





Ottawa, June 4.—(Special.)—A statement issued by the Finance Department of the revenue and expenditure for May, shows a total revenue on account of consolidated fund of \$3.517,500, an increase of \$894,523 over the same month of last year and an increase for 11 months of the current fiscal year of \$1,111,341. The revenue is made up as follows: Customs, \$1,769,837.01; excise, \$718,699.37; postoffice, \$270,000; public works, including railways, \$377,867.74; miscellaneous, \$381,102.68. In the matter of expenditure there is an increase on consolidated fund of \$155,497, and on capital account of \$221,968, made up of: Public works, railways and canals, \$299,491.46; Dominion lands, \$20,135.62; Northwest Territories' rebellion, \$14.57.
