AN HOTEL ON WHEELS.

How Two Miles and Business Went on Just the Same—Towns Moved Bodily to be in the Swim.

Moosemin, N. W. T. Spectator.

The Dauphin Railway has now been completed 100 miles north of Gladstone. This is 16 miles beyond the town of Dauphin. According to all reports, the town is booming and in a most peculiar manner. While the road was being constructed, all reports were that it would be a boom town, which are four miles apart, made strong bids for the line, each vying to get the headquarters of the railway. The contractors could not decide on a site, and an equal distance from each. Their compromise was to build the town on the inhabitants of both towns made a rush for the new location. Both Dauphin and Garmouth have moved to the new town, which will be known by the old name of Dauphin. The buildings were erected on the site, but when the snow came skids were used, and the houses were rushed over in great haste.

The most peculiar part of the whole matter was that business went on while the process of moving was in operation. The Dauphin Hotel, started on its two mile journey on rollers, before it had gone far and the rollers had to be replaced by skids. This seriously delayed the work and the journey lasted seven days. During this time the business of the house was thriving, rooms were at a premium and the servants attended to their household duties as usual. Stores were moved in the same way. A farmer would overtake a navigating grocery store and make his horse to it, would go in and make his purchases. The horse would follow the building and when the purchase was completed the storekeeper would throw off the tow line and the two would part company. When one hotel was disembarking across the prairie a horseman stopped aboard to have some refreshments and get some gauntlets on the bar. He did not realize his loss for nearly an hour and then he was recalled to the hotel. The English churches of Dauphin were drawn together and Lakos Dauphin were held in the same place. The cost of transportation and the cost of the buildings are now in shape and forty of them are punched together on the townsite, which was put on the market on Oct. 7.
