LIQUOR LICENSES ON THE NORTH SHORE

Campbellton Appointment—Applications in Gloucester and Elsewhere.

The Royal Gazette has notice of the appointment of Edmund J. Allingham to the board of liquor license commissioners for Campbellton in place of James K. Kelly, whose term of office has expired. The commissioners for Campbellton will meet April 30, for the consideration of the granting of licenses. There are two new applicants, Wm. Sprout and Thomas J. Gorman, both for taverns. It is contemplated to grant twelve tavern and one wholesale license as against ten tavern and one wholesale this year.

PUGSLEY DEFENDS COLLUSION IN DREDGING CONTRACTS

Ottawa, April 14.—Before the orders of the day Dr. Sprout read a despatch from Washington that treaties between Great Britain and the United States relating to the St. Lawrence river, had been presented by President Roosevelt to the Senate. Dr. Sprout thought it strange that the government had come into possession of the documents. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said copies should be sent soon. He said the minister would be laid before the house. Mr. Bennett moved an adjournment to discuss a question of urgent public importance relating to dredging at Giffin and Victoria harbor. He said that according to statement of Mr. Pugsley it was proposed to let contracts for dredging at these points without calling for tenders, at prices for which the same work was performed last year.

Charges Fraud

For work at Midland, Grand Company tendered at 33 cents and the Spohn Company at 27 cents. But there was a third tender from the son of the member for Ottawa for 30 cents. Mr. Bennett charged that there was an arrangement between the Grand and Spohn companies, and he challenged the minister, or prime minister, to have the tenders laid on the table. Sir Wilfrid Laurier declared he had no authority to order a production of the papers, but Mr. Bennett thought, partly because he was a member of parliament, he was big enough to do it. Finally Mr. Bennett sent a page after the papers. The whole thing, Bennett, hinged on whether scores were filled. The country paid inspectors, who were never there. This had been proved in one case, and no one had been prosecuted for conniving at the fraud. Dr. Pugsley pleaded that the transaction was before the public accounts committee, and therefore could not be discussed in the house. Mr. Bennett declared the Midland matter had not been before the committee, the papers had been moved for and brought down and in due course an investigation would be started. Mr. Speaker ruled that if the matter was before the committee discussion was not accepted without a protest. Mr. Lake pointed out that it would be possible to prevent a discussion on any expenditure by having a supplementary of the government moving for the production of papers before the public accounts committee.

Rules Against Pugsley

After the discussion Mr. Speaker gave his ruling, declaring that if the matter was not being investigated by the committee, Mr. Bennett was at liberty to go on. The Simcoe member proceeded to show that after the Midland Company had put in tender for 33 cents, in a few weeks the same company put in a tender for the same work at 26 cents. Further, the Tiffin dredging was given to Penetanguishene Company without tender at 27 cents. The Midland Company was paid \$11,000 in one month and there was no signature of any inspector attached to the accounts. Dredging costing \$100,000 had been earning from \$80,000 to \$100,000 in a single season. Dr. Pugsley admitted the importance of the subject, and was not sorry that Mr. Bennett had brought it up. Dredging was becoming more and more expensive, and he believed the government had the right to plant it should have. It had been found that in a majority of cases it was advisable to pay for dredging work by score measurement, and therefore the government had to depend upon the honesty of the inspectors. There had been cases in which inspectors had not done their duty. One man appointed as inspector employed another to do work; he was dismissed. The minister had taken precautions to secure the full measure of work for the pay given. "No Harm to Oonspire." Mr. Pugsley did not think it crime for two men to set together and put in tenders at different figures, each knowing the figures of the other. It was not strange that one company which tendered for

NOTHING DOING.

Between the new city council and the old there will be a distinction without a difference. The hope of many citizens that a ticket of strong men would be in the field has been dispelled. The choice is limited to members of the present council and a few gentlemen who are not any better qualified to conduct the affairs of the city.

THE ADVISERS The Sun this morning charges that other journals misrepresent the reasons for the postponement of the Liberal convention, which it says was entirely due to the fact that the house was summoned to meet after Easter on the day before that set for the convention.

An Ottawa correspondent writes this concerning the long-drawn session of parliament:—"When the present session opened on November 29th last, the grass was green on the hill, and the page boys played baseball until the winter swooped down. Today the page boys are out with the bats and balls; the snow has disappeared, winter has gone, and the government has awakened to the fact that if prorogation is to take place before the snow flies again there will have to be some activity shown."

The Railway Age states that about one-third of the railway mileage of the United States reports 345,000 less men employed than on October 1st. An exchange points out that if the remaining two-thirds have discharged as many men proportionately, a million railway workers are without jobs. In addition to saving the pay of these men, railway men report increased efficiency on the part of those who have held their jobs, due in large measure to fear of being laid off.

Referring to the civil service enquiry, an Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Gazette says:—"Some startling revelations are anticipated when Mr. Justice Cassin gets to work. An effort will be made to have the investigation a public one, but it is more than likely that the government will resist this suggestion."

The death of Mr. H. W. Barker removes the last of the older male members of a family associated with the wholesale and retail drug business of St. John for two generations. The late Mr. Barker was a man of quiet tastes, a successful business man and a good citizen.

The removal from office by the Hasen government of certain officials here and there, who were either incompetent or violent partisans, appears to cause no little worry to certain journalistic minds. The public, however, will approve of the course of the government.

The Conservatives of Westmorland evidently approve of the effort made in the provincial elections to conduct a pure campaign. They have declared themselves in favor of a similar course in the federal elections. The example should be generally followed.

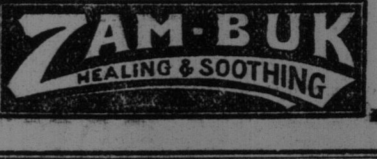
