The fundamental business conditions of the country are sound, the president declares, and it is feelish for people to withdraw their money from the banks and hoard it. Moreover, he continues, the business of the people is conducted with honesty and probity, altho in any large body of men there are certain to be some dishonest. "Interstate commerce must, be controlled," the president continues, "and only the national government can in thorogoing fashion exercise the needed control. This does not mean that there should be any extension of federal authority, but it does mean that there



Orange Marmalade.—Slice very thin, rind and all, three large seedless oranges, and one lemon. Pour over the sliced fruit eleven tumblers of cold anges, and one lemon. Pour over the sliced fruit eleven tumblers of cold water, and set away for twenty-four hours. Then boil slowly for one hour. After boiling, add four pounds of granulated sugar, and set away for twenty-four hours longer, then boil for one, hour and twenty minutes, or perhaps a little longer. Pour into jelly glasses. This amount will fill eight glasses. Cover with paraffine. The total cost of the marmalade is not more than seventy-five cents, glasses included, and here are eight presents provided for that ridiculous small sum.

Fruit Cake.—Cream together one and one-half cupfuls of powdered sugar and one cupful of butter. Add the well-beaten yolks of six eggs, and one and one fourth cupfuls of sifted flour. one-half teaspoonful each of powdered cinnamon and nutmeg. Then add the stiffiy beaten whites of the eggs and another cupful of flour. Add one-half pound of currants, one-fourth of a pound of citron, one-half cupful of cherned elmonds and a little chopned.







### U.S. JAP AMBASSADOR RECALLED TO EXPLAIN

His Government Wants to Find Out All About Immigration Difficulty.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.-Ambassa-WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Ambassador Aoki has been summoned to Japan by his government to explain personally and in detail the precise situation in this country in regard to the Japanese immigration problem.

The ambassador has been making very careful enquiry on his own account and thru the various Japanese very careful enquiry on his own account and thru the various Japanese consular offices, into the extent of the reported race feeling existing in some sections of the United States towards Japanese immigrants. PADEREWSKI'S "VARIATIONS AND FUGUE."

Editor World: It has happened that the recent Paderewski recital has proregarding his own "Variations and Fugue." Permit me to point out how the criticism of this perticular composition has lost an portunity to be vital and helpful to the

The aim of criticism to-day should be to interpret musical compos with a view to making musical culture democratic. We may be willing to put up with an unequal distribution of material goods, but in a democratic country we are unwilling to put up with the unequal distribution of spiritual possessions. Musical culture is a spiritual good, and the only way in which it can be possessed by the whole people is for the critics of any musical performance to stand between the virtuoso and his program and inter-pret his work so that the people may

understand and appreciate it It is to be regretted, then, that in Mr. Paderewski's case our critics flatly described his "Variations and Fugue" as wearisome. This is to Fugue" as wearisome. This is to destroy the pedagogic value of critiwe may suppose that if Mr. Paderewski were to visit us again and announce, Mendelssohn's "Prelude and Fugue in E minor" as the first num ber on his program, many would say, "There's some more of that wearisome stuff; I'm not going." How much better it would have been for our critics to have explained (as I myself did explain in The World) that variations or fugues are purely intelectual products, and that the interest in them is to be derived from watching how the composer has built up a structure of "tunes" in which the tune accom panies itself. A fugue, therefore, mus always be more interesting to the player than to the hearer. But it can be made interesting to the latter i state that there is always the deligh sure of recognition to be found in the playing of a canonic composition, such as a fugue. Now, Paderewski's Varlations gave us perhaps too much of a good thing, but they were far from wearisome, and in playing his Fugue he illumined a species of composition which, unless we look at it historically and structurally, is by nature no s) interesting as the more emotions forms of the romantic composers.

Finally: Much more wearlsome than any fugue is the inhuman criticism which talks only to itself, "The won derful, subtle nuances of his tempo rubato which distinguish his playing—"
So far as aiding the people to become cultured, such stuff is no more en-lightening than if the critic had written, "Nulsances of tempo tomato." In short, the musical criticism, which is a private expression of prejudices and the glorification of one's vocabulary of musical terms, is antiquated. A demo-cratic age waits criticism, which reveals and interprets to wayfaring men all the places where beauty and delight may dwell unrecognized by them.

Following, as this reverse did, on a period of unexampled prosperity and inflation, during which credit was abundant, capital poured forth freely, with in consequence a more or less general rise in the proce of commodi-ties and labor, when sound principles of finance were forgotten, and fictitious capital created to an enormous extent, it was only consistent with all previcus experience, and apparently inevitable, that a reaction should come.
To this result, various causes contributed. Among the most prominent was a wave of distrust and hostility to corporations and capital, which seems to have passed over the United States, and for which some justification was given by the management of some great companies within its borders. This hostility to corporations, to my view, merely hastened the coming


