Three Score Years and Ten Guilty of Making Bad Money Ambitious to Play a Tune on Violin to Soothe the Court

William Stuart Run to Earth Thru the Efforts of Ernest Cooper, a Young Engraver, Who Co-operated With the Police—Bill Counterfeited Escapes the Scrutiny of a Bank Official—Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Plead Not Guilty.

"Give me my violin and I will play the magistrate a tune that will get me off," observed William Stuart, the aged counterfeiter. Detective Forrest yesterday morning, when he was escorted from the Detective Department to take his seat in the dock at the Police Court. He has been kept separate from Anson Raymond and his wife, at whose hotel he had made his home for some time past, and where he manufactured the "queer" money.

Stuart was charged first with having, in October and November, forged a one-dollar bill of the Dominion of Canada. He elected for a summary trial, and when asked to plead, said: "Well, I plead guilty of making the things."

The next charge was that, on Nov. 6, he did knowingly have in his possession a glass plate, upon which had been engraved, photographed or transferred something purporting to be, and intending to represent a whole Dominion of Canada one-dollar bill. "I plead guilty," he said. He was remanded till Tuesday.

The two Reynolds were charged with knowingly having the plate in their possession. They pleaded not guilty thru their counsel, H. C. Robinson, E. C., and were remanded for a week, without electing. No application for bail for Mr. and Mrs. Raymond was considered, at least for a few days. Business was carried on as usual at Raymond's hotel yesterday. The place is in control of a bartender and the five daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond.

Communicated With Cooper. Detective Forrest was handling the case and was in constant communication with young Cooper, who in turn, was in constant communication with old Stuart. The young man's honesty asserted itself in dealing with the criminals after he discovered their motives, and he only consented to act as a police agent when he became aware that if he had done the innocent piece of work the counterfeiters requested, it would result in the discovery of their duplicity that resulted in the information reaching the ears of the Toronto police.

finished in another. Cooper suggested that the work should come thru the business office of the institution, which employs him, tho at that time he was not suspicious of anything wrong. The old man protested that this would not suit his convenience, as they would want more than the work was worth. If Cooper could not do the work in the shop he would fit up a little room for him in his hotel. Stuart said he could do the engraving, but not the photographic work.

These negotiations had consumed a month, the shy old criminal evidently feeling his way very carefully. Finally, feeling his way very carefully, Stuart stood carelessly in front of the place until Cooper came out. Then, as they walked home together he handed him a piece of glass on which was pasted a full Canadian bill with the engraving of the Earl and Lady Aberdeen on it. "It is rather a tough job, the first my friend gave me," Stuart observed. He wanted Cooper to make a negative of these faces. With this the old man went away with his outfit, complete a perfect counterfeit of the bill, as it is the photographic work that is most difficult since a large camera and costly machinery are necessary.

Continued From Page 1. and they were anxious to catch them all. About three weeks ago the aged leader of the counterfeiters' band came to Cooper with tears in his eyes.

His friend has come to me again about getting these notes made, he said. It cuts me to the heart to be told that I can't photograph who used to be able to give 'em all cards and spades on such work. Won't you do this job for me? I hate to have him think I can't do such work after I had blown myself up to him so much. I was always the best in the business, and now I can't find a single one of the craft to help me out in a little piece of work. I will give you \$2.50 for each job, and it will only take a little time. It is safe. You can be sure of that. It is legitimate, and my friend is a big boss and we can't get into trouble. Just do this one job for an old man, he pleaded.

Promised to Do It. Then Cooper took the bill and told him he would make the plate he told of. The old crook was jubilant. Cooper reported the conversation to the police and they told him to go ahead and do the work, but continue to put the old man off and give them all the time they could. Finally the negative of the one dollar note was ready. It was to be delivered Tuesday night. It was arranged that Stuart should meet Cooper in front of the latter's house and receive the negative of the bill. The police thought another day should intervene, in the hope of getting a further line on the old man. So Cooper did not appear Tuesday night.

Famous Letter. Then it was that Stuart wrote the famous letter, which will be one of the links of the chain of circumstances evidence against the whole gang. Evidently suspecting that the young engraver had been afraid to do the work, he addressed a letter to him. He sent it to his College-street residence. The "old man" immediately wrote that it looked like Mrs. and Mr. Cooper's wife promptly opened the communication. Then she turned it over to her husband as something she could not understand. Following is the letter:

Mr. Ernest Cooper, 306 College street, Toronto, Ont. My Dear Cooper: If you think the job too risky, don't do it. I wish you would let me have two or three pieces of zinc and some ink. I like your ink for it is better than mine. I have some zinc plates and outfit to Montreal.

Aud Stuart. The father of you all. On the other side of the paper was written: "You can beat me on photograph work, but I can show you all points etching. I don't want to do this job, but I hate to be a failure."

How It is Done. The zinc referred to are plates of that metal rendered sensitive to light by powerful chemicals. This photograph is transferred to metal, out of which, by an intricate process, a metal picture capable of printing paper money is constructed. This is the same system used by the government in printing its bills, therefore it is a very dangerous proposition in the hands of an outsider. Wednesday Cooper told Stuart he should have his much coveted plate Thursday evening, and to meet him on College-street. Then it was that he handed to the old crook the incriminating evidence of a counterfeiters' trade, and with the material he was caught by the police.

ton, Assistant Receiver General at Toronto, and inquired of him if there had been any of the bad money made by Stuart and his confederates passing from the banks to his department. Mr. Craighton replied that his clerks had, of course, there was always more or less bad money going thru the banks, on some cases to be more definite, he said the number of counterfeit bills brought to his notice was comparatively very small. He said that he would expect a bank teller was one or two bills might possibly slip thru his hands. Mr. Craighton said that the banks would not get much counterfeit money if it was going around, as any person who receives would be liable to cover it, and would not be able to take it to the banks, where it would be almost certain of detection. In that case, he would destroy it, or pass it on to someone else, and thus it would be kept in circulation. Mr. Craighton said that he would be glad to see many and harm only to the government.

SIMILAR CRIMES RECALLED. Police Have Run Down Several Makers of Bad Money.

The last counterfeit arrested in Toronto was Charles E. Higgins, who was caught a few months ago attempting to pass some "queer" \$5 Molson Bank Bills at Brown Bros' grocery store, corner of Queen-street and Dundas-street. Just prior to his arrest he had been in the hands of the bad bills. On his appearance in court he pleaded guilty, and at the same time he was fined \$100. If the judge would be easy on him he would show officers where the plates were hidden. He was sentenced to a week for sentence, and in the meantime he was taken to Hamilton by Col. Percy Sherwood, chief of the Dominion police. A house formerly occupied by Higgins was visited, and the plates were found in a box in the cellar. GOVERNMENT SLIGHTLY SECURED. Alfred McDougall Gave Up His Life Insurance Policies.

SOMETHING ABOUT STUART. Real Name is Held, and He Came Here in 1880.

All day yesterday Detective Forrest was engaged in hunting up information regarding Stuart's past history. In 1880 he came to Toronto from Montreal and secured a position with the Grip Company, and for five years did nearly all the firm's lithograph work. He was the first man to introduce zinc etching into Toronto, and during his connection with the firm he was a very successful engraver. Knowledge of this particular line of work to himself. While engaged in making the plates for the Grip Co. he was in the room with him. After leaving the Grip Co. he returned to Montreal and was engaged in the business of lithographing bill heads. About seven years ago he came back to Toronto and was engaged in the business of engraving plates for the Ontario Bank. He was in the employ of Mr. Doust, an exceedingly honest man, and the last person in the city who would get himself into trouble. The prisoner was held in Scotland, and prior to coming to Canada worked for a celebrated London, England, lithographing house.

Where Did He Get the Plates? Although Stuart has voluntarily told the police everything about his past history, he has positively refused to say anything about his confederates, if he had any. One matter the detectives would like Stuart to enlighten them on is where he got the plates to turn out the bills circulated in this city. The prisoner maintains that an expert counterfeiter who was put in communication with him came to Toronto and made the plates, after which he returned to the United States. This part of the investigation will be pursued by the police.

Real Name is Held. While the prisoner has been passing in Toronto under the name of William Stuart, his real name is William Stuart Reid. Why the man should change his name is not apparent, but the authorities believe that there must be some reason for his desire to be

COUNTERFEITING MADE EASY

Another gang of counterfeiters has been corralled by the police, and, in this instance, as in the majority of such cases, the hills duplicated are the one and two-dollar notes issued by the Dominion government.

And this gives rise to the question: Why do counterfeiters so often select these government bills in preference to the chartered bank notes, as the basis of their spurious issues?

Not have we far to seek to arrive at an answer to this pertinent query. The counterfeiters prefer the small government bills because these circulate to a greater extent than do the higher denomination banknotes among the poorer and working classes, the effect of this circumstance being twofold.

In any event, Canada cannot long continue to enjoy the prestige and protection of the United Kingdom without setting in the upholding of that flag. It is all very well for some of us in our moments of loyal exultation to stick out our chests, and recite:

Ye can catch hold of the wings of the mornin' And round the world till yer dead, But yer can't get away From the tune that they play To the bloomin' old rag overhead.

But we cannot with self respect forever go on reciting unless we also help to "pay up, pay up." To say nothing of the army, the Mother Country annually shells out vast millions to keep up the navy, which ensures the safety of Canadian shipping in all the ports of the world, and Canadians who do not want to be receivers of alms will help to bear this great imperial burden.

And even leaving Canadian dignity and self-respect out of the question, would not the Dominion be a gainer financially by carrying out such a bargain as has been indicated? Would not a contribution to the navy, such as Canada might be expected to give, be fully or more than offset by the commercial benefits this country would derive from a free admission of our foodstuffs into the British market?

But, meantime, let us have a clearer government medium of circulation. If only new, clean, crisp one and two-dollar notes were in the hands of the public, the people would soon learn to refuse dirty bills, the detection of the spurious article would be facilitated, and the profession of the counterfeiters would be rendered a difficult one.

The government at Ottawa can inaugurate such an improved condition of things by promptly issuing a plentiful supply of its paper money, and by thus continually forcing the old, dilapidated bills out of circulation.

This is an important matter, calling for the immediate attention of the Dominion authorities.

WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN. Canada may increase the tariff preference on British goods, and Great Britain may exempt Canadian foodstuffs from the duties now or hereafter to be imposed.

In the light of official announcements, these words contain in a nutshell the net results of the colonial conference so far as strictly trade relations between Canada and the Mother Country are concerned. No definite arrangement was arrived at in London, but both governments have promised to consider action along the lines mentioned. Mr. Chamberlain did not regard the advantages accruing to Great Britain from the present Canadian preference sufficient to warrant England departing from her historic fiscal policy, but this very expression of opinion contained an implication that Canada might be able to grant such further tariff privileges as would lead the British administration to comply with this country's request for the free entry of its wheat and flour.

And according to Mr. Fielding's official statement from Ottawa, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues have taken the granting of such an increased preference into their consideration.

In passing, we may note that the Liberal newspaper, The Montreal Witness, justifies Mr. Chamberlain's assertion that the much boasted Canadian preference had been of little benefit to Great Britain. The Witness says, editorially:

It was surely in the interests of Canada that that step (the granting of the Canadian preference) was taken, and the boast of having done it for the dear mother's sake must take a minor place. It has been admitted that we have made the most of that boast and that we have got a maximum amount of glory out of it. Yet Great Britain sacrificed very large interests to enable us to give her the preference, also she knew she was getting little or nothing in return for that sacrifice, and now in addition we ask to get paid for our fiscal behavior. The unwisdom of the thing is obvious in the Minister's reply to the question. He points out that we are asking Great Britain to depart from her established principle of tariff for revenue only and revert to protectionism, and this in return for no tangible advantage to herself, as the preference has been the cause of no appreciable increase of trade. Instead of asking for favors in return for a slight advantage on woolsens, we ought, in order to be consistent, to be planning a much more substantial reduction in our tariff. If preference to Great Britain then it should be one that Great Britain should feel at more than one point.

"Water floating on water is unsteady. How can such gross over-capitalization succeed? How will the trust get money to rebuild or replace its old ships with the very best of the modern type? The answer is, of course the common stock is not intended to be the granary of the empire, and the realization of that dream would free England of the danger that now hangs over her—the danger of having her food supplies cut off in time of war.

Chicago Live Stock World: Our esteemed and enterprising contemporary, The Toronto World, and a better paper is not published north of the line, is somewhat inconsistent in discussing its relations with people in the United States. A member of its staff, traveling in the Canadian Northwest, bewails the fact that Americans are flocking to the grain and livestock to control its destiny. This writer laments the policy of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is in the extreme, and reiterates the questionable sentiment, "Canada for the Canadians."

At the same time, The World is anxiously inquiring, editorially, why Toronto does not get the same preference for live stock as Chicago, and is puzzled over the fact that Alberta cattlemen are able to send their calves to this market and pay the existing duty of 27 per cent.

"The Canadians" is a motto that should be expunged from the Canada flag. After a few millions of settlers from this side of the line have invaded Canadian prairies and forests, the Dominion markets will have to be more attractive to shoppers.

CAPT. BERNIER AND THE POLE.

Capt. Bernier is meeting with success in his search for contributions to his North Pole expedition. The people of Hamilton received him well, and individuals subscribed liberally to his fund. The captain very properly expects Torontonians to respond with equal freedom, and he will remain here for the next few days, to give them an opportunity so to do. The prospects seem bright for getting the Canadian expedition under way next spring or summer.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT IGNORED.

Pacific Cable is Being Laid Under British Patronage. Washington, Nov. 7.—The Pacific Commercial Cable Company has ignored President Roosevelt's stipulations regarding the laying of the transpacific cable, and is going ahead under the patronage of the British Cable Trust, secure in the belief that the United States will never undertake a government cable or make terms with some strictly American company.

The New Dominion, which in 1890 completed elaborate surveys for the Pacific cable, has just learned that the British cable steamer "Colonia," after finishing its work on the Vancouver-Australia line, left Hawaii ten days ago to survey a line via Midway and the coast of Luzon. The British cable steamer Silverton, which left London early last August, is expected to arrive in the city in a few days, and the failure to hear from her gives rise to the fear that she may be carrying the remission of cable laying without entering an American port, where she would be liable to seizure by the federal authorities.

The appointment of a secretary for the Ontario branch of the Lord's Day Alliance was the subject of a warm debate among the delegates to that body at yesterday's session. Macdonald, Hon. E. H. Bronson, Hon. Senator Vidal; treasurer, John C. Copp; secretary, Rev. J. G. Shearer, who will occupy that position until a successor is appointed.

Chairman of Committees—Organization, Rev. T. A. Moore, Hamilton; Finance, John E. Brown, Hamilton; Legal, John A. Patterson, K.C.; Legislation, J. K. Macdonald.

READY FOR THE ALDERMEN

Is the Proposal to Grant a Site for Smelting Works at Foot of Cherry-St.

CITY WILL DEAL IN HARD COAL

Can.-St. Will Not Be Closed—Meeting of Works Committee—City Hall Notes.

Negotiations for the establishment of iron and steel works, however the dry-dock at the foot of Cherry-street have been going along smoothly, and the proposition is now in definite shape to come before the Property Committee. Mr. Jones of the Dominion Street Company, Mr. McLaughlin of Montreal and Mr. Watson of Hamilton are the parties who have been dealing with the Assessment Commissioner. Ald. Richardson is very favorable to the terms which will be submitted, as he thinks the new concern would greatly benefit the east end. The amount of property asked is about 14 acres, for which a nominal rental of \$300 would be paid. It is understood that the city would, however, have to provide a cut between Ashbridge's Bay and the Don, and it would also require some change in the plans for diversion of the Don. The site requested includes a strip of the estate, and there might be some difficulty over that. The company, it is understood, would consent to put up its buildings at the present site.

The Mayor intimated on Friday night that the city was making an effort to purchase some hard coal for distribution from the city fuel yards, but no purchase has been made so far. His object was not to think the dealers will have as much coal as many people imagine. Owing to scarcity of cars to get the coal to port, many difficulties in getting the wood which has been shipped, but refuses to arrive, is greatly handicapping the usefulness of the city fuel yards. There was no wood yesterday, but there is some sign of a carload of soft coal in the only fuel yard now for sale by the city.

ONE OF THE MASTERS.

A London Journal Speaks of the Supreme Chief Ringer of the I.O.F.

The enormous influence for good possessed by the controlling spirit of the organization is impossible to over-estimate, and the career of such a man must be of interest to all concerned in financial questions."

The Provincial has returned. Rev. J. M. Wilkinson, so well known in Toronto, after ten years' residence in the United States, has returned to Canada with the intention, we understand, of making it his home for the rest of his days. He has resigned his charge in Buffalo, sold his farm there, and has burned the bridges behind him. Last summer, while supplying the pulpit of a London church, he had the privilege of witnessing the religious attending functions which impressed him with the magnitude and strength of the British empire, and on his return to Buffalo he was quoted by the Courier of that city as saying that he was a confirmed Imperialist. Mr. Wilkinson and his family are the guests of his brother-in-law, Mr. A. J. H. Eckardt of St. George-street.

Telegram to the Enemy. Madrid, Nov. 7.—The trial of Subino Arana, leader of the Autonomist party in the Basque Province, charged with having organized a conspiratorial cablegram to President Roosevelt last spring on the granting of Cuban independence, began at Bilbao today. The public prosecutor took the ground that Senor Arana's telegram to the President implied the integrity and dignity of Spain, and he demanded that a sentence of eight years' imprisonment be imposed on the prisoner.

That Murderer School Teacher. Winchester, Nov. 7.—At the Winchester Assizes a true bill was found against Thomas, of Gretna, charged with murdering Miss. Mrs. Wm. Burke.

City Hall Notes. The Taylor St. Works Front-street, want to extend their premises, and are applying to the Board of Works for a license to lease some of the Morgie property. The property committee is considering it.

Should Have What They Want.

The Health Officer Sheard has been asked by Controller Graham to report on 80,000 more to defray the cost of screening the strip of land between York and Jarvis streets, which has been the scene of a property dispute.

LIVES LOST IN PORTUGAL.

Lisbon, Nov. 7.—A severe earthquake shock has been felt at Guara, in the Province of Beira, and at other places in the same province. Many lives and many houses have been destroyed.

Election Petitions.

At Osceola Hall on Friday, the petition against Dr. Lacker in North Waterloo was formally removed to Toronto for trial on Nov. 22. A motion was also made to set aside the petition against the return of T. G. Carscallen, Conservative, in Lennox, on technical grounds.

Seven Killed by Indians.

Tucson, Arizona, Nov. 7.—E. Sullivan, superintendent of a mine at La Mesa, and a half dozen Mexicans, have been killed near San Marcial, Sonora, by Yaqui Indians.

Ontario Firm May Join.

New York, Nov. 7.—The new combine of ax manufacturers will have a capital of \$20,000,000. A St. Catharines, Ont., firm is expected to join.

Will Abide by It.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Most of the independent mine owners have agreed to abide by the strike commission's decision.
