or four times, including Black Island, Exploits, North-

ern Harbor, New Bay, New Bay Head, and Leading Tickle. Some of these places had never been visited in the winter before by any of my predecessors and in two of them (New Bay and Northern Harbor) service had never been previously held. The welcome I received was indeed hearty and pleasing. Many of my flock could not be persuaded for some time that I had really arrived among them at that unusual season of the year. The following little incident may afford some interest. Tired and worn out with the duties of the day and a severe attack of sickness I was resting in a fisherman's house on a bitter cold night at New Bay Head when some people came and enquired for me. They had walked over a mile on very slippery ice out of New Bay Head, and a woman with a child wrapped up, and crying most piteously asked me if I would baptize it then. It was about 10 P.M. Godfathers and Godmothers were already provided. They told me they had heard I was to leave for home the next day, and apprehensive I might depart without calling at their place of abode, they had endeavoured to guard against not having their baby christened by coming to me that night. I told them I had no intention of leaving till I had been up in New Bay and purposed visiting that place on the morrow, and would (as I felt too unwell to perform the service that night) then baptise the child. The woman seemed quite satisfied when I promised to come next day, and told me that her sister also had a child and was desirous of having it christened.

Some idea may be gathered of the work to be done, when I give you an account of the manner in which I spend Sunday. At 8 A.M. I leave Moreton's Harbor for Tizzard's Harbor, distance 3 miles. Upon my arrival there I have three sick persons whom I contrive to visit before divine service, which is at 10.30. After this I return and hold service at Moreton's Harbor at 3 P.M., and at 7 P.M. I go to Western Head, 2½ miles to hold service in a planter's kitchen. I have some sick persons to visit there, so that I cannot leave for home much before ten and do not arrive till eleven. This makes three full services, visiting sick, and a walk of fourteen miles, my Sunday's work.

My time is fully occupied. I scarce know what it is to sit down to an hours undisturbed reading. The following will give you some idea of a Missionary's labor in an Out-harbor of Newfoundland. Upon the Feast of the Annunciation, I left home at 9.30. Walked 1½ miles into the woods to a miserable tilt where I baptized two children. The youngest was wrapped in a sheet and a coat of the father. It has since died. I then visited my Church-warden who lives during the winter in a tilt and from thence proceeded to another. As I was leaving the last I met a man who desired me, if possible to go up to Western Head to see a sick young woman I called at a planter's house, where every Tuesday I hold service

and got the "old skipper" to accompany me to see an old man aged 80, and his wife 65, who were desirous of seeing me. I reached the poor couples home—a poor miserable hovel affording little protection from the blasts of the howling wintry tempest. Here I learned that the man had seen no clergyman for five years. I read to the old man St. Luke's account of the crucifixion. My next visit was to the old couples son, who lived near. He was out, but having spoken a few words to his wife, I hurried to Western Head to see the sick young woman. I was met by several of my flock, and enquired about their circumstances, and begged them to come to the service I intended holding the next evening. I then bent my steps to the house of the poor sick young woman, and found her in a state of extreme exhaustion. I left, promising to visit her again on the morrow, to hold divine service. I did so. The sight was indeed solemn and affecting. The kitchen was crowded with sixty persons, and I observed many old persons present. In a room on the same floor, lay on a bed, (probably her death bed) my sick young friend. She had thus an opportunity of joining in our public worship. I might go on to record many incidents, more or less interesting, but for the present this must suffice.

Since the last Annual Meeting of the Church Society, the Committee have had the pleasure of welcoming, and the disappointment of parting from, the Rev. Mr. Kelly, who arrived in June last to fill the place of Incumbent of the Cathedral Church, which appointment he was compelled to relinquish in October, from failure of health, and to return to England. Your Committee have great satisfaction in stating that they have recently heard the unexpected good tidings, that after a short absence from England, Mr. Kelly has returned with health so much improved as to make him willing and desirous to resume the work, which ill health had compelled him unwillingly to abandon, with, as it seemed at the time, very little prospect of his being ever able to return. The Committee are assured all members of the Church of England in St. John's will rejoice in the prospect of seeing Mr. Kelly once more among them, and will join in the expression of the hope that he may long be preserved in the health and strength to which he has been happily restored.

The last Annual Report closed with mention of the anticipated departure of Sir Alexander and Lady Bannerman, and with an expression of the Committee's appreciation of Sir Alexander's firm and judicious administration of his government as beneficial to all classes of the community, and of Lady Bannerman's numerous and various charities, private as well as public. Sir Alexander's departure in September was followed by his unexpected death in the beginning of the present year, intelligence of which was received by all with deep regret.

Your Committee have great pleasure in informing the meeting now assembled, that an address of congratulation, presented to His Excellency Governor Musgrave immediately on his arrival, was very graciously and kindly received by him. His Excellency at once accepted the office of Patron of the Church Society, and has since become a contributor to its funds. The Governor, your Committee are pleased to observe, has moreover shewn himself ready and desirous, not only to assist by his liberal pecuniary aid, but also personally to promote the objects of this Society, which are so important to the whole community, in its highest interests.

On Wednesday, October 12, 1864, the Right Rev. the President and the Committee of the Newfoundland Church Society waited upon His Excellency the Governor, by appointment, and presented the following Address:—

*To His Excellency ANTHONY MUSGRAVE,
Esq., Governor and Commander-in-
Chief in and over the Island of
Newfoundland and its Dependencies,
&c., &c., &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

The Officers and Committee of the Newfoundland Church Society desire to congratulate Your Excellency upon your safe arrival, to exercise the high and important office of Representative of Her Majesty in the Government of this ancient dependency of the British Crown.

The Society we represent is established, as we believe you have been made aware, for the purpose of securing to the members of the Church of England within the limits of your Excellency's Government the ministrations of our Reformed Church in all their fullness. It is a Society which has obtained, year by year, increasing favour and support among the members of the Church of England. It has since its formation enjoyed the patronage and support of all Governors of this Colony, and its agency has been largely blessed of Almighty God in extending the blessings of true religion along the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador. We venture, therefore, respectfully to solicit the honor of your Excellency's accepting the office of Patron of this Society.

In conclusion, we desire to assure your Excellency that our prayers shall not be wanting that God may be pleased to bestow an abundant blessing on the exercise of your high office,—that it may tend to the promotion of all the interests—especially the highest interests—of all Her Majesty's subjects committed to your Excellency's care and charge.

Subscriptions paid after Jan. 31, in each year, will come under a fine of 10 per cent. See Rule 5.

STANDING RULES

OF THE

Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

1.—THE NEWFOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY'S Special Fund, for assisting the Widows and Orphans of deceased Clergymen of the Diocese of Newfoundland, shall consist of all monies paid to the Treasurer of the Society for that object.

2.—The Committee of the Church Society shall have the management of the Fund.

3.—Every Hundred Pounds of available surplus shall be invested by the Committee as opportunities occur. Smaller sums shall be deposited every quarter in the Savings' Bank.

4.—All Clergymen in the Diocese holding the Bishop's license may secure the benefit of this Fund by contributing, within six months from the first day of this present July, or within one year of obtaining their license from the Bishop, as follows:—(1) Unmarried Clergymen, and Widowers without a child, one pound (£1) per annum: (2) Married Clergymen, and Widowers with a child, two pounds (£2) per annum.

5.—Subscriptions shall become due on the 31st day of December, each year. Thirty days grace shall be allowed; but every Clergyman neglecting to make payment within that time, shall forfeit his claim upon the Fund, to be recovered only upon payment of arrears with ten per cent thereon.

6.—Any Clergyman neglecting to subscribe according to Rule 4, may secure the benefit of the Fund, at

the option of the Committee, on the payment of two pounds for each year from the first-day of the present July, or from the day of his being licensed by the Bishop.

7.—Every Clergyman securing the benefit of this Fund, will be expected to make, and forward to the Treasurer, a yearly special collection from every Congregation in his mission, and to solicit annual subscriptions from individual members.

8.—The Widow of every Clergyman who shall have paid his annual subscription, and forwarded an annual collection, till his death, or till incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity, shall be entitled to receive a yearly Pension of thirty pounds (£30) currency, during widowhood.

9.—If the Fund should at any time permit, the Committee may increase the amount of Pension to any sum not exceeding £50; such an addition, however, being subject to be withdrawn wholly or in part, should the state of the Fund not warrant its continuance.

10.—If the Widow die or marry again, the Pension shall be paid to Trustees for the benefit of such Children of the deceased husband, as may be, if boys, under sixteen, if girls, under eighteen years of age.

11.—The Trustees named by a deceased Clergyman, in the event of the death or marriage of his Widow, shall be recognized by the Committee in paying the Pension for the benefit of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, the Bishop of the Diocese shall act as Trustee in the application of the Pension.

12.—If the wife die before her husband, his child or children shall receive the Pension, so long as there is a claimant under Rule ten.

13.—The pensions shall be paid half-yearly by the Bishop's order on the Treasurer on the first of Janu-

ary and first of July. The first payment to be calculated for the interval from the husband's death to the day of payment.

14.—If a Clergyman, having joined the Fund after the 24th June 1863, removes from the diocese after having served less than fourteen years, his connexion with the fund shall cease, and he shall be entitled to receive back half the amount of the annual subscriptions he has paid. If he removes after having served fourteen years and less than twenty-one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connection with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of six pounds, or nine pounds if residing within the tropics; or he may receive back half his annual subscriptions, upon which his connection with the Fund shall cease. If he removes after having served twenty-one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connexion with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of Five pounds, or seven pounds ten shillings if residing within the tropics: or he may receive back three fourths of his annual subscriptions, upon which his connection with the Fund shall cease. All Clergyman in connection with the Fund previous to the 24th June, 1863, to be governed by the original Rule 14 thereof.

15.—A yearly statement of the Treasurer's account with this Fund shall be published with the Society's Report.

16.—None of the above Rules shall be altered, or repealed except at a general meeting of the Church Society, and after a full years notice to the members of the proposed change.

“ The following is the original Rule 14, governing Clergymen in connection with the Fund before June 24, 1863.

14.—If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's

consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than seven years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on the payment of an annual subscription of three pounds (£3); or, if he desire it, may receive back half the amount he has paid; which repayment shall release the Fund from all his claims upon it."

The above Rules; with the exception of the new Rule 14, were agreed to by the President and Members of the Church Society at a special general meeting held on Wednesday, July 14th, 1858.
