WHEAT GOES STILL LOWER.

Another Chicago Drop in Futures on Saturday.

An Advance Reported From Liverpool, and Antwerp Was Higher With Paris Inclining Lower-Corn, Oats and Provisions All Weaker—Gossip.

Saturday Evening, June 4.

This week has been distinguished by the breaking of Leiter's great May wheat deal and in Chicago the June delivery is 63¢ per bushel lower than a week ago, while July is 25¢, September 41¢ and December 25¢ per bushel below last Saturday's figures. At Toronto, Ontario red has fallen 2½¢ per bushel below last Saturday's figures. Liverpool and Continental markets have advanced heavily. The decline was brought about by the immense world's shipments, which the high prices brought out to fill Europe's needs, and by the approach of what promises to be a bountiful harvest.

At Chicago today a further decline of 1/4¢ to 1/2¢ per bushel occurred in futures, and the June delivery eased off 5¢. Foreigners sold September wheat, and the demand from abroad seems to have dropped off.

Toronto red and Manitoba hard remained weak at 91¢ to 91¢, high freight, and \$1.22 to \$1.25 abont for Fort William, respectively.

At Liverpool, July wheat was up 2/4¢ and September 2/4¢ per cental.

Corn ruled lower in Chicago, and up to 1/4¢ off in Liverpool. Oats are weak.

Provisions declined in Chicago in sympathy with grain.

Peanut oil in Liverpool.

White cheese dropped another shilling today.

English country farmers' deliveries of wheat the past week have totaled 30,500 quarters, at an average price of 40s 8d.

September wheat puts at Chicago today 75¢, calls 80¢. Puts on September wheat, good next week, 75¢, calls 80¢.

July corn puts at Chicago 32½¢, calls 35¢. Puts on July corn, good all next week, 32½¢, calls 35¢.

The distribution of securities has been liberal. Wednesday rendered about a million dollars available for investment purposes. On Thursday and Friday the market showed a slightly weaker tone, but to-day the list recovered its firmness, and scored a general advance.
