

CITY ENGINEER RUST RESIGNS TO GO WEST

Has Accepted Position of City Engineer at Victoria, B. C., and Will Have Absolute Control of His Department - Mayor Geary Asks Mr. Rust to Reconsider His Decision.

Because of the persistent criticism of himself and his department by the members of the city council, C. H. Rust, for the past fourteen years city engineer for Toronto, has decided to resign from his position in order to take a similar one in Victoria, B.C., where he has been offered a salary of \$5000 a year with absolute control of the work department. Mr. Rust received a telegram yesterday from Mayor J. L. Beckwith of Victoria, informing him of his appointment and the immediate wired Mayor Geary of his decision to accept.

Last night Mayor Geary sent a telegram in return asking him to reconsider his decision. Mr. Rust, however, stated to The World that there was little possibility of this.

Not Much Chance. "If the council decide to make some definite proposition to me I might be induced to reconsider my decision," he said, "but I don't think there is much likelihood of them coming to any agreement, and I doubt whether I would stay if they did."

When asked what were his reasons for leaving, Mr. Rust said: "I have not along very well with the majority of the members of the city council, but there are a few who have persistently criticized me at every opportunity. I certainly don't feel that I am obliged to put up with this, and consequently I have resigned. I will not formally hand in my resignation until the next meeting of council, but this is merely a matter of courtesy. Of course, I regret leaving Toronto and my many friends here, but I carefully considered the matter and have decided to go as soon as possible, as they need me at once in Victoria." Mr. Rust also stated that the resignation of the council to all the departments of the city with regard to the reorganization of the works department was also a reason why he had decided to leave.

"Toronto is now getting too big to have works and waterworks in one department," said Mr. Rust. "Council have endeavored to separate the departments and then went back

on their decision. The probability is that they would put a man over my head who doesn't know as much about the city's business as I do, and I certainly could not stay under these circumstances. The best thing I can do is to go."

Here Since 1877. Mr. Rust entered the city's employ in 1877 as a rodman under Frank Shanley, who was city engineer at that time. Later he was appointed principal assistant engineer under E. H. Keating, remaining in that position till 1898, when, on the resignation of Mr. Keating, he was appointed city engineer. During Mr. Rust's regime in the works department he has supervised the expenditure of over \$30,000,000. Several investigations have been held regarding the workings of the department, but none of these resulted in proving any misuses of the vast sums entrusted to him. As head of the works department he has supervised all the great civic improvement in the last decade.

Many regrets were expressed yesterday when the news of Mr. Rust's decision was learned, and around the city council would commit an irreparable blunder if it allowed him to leave the city's employ.

Well-Known West Toronto Lady Passed Away Yesterday.

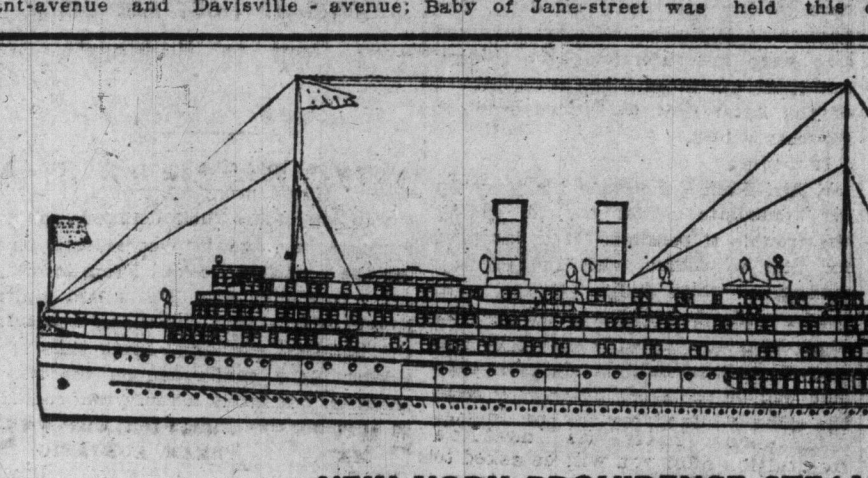

COURT CLERKS WANT MORE PIECES

Deputation From County and Surrogate Courts Waited on Board of County Judges Yesterday.

While the board of county judges were in session yesterday at the parliament buildings, they were waited on by a deputation from the division court clerks' association and other similar organizations in the judicial service, asking for increases and changes in the tariff of fees for clerks and solicitors in the county and surrogate courts. The deputation consisted of about a dozen members of these associations and included Mr. Williams, president of the registrars, and J. A. V. Preston, Orangeville, secretary of the county court clerks' association. The claim is that there are many extra duties now performed by clerks, registrars, etc., for which no remuneration is paid at all and the deputation want to have the County and Surrogate Courts Act amended. By this means new fees can be allowed for special work and higher fees for the work being done in routine from day to day.

SHOULD REPORT NEGLECT CASES

J. J. Kelso Says His Department Has Machinery to Deal With Cruelty to Children.

J. J. Kelso, provincial superintendent of the department of neglected children, stated yesterday afternoon that Ontario, he had often rescued children who were actually and intentionally being starved to death by their parents.

Mr. Kelso pointed out that cases of this kind were exceptional and isolated. Mr. Kelso said, during his lecture, he had often rescued children, on one or two instances of wilful neglect on the part of parents, but these cases were not plentiful.

ARCHBISHOP HOWLEY REPLIES To the Accusations of Mr. R. A. Reid Concerning Mr. Morine.

Editor World: A copy of a Canadian paper has been forwarded to me containing a letter from Mr. R. A. Reid, formerly secretary to Mr. A. E. Morine, K.C., etc., while the latter gentleman was in Newfoundland, some eight or ten years ago. The greater part of the letter complains only very vile, personal abuse of me, which requires no answer. There are, however, some statements therein which are intended to deceive the people of Canada, and injure my character, and which I consider deserving of an answer.

The principal accusation contained in the letter when stripped of its insulting and violent verbiage, seems to be that I tried illegally to obtain a loan of "some thousands" from the "public treasury" for the purposes of the Roman Catholic Church, that I offered as security certain church properties which Mr. Morine (who was then financial secretary of the society) declared to be valueless, and refused to grant me the loan.

The accusation is utterly absurd and unfounded. But even if it were true that I had obtained a loan of "some thousands" from the "public treasury" in order to try and discover what is really meant by this institution, it will be necessary to explain a little concerning our monetary affairs here in Newfoundland. This institution is a body corporate, managed by a board of directors appointed entirely by the government. The principal object of the bank is to receive and finance the small holdings of the people. It is also one of the legitimate powers of the bank to advance on good security loans to individuals, firms, corporations, etc., and to accommodate the people by charging a moderate rate of interest.

I came to St. John's as bishop in February, 1898. This was not long after the "bank crash," December, 1894. I found the whole monetary and commercial fabric of the community in a state of confusion and unrest. Several of the large mercantile establishments had collapsed, and all the public institutions, clubs, etc., were in a state of panic and weighed down with debt.

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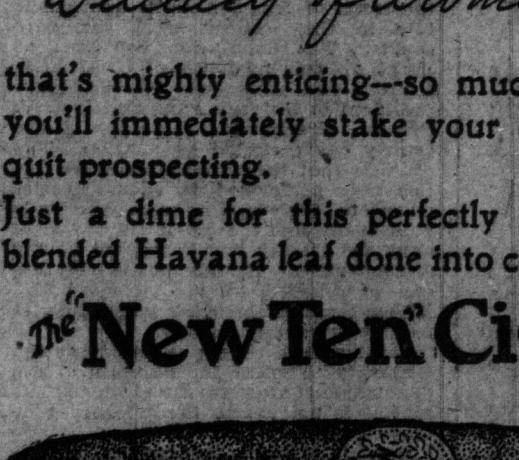

TERRIBLE MASSACRE AT FEZ IS UNDER INVESTIGATION

PARIS, April 23.—(Can. Press).—The massacre at Fez, in which a large number of French officers, soldiers and citizens were killed and wounded, has given rise to considerable criticism of the government authorities for not foreseeing and preventing the occurrence. It is pointed out by the newspapers that the French troops occupied the Moroccan capital more than a year ago.

Premier Poincaré telegraphed today to Eugene Regnaud, the French minister, to make a rapid and complete investigation.

The special correspondents of the French newspapers at Fez indicate that the plot of the rebels included the massacre of the whole of the French mission, headed by M. Regnaud, which recently arrived at the capital to establish the protectorate.

Scenes of awful horror occurred in the Jewish quarter of the city where the mob murdered, pillaged and burned all the Jews they could find, throwing their bodies from the roofs. Many young girls were carried off, torturing the wounded, and sometimes aiding the Moorish rebels in the final mutilation and desecration of the victims.

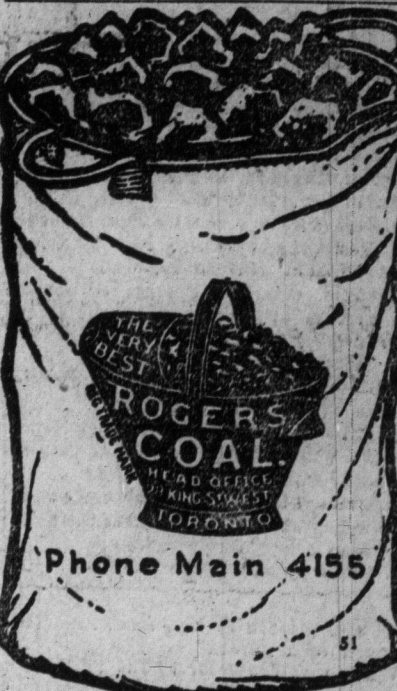

MARKET SHOWS MORE BUOYANCY

Toronto Exchange Proves More Prolific of Features—Rio and Sao Paulo in Lead.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, April 23. The South American traction stocks, Rio and Sao Paulo, came in for more real activity and buoyancy on Tuesday than they have shown for some little time. Of the whole the Toronto market showed a better trend than has been apparent of late, but about all the general list did was to hold its own at firm prices. Rio was on the upgrade through the whole session and closed the day at a full point advance at 149 1/8 bid, with the stop price recorded a fraction above that quotation. Sao Paulo on the other hand did not show up at all in the morning's transactions, but the movement when it arrived came with a rush. The first sale of the day was made at 208 1/4 and from that 204 was made in short order. At the latter figure the shares were up better than two points and at the close none was offered under 205. An upward movement in Imperial was the feature of the bank list. The shares touched 227, a gain of 2 points

BIG FORTUNES INVESTED IN PICTURES

A recent report of one of the big moving picture companies which maintains branches in the leading cities across the border, gives prominence to

the fact that enormous fortunes are invested in this new industry. It is estimated that at least \$300,000,000 has been put into the moving picture business during the last seven years in Canada and the United States alone. This includes the investment in the manufacture of the machines, the films, and in the theatrical companies. Extravagant prices are paid by these companies for special pictures. Recently \$400,000 was offered to the Vatican (which was declined) for the privilege of taking a picture of the Pope receiving visitors. The recent production of Dante's "Inferno" cost \$100,000. Some of the larger companies spend as high as \$25,000 on a single production. One company spent \$6,000 on one scene—the blowing up of a ship at sea with giant gunpowder, and it was done with a real ship and with real gunpowder—no theatrical illusion. The war plays cost a small fortune. Thomas A. Edison receives a royalty on every machine used, as he controls all of the fundamental patents and practically all of the recent patents on motion picture devices.

OUTLYING BELT OF PORCUPINE

Outside Townships Where Gold Has Been Sought—Status of Development and Prospects.

Porcupine, April 23.—(From Our Man up North.)—Enquiries come relative to work being done in the following districts, with results attained:—Kamasotia district, in the Township of Robb, lies twenty-five miles to the southwest of Porcupine. The district is reached by canoe down the Mattagami River to a small creek, thence west to Kamasotia Lake. Prospecting was done in this district two years ago, quartz bodies are reported, but payable values not found with work so far. In the basin of the Mattagami River there is a lot of sand. High ridges parallel the district from north to south. Country is heavily timbered with small spruce and tamarack trees. Practically no work has been done in the district this winter. Three Nations Lake district is in Whitney Township, the lake being situated about five miles to the east of the Whitney-Tisdale township line. Huronian slates and diorite mark a large portion of the surface rock. Two prospective mines, Three Nations Mining Company and the Keora, are now working. The territory in the Township of Deloro was practically all staked by 1909, the year Porcupine became generally known as a gold-bearing district. Many of the claims were abandoned and restaked the following year by those who still had a confidence in the district. The most promising find was made in quartz porphyry ridges that parallel the township from nearly east to west in the north half of the township. Although several prospects are still being worked in this section ore bodies of sufficient importance to warrant large expenditures of money in expensive plants are not blocking out. The values come mostly in pockets and are not consistent to the extent of inducing capitalists to enter the Deloro field. Options were dropped on a number of claims during the last eight months. Development work is being done on claims on Northern Shaw. Chas. Fox.

SEEK GOLD IN LAKE BOTTOM

Two Hundred Foot Level at McIntyre to Be Thoroughly Tested—Results at Mill.

Porcupine, April 23.—(From Our Man Up North.)—With 400 feet more made in the main cross-cut at the McIntyre, that property will be out at the 200-foot depth, with the exception of the distance across the lake bottom, where the drift may be dropped to the 300-foot level should the lake bottom show up very soft from south to north a distance of 200 feet more. Added boilers now being installed will give 10 more air drills for use in the underground, and the management does not anticipate that much more will be consumed in driving the cross-cut thru the lake bottom. A new office building is being erected on the site to the east of the mill shaft house, to furnish added facilities for housing the office help. The old quarters are outgrown. With the installation of the added boiler capacity, sinking the three main shafts now down 200 feet to the 300-foot level will be begun. Excavations for the base of the additional 30 stamps to be put in are completed and the cement work started. The mill will be constructed on the free milling basis. "We are perfectly satisfied with the results coming from the underground work," said Manager Swindler, "and especially with the results from the little mill. One good big brick a week is about the average." To date, a total of \$20,000 has been recovered in brick form. Chas. Fox.

Famous Claims Changed Hands

Jowsey Properties in Deloro, South of Dome, Pass to Gold Peak.

A deal was completed yesterday by which the Gold Peak Mining Co. became owners of the well-known Jowsey claims in Northern Deloro. Properties occupy an area of 290 acres and are only two claims removed from the Dome Extension. They lie immediately south of Dome Extension and southeast of the Big Dome. It is the intention of the Gold Peak Co. to concentrate all their immediate work on the Jowsey property, on which six well-defined veins have been discovered. The largest vein showing free gold is 75 feet wide and 50 feet long. On another six foot vein a 28-foot shaft has been sunk, the whole distance in ore values. No. 2 shaft is down 39 feet on a vein at the south of the claims, which runs for a long distance northeast and southwest. J. G. Boldt, who is largely interested in the Gold Peak Co. will leave for the north this week, to arrange for the new operations on the Jowsey claims.
