Lewiston, Mc., Oct. 24.—All the cases in the Androscoggin County Supreme Court against Rev. Frank W. Sandford, of Shiloh, leader of the "Holy Ghost and Us" Society including one charge of manslaughter and four of cruelty to children, have been nol prossed. Against each of the charges on the record of the clerk of the court has been written the memorandum: "Nol prossed on advice of the court."

Sandford has been tried three times on an indictment for manslaughter, alleging that the death of Leander Bartlett, a fourteen year old boy who was one of the Shiloh colony, resulted from undue punishment, inflicted for disordedience of the same and the same was the same with in getting evidence in previous trials, it would be well to nol prosse the indictment. Mr Stephens said that the Montreal jail in its present state is a school for criminals, a hot-bed of vice, and an institution from which the output must be expected to be worse than the material it received. Hardened criminals of all ages, youths of tender years, and persons not yet convicted, but awarting trial, were allowed to rub shoulders together. The condition of affairs he compared with the system in England, according to which the different classes were kept strictly separate. Last year there were eighty boys under sixteen years of age in the common jail, some for trivial offences, but the Recorder had no option in the matter. The point, however, which he wished to especially make clear was the total absence of any comprehensive system of employment for those confined in jail.
