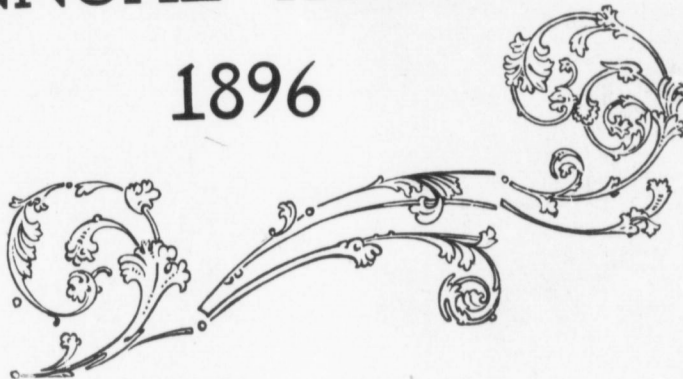

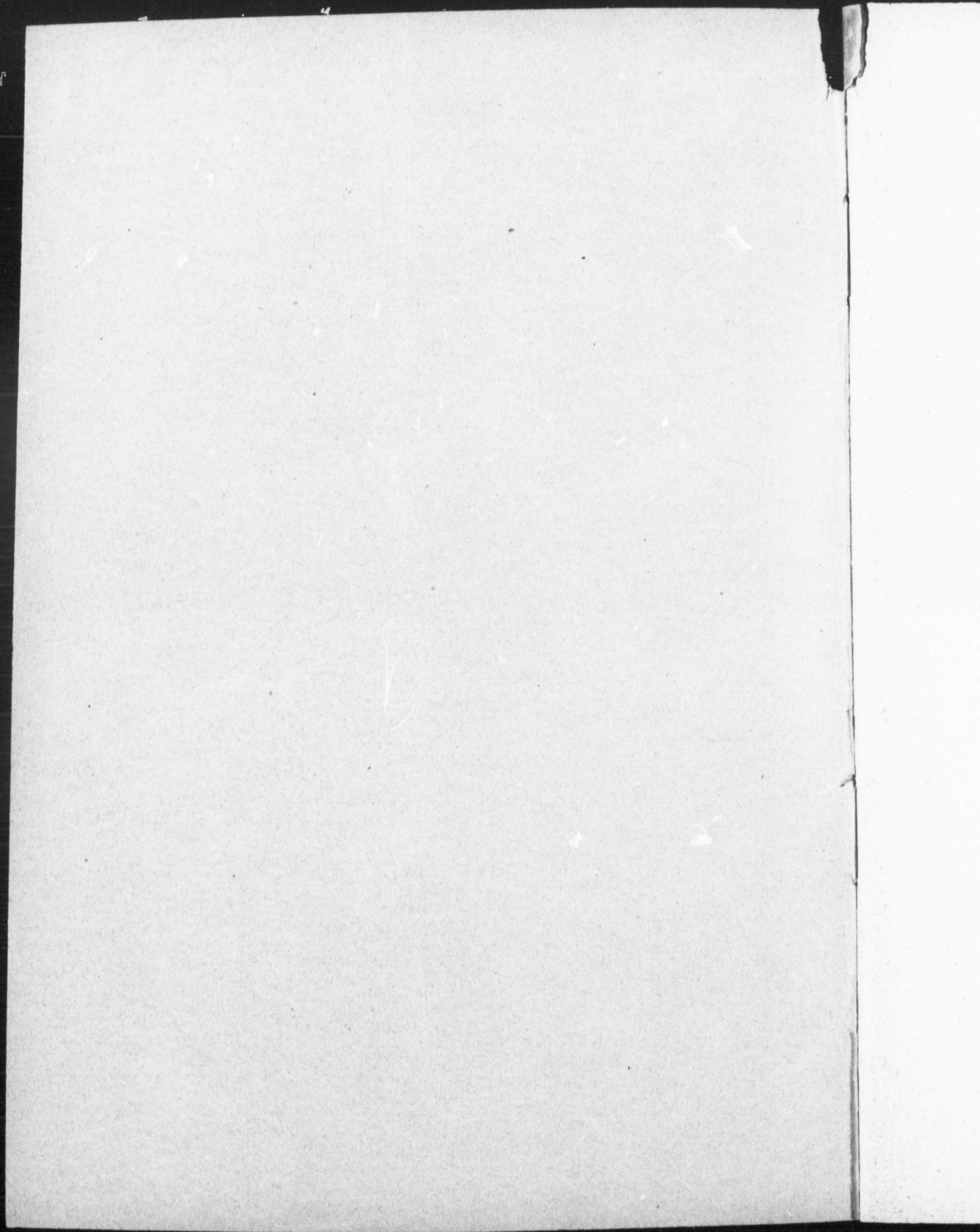

### 1. SERVICES.

### 3. SACRAMENTS.

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of February, June, August, and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbath of April and October, in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording attendance.

### 4. SUPPORT.

Pews and sittings are free, although, as far as possible, allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer-meeting service, when the Seat-letting Committee will endeavour to meet their requirements.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, by applying to the Envelope Secretary for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain, by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the church stands at any time, and they are asked to



make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence or otherwise.

#### 5. MISSION SCHEMES.

All are expected to contribute to the Mission Schemes of the Church, such as Home and Foreign Missions, French Evangelization, etc. Envelopes for monthly contributions are provided, and may be obtained from Mr. Charles D. Gordon, 58 Nassau Street. Over and above the regular contributions, members of the congregation are supporting Rev. N. H. Russell, B.A., in Central India, and assisting in the support of Rev. J. W. Muirhead, Whitewood, N. W. T. These objects are commended to the generosity of the members.

#### 6. DISTRICTS.

Synopsis of Minutes of the Annual Meeting  
of the Congregation.

---

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday, January 18th.

After devotional exercises had been conducted by the pastor, Mr. C. B. Petry was requested to act as chairman, and Mr. A. D. Crooks, as secretary to the meeting.

The report of the session for the past year was presented by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. J. McEwen. Carried.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Petry, seconded by Mr. Meldrum, and carried.

On motion of Mr. Creelman, seconded by Mr. Wm. Wilson, it was resolved to take over and assume the mission property on Elizabeth street, with the mortgage thereon for \$4,000, and Messrs. Andrew Jeffrey, R. G. A. Paton, Joseph Stephens, C. B. Petry, and A. D. Crooks were appointed Trustees, for the purpose of taking a conveyance of and holding same in trust for the congregation, and it was further resolved that Messrs. C. B. Petry and A. D. Crooks be appointed Trustees of the church property on the corner of St. Vincent and Grosvenor streets, in place of Mr. Richard Donald,



deceased, and Mr. W. N. Miller, and that Messrs. Joseph Stephens, Andrew Jeffrey, and R. G. A. Paton be re-appointed.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church, were presented, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form, and distributed among the members of the congregation.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers for two years: Messrs. Wm. Campbell, R. C. Donald, James M. Hamilton, R. Haslitt, F. C. Jones, G. H. Meldrum, C. B. Petry and Robert S. Young, and for one year, A. H. Crawford, James Hedley and Thomas Young.

Votes of thanks to the members of the choir, to the auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, and to the ladies of the congregation for the social preceding the business meeting, were unanimously passed.

Mr. John Ferguson was re-appointed auditor for the ensuing year.

## Report of Session.

---

The work of the congregation appears to have been carried on with faithfulness and with a fair degree of success during the year just closed. In the month of June we were honoured with the meeting of the General Assembly—its sessions being held in our church—and the services connected with it were both interesting and profitable. In the work of the Elizabeth Street Mission, two matters are of special interest. First, the continued devotion of Mr. F. W. Anderson, and the other young people, to the work, as well as the assistance rendered by many of the college students. Second, that Mr. Daniel McIntosh, one of our members, has resigned his position as Superintendent of the Sabbath School. He has filled this post for the last sixteen years with the most self-sacrificing faithfulness. Such long and valuable service deserves more than a passing notice. So far as we are able to judge, there has never been a deeper spirit of devotion to Christ in the Christian Endeavor Societies, both Senior and Junior, than at present. This is specially indicated in the increasing number of its members whose hearts are being turned to the great Foreign Mission work of the church.

The Sabbath School and Bible Class are being carried on most satisfactorily by an excellent staff of devoted teachers. We are sorry to lose from the Sabbath School teaching ranks during the year several who have rendered most efficient service; but we think especial mention should be made of the resignation of Mrs. Henry Meldrum, who for the past eighteen years has filled with incomparable efficiency the position of teacher of the Primary Class. In the approval of the Great Teacher, and the blessed results of her work, she has her reward. The choir has rendered excellent service during the year, and hearty thanks and commendation are due to Mr. Hunt, and those associated with him, for the admirable manner in which they have conducted the service of praise. We regret the loss, from various causes, of several former members of the choir, who have left it, but whose past services are most gratefully acknowledged.

Missionary interest, as represented in the contributions, has been steadily maintained during the year, notwithstanding the financial stringency that has brought trials and loss to many a home.

The year has been an unusually sad one on account of the deaths that have occurred. Last year we were called upon to mourn the

sad and very sudden death of Miss Maria Cobban, whose quick and unostentatious Christian life was a beautiful example of Christianity, as exhibited in domestic faithfulness. The year had scarcely opened when we were called upon to mourn the death of Mr. Charles T. Irish, and in a few short months his noble Christian son was laid in the grave beside his father. In the sweet spring time, when all nature is bursting into life, the home of Mrs. Gowans and the home of Mr. Easson were invaded, and two beautiful young lives joined the triumphant hosts above. These were followed in August by Mrs. P. W. Newton, whose noble Christian life was suddenly brought to its earthly close. But the death that has impressed itself most on the congregation is that of Mr. Richard Donald, Sr. This is due to the prominent part he has always taken in the work of the congregation, as well as to the suddenness of the death itself. Reference has already been made at length to his business integrity, his genial disposition, and his uniform faithfulness to the interests of Christ's cause in this congregation. His removal has left a blank it is not easy to fill. Ere the year closed another of our old and devoted members, Miss Ellen McCulloch, died, after a brief, but painful illness. She was another of those quiet Christians, who are in the background of Christian service, but whose many self-sacrificing ministries will never be known till that day when the secrets of all hearts shall be revealed. To the many who have been called to pass through sorrow and affliction, we extend our deepest sympathy, and pray that they may find comfort in Him who is "a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief."

During the year 78 new members have been added to the roll, 27 of these being by profession of faith, and 51 by certificate. The removals are : By death, 5; by certificate, 31; by discipline, 2; and by retirement, 27. This makes the net gain for the year 14, and the present membership 655.

Eleven infants and five adults received the sacrament of baptism.

There were only five communions during the year, owing to the absence of the pastor. The attendance was as follows : February 376, April 363, June 364, October 346, December 393. We thankfully acknowledge God's goodness in the past, and press forward to better things in the future.

## Report of the Managers.

---

The Managers have pleasure in submitting to the congregation the usual report and statements of account for the past year. From the figures presented it will be seen that the payments have exceeded the receipts by the sum of \$85.35, and this added to the deficiency of \$139.90, with which the year opened, makes a total deficit of \$225.25 at its close. There is much cause for thankfulness in the attainment of this result, in view of the large deficiency threatened several months ago, and the Managers desire to express their appreciation of the liberality of the congregation in contributing the sum of \$435.67 in response to the special appeal made in November and December.

Comparing the receipts for 1895, from the ordinary open and envelope collections, including the week evening collections, with those of the past year, it will be seen that there has been a decrease of \$422.86 for the year. This is doubtless owing to the prevailing financial stringency, as the membership of the Church has slightly increased. The expenditure for 1896 has exceeded that of the previous year by \$152.48, the principal increases being for fuel, \$48.44, insurance \$74.00, and expenses of the Elizabeth Street Mission \$137.07, which includes the missionary's salary of \$120.00, while the only decrease of any importance is in the interest paid on bank overdraft, which is \$86.39 less than that of last year.

It was thought inadvisable to make any special effort to reduce the Floating Debt, or Church Improvement Account, during the past year. For this purpose the sum of \$453.30 was received as against \$1870.45 in 1895, the latter sum including the bequest of \$1,000.00 from the late Neil Currie. A plan has been suggested for the liquidation of the remaining indebtedness now standing at \$2,233.20, which, it is hoped, will receive the hearty support of the congregation, who will shortly be addressed by circular, individually, on the subject. This plan, if success-



ful, will almost, if not fully, meet the liability by the close of the present year.

The Managers deeply regret the loss sustained by the church and congregation through the death of Mr. Richard Donald, the chairman of the Board. Mr. Donald had held this position since 1889, and was exceptionally faithful and conscientious in his attention to all the duties of the office.

A resolution will be submitted to the congregation, having in view the conveyance of the Elizabeth St. Mission property to the Trustees of the church. This property was purchased by six members of the congregation five years ago at the request and with the approval of a meeting of the Session and Board of Managers, held at the time. A recent meeting of the members of the same two bodies, together with the Trustees, have deemed it expedient to take over the property and assume the mortgage debt thereon of \$4,000.00, on which interest has hitherto been paid by the congregation as part of the expense of the said mission.

In consequence of the death of one of the Trustees, Mr. Richard Donald, and the previous resignation of another, Mr. W. N. Miller, it is advisable that these two vacancies be filled, and the congregation will accordingly be asked to appoint two new trustees, and re-appoint the remaining three, Messrs. Stephens, Jeffrey and Paton.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 224 members and adherents giving weekly the sum of \$88.37, against 221 giving \$93.74 reported a year ago. The amounts contributed are as follows:—

The Managers think that the congregation have every reason to be satisfied with the report for the past year, the total deficiency, including the floating debt, being about \$350.00 less than at the close of 1895, and it is hoped that, with careful management, the close of 1897 will find the congregation financially in a satisfactory position. The Managers believe that the church is, in all other respects, in a very flourishing condition.

The following Managers retire by rotation, and are eligible for re-election :—Messrs. Wm. Campbell, A. H. Crawford, Jas. M. Hamilton, R. Haslitt, F. C. L. Jones, G. H. Meldrum, C. B. Petry and S. B. Windrum.

## Home Mission Work in Whitewood, N.W.T.

The great affliction that came to Rev. J. W. Muirhead, in the death of his beloved wife in December, prevented him from sending a lengthy report. He writes:—"We have started our new church. The carpenter work is all done, and the brick veneer about half done, but the frost came on so early we were forced to leave the finishing of it until spring. We had the manse fixed, as it should be for a manse alone, and we are using the Methodist Church for services. The work in Whitewood is progressing very favorably, every part of the work being encouraging, and I believe that if it is looked after it will, ere long, be a self-supporting charge. Most of the people are taking a deep interest in the church. Of course, we have some about us who do not take any interest in the Gospel, but one by one they are coming to Christ. I often think we spend too much time looking after those who are Christians, and neglect those who are living without God and without hope. The congregation is about the same as last year. A few families have moved away, but others have taken their places. The Session and Managers hold their meetings regularly, and all the families in the congregation have been visited pastorally at least twice during the year." Mr. Muirhead mentions another fact that is of special interest, viz.: that in one part of his large field he could hold services only on a week day. But the people, with one accord, left their harvest fields, or other places of employment, and gathered in the middle of the afternoon to hear the Gospel preached, and to worship God. Surely such people put many of us to shame, and surely in such people there is the promise of future success and blessing.

## The Ladies' Aid Society.

In presenting their sixteenth annual report the Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in stating that the attendance during 1896 has been better than in the previous year, although there is yet room for improvement. Sixteen meetings were held during the year, with an average attendance of thirteen. When the size of the congregation, and the important nature of the work are considered, there is yet cause for regret that the attendance is not larger.

The attention of the congregation is called to the fact that the revenue during the past year has fallen off about \$100 as compared with 1895. The collections at the Thanksgiving and New Year services were less than formerly, and the deficiency has not been made up from other sources. It is earnestly hoped that the congregation will keep this matter before them, and that they will remember the needs of the Society in their future givings.

During the year fourteen families have been assisted from time to time, principally by donations of fuel, food and clothing, and, in some instances, by grants of small sums of money, and even medicines. We still continue to support one aged member of our congregation in the Aged Women's Home, and another in the Old Folk's Home.

As in previous years, many garments, quilts, etc., have been made at our meetings. These have been sent to the Elizabeth Street Mission, and there sold at a nominal figure. In this way a spirit of independence is engendered, and pauperism is discouraged. Any cast-off clothing donated by members of this congregation during the year was distributed in homes where such gifts were much appreciated.

In last year's report regret was expressed that Mrs. Mitchell had been obliged to retire from active work in the Society on account of ill-health. We have to express great gratification and thankfulness that Mrs. Mitchell has been able to be amongst us during the past year to help on the good work and aid us by her counsel.

This Society has to mourn the loss of a true friend by the death of Mr. Richard Donald, late Chairman of the Board of Managers. Mr. Donald always responded cheerfully and generously to the frequent calls made upon him, and we fully realize that the place left vacant by his sudden demise may not soon be filled.

In conclusion, we would urge the members of the congregation to take a deeper interest in the work of the Ladies' Aid Society. While much good has been accomplished, the limit has not by any means

been reached, and it is only reasonable to conclude that, were more of the ladies to interest themselves, the results would be proportionately more gratifying.

### Auxiliary of Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

In submitting the sixteenth annual report of this Auxiliary, we do so with a grateful sense of an ever-deepening and widening interest in the earnest work being carried on and advanced in the various fields in foreign lands.

We had the pleasure and profit of hearing several Missionaries who were home on furlough. Amongst them were Mrs. Large and Miss Sinclair. When we have come into personal contact with these noble women, who are working so zealously for Christ's kingdom, we cannot fail to be more impressed with the endeavours being made on every side to make each one take a more personal interest in this department of Christian work.



During the year we held twelve meetings, with an average attendance of twenty-six members. In October the usual thank-offering meeting was held, when we were pleased with a collection of \$94.75, which was in advance of last year. In August a contribution of clothing and \$13.50 in money was sent to the North-West.

We have 101 contributors to the "Letter Leaflet," who enjoy the monthly account of the progress made. We have nine Scattered Helpers, who have contributed \$19.31. In connection with the Scattered Helpers we regret to record the death of one of the most quiet and earnest Christian women. We refer to Miss McCulloch, who was called home last month.

There are on the roll 76 members, 23 of whom are life members; 43 belong to the general Society and 10 to the Auxiliary.

Through the year we have contributed \$230.28, which is quite an increase over previous years, and which was given without an extra effort having been made to increase the funds. This fact alone surely goes to prove a stronger interest in the labour of "winning the world for Christ."

## Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

While we cannot say that our Society has made the progress it should have made during the past year, we still feel that there is much cause for rejoicing in that many more of our young people have been drawn into work for our Master, and we are assured that the Society has been doing great good, not only in the work they have accomplished, but in making strangers feel that in our Church they have a home as well as a place of worship.

Though all our members do not take the interest in service which it is their privilege to do, we are happy to say that those who have entered into work have, in blessing others, been doubly blessed themselves. Some of our members teach in the Church, Elizabeth Street Mission and Central Prison Sabbath Schools; others distribute tracts, and personally visit many a home where the inmates have not or do not take the opportunities they have for learning the way of righteousness. Each week two Cottage Prayer Meetings are held by some of our members, and during the fall months we held open-air meetings once a week in the Ward under the direction of Mr. F. W. Anderson. Once every month our regular meeting on Sabbath is given up to the presentation of some missionary truth; and we are sure these meetings have been helpful, not only to our own members, but to others coming into the meetings. We regret we have not raised as much money as formerly, but this may be owing to the hardness of the times, and the fact that many of our members are not richly blessed with this world's goods. Of the total money raised—\$166.33—the Armenian Relief Fund got \$23.10 and the Russell Mission Fund \$127.80. We have added forty-four members to our roll during the year and taken off eleven.

The meetings of the Junior Endeavor Society during the past year have been very interesting and profitable. The membership numbers thirty; average attendance, twenty. This is a slight decrease from previous years, and is owing to the fact that the hour of meeting has been changed from 3 p.m. to 10.15 a.m. on Sabbath. They have raised \$10.50 for missions, which was sent to Mr. Eshoo in Persia, and given \$2.00 to the City Endeavor Union. The Sunshine Committee has frequently visited the Sick Children's Hospital, taking with them flowers and toys for the suffering inmates. The prayers of all interested in this Society are asked for its welfare.

## Elizabeth Street Mission Workers' Association.

(EMBRACING ALL ITS BRANCHES).

The average attendance at the different meetings has been very good. That of the Sabbath School has fallen slightly below the average of last year. This is owing principally to the fact that a number of families have removed to other parts of the city. The attendance at the Sabbath evening service has largely increased. The behaviour and attention of the boys and girls at this service is much improved.

The Mothers' Meetings are always well attended, for is it not there—and to many a mother the only place—where the kind and helpful word is spoken?

The tract distributors have earnestly endeavoured to spread the truth by means of good literature and personal conversation. The medical department (of which many may not know) has been a most valuable adjunct to the work, and to our friends, Messrs. McDonald, Elliott and Hume, who have done such excellent service, the mothers tender their warmest thanks.

The Christian Endeavor class is moving forward. Some of the children are very bright, and answer with much intelligence the questions put to them; and many of them have learned the truth, though only dimly and vaguely.

From time to time we have had entertainments, and on Thanksgiving Day fully 300 sat down to tea. These were much appreciated and enjoyed. But it is not necessary to say more of the different departments of the work, as the reports speak for themselves.

It is with much regret that we have parted with a number of our workers, principal among whom is our much-esteemed Superintendent, Mr. D. McIntosh, who, owing to increasing infirmities, has found it necessary to retire from the active duties of the Mission. Those of us who have had the privilege of labouring with him (some for a longer or shorter period) can testify to the faithfulness with which he has discharged every duty, and to his kind, wise and unerring judgment in all matters pertaining to the work, added to which he possesses in a very marked degree that very important quality which is so essential to the success of a Sabbath School, namely, punctuality, for in sixteen years he was not late once. Although he has given up the active duties, we know he will always retain a warm interest in the work, and, as our Heavenly Father in His great goodness has spared him to labour in His vineyard so many years, and

has granted him a resting-time in the evening of his day, we hope and pray that he may be spared many years to his family and to his many friends. The teachers have been fortunate in their choice of a man to take up the work of their esteemed Superintendent. Mr. Wiley is fully qualified for this position. He has been an earnest worker in our Mission for almost two years, and to his faithful and indefatigable labours we owe much. We trust that the mantle of his predecessor may fall upon him.

We are frequently asked what results we see from our labours. From the standpoint of cold figures the results might be deemed rather small. While many may feel that the reclamation of the erring, the wanderer, and the drunkard is almost impossible, the experience of the workers has shown that this is not the case. When we see lives wholly consecrated to the service of the Lord, and ever doing His will in kindly ministrations to the sick, the lowly and the downcast, and spreading abroad a sweet and purifying influence, thereby raising in the hearts of their fallen brothers and sisters longings after a higher life, can anyone doubt what the results will be?

As the workers go forth in loving obedience to the command, "Cast thy bread upon the waters," they wait with patience and hope the fulfilment of that precious promise, "Thou shalt find it"; perhaps not now, but "after many days." Then shall we not go forward, faithfully doing our duty, knowing that results will undoubtedly follow?

### THE SABBATH SCHOOL.

The officers and teachers of the Elizabeth Street Mission Sabbath School have great pleasure in presenting their sixteenth annual report to the congregation.

We have closed another year's work in the Master's service. We are thankful for His guidance. While we realize how little advance we have made, we ever strive to keep before our minds our chief aim, that of winning souls for Christ.

We have not been without our usual changes: scholars leaving for different causes and others coming in. A number of large boys have come back, enabling us to form a new class. Some show very little interest further than coming to School, but of others we are confident of definite results.

We regret deeply having to announce the retirement of our highly-esteemed and much-loved Superintendent, Mr. D. McIntosh, who, since the inception of the Mission on William Street, has given most

faithful and self-denying service. It is difficult for us to express in words just what we feel with regard to his rare devotion to the work; and it was only at his own urgent request to be relieved of the responsibility that we were led to consider the appointment of a successor. We feel thankful that we can still retain him as our friend and valuable counsellor, and trust he may be long spared to come and go among us. We have lost, too, some of our teachers: Miss Annie McIntosh, who was for years a faithful and untiring teacher, has been transferred to another field of labour as the wife of our former Missionary, Mr. McNichol. Our hope is that she may be greatly blessed in her sphere of labour. We are also sorry to lose Mr. C. J. Peter, who was for along time a kind and generous friend to the Mission; and Miss May Smith. Mr. David Wilson has kindly taken Mr. Peter's class.

We had our usual summer outing to Long Branch on June 6th, and at Christmas we entertained the children by a tree and programme, giving each scholar a useful gift. On both of these occasions a very pleasant time was spent, and our thanks are due to the kind friends who assisted us with money, provisions and books for prizes.

The average attendance per quarter is as follows: First quarter, 83; second quarter, 73; third quarter, 62; fourth quarter, 75. Average for year, 71; teachers' average, 20; total average, scholars and teachers, 91.

About one hundred volumes were added to the Library during the the year.

The collection taken by the School for the year was \$47.02, and at evening services, \$41.37.

### SABBATH EVENING SERVICES.

The workers have been very much encouraged by the attendance of both adults and children at the Sabbath evening services.

During the summer months there was as usual a falling off, besides some annoyance caused by a number of unruly boys and girls. One of the workers undertook the duty of keeping order, since which time there has been better behaviour and more interest shown in listening to the Word. There has also been a gradual increase in attendance; it now averages 100. Acceptance of pardon in Jesus Christ is continually pressed home, and anyone signifying a desire of leading a better life is faithfully visited and spoken to, either by the Missionary

or one of the workers. Our Missionary, Mr. Anderson, has not been slothful in the performance of his duties. Besides preaching the Word, he has faithfully visited the homes of the people, carrying with him the message of salvation to the old and feeble, and to any who are otherwise unable to attend the services. We trust that one who has so faithfully and so efficiently performed the duties of a Missionary, and who has cast into it all his heart and energy, may long remain among us.

#### THURSDAY EVENING MEETINGS.

There is a quiet, steady work going on at the Thursday evening prayer meetings which has been helpful to many. The attendance throughout the year has been very good. The attention and interest shown by a number of young lads is most encouraging, and leads us to hope that they will one day—and may it not be far distant—accept Christ as their personal Saviour. These meetings were in charge of Mr. Anderson during the summer, but latterly they have been conducted by Mr. Harcourt, who, by his quiet, earnest manner, is winning the love and esteem of the people.

#### COTTAGE MEETINGS AND OPEN-AIR SERVICES.

Two Cottage Meetings are being held every Tuesday evening, one at the home of Mr. Adams, 51 Centre Avenue; the other at 134 Elm Street. We believe these meetings have been a means of blessing, not only to the people, but also to the workers. They are, as formerly, conducted by members of the Christian Endeavor Society.

The open-air meetings held during the summer months were well attended, and, we trust, productive of much good.

#### MOTHERS' MEETINGS.

On the presentation of the sixteenth annual report as to the work done in this branch of the Church's work there is every reason to express a strong feeling of gratitude to God for a year of successful work, for the deep interest taken in the meetings by the mothers, the class sought to be benefited, and for the bright outlook, the hopeful signs of progress, and the opportunities afforded the workers for interesting those so much in need of comfort and motherly guidance in the study of The Book, which is so full of loving sympathy, more especially for the friendless and afflicted. The work has been faithfully attended to, under the direction of our President, who has



proved herself a real Mother in Israel. The prayerful study of the Sunday School Lesson, and of the portions of the Word relating thereto, have been a wonderful help. The brightening influence of God's Word has gone into many a poor home, and the result has encouraged the teachers to even more self-denying work in the future. The Ladies' Aid, as in the past, have helped a great deal in rendering the work far-reaching; the garments, the warm quilts, the cast-off clothing, and the coal for the aged and infirm, making the lives of the recipients more comfortable and happy, and warming their hearts to the teachings of the sacred Word. In June last, by the kind remembrance of one of our friends, and afternoon tea, which was much enjoyed by the mothers and workers, gave a fresh impetus to the work. Six dollars, the result of collections at the meetings, was sent to China to Miss McIntosh. We have a little over forty regular members; there have been twenty-six meetings during the year, the attendance averaging thirty, a very encouraging fact. While times have improved but little, the workers feel called upon to exert themselves, knowing that the blessing of the Great Shepherd will give success to their labours.

An aged member who passed away during the year, Mrs. Ramsay, had seen many of the ups and downs of life. Her last days, however, were cheered and gladdened by the many kindnesses bestowed upon her, in the true spirit of Christian love. Again thanking the members of the congregation for needed assistance and kindly help and advice, we enter on the new year with the brightest hopes of success in our work.
