This was not a one-man government, and the country was entitled to an answer as to how the government viewed preferential duties, and also the proposal to place a 10 per cent. tax on manufactured goods.

Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in replying said the government affirmed that the country's fiscal policy needed reform, but they were not bound to present it in advance.




