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ECLIPSES.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun this year.

I.—March 25th, the Sun will be totally Eclipsed. In Longitude 77° West of Greenwich, or in all that part of the United States, West of the Meridian of Washington, the Eclipse will be partial and visible; but East of Washington the Eclipse will be invisible. Near Toronto the Eclipse will begin at the time of Sunset. At Chicago the Eclipse will be largest at the instant of Sunset. The Sun will set, partially Eclipsed, West of Washington. The Eclipse will be total in the Gulf of Mexico. Not visible in Montreal.

II.—September 17th, there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, about Midnight,—therefore, invisible in Canada.

Venus will be Evening Star until May 10; then Morning Star for the remainder of the year. Mars will be Morning Star until June 7th; then Evening Star the remainder of the year. Jupiter will be Evening Star until April 17th; then Morning Star until Nov. 3rd. Saturn will be Evening Star until July 10th; then Morning Star the rest of the year.

Since July 29th, 1851, twenty-six new Asteroids have been discovered—three of these in 1856.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

LETTERS.

Canada.—On Letters not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight, transmitted by Post between any two places in Canada, the rate is a uniform charge of *Three pence*, currency, pre-payment being optional.

For every additional weight of half an ounce, or any fraction excess of less than half an ounce, then is charged an additional rate of 3d., thus :

Great Britain or Ireland.—The single Packet rate on Letters between Canada and Great Britain is as follows :—By British (Cunard) Mail Steamer, from New York or Boston, 10d. currency (8d. sterling); by Canadian Mail Steamers from Quebec, 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. cy. (6d. sterling.) The scale of rating is, for a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ an ounce 1 rate of Postage, and an additional rate for every $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

Letters addressed to Non-Commissioned Officers, Soldiers, or Seamen, serving in Her Majesty's Forces, may be forwarded from Canada via Quebec and Halifax, or by Canadian Mail Steamer from Quebec, on payment of one penny at the time of posting, provided that the letter does not exceed half an ounce in weight, for, if above that weight, letters so addressed are liable to the ordinary Postage rates.

Letters for the above British Colonies are subject to a rate of 1s. 5d. currency, per half ounce, when sent by British (Cunard) Mail Packet via Boston or New York; and to a rate of 1s. 3d. cy., when sent by Canadian Mail Steamers.

Upon Letters for those places marked thus * prepayment is compulsory.

France.—Letters for France and Algeria, 1s. 8d. cy. per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., by Cunard Line, and 1s. 5d., if by Canadian Mail Steamer. Prepayment optional.

United States.—Letters posted at any Office in Canada, addressed to any place in the United States, except California and Oregon, are to be rated at an uniform rate of 6d. per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

The Postage Rate on Letters passing between Canada and California and Oregon, is 9d. per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

The scale for computing the charge upon Letters weighing over $\frac{1}{2}$ an ounce is the same as that for Letters passing within the Province.

Prepayment of Letters passing between Canada and any place within the United States, including California and Oregon, is optional, except as regards Letters intended for Registration.

The fee for Registration on Letters between Canada and the United States is 3d., and Letters intended for Registration must have their full Postage to destination prepaid.

Canada Postage Stamps are taken in the United States, and United States Postage Stamps are taken in Canada, as evidence of prepayment.

Stamps, of the denomination of 3d., 6d. and 10d., for the prepayment of Letters, can be purchased at the different Post Offices.

Registration--Letters containing valuables will not be recorded by the Post Office, unless handed in for Registration, with payment of 1d. as Registration fee.

Newspapers--All Newspapers published in Canada pass by mail free of Postage, within the Province, whether from the office of publication or otherwise.

Newspapers posted in Canada for either of the other British North American Provinces, or coming from thence into Canada, pass free of charge.

Newspapers posted in Canada for England, one penny on delivery.

Newspapers posted in Canada for the United States pass free to the Frontier. United States Newspapers coming into this Province are liable to a charge at the rate of one penny for every four numbers to regular subscribers, and to a half-penny each on transient Papers.

Newspapers re-posted in Canada pass free within the Province.

Publishers of Newspapers, &c., may forward, enclosed in their Publications, accounts for subscription and receipts for the same, free of charge.

Newspapers, when posted, must be so put up as to shew clearly that the wrapper covers Newspaper matter only. No marks or signs to serve the purpose of written communication is permitted, either on the paper itself or on the cover, nor any writing other than the address to which it is sent and the name of the sender. If these conditions are not complied with, the Newspaper will be liable to same rate as for a Letter.

Magazines, Periodicals and other Printed Matter.—On each Magazine or other Periodical Publication passing between any Post Office in Canada and any place in British North America, the United States or British West Indies, the ordinary Postage rate is :—If not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; if over 3 ounces in weight, 2d. If the Postage on Periodicals published in Canada be paid quarterly, in advance, either at the Office where Posted, or at the Office of delivery, one half those rates are charged.

Periodicals when sent in packets to one address, within the limit of 4 lbs. to each packet, pass at the rate of 3d. $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. Printed Circulars, Prices Current or Hand Bills, and other printed matter of a like description, and Books bound or unbound, passing as above, are charged a rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ d. $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce or fraction of an ounce, whether singly or in packets, to one address, under the weight limit of four pounds per packet.

Prepayment of the foregoing rates on Periodicals and Circulars and all other printed matter is optional, except when addressed to the United States or British West Indies, and in such case the charges must be prepaid. On all such printed matter received from the United States or British West Indies, the Canada rate always remains to be collected by the delivering Postmaster in this Province.

Circulars and other Printed Papers must be sent unsealed to pass as such, and Pamphlets, Periodicals, Magazines, Books, &c., must be put in covers open at the ends or sides, so that the character of the matter may be seen, and are subject to the same restrictions as to the presence of writing, which are hereinbefore detailed as applying to Newspapers.

Book Post with England—A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanacs, maps or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum or parchment (to the exclusion of letters whether sealed or open) and the books, maps, paper, &c., may either be written,

printed or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign.

The name and address of the sender, or anything else not in the nature of a letter, may also be written or printed upon the envelope or cover of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom forwarded.

All legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers, in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto, and the postage is to be rated upon the gross weight of the packet.—

It must not contain any letter, open or sealed, or any sealed enclosure whatever.

No Packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth or thickness.

The Postage of Book Packets must be paid in advance.

Printed Votes and Proceedings of the Imperial Parliament and Colonial Legislatures are subject to the above charges and regulations, when sent by Book Post between Canada and the United Kingdom.

All Book Post matter intended to be sent, under these regulations, from Canada to the United Kingdom must be forwarded by the Canadian Line of Steamers.

Each Carter, Cabman, &c., shall pay an annual duty to the Clerk of the Bonsecours Market, for registration and number, as follows :—For every cart or caleche, 10s. ; ditto cab, whether two or four wheeled, 15s. ; ditto coach, drawn by two horses, 30s. ; ditto omnibus, 40s. ; certificate to every Master Carter, 1s. ; ditto Driver, 6d.

The Clerk of the Bonsecours Market also collects all assessments leviable on all horses and vehicles for which certificates of registry are applied for, viz. :—On each working horse, annually, 12s. 6d. ; ditto two-wheeled vehicle, for hire, 15s. ; ditto four-wheeled ditto, 20s. ; ditto stage coach, omnibus or waggon, drawn by one or two horses, 40s. ; ditto drawn by four or more horses, 60s. ; each cart or sleigh, drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of building materials into the City from the Banlieu, an annual duty of 5s. for registration and number ; for each vehicle, under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 10s. ; for each waggon or other four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two horses, 20s.

Brickmakers, Builders, or any person carting building materials in the City, an annual duty for registration, as follows :—For each two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by one horse, 15s. ; ditto, drawn by two horses, 20s. ; for each waggon, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two or more horses, 20s.

All Bakers, Brewers and Distillers, and their Agents, the following annual duty for registration :—For each Baker's two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 40s. ; ditto wagon or ditto, 60s. ; ditto Brewer's or Distiller's two or four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 60s.

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


