ton without paying their board. His landlady kept his valise until he the order was a fraudulent one, and hence the warrant for his arrest.

Early this morning, Chief Kimball Early this morning, Chief Kimbali arrived in town with a warrant for Healey's arrest on a charge of fraud. Without waiting to notify the local police, he went traight to the Wellington home and asked for Healey. The young wife answered the door and said her husband was in bed. The chief was ushered into the parlor, where he read the warrant to Healey and placed him under arrest.

Tried to Escape.

The prisoner said he wanted to wash and went to the back of the house, and at once ran out of the back door.

Kimball made a dash after him and James Rhodes, Aged 45, Ends His chased him around the house into the front door, where a fièrce scuffie en-sued. Healey broke loose and again got thru the back door entrance, with the policeman after him. The fugitive scaled a fence and had taken about three steps when Kimball, who had reached the fence, fired, he says, to

Healey dropped in his tracks with a bullet in his back. Medical aid was summoned, but the victim died in 15 minutes within 50 feet of where he minutes within 50 feet of where he had fallen. He could barely summon enough strength to bid farewell to his wife and to tell her to notify his mother, who lives in London.

Surrendered Himself.

Chief Kimball immediately surrenrendered himself to Magistrate James

Colwood, and was detained until the inquest opened at 4 p.m. under Coroner Dr. McKeough of Chatham. The following verdict was rendered.

"That the said William Healey came to his death from the wound of a bullet clischarged'by the hand of Elliott J. Kimball, while the said Wm. Healey was running away to avoid arrest at the hands of the said Elliott J. Kimball, and that we would recommend that some restrictions be placed upon the carrying of fire arms by the constabulary of the province."

Kimball was then arrested by local Chief Constable Wm. A. Smith on a warrant issued by Crown Attorney H. D. Smith. charging manslaughter. He was remanded for preliminary trial until Monday at 10 a.m. and taken as prisoner to Chatham jail.

Solicitor O. L. Lewis appeared for Kimball and brought out evidence pointing strongly to the accidental theory, as Kimball, it was shown, was partially over the fence at the time he fired the fatal shot.

Kimball is 52 years of age, and was brought up in the vicinity of Leamington. He has been attached to the constabulary 15 years and was appointed chief of police two years ago. the is very highly respected, and feels the incident deeply. He had no intention of killing Healey, he protests, but after the prolonged struggle, and in the excitement of the moment, when the prisoner was undoubtedly escaping, he involuntarily pulled his revolver as the only means of making him stop, and fired.

He had to work night and day to get his accounts in shape, and, as the sum of about \$250,000 passed thru the books, it could easily been seen, he said, that a mistake might creep in.

Col. Leslie, who receives a salary of \$1200, assumed a bond of \$10,000 when taking office two years ago. He was once a member of the city council, and is well-known in many circles. He was a member of the exhibition board when appointed treasurer.

Gind of an Audit.
