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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd Day of August, 1855, and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, 18th day of November, 1887, and 30th day of May, 1895.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE Society," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society —that is, the circulation of the Bible without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavor to unite all Bible Societies in the Province and to concentrate their operation, in order to give more efficiency to the whole

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a Representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The three clerical and the three lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness, or absence from the city, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be ex officio such representative or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Branch Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper and

Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society, when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alterations has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-Schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements, reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-Schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools under denominational auspices are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of this Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule. 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RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.

II. That the Society be denominated " THE BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operation into districts, and appoint visitors for each district to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society, shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the parpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society on sale. Remittances on purchase account to be made from *proceeds of sales only*.

X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the ______day of _____, in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.

XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

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ABSTRACT

OF THE

FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1898-99

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 31ST, 1899.

Compared with past centuries, that now closing has been one of bold and successful enterprise and effort-but compared with the world's needs, and the means and opportunities of supplying them, the followers of the Lord Jesus are but beginning to realize their obligations, and the duties devolving upon them. When this century dawned upon us, the Sacred Book, even in the Motherland, was a rare and expensive volume, often beyond the reach of the poor, while throughout the greater portion of the world its contents were almost unknown. At this period, (1804) to meet a local necessity, the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY was organized. " The little one has become a thousand," and to day our Parent Society numbers in its ranks, over 7,600 Auxiliaries, Branches and Associations, in different parts of the world, while sister Bible Societies, with their branches, have sprung up in many lands, all working on the same lines, to supply the world's need of the Holy Scriptures. The following statistics are suggestive of the vastness and value of the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society and its branches : Since its establishment, millions of dollars have been expended in the production and circulation of the Scriptures ; the total number of issues to the close of the last year (31st March, 1899) being 160,009,393 copies. These have been printed in more than 40c different languages and dialects, and by means of local depots, colporteurs and bible-women, distributed even to the uttermost parts of the earth. The average annual circulation is over 4,000,000 copies, and to accomplish this work, last

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year over 725 colporteurs and bible-women were employed. This wonderful dissemination of the Truth of God has been made possible by the careful research, the patient effort, the scholarship, and the whole of that great process by which it is translated into different and previously unknown tongues. The encouragement in this service is the promise, "My word shall not return unto Me void."

The present is a very important epoch in history. Representatives of many nations are now assembled in the world's first "Peace Conference," with a view to disarmament, and to discuss plans for the settlement of all future international difficulties, by the more reasonable and righteous means of arbitration, as declared in the prophetic language : "And He shall judge among the nations, and shall rebuke many people; and they shall bear their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

The Churches are pledging themselves to the raising of "Twentieth Century" funds for denominational work. Why should not the Bible Societies unite in a more earnest effort for the circulation of the Word of God, the Sword of the Spirit, the great weapon which is to subdue all nations, and hasten the time when "His dominion shall be from sea even to sea, and from the river even to the ends of the earth."

Sixty years ago the UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, with much weakness, but in earnestness, and with faith in God, entered upon the blessed work of aiding the British and Foreign Bible Society by circulating the Holy Scriptures in the Province of Upper Canada. Our work has gradually increased and extended. The territory which we now occupy is great, reaching to the Pacific ocean, and covering a considerable portion of the Dominion. By the blessing of God, this Society, for many years past. has been enabled to send generous contributions to aid the parent Society in its noble and extensive missionary work throughout the world, in addition to a large annual grant to our sister Auxiliary Bible Society in Quebec.

It is a great honor and a sacred privilege to be associated in so good a cause, and as one of its principal Auxiliaries, to co-operate with the British and Foreign Bible Society in endeavoring to dispel the darkness that overshadows the earth, and to implant the knowledge of the living and true God; and we pray that the time may speedily come when every kindred, tribe and nation shall bow, and every tongue confess that He is God. An abstract of the report of the past year's operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society, issued a few days ago in London, Eng., is attached to this, and will be found most interesting to its readers. The business of the Society for the past year has been of an encouraging nature, indicating no diminution in the interest of Bible circulation. An abundant harvest and a return of general prosperity seem to have dispelled the recent signs of depression and discouragement throughout Canada.

Although the total revenue of the Society is somewhat less than that of last year, the apparent deficit is attributable almost entirely to the fact that the bequests and special donations are not so large as in the previous year, the general contributions from branch societies being well maintained.

Twenty-seven thousand, one hundred and eighty-five (27,185) copies of the Scriptures, in twenty-two languages and dialects. were issued from the Toronto Depository during the past year. The number is not so large as in the previous year, probably the result of importations by dealers from another province. A large supply of the Scriptures, in English, and all the different foreign languages and dialects required in the Dominion, will be kept in stock so that all orders can be supplied from the Toronto Depository. All are sold at cost price.

At Toronto harbour, eighteen (18) steamers carrying passengers to and from that port were presented with large-print Bibles for the use of travellers, etc. All were cheerfully received, and some Bibles placed years ago, were found still in use on the cabin tables.

BRANCH SOCIETIES.

An additional number of branches undertook to hold their annual meeting without the assistance and consequent expense of an Agent's visit. The holding of union meetings of the different congregations, in one of the churches or public halls, in towns and villages on a Sabbath afternoon or evening, the resident ministers taking active part in the meeting, has proved very interesting and advantageous. This plan is again earnestly recommended to such branch societies as can make it convenient to do so, once a year.

A few branches, formerly valuable assistants to the revenue of this Society, we regret to say, are not now so active and enthusiastic, but we hope that the efforts made to resuscitate them will soon prove effective.

Sincere thanks are due, and are hereby tendered, to the resident Ministers and faithful officers and collectors in connection with the different branches; also to the individual contributors for continued support of

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this great and Christ-like work of disseminating the Holy Scriptures at cost price, or free to those who cannot purchase.

Eleven new branches and depositories have been opened during the past year, viz. :

IN ONTARIO—Bewdley, East Oxford, East Zorra, West Zorra, Elginburg and Glenvale, Stromness, Wilmer and Perth Road.

IN MANITOBA-Binscarth, Gilbert Plains.

IN BRITISH COLUMBIA - Upper Grand Forks, Rossland.

COLPORTAGE.

The work of Colportage has been extended during part of the year, more especially in British Columbia, where our Colporteurs have done excellent service, along the new Railway lines ; in mining districts ; lumber camps, factories, canneries, Public Works, etc., etc. Also among fishermen and sailors temporarily in the harbours, some of them en-route to the North Seas on whaling expeditions, expecting to spend two years or more on the trip. A number of the sailors purchased Bibles and Testaments in different languages, while others were supplied with free copies. In British Columbia the Colporteurs found very many persons who had no copy of the Scriptures, and not a few who openly declared that they did not want any.

In Manitoba, the North-West Territories and the more remote portions of Ontario, the work has been faithfully prosecuted, and special care is being taken to provide the Scriptures in the various languages required by the recently arrived foreigners who have settled in Manitoba etc.

Thirteen Colporteurs were engaged in this work, for longer or shorter periods during the year.

The Colporteurs had many opportunities of personal conversation with infidels and others who were perfectly careless regarding their eternal interests; the sick and infirm were visited, the Scriptures read and prayers offered—and frequent religious meetings were conducted where there were no regular services. Such services on the part of the Colporteurs were much appreciated, and good results were visible.

OTHER AUXILIARIES.

We rejoice to notice the successful prosecution of the work of Bible circulation by our sister Auxiliaries of the British and Foreign Bible Society, such as Quebec, Montreal, Perth, Ottawa, and the Western Ontario (London)—all working in harmony and Christian co-operation. N

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AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Now that the war between the United States and Spain has ended, we sincerely trust that every effort will be put forth to cover the new fields opened for the circulation of God's Word among the people of those conquered lands, and that the British and Foreign and the American Bible Societies joined heart and hand, will have abundant success, with the blessing of God, in Christianizing our fellow-men in those long neglected fields.

In a spirit of deep gratitude to God for His guidance and realizing our own weakness and imperfections in the service we have sought to render, we rely on Him for the results which no human reason can calculate, and the records of time never disclose; but in faith we look forward in anticipation to that glorious day when all nations whom He has made shall come and worship before Him, and shall glorify His name.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1898-99.

"Not least art thou, thou little Bethlehem In Judah, for in thee the Lord was born; Nor thou in Britain, little Lutte.worth, Least, for in thee the word was born again.

PROLOGUE.

When our Lord ended His earthly life, He left behind Him a twofold legacy in the Bible and the Church; the power of His Spirit shown in the record of revelation, and in the whole fellowship of the faithful. And Christ's parting command to preach the Gospel to every creature, applies not only to the Church, but to the Bible. As His Apostles and witnesses go forth to make disciples of all nations, they must carry His missionary Book, or they lack their weapon with which to conquer. And not only must the preacher in foreign lands frame his lips to new and uncouth languages, the Scriptures must learn them too. The immortal Truth must borrow fresh raiment, and clothe itself in many a strange garb, before it can enter as a friend in the huts and tents of far-off tribes, and bring home the message of redemption to every man in his own tongue, wherein he was born.

The Bible Society has been the great instrument in modern times by which God's Providence is accomplishing this wonderful work of translating and circulating the Scriptures. Already it has helped the Gospel to speak in some 350 languages and dialects. So that the Book, which a century ago was a sealed book to four men out of every five, to-day lies open, more or less completely, to seven men out of every ten in the world. Such a result, partial though it be, bears the manifest seal of a Divine vocation. And the paragraphs which follow will indicate, in brief outline, how far the Society has continued faithful to this high calling, during the ninetyfifth year since its work began.

THE YEAR'S ISSUES.

If we count in each Agency and Auxiliary a year's figures onwards from those incorporated in the totals of a year ago, we find that the issues by this Society now to be reported have been as follows :----

The total announced at the last Anniversary was the highest ever attained by the Society. But this year has surpassed it by 92,287 copies

It will be noticed that for every two Bibles issued, there are sent out three Testaments, and six Scripture Portions, chiefly single Gospels or Psalters.

Out of the year's total issues, 1,352,952 copies have been in English and Welsh-a proportion of over thirty per cent. Of the English Penny Testament, since its appearance in July, 1884, up to the end of March, 1889, 6,847,920 copies have been issued.

The total issues by the Society, for the ninety-five years since its foundation in 1804, amount to 160,009,393 copies.

THE YEAR'S FINANCE.

This splendid result represents increased effort and corresponding expenditure, especially in some of the foreign fields.

This shows a deficiency for the year of $\pounds 4.769$ 18s. 1d. It is encouraging to report an increase of £3,579 in the Free Contributions from Auxiliaries at Home and Abroad. These have risen some £500 in England, £400 in Wales, and $f_{2,670}$ in the Colonies.

On account of Appropriated Special Funds the Receipts have been f_{416} 16s. 2d., and the Payments f_{538} 3s. od.

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THE STAFF. -

A note in the last Report recorded the appointment of the Rev. H. B. Macartney, M.A., of Melbourne, as Superintendent of the Home Department. The Rev. A. B. Evans, B.A., has since been appointed Assistant to the Secretaries.

The Rev. H. Matthew Cox, B.A., North Metropolitan District Secretary, having accepted a living, the vacancy thus created has been filled by the Rev. James Thomas. The Rev. W. Fisher, M.A., has been transferred to Mr. Thomas's former post in the South Metropolitan District, while the Rev. H. C. Moor, M A., has succeeded Mr. Fisher, as Midland District Secretary.

More than one important Eastern vacancy has been filled during the year. Mr. Charles E. G. Tisdall has taken up the duties of Agent in Persia, under encouraging auspices. Through the courtesy of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, the Rev. W. Sherratt has begun work at Mandalay as Agent for Burma. Mr. Charles J. Rodgers died suddenly last November -only ten months after his appointment as Secretary to the Panjab Auxiliary. The Rev. J. M. Adcock, B.A., has gone out to become his successor at Lahore.

Before the last Report was printed, sad news came of the death, at Rosario, of Signor Paul Lanteret, the Society's recently-appointed Agent in the Argentine. This vacant post has since been filled by Signor B. A. Pons. The five Republics of Central America have been constituted a separate Agency, under the care of Senor F. de P. Castells, who has laboured there as Sub-agent with conspicuous success. The Rev. R. O. Walker, M.A., has been appointed Joint-Agent for Spain, in conjunction with the Rev. Robert Stewart. The Rev. A. A. Cooper, M.A., has begun work at Alexandria as Assistant to the Rev. R. H. Weakley, our Agent in Egypt. The Rev. F. H. Spencer has accepted a tentative appointment as Agent in New Zealand, for twelve months. Mr. E. W. Searle has sailed for Rio to assist Senhor J. dos Santos in Brazil. Mr. J. S. Mellowes has retired from his Sub-agency in the West Indies After thirteen years' devoted service Mr. George Braithwaite has resigned his post as Agent in Japan, to take up some other form of Christian work in that country.

ORGANIZATION.

The Society includes, at the present time, over 7,600 Auxiliaries, Branches, and Associations in different parts of the world; of these nearly 5,700 are in England and Wales.

The Society's work in England and Wales is organized into fourteen Districts, each under its own District Secretary. The Society's work abroad is supervised and controlled by twenty-two Foreign Agents, besides seven Secretaries in India and South Africa. These are assisted by Subagents and Depositaries, while missionaries of all Protestant Communions and many different nationalities co-operate as our most effective allies in every province of the field.

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COLPORTEURS AND BIBLEWOMEN.

Colporteurs.—During the past year, the Society has supported an average number of 725 colporteurs at work for the whole twelve months. These are employed in selling the Scriptures from door to door, chiefly on the Continent of Europe, and in the great Asiatic countries. As a rule the colporteur labours in his native land, and his journals are racy of the people and the soil.

The need for such work as this will be realized when we remember that, whereas two out of every three Englishmen live in towns, more that 90 per cent. of the population of India are villagers. While, to take another example, in the Austrian Agency, which includes over 50 millions of people, there are only six cities larger than Norwich.

Some foreign returns are still incomplete; but these 725 colporteurs during last year have sold above 1,500,000 copies of Holy Scripture. They are instructed to avoid controversy, as far as possible.

Biblewomen.—Last year the Society maintained 552 native Christian Biblewomen (an increase of 48 on 1897), who laboured mainly in India and Ceylon. Their work is also growing in China and Japan. These Biblewomen read the Scriptures to their secluded sisters, shut off from all preachers and churches. They are supported chiefly in connection with some thirty different Missionary Societies—British, Colonial, American, German and Danish—and cost last year above $\pounds_{3,400}$. More than 31,600 have been read to on an average each week; nearly 2,000 have been taught to read for themselves; and over 20,000 copies of Holy Scripture were put into circulation through this agency.

TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

The translation and revision work of the Society, like the River of Ezekiel, continues to grow in depth and volume as the years go by. Each year shows increase and expansion compared with the year before; and the record for 1899 will disclose a marked advance on all previous years. In number and fitness of the translators, in the texture and quality of their work, in the old versions made better and new versions begun, and in the intelligent and sympathetic interest taken in the editorial work of the Society, the Committee can rejoice, not only in an unparalleled linguistic achievement, but also in a vast extension of the dominion of the Bible.

The last Bible completed for the Society is the **Tukudh**. It was prepared and carried through the press by the genial and painstaking Archdeacon McDonald, of the C.M.S., for a scattered tribe of Indians on the confines of the Arctic Circle. When the discovery of gold in Klondyke brought that inhospitable region to the attention of the world, it was found that the missionary had been in advance of the gold-seeker, and that the Bible in the tongue of the natives was approaching completion. The entire people have been brought under the influence of the Gospel and baptised, and, from being fierce and cruel savages, are declared to be exemplary Christians.

Another great Biblical achievement has been the completion of the revision of Karolyi's **Hungarian** version of the Old Testament, under the guida scholars. One of

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the guidance of the Right Rev. Bishop Szasz, aided by a band of Hungarian scholars. This work, so happily brought to a close, was undertaken in 1886.

One of the latest and most timely undertakings of the Society has been to prepare versions in the vernaculars of the **Philippines**, while the Americans were breaking down the barriers that had so long shut out the Gospel from those islands. Great credit is due to the enterprise of the Society's Agent, the Rev. R. O. Walker, of Madrid, who employed exiled patriotic Filipinos to make translations in **Tagalog**, **Bicol** and **Ilocano**. These scholars, by Mr. Walker's help, translated from the Spanish version, and, to make sure that their translations were faithful, Mr. Walker had each portion re-translated into Spanish from the new version. The British and Foreign Bible Society is thus sending in the Bread of Life, where our American brethren have been instrumental in opening up the way.

In **India** the work of translation and revision has been proceeding in over twenty-five versions during the year. The re-translation of the **Hindi** Old Testament, on which three eminent scholars, representing the C.M.S., the L.M.S., and the Presbyterian Church of America, with native assistants, have been engaged for several years, is now completed, and the revision of the whole will be finished during this present year. This version is intended for a population of some eighty millions of souls. The work has been carried out under the care of the Rev. T. S. Wynkoop, of Allahabad.

The revision of the New Testament in **Urdu**, or Northern Hindustani, has been completed, and is now being published in Roman and Persian characters. This language is spoken chiefly in the large towns in the upper provinces of Hindustan, by several millions of people, chiefly Musalmans.

Steps have been taken to bring to a close the revision of the **Telugu** Bible, which has been many years in progress. This tongue is spoken by more than nineteen millions of people. A representative of the L.M.S. is now working with a scholarly native minister of the C.M.S., and by the help of their brethren they are harmonizing into unity the work of their predecessors.

In **Kashmiri** the complete Bible will be published this year, under the care of the Rev. J. Hinton Knowles; and in **Baluchistan**, the Rev. T. J. Lee Mayer is engaged on a version of the New Testament by the help of native and other assistants.

The **Gujarati** New Testament has been revised and published by the Presbyterian missionaries, who are now proceeding with the Old Testament as well.

In Ceylon, the Rev. S. Coles, of the C.M.S., has been joined by a native Wesleyan Minister with a view to bringing the revision of the **Sinhalese** version, which has been long in progress, to an early termination.

The Wesleyan Methodist Conference has lent the services of the Rev. Henry Haigh, to complete the **Kanarese** revision, long in progress; and as chief reviser, assisted by a committee, he is now labouring to bring this to a close. Others belonging to various missionary societies are also at work on the outskirts of remote mountain regions of the Indian frontier, to give the Gospel to the native tribes in their own tongue.

A revision committee is now engaged at Darjeeling on the New Testament in **Tibetan**. The venerable Rev. A. W. Heyde, of the Moravian Mission, has united with the Rev. J. F. Frederickson, of the Scandinavian

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Alliance Mission, and Mr. Macdonald. a Government official and Tibetan scholar, belonging to the Scotch Church, in the revision of the New Testament.

In **China**, the Union versions initiated by the great Shanghai Conference are all progressing, and in remote districts throughout the vast empire translations are being made in the vernaculars of peoples recently discovered by the missionaries.

In **Korea** a representative committee has finished the New Testament, and is now taking steps towards the translation of the Old.

In **Russia** new versions are being produced, and old versions improved in the vernacular of remote districts.

In the distant islands of the Southern Seas the venerable Dr. Paton has carried his version of the New Testament in **Aniwa** through the press without cost to the Society; and for the surrounding islands and **New Guinea**, translations are being made and improved for tribes now coming under the influence of the Gospel.

The Rev. Frederic Langham is in this country, perfecting and editing the **Fiji** Bible. For over forty years he has been familiar with the language, in which he is admitted to be the ripest scholar, and the version now passing through the press will remain, it is hoped, the standard Fijian version.

In Cochin China, beyond the influence of the missionary, Mr. Walter James, one of the Society's Sub-Agents in Malaysia, has by native assisttance produced versions in the languages of **Cambodia** and **Anam**

In **Africa** translation and revision work is proceeding rapidly in over thirty languages. For the widely-spread and most interesting **Hausa** people a Committee is engaged on the New Testament, and it is hoped that the Gospels will be ready in time for the new missionaries who are about tobegin work in the Sudan.

The **Uganda** Bible, carried through the press by the late Mr. G. L. Pilkington, has been revised by a Committee of native Christians, and is now being brought out under the care of the Rev. F. Rowling. The cost of printing this version is being defrayed by a generous friend of the Society. The cost of two other versions of the Bible for the Dark Continent, now in progress, is also to be privately borne by friends deeply interested in the work.

These are a few out of the many versions on which the best intellect and consecrated zeal of the various mission fields are at present engaged. THE NUMBER OF LANGUAGES ON WHICH ACTIVE WORK IS IN PROGRESS

WILL PROBABLY, WHEN THE SUMMARY IS COMPLETE, REACH FROM IOO TO I20.

Some of these versions, under special circumstances, are being brought out by the energy of one scholarly man, aided by perhaps four or five native assistants. But on some of them ten or a dozen or even more linguists are actively engaged. It will thus be seen what a mighty army of able and devoted translators is now working to give the people of all lands God's thoughts towards them in their mother tongue.

SURVEY OF THE FIELD.

It is no easy task to present a bird's-èye view of the Society's mission in circulating the Scriptures. Every one has heard of the rustic who came up from the country to see the great city, and went back disappointed; he was unable to see London, because of the houses. There is the same kind of diffic because variety At

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nission came ed; he e kind of difficulty about the Bible Society's work ; we fail to grasp its proportions, because, while it reaches to the corners of the earth, it includes such infinite variety of detail.

At Home.—Here at home, in England and Wales, the Society has made Bibles and Testaments the cheapest books, for their size and quality, that are published—cheap enough for the poorest child to buy. They are granted free, or at nominal rates, to multitudes of Sunday Schools and Missions of all denominations. By similar grants, continually renewed, the Society goes into partnership with almost every religious and philanthropic agency in the country. It joins hands, for example, with orphanages and hospitals and asylums, with soldiers' institutes and theological colleges, with missions to navvies and hop-pickers and deep-sea fishermen. It spends many hundreds a year on Biblewomen who visit in the slums of London. It puts a Bible into the pocket of every child whom Dr. Barnardo and other philanthropists emigrate to Canada.

Abroad.—Outside England and Wales, the Society has been happily supplanted by sister Societies, working in friendliest co-operation, in Scotland, in Ireland, in the United States, as well as in the northern Protestant countries of Europe. Its own work lies mainly in those Continental lands which are still unblessed with the Reformed Faith, and in the vaster and more distant realms of Moslem or heathen worship.

Obstacles.—Before we survey those broad fields of Bible work in detail, it will be right to particularise two chief obstacles which meet the Society, especially throughout Europe to-day.

The sense of social hardship and misery, and the iron pressure of militarism, have driven multitudes to embrace what are vaguely called socialist or social democratic ideas. Such names in England convey no religious connotation. And Englishmen often forget that "collectivist" doctrines on the continent involve much more than economic theories or political programmes (as to which the Bible Society is entirely neutral); commonly, and among working people, they imply definitely secular standards and materialist ideals of life. So that a foreign socialist is generally unchristian, and too often bitterly anti-christian, confronting the colporteur with scorn, ridicule and blasphemy.

And side by side with this disbelief and denial stands another antagonist still more formidable and sinister. The Jesuit power, which dominates the Vatican and controls the whole policy of the Roman Church, is everywhere and always the relentless foe of an open Bible. Forty years ago George Borrow characterized the Bible Society as "one of the very few Protestant institutions for which the Roman Church entertains any fear, and consequently any respect." And our Agents agree that this implacable hostility grows more bitter and persistent year by year.

From Germany Mr. Morrison writes: "It is the unanimous testimony of our colporteurs that the opposition of the Roman Catholic clergy has never been so violent and so virulent." From France M. Monod writes: "The Jesuit journal LA CROIX has for its special object war against Protestants, and does more harm to colportage than the press of the Free-thinkers." From Austria Mr. Millard writes: "The growing influence of Rome is felt more and more." From Italy Signor Meille writes: "More and more do the priests in Italy exert their utmost power to dissuade their people from buying and reading the Word of God, and to get hold of the copies a col-

porteur may have sold, that they may burn them solemnly and publicly." We hear of the same intolerance in Spain, in Quebec, in Brazil, wherever, in short, the Church of Rome is powerful. The Bible Society and its friends, therefore, can cherish no illusions in this matter. But still less can they treat as an open question the right and the duty of every man to search for himself the Book of God. Bearing these facts in mind, we can now glance briefly at some results of the past year's work in our foreign Agencies.

France.-The atmosphere has been charged with storm, while once there was threatening thunder on the horizon towards England. The antisemitic crusade has widened into an anti-protestant propaganda. M. Monod believes that this is confined to political partisans, and has no real root among the French masses. Still the popular imagination is obsessed with one subject, which breeds endless prejudice and suspicion against whatever can be labelled Protestant. Under such conditions it is not surprising that our direct sales of Scriptures were 20,000 lower than in 1897, although still 10,000 higher than in 1896. We can rejuice, however, to believe that Evangelical agencies are multiplied over France to-day, as they have never been since the days of the great Huguenot exodus. While the growing Evangelical movement among French priests themselves attracts our warmest interest, sympathy and hope. Nevertheless the Secretary of our Paris Auxiliary reminds us that there remain to day tens of thousands of people in Paris who have never seen a Bible or a Testament, and whose only idea of one would be that it was "some kind of English Protestant prayer book."

Belgium.—In Belgium where Mr. Kirkpatrick describes a marked progress of the Evangelical Churches, colportage goes on steadily among the socialist miners and factory hands, the stolid Flemish peasants, and the sailors of all nations who crowd the quays at Antwerp. Our sales have dwindled since 1897, the year of the Brussels Exhibition. The laws against book-hawking have not yet been relaxed so as to permit of colportage in Luxembourg.

Italy.—The year which opened with bread riots and attempts at armed revolt ended more prosperously and peacefully. Italy has rejoiced in an abundant harvest and vintage, her new Cabinet has restored public confidence, and Signor Meille reports that it also gives increased protection to our colporteurs against the accusations and attacks of their opponents. Yet such a season of trouble, agitation and poverty could not fail to influence their sales, which have decreased by no less than 16,322 copies. The total circulation, indeed, rose to 105,052 copies, an increase of almost 10,000. But this is entirely due to nearly 25,000 Portions, distributed last summer during the Exhibition at Turin.

Spain,—This year of disaster to Spain has resulted in the opening of some doors which were practically shut against Bible work. For the Spanish colonies had been garrisoned with Spanish friars, and held almost as fiefs under the Pope. In Cuba, in Porto Rico, and in the Philippines, fourteen millions are now emancipated from the yoke of Rome in its corrupt mediæval form, and will henceforth enter upon religious liberty. The Spanish people as a whole, have accepted their crushing defeat with a certain native dignity There are loud demands for political regeneration and reform within the kingdom itself. But as yet we hear no distinct note of reform in religion. It is not wonderful that the passionate prejudices stirred up by the war against all things Protestant should have set back our circulation to some extent. colported tributed their nati **Por**

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extent. The figures show 73,824 copies, against 90,298 in 1897. Yet our colporteurs in Spain have sold 36,452 copies, and 6,000 Gospels were distributed among the sick and wounded soldiers and sailors as they regained their native soil.

Portugal.—Our circulation as a whole, apart from sales to other societies, has amounted to 9,226 copies, an increase due to improved colportage of nearly 1,000 over the previous year.

Germany.—Prince Bismark's death reminded his countrymen how much had happened since the founding of the German Empire. The new Germany is fast becoming a land of factories, a focus of busy and successful trade. Amid this rapid commercial prosperity, with its resultant perils, we rejoice that the distribution of the Scriptures by all agencies in Germany reached last year the unprecedented total of 869,460 copies. Our own Agency, which is chiefly confined to the Roman Catholic States and Provinces of the Empire, circulated 269,989 copies, an increase of more than 14,000 on the previous year. Our 32 colporteurs sold 77,545 copies, an increase of 10,000.

Switzerland.—Here our circulation has taken a wide leap forward. The various Cantonal Societies, conducted as a rule with great energy and wisdom, carry out the distribution of the Scriptures which they draw from us. Last year we supplied them with nearly 63,000 copies, an increase of over 11,000 on 1897. Swiss colporteurs sold altogethor 13,723 copies up and down this playground of Europe.

Austria-Hungary.-The golden hopes which greeted the Emperor's jubilee were darkened by the sudden tragedy when the Empress fell murdered at Geneva. And both divisions of the dual monarchy have suffered from the antagonism of nationalities, and extreme bitterness of party passion. Some are even deserting the Roman Church, and have joined the Reformed faith, from motives of racial and political antipathy, rather than through religious conviction. Under such untoward conditions the Society's work has been pursued, amid grave difficulties and anxieties graver still. Socialist doctrines on the one hand and ecclesiastical bigotry on the other confront the colporteur in almost every village. The Jesuits succeed only too well in their inveterate hostility against an open Bible. Through their influence the authorities in Galicia for more than two years refused to renew our colporteurs' licenses, which are now only granted again on less favourable terms, and under new and vexatious restrictions. And in Lower Austria two colporteurs' licenses were refused last year; and though we have appealed and the matter remains sub judice, the licenses of two other colporteurs are also held back, pending this decision.

Yet in the teeth of all hindrances our circulation has been 44,000 greater than in the previous year. The strange medley of races which this Agency includes purchased Scriptures in twenty-three different languages and dialects. And our colporteurs have plodded patiently at their task among the fifty millions of people whose homesteads and hamlets chequer the vast expanse from Poland down to Dalmatia, and stretch along the course of the mighty river which drains the snows of the Engadine eastward to mix with the waters of the Black Sea.

Turkey and Greece.—In Turkey the year just closed has been happily devoid of special history. The massacres have become only a dreadful memory, and the last echoes of war with Greece have died away. Bible

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work has quietly resumed its normal character. Even in Crete with the return of peace and settled government, colportage is now being re-organized under our experienced servant, Mr. Bosdoyannes.

The sales by our staff of thirty-three colporteurs have amounted to 26,-394 copies, over 9,000 more than the sales of the previous year by the same men. The total circulation for the whole Agency has been 42,724 copies in some forty languages—a decrease of 4,500 copies.

In Greece a new era in our work may date from the war. It began, perhaps, out of gratitude for the spiritual help supplied by the Society to Greek soldiers in the field and in the hospital. But a genuine quickening of national conscience has appeared in the midst of national defeat, and bears promise of a true religious revival and reform.

Russia.—The least expected, and it may be, the most momentous event of 1898 occurred in August, when the young Tsar startled the world by seriously proposing a Conference on international disarmament. It is too early even to forecast the issues of his memorable act. But all Christians must unite in effectual fervent prayer for "peace on earth." And there is perhaps more than an accidental connection between the eirenicon from St. Petersburg and the fact that of all countries outside England, Russia has in many respects given the largest facilities and the warmest welcome to the Bible Society.

Throughout these enormous territories, our work has been carried on with courage and with patience, and the results achieved give an abundant cause for thankfulness. The year's circulation has been 523,170 copies—an increase of over 20,000. Out of this total no less than 210,709 copies were sold by colporteurs. In Russia the colporteur is welcomed alike by priest and peasant, and often finds his friendliest customers in the soldiers' barracks. Seventy colporteurs have been continuously at work throughout the year, and their sales are nearly 10,000 greater than in 1897, and 25,000 greater than in 1896. Some 23,000 copies of Scriptures have been also granted at nominal rates for distribution in Russian prisons.

Siberia.--Mr. Davidson sends a thoroughly cheering report from the Siberian Agency, where such rapid changes are in progress, paving the way for changes greater still. The new Trans-Siberian railroad creeps steadily eastwards, and in four years time will stretch from St. Petersburg across to Port Arthur, as one of the highways of the world. It will then be possible to travel overland from London to Shanghai in a fortnight, instead of in five weeks as at present by steamer. Already this iron road is creating traffic everywhere as it advances, quickening immigration, improving agriculture, and carrying into the heart of these vast territories the education and civilization of the West. Bible-work in Siberia has been growing at a corresponding rate. In 1886 we circulated just over 3,000 copies " in this hitherto dark region." In 1898 the total was over 49,000. Our principal increase last year was in colportage sales, which reached 21,526 copies, a rise of nearly 6,000 during the year. Mr. Davidson can testify that the confidence of the authorities, both clerical and civil, has been won. The Siberians recognise our work more or less as an institution of the country. And latterly our colporteurs do not need to produce their signed permit for free passage, the knapsack and the books are passport enough.

Persia.—Though this Agency was vacant for more than three years, its colportage sales increased by over 1,000 copies in 1898, and we look for

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new progress under Mr. Tisdall, who reached Ispahan on December 31st, 1898.

India.—When Dr. Welldon, the new Metropolitan of India, took leave of the Committee at the Bible House in January, he reminded them that every fifth child born on to the planet is born within the limit of his ecclesiastical jurisdiction. It is difficult to grasp the full meaning of such a fact. Few Englishmen realize that India is not a country or a nation, but a continent, containing scores of nations and languages and creeds, representing all stages between savagery and culture. There are now more than 300 millions of people for whose government we are responsible in India, and of these 73 millions have been added, mostly by the increase of population, since 1871.

The Society's work, in this swarming and polyglot empire is subdivided among six Auxiliaries. Reports from only five of these have as yet come to hand. From their reports, however, we note thankfully that the India of 1897, has been relatively prosperous. Of the three calamities of war, famine, and pestilence, only the last has lingered. Yet the year 1897, so crowded with troubles, showed a wonderful and unlooked for rise in our Indian circulation ; in 1898, however, there appears a general slackening. Lahore returns a decrease of 12,000 copies, Allahabad of 12,037 copies, Bombay, of 1987, Madras of 10,546, while Bangalore shows an increase of 7,496. Leaving Calcutta on one side for a moment, that gives a net decrease of 29,074 copies—after all, less than six per cent. of last year's figures. It is encouraging to find that Indian colportage sales have generally increased.

Ceylon.—The circulation in this island, though the figures are incomplete, also show a slight falling off.

China.-To outside observers, affairs in the Far East have seemed an ugly welter of claims and intrigues by rival foreign powers, amid alternate concession and reaction on the part of the rulers of China. But, viewed from within, the year has been full of exceptional opportunities for Bible work. "In every direction," writes Mr. Bondfield, "we have found the open door, and happily have been enabled to take full advantage of it. In Manchuria and Mongolia, Formosa and Hainan, as well as in several of the provinces our work has developed or strengthened." Once again we can thankfully record an advance in all departments ; and the year's circulation has reached the astonishing total of 728,716 copies of the Scrip-tures, an increase of 161,704 on 1897. By far the greater part of this total consisted of Portions, but the circulation of New Testaments has more than trebled. Outside the above total, a quarter of a million of Scripture calendars were sold. Our sales by colportage alone have increased by 154,-176 copies. Over 300 men were at work for longer or shorter periods. Wide districts have been systematically covered, house-to-house visitation has been carried on in towns and villages, little companies of worshippers have been sought out and instructed, and in many other ways our colporteurs have been both sowers of the good seed and reapers of a ripened harvest.

In no other field are conversions so freely attributed to colportage. Dr. Ross of Mukden, writes: "Last year several hundred must have been brought into the Church of Christ through this means." Mr. R. T. Turley reports: "Good use has been made of our colporteurs on the N.E. bor-

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ders of Mongolia, and little bands of believers are being gathered together in consequence." The Rev. A. Karlsson, of Huen-uen writes : One encouraging aspect of the colporteur's work is that many people are coming to our station through reading the Scriptures." The Rev. F. Harmon, of Chou-p'ing, says : "The colporteur has been largely instrumental in establishing two new stations this year." The Rev. G. H. Jose, of Tai-chow, writes : "At Tien-hai the colporteurs have opened up two new centres for us. There are now several hundred inquirers meeting regularly by themselves for worship, who first heard the Gospel from our two colporteurs." The Rev. J. Bosshard writes : "In the city of Fo-phin a small Church has come into existence during the past year, and a second one, also the result of colportage work, was formed a few months ago at Limtshai."

Such are a tew of the testimonies found in reports, mostly by missionaries, on this year's work. Taken together, these reports give overwhelming evidence that our labor is not in vain in the Lord. How much the work of the colporteurs has to do with the present remarkable movement in Chinese thought it would be difficult to say. But patiently and persistently, year after year, they have itinerated over vast areas, and brought before millions in the eighteen provinces of China the Name which is above every name, and the regenerating truths which that Name represents.

Korea.—The circulation, which four years ago was 1,253, rose last year to 34,912 copies. This means, says Mr. Kenmure, "that the native Christians are studying their Bibles, that the missionaries are laying stress on Bible knowledge, and that the people are learning to read—painfully and with many tears, but learning." Our colporteurs have sold 6,205 copies, and their footsteps are marked by little knots of inquirers and believers, while in many places where the Bible Society might have sent colporteurs the native Korean Church has begun to do this work itself.

Japan.—Bible work in this Empire is administered by a joint Committee of three Societies—the American, the Scotch and our own. Last year's circulation increased by nearly 1,000 Bibles and Testaments And a significant event occurred when the Emperor accepted the gift of an English Bible from the Societies' Committee, and a Japanese Bible from his Christian subjects, The Buddhist opposition to mission work grows feverish, as with a sense of being foredoomed to failure. And we hear of a Christian Speaker of the Japanese House of Commons, a Christian at the head of the military hospital at Osaka, the Aldershot of Japan, and a Christian chaplain appointed for the first time to the great prison at Tokyo. Such outward symptoms betray Christian ideas slowly penetrating this gifted and facile people, who may well hold the key of the future in the Far East.

Malaysia.—From Malaysia, "the naturalists' paradise," the Rev. H. F. Miller, the acting Agent during Mr. Haffenden's furlough, sends a report of further most encouraging progress, especially in the sales of Chinese Scriptures. The circulation in 1898 reached a total of 84,690 copies—an increase of 14,433 over 1897, which itself showed an equal rise over 1896. The growth this year is distributed over different regions of this widely scattered archipelago. In Cochin-China, our energetic Sub-agent, Mr. Walter James, has sold no less than 30,653 copies, most of them Chinese Portions—4,400 more than his wonderful total for the previous year.

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Throughout this field there is a peculiar need for more missionaries to take up and carry on the hopeful work begun by our colporteurs.

The Philippines.—It is ten years since the Society's first attempt to work in Manila provoked imprisonment and expulsion, and its books were rigidly excluded by the Spanish priests. Last September, however, the American conquest enabled Mr. Bondfield to despatch our Sub-agent, Mr. B. C. Randall, to Manila with a supply of Spanish, Chinese, and Pangasinan Scriptures. He was the earliest Evangelical worker to enter this long-closed field, where he found a brisk demand for his books, and Gospels have since been sent out to him in three other Philippine languages. We have had great pleasure in placing these versions at the service of the American Bible Society, with whom we are arranging to co-operate on the friendliest terms in their new Eastern dependency. Although during the present unhappy conflict Mr. Randall can do little, he remains at Manila, to take advantage of coming opportunities. His last letter tells of Scriptures distributed in the hospital among wounded Filipinos, as well as among prisoners of war.

Australia and New Zealand.—Space fails us here to describe the fruitful work of our numerous Auxiliaries at the antipodes, not only within their own borders, but in New Guinea and Melanesia. It remains to refer briefly to two other great continents—Africa and America.

Africa.—Perhaps the most significant detail of last year's work in Africa was a grant of Swahili Gospels made to Baptist Missionaries on the Upper Congo. For Swahili is the lingua franca of the East African Coast, and the New Testament was put into it by Bishop Steere. So that this grant shows how Christian Missions have begun to clasp hands right across the deserts and forests between Loango and Zanzibar.

Another similar notable incident was a letter to the Committee from the King of Toro, begging for the Gospel in his own tongue. Toro lies north of the Albert Edward Nyanza, and has been evangelised by the C.M. S. and their converts from Uganda. The King's letter was forwarded eastwards by Mr. A. B. Lloyd before starting on his adventurous journey westwards down to the Congo mouth.

Egyptian Agency.—All through last year Englishmen were watching for news from the Nile. Our pulses quickened when we heard of those victories which rescued the Sudan from a blighting and barbarous tyranny. The destiny which has bound England and Egypt so closely together, must deepen our sense of responsibility for the future of this immemorial land. The Sirdar's College at Khartum is rising among illiterate tribes as a symbol of their education. But on the Bible Society, hand in hand with Christian Missions, rests the duty to spread southwards along the waterway of the ancient river, those sacred and saving truths which neither arms, nor arts, nor sciences can supply.

No other Agency presents such unique attraction, such incalculable opportunities. Three continents converge upon Egypt. While its deserts have become a thoroughfare for British regiments, each winter brings more English and Americans to seek health and rest under its rainless skies. The world's commerce filters through its canal. Men of every color and speech jostle each other on its quays. Scriptures were sold last year to sailors at Port Said in thirty-one different tongues, to be carried away to the ends of the earth. And thus, by this sole Agency, the coin of the

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Kingdom is made current from Japan to Jamaica, and from the Gulf of Finland to "the long wash of the Australasian seas."

Mr. Weakley, who has been reinforced by fresh workers, can report with keen satisfaction a year of unrivalled progress. In his Agency, which stretches from Cyprus to Zanzibar, the circulation has reached the record total of 28,071 copies—an increase of over 8,000 on 1897.

One of our colporteurs penetrated south as far as Wady Halfa, and the Dervish prisoners there; but he has been compelled for the present to return, through the Sirdar's decision to exclude all Christian Missions for a time from the Sodan. Still further south, our East African Subagency has been removed from Mombasa to Zanzibar. The Rev. T. F. Shaw was accorded a private audience to present the Sultan of Zanzibar with a specially prepared Arabic Bible, on behalf of the Society.

Madagascar.—In Madagascar, the work is controlled by two Committees which represent all the Protestant Missions in the island.

South Africa.—The South African Auxiliary happily unites men of all rival races which sometimes come into political conflict. It includes over 250 Branches, which ramify through Cape Colony and the Orange Free State, and spread through and beyond the Transval. Pietermaritzburg and Durban possess Auxiliaries of heir own.

We felicitate our friends, that 1898 proved a record year for their Bible work, both in finance and in circulation. Over 44,000 copies were sold— 17,000 in Dutch, 15,000 in English, and 11,000 in native tongues, while the Free Contribution to London reached \pounds 1,100. Colporteurs, who sold 9,539 copies, have laboured successfully among the Kaffirs of Cape Colony, and the miners round about Kimberley, and have visited many a remote and isolated homestead in the far north of the Transvaal.

West Africa.—The Reu. C. R. Johnson has charge of this widely scattered Agency, which extends from the Gambia to the Congo, He has achieved striking successtin forming Auxiliaries and arousing interest in the chief towns along the coast. And it is wonderful that after about two years' work he can report a circulation of nearly 10,000 copies of Scripture in a dozen different languages. This side of Africa is just beginning to rise out of the ignorance of ages. Education as yet touches only the fringe of the native population. But it is spreading every year, and with it will arrive the Bible Society's opportunity.

West Indian Agoncy.—Several of the West Indian Islands were devastated last September by a most disastrous hurricane. Free grants of Scriptures have been sent out to the sufferers, who in thousands of cases lost their all. Besides the regular work of the Agency, something has been done for Cuban refugees in Jamaica, and for Indian coolies in Trinidad, British Guiana and elsewhere. And Bible work has quickened at various points in this extended field.

Central America.—Amongst the five Republics of Central America, where a revolution is as commonplace as an earthquake, Senor E. de P. Castells has laboured as Sub-agent with increasing success. Through his influence the new Quiche St. Mark was printed at a nominal charge by the Government press at Gautemala city—a unique event in a Roman Catholic state. Senor Castells sold 1,000 copies of this edition during a four months tour among the Indians in the highlands of Guatemala. Central America will henceforth be recognized as a separate Agency of the Society. As soon as the lo waterwa

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as the long-projected canal pierces the Isthmus, the Central American waterway must become one of the chief trade routes in the world.

Brazil.—Across this remote and difficult region the circulation has been 20,204 copies, a falling off of over 3,000. The diminution was in sales at Sub-depots. Colportage shows an encouraging increase of 3,337 copies Senhor J. dos Santos has completed twenty years' service as Agent at Rio, during which he has circulated nearly 300,000 copies of the Scriptures in Brazil.

In **Chili and Peru** our work is still carried on through the Valparaiso Bible Society. And in the **Argentine**, where the death of Signor Lantaret left us without an Agent for the greater part of the year, the vacant post is now filled by his friend and former colleague, Signor Pons.

British North America.—Here the Society includes seventeen Auxiliaries, with some 1,200 Branch Societies in active co-operation, which not only circulate Scriptures from Newfoundland to British Columbia and Klondyke, but remit liberal Free Contributions to London. Among the largest and wealthiest Canadian Auxiliaries are Toronto, Ottawa, and Montreal; while the Quebec Auxiliary labours in one of the most arid and difficult fields for Bible work in the world.

EPILOGUE.

It is impossible to close this imperfect review without a sense alike of profound and humble thankfulness, and of resolute courage. We dare not grow slack to carry on the work which God has so signally blessed. The Bible Society to-day seems more necessary than ever. We have joined in the glorious centenary psalm of the Church Missionary Society with all the deeper fervour, because we know its work would be crippled to-morrow if ours were to cease. And we unite as heartily in the thanksgivings of the Religious Tract Society, knowing how all its noble effort builds upon the circulation of the Scriptures. Has any Christian enterprise a surer sanction, or a richer promise ? "If he shall not lose his reward," says Thomas a Kempis, "who gives a cup of cold water to his thirsty neighbour, what will not be the reward of those who, putting good books into the hands of their neighbours, open to them the fountains of eternal life ?"

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REPORTS OF AGENTS.

REV. DR. ABRAHAM.

Alberton, Oct. 31st.—The meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, was well attended. In the absence of the President, the Rev. Mr. Hodges was called to the chair, and opened the meeting with devotional exercises. The reports for past year were read and adopted. Officers for the ensuing year were then elected. The collecting was heartily taken hold of by the young people.

Je.seyville, Nov. 1st.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, which was well filled with an interested audience, the President, Mr. J. G. Campbell's Cross.—Meeting very well attended. Address by Rev. Joseph Hamilton. He spoke on the Word of God from Ps. 19:7. The interest taken in the work in this branch is very commendable. Evidently the Secretary, Mr.

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Nixon, is alive to the importance of the work. There is also a Depository at Inglewood connected with this branch, and is in good hands. The contributions from this branch are, we think, good, being \$55.00.

Erin.—This branch was visited by Rev. Mr. MacKinnon on Feb. 27th. The attendance was good, though the night was very cold. The interest shown was commendable. The address, which was most appropriate was received with marked sympathy, The income of last year was double that of the previous year. and better things are hoped for from this year, 1899.

REV. JAMES GRANT.

REV. E. B. HARPER, D.D.

Hawkestone was visited on October 11th. The fine weather gave way to that which was most unfavorable; yet we had with us those whose hearts appeared to be loyal to the interests of Bible dissemination. The Rev. H. A. Fish (Methodist) in whose church our meeting was held, was with us, assisting ably to make the meeting a success. The officers of this branch appeared to me to be the right men for the places which they fill.

Edgar was taken the following day, 12th. It is always a pleasant task to visit Edgar and set forth the claims of the Bible. In Mr. Miller, the Society has a model officer as Depositary and Treasurer, to which must be added his hospitality and readiness to do what is kind and obliging. Dunlop, boasts of a fine meeting, largely attended, and where the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist clergymen were present helping. Collection \$5.73. Depositary reports sales for the year \$11.45, and has stock worth \$46 on hand.

Bracebridge was visited on the 9th Nov. by the Rev. A. W. Lennox, Congregational minister of Barrie, who acted for the Agent. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, whose pastor, Rev. H. Moore, with Rev. Mr. Leith, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Roberts, Baptist, lent assistance. It was observed that the

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attendance was larger than usual. Fine attention was given to Mr. Lennox's speech. The stock is in good condition and is kept in sight of the public. The sales for the year are reported to be \$16.65.

Huntsville was taken charge of on the 9th Nov. by the Rev. A. G. Hudson of Barrie. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. John Locke, as well as Mr Hudson, is said to have spoken well.' The attendance was good better than ordinary. Enthusiasm was at high tide. Friends of the Bible looking forward to increasing success. The collection much larger than on any previous occasion.

REV. W. JOHN GARTON (Manitoba.)

Stony Mountain, Sept. 22nd.—This is a very small place. The only place of any size in it is the penitentiary. We held our meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. R. T. Hewitt occupied the chair, and, in the absence of the Secretary-Treasurer, read the minutes of the last meeting, and spoke of the benefit Stony Mountain had derived from having a branch of the Society located there. Heppe was elected President. Rev. J. H. Jarvis, Presbyterian minister, came from Sidney (9 miles) to attend the meeting, and spoke on behalf of the Society. The meeting being held early in the fall, we expect good results from the collectors.

McGregor, Sept. 29th.—The Depositary here has a good stock of well-selected Bibles. Sales excellent. Mr. T, R. Vardon gives a conspicuous place in his store, so that everyone may know of the Depository. Meeting was held in the Methodist church. Rev. W. A. Lewis in the chair. All the resident Ministers were present. Rev. C. Cunningham, Episcopalian, expressed his interest in our work. Owing to the meeting being held late in the season last year, the collectors were not as successful as usual. However, plenty of time is now in hand for the work.

Baldur, Oct. 5.—On arriving here your Agent visited the Depositary, and assisted him in taking stock. As there are a number of Icelanders in this district there is a demand for Icelandic Bibles. We hope a supply will be obtained. A small attendance greeted the Agent in the Methodist Church. Dr. Cleghorn was in his place as President. From remarks that fell from Mr. Shoults we may well anticipate a good meeting next year. Dr. Cleghorn also thinks a change for the better will come "o'er the scene." Rev. Messrs. Wilson and Wigle were present, the latter from Winnipeg. Unfortunately Rev. H. E. Hobbs, Episcopalian, was obliged to be away.

Miami, Oct. 6.—A very happy time was spent at Miami. Rev. J. Baikie, Presbyterian, met your Agent at the station and hospitably entertained him. In company together we visited the Depositary and Secretary. The stock of Bibles is extremely small, only amounting to \$6.20. A very interesting meeting was held in Mr. Baikie's church. Mr. Baikie himself was in the chair and rendered valuable assistance. Our old friend, Rev. J. H. L. Joslyn, was detained at home on account of serious illness in his family. He has our sympathy. Miami should be very successful from a collector's standpoint this year.

Wawanesa, Oct. 7.—From Miami we went to Wawanesa, one of the prettily situated towns on the N. P. Brandon branch. The Society is fortunate in having such an energetic Secretary-Treasurer as Mr. J. C. Robinson. Last year this branch contributed \$48.30. We expect a great increase this year. The meeting was excellent. Rev. A. Currie wa with know Methven. for the ele thing tedi

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Currie was chairman Besides the Agent's address, Revs. Currie and McCullagh spoke with knowledge of the Society's work. Mr. McCullagh, Methodist, drove over from Methven. Before the meeting, the Executive committee met and arranged the details for the election of officers, so that the good effect of the meeting was not lost by anything tedious.

Roland, Oct. 10th.—Unfavorable werther was with us at this point. It has been your Agent's privilege to hold several meetings here on behalf of the Society, but our meeting at this time, in spite of the unfavorable weather, was undoubtedly the best. The spirit evinced was all that could be desired, and the result was very gratifying. Dr. Macklin is a painstaking Secretary, and deserves great credit for his energy. Another thing suggested was a greater circulation of Bible Society literature.

Brandon, Nov. 2.—Your Agent paid two visits, and spent the best part of three days, trying to enthuze some to take part. On Nov. 2nd he spoke at the Presbyterian prayer meeting on behalf of the Society. The Secretary has promised to call a meeting of the Executive when he has time.

Thomas, gave a short address, after which, the agent addressed the audience in both English and German. The collection amounted to \$5.16. We hope that Alsfeldt will prove an efficient auxiliary.

Elmwood, Nov. 18th.—The weather being very disagreeable, and other meetings being in progress, we were favored with a small yet interested audience. The President, Rev. F. M. Mathers, spared no efforts to make the meeting a success. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church.

Zurich, Nov. 29th.—Rev. A. Y. Haist, the energetic President of this branch, always succeeds in bringing the people out to the meeting. The agent's address was given principally in the German language. The choir rendered valuable assistance. Mr. D, S. Faust keeps a model depository.

Crediton, Dec. 1st.—A cold, stormy night, no doubt had the effect of limiting the attendance somewhat. In the absence of the President, Rev. Mr. Hussar presided acceptably. Rev. J, G. Litt also assisted in the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. The agent found an interesting, attentive audience to speak to.

Mr. McNaughton, a retired minister, took the chair. Rev. J. R. Isaac conducted the devotional exercises. Rev. Mr. McKinnon was absent from the place. Depository well kept. Officers re-elected and collectors appointed.

Hollin.—The meeting was arranged for Oct. 4th, but on account of rain it was postponed till the 14th. Again rain and a small audience. There are no resident ministers. Mr. Isaac, of Glenallan intended to be present, but was prevented by sickness. In the absence of the President, Mr. W. Herbert took the chair. The choir of the Church were present and led in song. The stock in the Depository was low. I advised the Depositary to get some more books. O fficers elected and collectors appointed.

Garafraxa (Belwood P. O.)—The meeting was held in the Congregational Church. Rev. Mr. Bolton, the President, in the chair. Rev. Mr. McLaren was present and helped in t and Testar tary and S good repor *Mimo*.

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helped in the meeting. Rev. Mr. Flagg was unable to be present. I found the Bibles and Testaments kept in the back part of a store out of sight. I spoke to the Depositary and Secretary about having the stock in a more provident place. I hope for a good report from Garafraxa Branch.

Mimosa, Oct. 11th.—It rained heavily most of the day, but there were about fifty out 'at the meeting. Mr. A Robertson was elected President, and took the chair. There are no resident ministers, and those who preach in the Mimosa Churches were unable to be present.

Cotswold, Oct. 13th.—In the absence of the President, the Rev. Mr. Edmison, of Rothsay, presided, and conducted the devotional exercises. On account of rain the audience was not large.

Moorefield.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. A union choir furnished good music. The night was very windy, consequently the audience was small. Rev. Mr. Hill conducted the opening exercises. The President in the chair. Mr. Nicklin, Depositary, was absent through illness. He died about a month after the meeting. I was not able to take stock of the books in the Depository. The books were well kept and in good condition.

Rothsay. The meeting was uppointed for the 19th, but as it poured rain, there was no meeting. I returned in November, and the meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Edmison, of the Presbyterian Church, takes a lively interest in the Society. In the absence of the President, Mr. Wm, Oxby—who died on the morning of the day the meeting was held—the Rev. Mr. Edmison presided. The audience listened attentively to your Agent. The Depository is in good hands.

Drayton.—A special meeting of the Board of Health prevented the President attending the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Saunders, one of the resident ministers, was present. The choir of the church efficiently helped with music. The Depositary did not wish to retain the books, so the committee arranged to meet the following week and make an appo_ntment.

Palmerston.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church on Dec. 19th. Rev. J. H Robinson gave valuable assistance in the meeting. The choir of the Church was present, and added to the interest. The night was very stormy, the audience small. The Depository is well situated and well kept.

REV. J. L. MURRAY, D.D.

Dungannon. Jan. 31st.—This was the first Branch of the few entrusted to my oversight which I visited. Weather cold, but roads excellent. Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church whose pastor, the Rev. Mr. Fairbairn, is President. The attendance was good and warm interest was manifested by those present. The president and the Rev. Mr. Hutton (Methodist) contributed largely to the success of our meeting. So did the church choir who had charge of the music. The Rev Mr. Armstrong (Episcopalian) would have been present had la grippe allowed him. He is a warm supporter of the Bible Society. The business of the Branch is conducted in a business-like manner and the meeting wisely elected the same officers for the ensuing year.

Auburn, Feb. 1st.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church and was well attended. The Rev. Mr. Henderson, (Presbyterian) presided and gave an excellent address. So did the Rev. Mr. Mills (Methodist). The latter was chosen President of the Branch. Mr. D. Munro, the Sec. Treas., is an earnest, intelligent worker in the Society's interests. In this place the singing of the choir was much enjoyed. The prospects for increased contributions from this Branch are excellent.

Nile.—A Sunday School Convention and a series of special services in the Methodist Church (the only church in the place) interfered seriously with our

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efforts to hold our Bible Society meeting. Officers were elected and collectors were appointed and the Branch expects to give a good account of itself within a few weeks.

Seaforth, Feb. 3rd.—Weather clear and very cold. Meeting held in the Methodist Church. La grippe seems to have held half the town in its clutches that night, and this affected our attendance. The Rev. Dr. MacDonald (Presbyterian) presided. Mr. R. Lumsden, Secretary-Treasurer, is an efficient officer of the Society. The Rev. A. S. Russell, B.D., (Methodist) was elected President. A determined effort is being made to increase the contributions of this Branch this year.

Varna, Feb. 6th.—This is a live branch though not a large one. Meeting held in the Methodist Church; attendance very creditable considering the temperature which dropped below zero. The President, the Rev. J. A. MacDonald, presided, and both he and the popular young pastor of the Methodist Church helped materially to make our meeting a success. A pleasant and profitable evening was spent. The officers and collectors are entering on their year's work with renewed zest.

Kippen, Feb. 7th.—Here also our meeting was held in the Methodist Church, though its pastor was not able to be present. The President, the Rev. S. Acheson (Presbyterian) presided. He is a very warm friend of our Society and speaks enthusiastically in its behalf. An excellent spirit pervaded our meeting here. The church choir did good service. Volunter collectors were called for and several young men offered their services. As there is a Branch in Brucefield, four miles to the north, and one in Hensall, two and a half miles to the south, the territory of the Kippen branch is limited. The Depository is excellently managed by Mr. R. Mellis.

REV. THOMAS NATTRESS, B.D.

The district assigned me, as your representative, comprised the following branch societies: Sombra, Nov. 8th; Mooretown, Nov. 9th; Corunna, Nov. 21st; Camlachie, Nov. 14th; Forest, Nov. 15th; Ravenswood, Nov. 16th; Thedford, Nov. 17th; Clandeboye, Nov. 18th; Lobo (Township) Nov. 19th and 20th and Sarnia, Nov. 22nd.

The attendance, with two notable exceptions, was said to be good, and in most instances a decided improvement on that of former years. At *Thedford*, the executive reported a partial collapse of the Society's work in the past year. Better things are undertaken, however, for this year, even the Salvation Army being represented on the committee. Sarnia has fallen behind greatly of late years, though once this branch society had an enviable reputation. In the year 1858 the returns were \$200.00. The executive is a strong one, and the methods proposed thorough-going, if carried out. Ravenswood and Thedford have had experience of self-support, but prefer the present method, fearing that otherwise there would "neither be money to pay for an agent nor to send to the Society." At *Mooretown*, the officers request the ministers to preach on the subject of the Bible Society's work, and at *Forrest* to announce the proposed visit of the collectors before the work of collecting begins. The *Sombra* branch, though hampered in some ways, is vigorously worked by young women. At *Camlachie*, there was a proportionately large attendance of men at the annual meeting, but weather and roads were unfavorable. The Corunna audience was called a large one by the officers. It was certainly a patient one and attentive.

Forrest and Lobo will save the Society the expense of an agent's visit next year. The former place has taken a step that might be considered by self-supporting branches elsewhere, by way of ensuring success. The Rev. Mr. Barber, the newly ordained pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Forrest, was appointed principal speaker to address the annual meeting a year hence. In *Lobo Township*, I addressed at least five hundred and the I the collection Compare ing and in Melrose M

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hundred people on the Bible Society's work on Sunday, in Ivan Presbyterian Church and the Poplar Hill Baptist Church. The whole of this fine township is canvassed by the collectors, and with good results, for last year the contributions amounted to \$73.00. Compared with the amount collected the year before (\$23.00) this speaks well for varying and 'improving the methods of work adopted. The next meeting will be held in Melrose Methodist Church.

Owing to the extent of pastoral changes, and to a number of vacancies in pastorates, I have had less support upon the platform than has usually fallen to my lot in other districts, but with lew exceptions the resident ministers were present. The Rev. Mr. Brownlee, Incumbent of the English Church at Clandeboye, drove a considerable distance from another part of his field to be present at the meeting in the Methodist Church, and address the meeting.

REV. W. R. PARKER, D.D.

The visit to the branches of this district were commenced on October 24th, and Nov. 4th. The places visited, successively, were : Darlirgton West, Newtonville, Hope, Garden Hill, Kendal, Orono, Tyrone, Hampton, Enniskillen and Blackstock, (Cartwright branch). The branches were found, on the whole, in a healthy condition, and judiciously managed. Generally, in the attendance upon the meetings, in the loyal and hearty interest evidenced in the story of the translation and the circulation of the sacred Scriptures in so many lands and languages, and in the liberal support of the claims of the Bible Society, there is shown unabated confidence in the Word of God as a lamp to the people in the pilgrimage of life. Except where prior engagements for local church purposes prevented, the ministers of the several churches ably assisted the Agent in presenting and urging the daims of the Society, as well as in cordially extending to him a welcome, and a generous hospitality.

REV. JAMES G. POTTER.

The work of an Agent of the Bible Society is made most pleasant, interesting, and in some measure successful by the spirit manifested by the officers of the branches, and the great courtesy and practica sympathy shown by the ministers of the various branches of the Church of Christ. Owing to the special and strong appeal being made on behalf of St. James' Church, Montreal, your Agent felt that the people were loyally bent on doing all they could, and consequently special stress had to be laid upon the great fact that the Society was not an "outside organization," but a union of all Christians for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom through the Word of God distributed by missionaries of the different churches, as well as by the Colporteurs, Agents, and through the Depositaries of the Society. It was also found in different parts of this district that special efforts were being made to cut off the interest of many from the Society's work to that of the S. P. C. K. Having lost thereby the support of a clergyman in one village, and the personal help of a President in another village, it became my duty to speak quite plainly of the absolute dependence of all branches of the church on the Bible Society, and I was encouraged to learn from one Anglican minister that he could not lessen his interest in the Society, for he had been compelled to seek its aid in a grant of free Bibles for cases of necessity.

Campbellford, Nov. 2.—A delightful meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church. The ministers of the Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches were present, and also Rev. Mr. Mcore of Seymour East. The Rev. Messrs. Campbell and Laird have taken a deep interest in extending the work to various points in the vicinity of the town, and thus helping in every way the good work sought to be done.

Moira, Nov. 3rd.—Here we also had a good meeting. There was an encouraging attendance and all seemed to be in full sympathy with the work. Mr. and Mrs. J. H.

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Salisbury are not only leaders in our work there, but are doing all they can to promote the interests of the Society.

Marmora, Nov. 4.—Owing to other strong attractions in Marmora our audience was only fair, yet one that showed deep interest in the work. The pastor of the church, the Rev. Mr. McCulloch, took part in the meeting, while the President, Dr. McKechnie, took charge of the service. After the address of the Agent the President spoke in very kind words of the Society's important work, and urged noon all to do what was in their power.

Trenton, Nov. 7.—A very large audience assembled in the Methodist Church, and a very encouraging meeting was held. The Rev. Messrs. Greatrix and Wilkins added to the interest of the meeting. Trenton, in Bible Society matters at least, is ambitious, and is anxious to take this work up and carry it on themselves without help, and if all the Christians would stand by those who desire this, it would cause them to feel a greater independence and consequent satisfaction in their work for the Society. Having failed in their prospects the year before, they expressed great appreciation of the services of your Agent, and I trust will show deeper interest in this year's work. The President, Mr. W. H. Berkinshaw, is very deeply interested in the Society's progress.

Frankford, Nov. 8th.—Owing to circuit revival services in other parts of the parish, the Rev. Mr. Wilkinson was so engaged that he could not be present at the meeting. However, his assistant, Rev. Frank De Mills, assisted and a very successful meeting was held. Different ones at the close expressed their appreciation of the work which the Society had done and the hope of more interest in Frankford in the future.

Belleville, Nov. 9th.—A very enthusiastic meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church. Rev. Mr. McLean, pastor of the church, being ill, was represented by his assistant, Rev. Mr. Conn. Revs. Dr. McIntyre, Thompson, Cowsert and other clergymen being present took a hearty interest in the meeting and proved beyond a doubt that Belleville is thoroughly alive to the great interests of the Society. With the Rev. Dr. Galbraith as President nothing should hinder Belleville from going right ahead in this work. Mr. H. C. Hunt, the Secretary, is the right man in the right place.

Foxboro, Nov. 11th.—The annual meeting was held in the South Methodist Church, and was fairly well attended. The pastor was of necessity absent, which militated against a thoroughly successful meeting, However, the officers were all in good cheer, and looked forward to better work in the Society's cause.

Madoc, Nov. 14th.—Here your representative was well received, and while the meeting in St. Peter's Presbyterian Church was not as large as might have been expected, yet there was a good spirit, and the arrangements for collecting were perfected. Both Presbyterian and Methodist ministers are enthusiastic over the work of the Society, and can be depended upon for future usefulness.

Stirling, Nov. 16.—Having spoken to the people on the previous Sabbath, we had a very large and inspiring meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Messrs. Johnston and Burns were present, and their interest in the meeting was a blessing to all. With Mr. Meiklejohn as President we expect still greater things of Stirling in the coming year.

West Huntingdon, Nov. 17.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. W. Sexsmith led with devotional exercises, and called upon the Agent to present the work of the Society. The people were very attentive and apparently interested, and, though falling short last year, felt that they ought to get to work at once and do all they could. The officers are alive to the work.

Plainfield, Nov. 18th.—A union meeting of the two Methodist Churches was held in the village church. The Rev. Mr. Anderson did all in his power to make the meeting a profitable and pleasant one, and there was assuredly strong hope of a greater interest in Bible Society work for the future. Tweed, J Church. 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Tweed, Nov. 21st.—The annual meeting this year took place in the Methodist Church. A very large attendance showed the interest the people of Tweed have in the work of the Society. Mr. Gordon, the worthy President, makes a capital chairman, and added greatly to the good spirit that pervaded the meeting. Rev. Messrs. Huyck and Martin are thoroughly in earnest about lhe work.

Flinton, Nov. 22nd.—A tremendous rainstorm just an hour or so before the time of meeting prevented the people from coming out. Those who assembled, however, were quite willing to go and do all they could for the great work. The Rev. Mr. Boyce will do all he can for the Society among his people.

Roslin and Thomasburg, Feb. 28th.—One of the most severe storms of the winter set in during the afternoon, and yet in face of it quite a few had gathered together to talk over the work of of the Bible Society. With a new President and Secretary we expect that this branch will do good work during the year.

REV. J. M. SMITH.

Marshville, Oct. 17th.—The meeting, presided over by the President, was held in the Baptist Church. The Pastor of the Church entertained your Agent, and conducted the devotional exercises. Miss Barker enlivened the programme with a sacred song tastefully rendered. Collectors were appointed who began their work at once.

Dunnville, October 20th.—It is always a pleasure to visit this flourishing Branch, because of the energy and zeal of its officers. They are making an organized attempt to reach the outlying country around by visiting the school-houses and holding meetings. The annual meeting was rather small on account of an entertainment. The ministers of the town, Messrs. Quinn, Gourlay and Stafford were present and gave short addresses.

Cayuga, Oct. 21st.—This was a very wet night, and your agent expected no meeting, but was agreeably surpri.ed to find quite a number gathered in the Presbyterian Church. The Secretary is a staunch and faithful friend of the Society. The collectors were requested to do their work immediately.

Nanticoke, Oct. 28th.-This is one of our banner branches, simply because the

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officers are large givers and faithful reliable men. Mr. Low, the veteran President, occupied the chair. The Rev. E. Maloney, of the Episcopal Church, entertained your agent right loyally, and contributed much to the success of the meeting.

Bridgeburg, Nov. 1st.—The meeting here in the Presbyterian Church was so small that your agent was requested to come again and spend a Sabbath in the churches. This he has consented to do. Some of the officers had either died or moved away, and there was hardly anybody but the President and Mr. James to do anything. I hope for better results at a future meeting.

Port Colborne, Nov. 4th. —The meeting here was not as large as usual. As the agent was also the local President, he requested the two other clergymen of the town, the Revs. Messrs. Bonney and Marshall to give addresses. This they did with great ability and enthusiasm. We expect to exceed the donation of last year, always seeking to advance a dollar or two every year upon our previous record.

REV. R. STRACHAN.

The advocacy of the work of the Bible Society is a pleasure to your Agent, and the visitation of the various branches would afford continuous delight were it not for the lamentable indifference of many who might be reasonably expected to be deeply interested. Yet it is refreshing to meet with so many that are taking an active interest in the work. The chief cause of the indifference of many is the want of information as to the importance and worthiness of the claims of the Bible Society. If the pastors would acquaint themselves fully with these, and urge them kindly upon their congregation once a year, there would be larger attendance as the annual meetings, and greater interest shown, and also better results.

Priceville, Oct. 21st.—Your Agent was kindly afforded the opportunity in the forenoon of addressing the Presbyterian congregation on the work and claims of the Society by invitation from the pastor, Rev. J. A. Matheson. The annual meeting was held in the same church in the evening. A collection was taken at the close of the meeting, which amounted to a little over three dollars.

Griswold.—Visited this branch on the evening of Dec. 7th, and found the Officers active and alive to the importance of the work. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. This branch however did good work last year, and the meeting wisely re-elected the officers and collectors. A good report may again be expected. Rev. Mr McLean, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Haw, Methodist, were present and assisted at this meeting.

St. Davids, Dec. 12th—This branch lies in a rural district about 8 miles north of Oak Lake Station. It did noble work for the Society during the year, having raised \$103.50. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church of the district. There was a good attendance, and the officers of last year were re-elected. Rev. Mr. McLean, the pastor of the church, assisted in making this a live meeting. A good report may be again expected from this branch.

Virden, Dec. 14th—The meeting was held here in the Episcopal Church. The attendance was small. The President, Rev. Mr. King, conducted the meeting. At the close of the agent's address, a collection was taken up. The Depository is

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in a very satisfactory condition. The collectors for the branch have not yet done their work for the year. It is to be hoped that they will be able to give a good report when their labors are completed.

Broadview—We had a small meeting here. Your agent presented the claims of the Society, after Rev. Mr. Campbell, the Presbyterian Minister of the Church, in which our meeting was held, had read a portion of Scripture and engaged in prayer. The business of this branch was regularly transacted and a good report may be expected from the collectors.

Granfell, January 17th—A severe blizzard raged, but had a live, though small meeting. This branch did good work last year. The same officers were re-elected and may be expected to render a good account for 1899. Rev. Mr. Hoskins (Methodist) Rev. Mr. Lang (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Marshall (Baptist) were all present and took part. The stock in the Depository should be increased in some lines.

Wolseley, Jan. 18th – Had a splendid meeting here. R. A. McGee, the Mayor of the town, President of this branch, presided. Rev. Mr. McAfee (Presbyterian) spoke briefly and eloquently on the claims of the Bible Society, after which, your agent stated to an interested audience what the Society had done during the past year and the aims of this and the parent Society. All the business of the meeting was regularly done. The collectors had not quite completed their work, but as far as heard from, a very satisfactory year's work is being done. The Depository is well managed by Mr. Brooks.

Qu'Appelle, Assa., Jan. 20th—A small but interested audience was present. Rev. Mr. Thompson (Presbyterian) in the absence of the President, acted as chairman. Rev. Mr. Galley (Methodist) was present and led in prayer. All the business of the annual meeting was transacted in a proper manner. Your agent presented the claims of the Bible Society, and urged that the stock in the Depository be increased at once. The collectors have started their work, and when completed, a good report may be expected.

Messonin, Assa., Jan. 23rd—Had an excellent meeting. Rev. Mr. Hastings (Baptist) Rev. Mr. Tufts (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. Squire (Presbyterian) were present and assisted efficiently. Mr. McCurdy, one of the prominent business men of the town, acted as chairman. The collectors had completed their work, and with a very satisfactory result. An excellent staff of officers was appointed for the ensuing year. The stock in the Depository is low; the executive decided to have it increased at once.

Whitewood, Assa., Jan. 24th—There was a small attendance. There is not as much interest taken in the Society in this town as the work deserves. A new Secretary-Treasurer has been appointed and the branch promises fair to do much better work and have a good report for the year. The business of the annual meeting was transacted, and your agent then addressed a very attentive and interested audience on the work of the Society. A committee was appointed to select an addition of books to the Depository.

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Elkhorn, Man., Jan. 25th—A bad blizzard raged all day and the attendance was small, but we had an attentive audience, and a good collection for the size of the gathering. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions of the Presbyterian Church in Manitoba and the North-west, was in town on business in connection with his work, and spoke earnestly and eloquently on the great need of the Bible being read and studied in our own land, by all classes, and especially by the foreigners coming to the west. A good showing may be expected from this branch when the collectors report. The three resident ministers were present and took part. Rev. Mr. Lewis was elected President; Rev. Mr. Hood, Treasurer and Rev. Mr. Mercier, Secretary.

REV. E. A. TONKIN.

Bath, Oct. 11.—This branch has been at low water-mark for a number of years. The meeting was interfered with this year again on account of a torrent of rain falling through the evening. The Agent addressed those present, and by visiting the officers and other leading friends stirred up an interest in the work. The Depository was changed to a new location, and an energetic young man appointed Secretary. Both will do better this year.

Odessa, Oct. 12th.—This branch has also been unfruitful for some years, but has begun to look up again. Our meeting was not large, but was full of interest. Many questions were asked concerning the work, which the Agent tried to answer. Rev. Mr. McKee, who has recently taken charge of the Methodist Church, will be a source of strength to the Society here. Odessa will raise more this year than for the past five years. Depository well kept. Amount of sales not large.

Cataraqui, Oct. 13.—This is a faithful branch, and though not large, being just on the outskirts of Kiugston, does its work regularly and well. The President and officers are punctual in the discharge of their duties. Meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the pastor, Rev. Mr. Robson, rendering valuable assistance.

Hill, Burns, Davidson, Graham, John Harvie, and outside The meeting opened with singing the hymn, "Arm of the Lord, awake, awake!" Rev. John Neil read from the third chapter of Paul's Second Epistle to Timothy, and led in prayer.

THE PRESIDENT: Christian friends, in the good providence of God we are permitted again to meet as members of the Upper Canada Bible Society, at the close of another year of the Society's existence, to receive the report of the work done, not only in our own land, but to hear, I trust, something of the world-wide work of our great parent society, the British and Foreign Bible Society, a work in which we, by our contributions, as you all know, are privileged to bear a part. The question which I think we should put to ourselves on an occasion like the present is this: While thankful for what our Society has done for the Bible cause, have our efforts been commensurate with the importance of the work, and is the importance of the work sufficiently understood and sufficiently impressed upon the consciences of us all? There is no lack of generous contributions to almost all Christian work among us, but it seems to me if the work of the Bible Society was better understood, both the number of our subscribers and the amount of our contributions would be increased ten-fold. I think there are a great many good people who regard the

Bible Society chiefly as a Society for supplying cheap Bibles, either for sale or, under certain circumstances, for giving away. They perhaps, to some extent, realize the work of the Society's colporteurs, and the fact that through their instrumentality the Word of God is brought to many individuals and to many households, who but for their labors, even in our own country, would be destitute of the Bible. But, do we ail also realize the greatness and extent of the work of the parent Society? A work towards which, I am thankful to say, we have this year sent over \$5,000.00 in free contributions. Let us reflect for a moment and see what this work is. "A work," I quote the words of one of the reports, "which has made the Bible speak in 350 languages and dialects, so giving to the missionaries who go forth to preach the glad tidings of salvation, a book without which they could do little or nothing for the souls they seek to save." Again, do we sufficiently realize the patient labor, the devoted zeal which is involved in the work of translation and revision on the part of those who have given themselves to the glorious task of enabling the Bible Society to send forth the Word of God in their own languages to all the nations of the earth; or, do we realize the enormous extent and value of the work of colportage? And that by means of these faithful men the Word of God is being carried into every quarter of the globe. Take the continent of Europe, in France and the German Empire, in Austria, Hungary, Spain and Portugal, Turkey and Greece, the colporteurs of the British and Foreign Bible Society are everywhere at work, sometimes receiving very hearty welcome, at other times meeting with many rebuffs and many insults, and in some cases with bitter persecution, and sometimes even in danger of their very lives. Now these men, in spite of all obstacles, still go on undismayed and carry the Word of God to the thousands who, though living in Christian lands, but for them would not possess a Bible, and would know nothing whatever of its contents. Then remember that this same work is being carried on also by the Society's colporteurs in heathen lands, in Asia, in Africa, and the Islands of the Sea under many privations, and risk of life itself from the effect of climate or the hostility of those among whom they are carrying on their work. In the brief summary given in the report of the parent Society, which has just been published, we find that during the past year the Society has supported an average number of 725 colporteurs, and these 725 colporteurs during the past year have sold above 1,500,000 copies of Holy Scripture. Then the Society maintains also 552 native Christian Bible-women, who labor mainly in India and Ceylon. These Bible-women read the Scriptures to their secluded sisters, shut off from all preachers and churches, and the report states that, "More than 31,600 have been read to on an average each week; nearly 2,000 have been taught to read for themselves ; and over 20.000 copies of Holy Scriptures were, through the instrumentality of these Bible-women, put into circulation." tion." There is a book called the year book of Bible work published year by year by the parent Society, which is well worthy of perusai by everyone who is interested in Bible work. I dare say many of you may be acquainted with the book, but anyone who is not, and who desires to know more fully what the Society is doing and what it is, they may have the privilege of supporting by their contributions and by their prayers, will find in it not a mere dry summary of facts and figures, but the most varied and interesting pictures of colportage work in every clime. I am quite sure after a perusal of this wonderfully interesting book, with its history of Bible distribution, that no one who utters that prayer in sincerity, "Thy Kingdom come," but will feel more than ever compelled to give a loving and generous support to the work of Bible distribution. Now, in thus speaking of the work of the parent Society, do not let me for a moment be misunderstood, or to be thought as if in any way undervaluing the importance and extent of the work which is being carried on by this Society in our own country. Far from it ! Rather would I urge a more generous support and more active zeal in pushing on our home work. Much need there is for it, especially in view of the increasing population of the North-west, and the great wave of immigration now rolling in there. All I want to show is how wide are the interests, how glorious are the objects which appeal to the sympathies of every Christian man and woman in the world-wide work of the Bible Society. In all our churches, our home missions are our first care, yet thank God no church is now content to rest in home work only. At no period scarcely has there been more activity among all Christian bodies in sending forth our missiouaries, as the Saviour has commanded us to preach the Gospel to every creature. So what I desire to urge is this: That in addition to our home work, this Upper Canada Bible Society, the largest auxiliary of the British and Foreign Society, offers to all who are willing, a channel through which they can, by their contributions, help on the grand work of Bible distribution, not in our own country only, but throughout the whole world. I cannot better conclude these few brief remarks than by quoting a few words from a paper by Dean Farrar, which appeared in the April number of the Bible Society's Report. They are as follows: "The admirable preface to our translation of the authorized version in 1611 is often omitted from our Bibles. I would advise every student to read it, for it is full of learning and wisdom." "What truth," and these are the words, "What truth," they ask, "what saving truth with-out the Word of God? If we be ignorant the Scriptures will instruct us. If out of the way they will bring us home. If out of order they will reform us. If we are in sorrow, comfort us. If tired, quicken us. If cold, inflame us Take and read, take and read." Such then Dean Farrar says is the Bible, "It is the only book in all the world which appeals with equal divineness to the learned and to the ignorant, to the scholar in

Ought we not therefore—that, I think, is the application so far as we ourselves are concerned—ought we not therefore resolve henceforth to give an increasingly generous and grateful support to the venerable Society which translates and disseminates the Bible over all the world?

MR. WARRING KENNEDY.—Mr. President, I have much pleasure in moving the resolution placed in my hands.

"That the report as printed, and now distributed be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year, 1899-90" (See page 3).

I may just add a word and say that the Report this year is perhaps more interesting than we have presented in former years. Take the Reports home with you. Read them carefully and prayerfully, and they will well repay your study.

MR. J. C. COPP: I have much pleasure in seconding that resolution.

REV. DR. JAS. HENDERSON said: Mr. President and Christian friends, I suppose you will all agree with me when I say, that of all the men who have ever lived, by far the most colossal man was Jesus. Of all the facts history ever recorded, by far the most colossal is Christianity; and of all human societies ever organized the most colossal is the Church; and of all the books ever published, by far the most colossal is the Bible. I am old fashioned enough, sir, to look upon the Bible as a miracle in the concrete. The very method of its compilation touches, at least, the fringe of the miraculous. For we must never forget, sir, that on its human side, the Bible is NOT one but MANY. Its constituent parts have gravitated together in a most marvellous manner. Portions of this book, as you all know, were written among the solitudes of Arabia, the wilds of the Jordan, in the palaces of Babylon, and in the prisons of Rome, on the banks of Chebar, in the valley of the Jordan, in Corinth, the commercial centre of Greece, and in Jerusalem that old theocratic centre of the globe. Patriots such as Moses, prophets such as Isaiah, dreamers such as Ezekiel, minstrels such as David, sages such as Solomon, statesmen such as Daniel, scholars such as Saul of Tarsus and physicians such as Luke, and boatmen and fishermen as Peter, James and John-all these, though sundered far apart by space and circumstance and time, contributed each something towards this marvellous symphony of saving truth. And yet there runs through all this human diversity like a golden thread, a moral and spiritual coherence which makes this book, or these books, so far as the unfolding of a central scheme of human redemption is concerned, substantially one. Now, sir, I hold that we cannot account for this phenomenon on anything like mere natural law. I hold, sir, that it touches at least the fringe of the miraculous. One has suggested that we just put togather sixty-six medical works written by thirty or forty different doctors, representing different systems of different schools of medicine, allopathy, homeopathy and hydropathy and all other pathys, and then go to work if you can, if you dare, and doctor any sick man with that book, and you would kill him before you were half through, and yet, sir, there is not a disease of the human heart that this Bible has not diagnosed, and there is no evil of the human heart or of the human race, for which it does not prescribe an infallible prescription. And then again the very preservation, the very presence of this book is miraculous. Why, sir, do you know that that book seems to possess a deathless charm? It is simply indestructible. It has been thrown into the flames but it will not burn; it has been thrown into the floods but it will not drown. It has been buried deep in Romish vault and monastic cell but it will not be hidden. It has been put to a million deaths but it will not die. You remember, sir, that Voltaire, before he passed away, prophesied that one hundred years from then the Bible would be unknown; but oh ! the irony of providence-the very press which published that prediction, afterward published many many volumes of the very book that the French infidel so despised. You remember, sir, that Gibbon entered the lists and did his very utmost to undermine the authority of its teachings in his own land and throughout the world-and it seemed to have paid; it seems that he got quite a revenue, and from the money made in the abuse of the Bible he went and bought as an estate, a beautiful valley in Switzerland. But oh ! the irony of destiny again. One of his descendants owns that estate today and spends, we are told, the most if not all his rentals in distributing the very book which his illustrious ancestor sought to destroy. You remember that Hume hurled anathema after anathema on the Bible. He owned a large vaulted chamber in the city of Edinburgh, where he and kindred minds frequently met together in order to fulminate and forge the worst weapons they could against this book, but oh ! again the irony of history. The first meeting of the Bible Society that was held in the Athens of the North, was held in that chamber! Destroy this book? Quench the sun in the heavens, but do not attempt, upon the peril of your soul, to quench the brightest light God Almighty ever kindled on this planet. Why, sir, thrones shall totter and kingdoms perish and empires pass away like smoke, but amid the wreckage of all human and all material things, one thing shall survive, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away."

Again, sir, I look upon the Bible as being miraculous so far as its contents are concerned. Any man, no matter how much he reads of modern literature to-day, can not read this book with open vision and fail to see God in it. I know there are those advanced thinkers who tell us that the time has come when we may put this old book of our mothers

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and fathers on the high shelf of some library museum, to be looked upon in the coming century as a curiosity or as the relic of a pagan period, but I am here to-night to say that human intelligence has a long road to travel before it has come up to the thought and intelligence of the Bible. I am here to-night to state as my belief that this book, from Genesis to Revelation, is pervaded with a spirit of prophecy in a larger and deeper sense than we theologically or technically attach to the word prophecy. I am not now reflecting upon prophecy. I believe in the prophesies of the Old and New Testament. It is wonderful how these old Hebrew seers could forecast the horoscope of empires, how they could predict their doom or destiny with such minuteness of detail. As one has said, "so long as Babylon is in heaps, so long as Nineveh is void, so long as Tyre is a place for the spreading of nets in the midst of the sea, so long as Israel is scattered the world over, so long as Jerusalem is trodden under the foot of the Gentile, so long as the great empires of the world keep marching along their predicted course, so long have we proof that 'Holy men of God wrote and spoke as they were moved by the Holy Ghost.'

But, sir, I believe that this Book is prophetic in another sense. It is prophetic in the sense that it is pervaded by the spirit of a sublime and infallible anticipation It has anticipated, in the trend of its teachings, the development of every nation and the discoveries of every age. It has anticipated the telegraph, it has anticipated the telephone, and it has anticipated the printing press, the Copernican theory of astronomy, the Dalton theory of atoms, -not in the sense that it gives them their scientific clue, but in the sense that it has put in motion those intellectual forces, that it has elevated society to that moral status, that it has created those intellectual conditions without which such discoveries could never have been made. And, sir, not only so, but I tell you that I find some of our modern discoveries literally anticipated in the Word of God. I remember when I had the honor to be pastor of St. James Methodist Church in Montreal, I was challenged by an agnostic to show a single discovery of modern science which had been anticipated in the Bible. One day I met him and reminded him of his challenge. "Well," he said, "show me one, and I am a Christian; show me one and I am a believer in the Bible." "Well," I said, "you must admit that one of the most modern discoveries of science is that storms move in circles." "Oh, but," said he "you do not find that in the Bible." "Well," I said, "you do, in Ecclesiastes-'The wind goeth toward the south and turneth about towards the north, the wind returneth again according to its circuit or its circle.' "And," I said, "do you know that the principle of Newton's discovery of the law of gravitation, by implication, has been discovered in the Word of God ? Don't you know that the Bible teaches that this world is upheld by some invisible force or power?" And his eves flashed an me where." I said, "Job sat upon the observatory of revelation and said, God stretcheth the north over the empty place and hangeth the earth upon nothing.' There is the principle of our Néwtonian law or theory of gravitation. "Why," I said, "why don't you study your Bible ?" "Excuse me, sir," said he, "I know my Bible just about as much as any preacher does and I read it too." "Well," I said, "can you tell me where this passage is to be found in the Bible, 'Birds of a feather flock together?' "Yes," he said, "it is either in Job or in Psalms, I could not tell you which but it is there somewhere." (Laughter.) That is how our critics criticize ; they know nothing, or very little, about the Bible they condemn. I challenge any man here to put his finger on a solitary moral force which is moving society to-day which does not owe its birth to the Bible. This Bible is a kind of dynamo, and it is illuminating and propelling the world up the shining slopes of civilization as no other book is doing to day. "Oh, but," you say, "Hold on, we are very much indebted to Greek culture for our civilization." Certainly we are : we owe very much to that old land where every dell enshrines some deity, and every fountain leaps as if to song; that land whose breezes still float the melodies of Homer, or tremble to the echoed thunders of Demosthenes. Old Athens still flings a spell over the nations from which there is no possible disenchantment. We feel her touch upon our intellectual being to-day as the magic chisel of Phidias upon the old Athenian marble. Her inspiration breathes through the soul of our century, as the genius of her mighty dead breathes through the pages of her poetry and of her literature ; and her battle shouts of freedom ringing over the straits of Thermopylae or floating over the plains of Marathon have reached us and stir the pulses of every progressive nation, and have inspired the battle shouts and songs of old Bannockburn, Waterloo and Gettysburg. We owe much to Greek culture, but, sir, we owe infinitely more to Christianity. Greek culture never released a soul from the crushing burden of sin. Greek culture never gave peace to the dying. Greek culture never brought a gleam of hope to the struggling masses, never enfranchised a serf, never emancipated a slave. And even as a law-giver Moses was greater than Solon; as a minstrel, David was greater than Homer; as a thinker, Paul was mightier far, and has shaped the thought of the world, more than Plato; and with bowed head I dare to say, if it is not a blasphemy, that even as a teacher, Jesus of Nazareth was infinitely greater than Socrates. Why, sir, wherever there is a light shining to day in the sky of literature, it borrows something from this book. You know that science tells us that there is not a single spark of artificial light that has ever been struck or kindled upon this planet that is not traceable to the sun. Even the mystic glare of electricity, the steady flame of the gas jet, the smoky glare of the pine torch, the faint glow of the taper, the fitful gleam of the fire-K

fly and the very phosphorescent sheen of old ocean's wave, and not only these but the moonbeams which to-night, if there is any moon, weave their rainbow wreath round old Niagara's brow—these are all translated sunbeams, and so, sir, when we come to the literary world there is not a book endowed with inspiration and immortality, not a book that is lifting up the masses, which does not owe something to this Bible. Just look at the constellations in this literary sky. There is old Chaucer; you know him well—

"On fame's eternal bead-roll worthy to be filed."

There is Sir Thomas More, whose "Utopia" you remember has been called "that enchanted isle anchored upon a tide of dreams." There is Shakspeare, the mightiest magician of them all, whose spell still enchains the world. There is Bunyan, the world's dreamer in Bedford gaol, and there is Sir Isaac Newton, the man who won for his native land the distinction of having given birth to the greatest natural philosopher the world has ever seen. There is Gray, the author of the immortal "Elegy," whose cadences fall upon our ear like the sweet tolling of some minster There is Macaulay, the first man who won a peerage by the power of his pen. And there is my celebrated countryman, Sir Walter Scott, bell. whose genius still flings a glamor over the most enraptured scenes of his native land. Two or three years ago, sir, you remember that we witnessed the mightest pageant that has ever taken place on this planet. Great Britain gathered together her novies from every corner of the seas, and they formed the mightiest naval power that ever swept the ocean. They gathered in brilliant parade, battalions from every part of her vast empire, and it was said that they presented the most thrilling spectacle ever seen on earth. But all that has passed away like a puff of smoke; Kipling's immortal "Recessional," every line and every verse of which, palpitates and throbs with the spirit of this Hebrew volume :-

"Still stands thine ancient sacrifice, a humble and a contrite heart. Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet, lest we forget, lest we forget."

There is not a star I see in the firmament of letters whose influence is shaping human destiny that did not borrow something from the splendor of this old Sun. Oh, sir, if I could paint infidelity as she attempts to wipe out every trace of Bible truth, every trace of Bible teaching from the land, you would behold the grimmest tragedy of our time. Not only would philosophy be robbed of her best maxims, and science of her best methods, and poetry of her sweetest song, and art of her divinest models, and philanthropy of her soul and inspiration, but we would see liberty again dragged in chains, the masses again enslaved, manual labor again degraded and woman lowered to the level, not only of a slave but of an animal. Murder would become a pastime, debauchery reduced to a science, suicide elevated to an art, fornication enshrined as a religious rite, and infanticide installed as a domestic virtue. Oh! life without the Bible would become again draped in gloom, and the grave would drip with horror, and the only connort that would then come to our broken bleeding hearts would be from such words as those that were spoken from a platform in this city eight years ago by a notorious infidel :--- "Whether out in mid-sea or among the breakers of the further shore, a wreck at last must mark the end of each and all, and every human life, no matter if its every hour be rich with love and its every moment jewelled with a joy, must at its close become a tragedy as sad and deep and dark as can be woven out of the warp and woof of mystery and death. Life is a narrow vale betwixt the barren peaks of two eternities. We strive in vain to look beyond those cruel heights, we cry aloud, and the only answer is the echo of our wailing cry." That is the only hope of the man who has closed the Bible against himself. Were it not for the ray of light which came into that man's soul when his mother used to teach him to clasp the hand and bow the knee in prayer, he never could have said as he bent broken-hearted over a brother's grave,-

> "And yet in the night of death hope sees a star, And listening love hears the rustle of an angel's wing."

Let your Bible go, let Christ go, and faith and hope are gone; and what then? Despair, as of old, would again gird herself, light her torch and exclaim, "Let the world's funeral pile now be kindled." But again, the greatest miracle of all, the central miracle of the whole Bible, is Christ. Take Jesus out of the Old Testament, take Jesus out of the New Testament, and you have your picture frame without the picture, you have your solar system without the sun. In a certain diamond field in Africa a beautiful diamond was found, and since then it has been called the "Fly" or the "Angel's stone." A jeweller one day was looking at it through a magnifying lens, and in its heart he was surprised to see a little winged insect. There it was with its out-stretched pinions as if it were flying through that miniature dome of mystic splendor. There it was in all its rainbow-tinted beauty in a state of perfect preservation. How it got there is all a mystery, but no human skill can take that fly out of its luminous prison-house without destroying the diamond as a whole. At the centre of this book there is ONE, the "Angel of the Covenant," and he is so interwoven and he is so immanent in it all, that you cannot tear that "Angel of the Covenant" from the sacred pages of this book without destroying the divine significance and splendor of it all. One day, sir, I got a terrible fright. The thought came to me that modern criticism, the higher criticism,

was going to expunge the faintest trace of all prophetic allusion from the pages of the Old Testament to Jesus Christ, and I tell you there was a chill went through my whole being, and I said, "Are we to lose the Christ of the Old Testament?" But you might talk to me forever about the results of the higher criticism and never cause my nerve to shiver, because I am convinced of this, that if the historical Christ were not present to the mind of these prophets in all the details of his life, he was present to the mind of the Holy Spirit that inspired these prophets, and the man who tells me that he cannot see Christ in the Old Testament, I will tell him that he is looking from the wrong point of view. A certain tourist told me that one day he entered a beautiful cathedral of the old world. He went to see a window of world-wide fame. He said : "When I entered the eastern door and stood in what they called the Hebrew vestibule, the view was a disappointment ; the wonderful window seemed nothing but a few panes of colored glass with here and there patches or blotches of darkness and shadow and there was no method or meaning to it at all. Just then the old janitor said, "Here, if you want to see that window of the transfiguration you will have to go in at the other door and stand beneath the main altar," and, he said, "I went there, and as I stood beneath the shadow of the crucifix, what a wonderful change ! As the light of day shone through that window, as it flooded that beautiful picture with its interpreting splendor, there in the central group of them all was the face and form of Jesus, radiant as if he were floating in a sea of glory." Sir, this old Bible of ours is a cathedral, but whether you see Jesus as He is pictured in the pages of the Old Testament depends upon the door you enter or the vestibule you occupy. Do not stand in the old Hebrew vestibule. Do not interpret the new by the old; interpret the old by the new, and as you stand beneath Calvary-that great altar of a world's sacrifice-with the light of the cross shining upon that old Hebrew economy, there shines out from every page of that Old Testament, that central figure of them all, the face and form of the world's Messiah, the Lord Jesus Christ. Another thing, there are those who take exception to the teachings of the Bible because they are not susceptible of anything like a scientific demonstration. A scientist told me not long ago that he would accept the Bible if he could submit its teachings to the ordinary tests of the logical and scientific method. The Bible, for instance, talks to us about eternity, but you cannot put eternity into an exhaust pump. It talks about an Infinite one, but you cannot crowd infinity in a blow pipe. It talks about an Infinite Spirit, but you never saw God through a telescope. A Frenchman said, " I have swept the midnight heavens for many years and I have not yet found God." It talks about unseen things, but no battery ever built could ever precipitate the unseen realities of God, so that they could be seen by the eye or touched by the hand. And, therefore, it is said that the teachings of the Bible do not rest upon any solid basis.

I am here, sir, to state that I have a greater and more immediate and more convincing evidence of the realities and of the being of spirit and of spiritual things than I have of the things or of the phenomena of nature. The test of sensible things are the senses, but the test of spiritual things is the spirit. I test all liveable truth by the life. I test all soul truth by the soul. Translate the teachings of God's Word into your life, into your spiritual consciousness, and when they have put God into your soul and your soul into God you will then be more conscious that there is a God and that there is life everlasting, than that there is a sun in the heavens, or that the light of summer palpitates through the organism of nature. These higher things of the Bible are written in cipher, and only the spiritual can decipher them. I am done when I have given you this illustration :- Beethoven's biographer says, "I called one evening for the great musician, to have a walk in the moonlight. We were passing along a certain street, when all at once we heard music. He paused and said : 'Hark ! that is my Sonata in F. Let us go,' and they followed the sound to its source. They drew up in front of a low shanty-like building and paused to listen. They heard parts played wonderfully well, and then there was a voice of sobbing and the voice said, 'Oh, my brother, it is beyond my powers. Oh, I would like to hear Beethoven, I would like to hear Beethoven.' Beethoven turned round and said, 'Let us go in ; my music has found its place in one heart anyway; I will go and play, and she will understand me;' and before I could interfere he entered. There at one side of the room was a pale-faced young man mending or making shoes, in the other was a young girl of fifteen or sixteen with a rich profusion of hair hanging over her shoulders, leaning sorrowfully over the old piano. 'Excuse me,' said the great musician, 'I am a musician myself and I would like to play you something.' 'Oh,' said the young man, 'thank you, but our piano is very, very poor, and besides, we have no music.' 'No music?' And how did this young lady play without?' Then she turned round. He blushed and stammered ; she was stone blind. 'How then,' said the great musician, 'did you come to learn that music?' 'Ah,' said she, 'I stood one night below the open window of the great Beethoven, and it sung itself into my soul, but I would like to hear Beethoven play it.' And the great man sat down, and his biographer said, 'I had heard him play before queens and emperors, but I never heard him play so royally as he did in the presence of that poor blind girl. Beneath his touch the whole instrument was changed and became possessed with the very demon of music. Then said he, 'You shall hear them,' and an infinitely soft lovely sound crept over the piano like moonshine or moonbeams over the landscape. Then came a wild elfin-like passage, in triple time, a kind of grotesque interlude, suggesting the dancing of witches upon the green sward or glassy sea, and then came that wonderful winding up when upon its rustling pinions they were lifted to their feet with a tearful, trembling emotion, and the poor blind child, unable to control herself, rushed forward, took the hands of Beethoven in hers, kissed them and said, 'You are Beethoven, I know it now; the music here tells me you are Beethoven.'" Then, sir, when we want to understand the deeper and higher mysteries of Divine truth, let us go to work and reduce them all into a holy, harmonious mode of living, and when we want the higher revelation the great Beethoven will come, and the beautiful vision will be ours As one has in substance said : Here is a book whose age is hoary, whose history is checkered, and whose preservation is miraculous, a book that stretches back to the world's birth and for ward to the world's doom, a book that sheds a flood of light upon human origin, upon human nature, upon human duty, upon human destiny, a book that can heal the broken hearted and that can hallow the human life and beautify the home, a book to which we owe our spiritual and religious liberty, our intellectual wealth, our national greatness, our national glory. Oh, to the throne of mind let us lift up this monarch volume. May we in life realize its peace, in sorrow its comfort, in bereavement its blessed hope, and in dying its full assurance of faith; and then beyond the shadows, while thought and life and being last or immortality endure, we shall prove by the deathlessness of its power to glorify, that the Word of our God endureth forever. (Loud applause).

REV. BERNARD BRYAN said: Mr. Chairman, with your permission I would like to make just a word of explanation before speaking upon the work of the Bible Society. When the matter of the annual meeting of the Bible Society was before the agency and colportage committee in Toronto, a peculiar partnership was suggested. It was stated that what we needed to make the annual meeting a success this year was that we should have a large gun—we call them canons in the Church of England and a small revolver. One great gun to deal with the question before the people at long range, and the other to do something in a practical way in giving some of the details of the work of the Society at close quarters. I remember when they were looking for the large piece of ordnance, they thought first of the Rev. Dr. Parkhurst, of New York; and then I think we considered some man in Montreal; and then we thought for a while upon Bishop Baldwin, of London; but after all, we decided upon Dr. Henderson, an sent to-night tl Dr. Henderson upon your cou to him, that h ever, with rega the good wine that matter, tl audience. 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Henderson, and I am sure that it is the feeling of the congregation present to-night that the committee made a wise choice. (Applause.) And Dr. Henderson has done his work well to-night. I am sure by the look upon your countenances, and the excellent attention which you have given to him, that his part has been well performed. I regret one thing, however, with regard to the programme, and that is, that they did not keep the good wine till the last. However, I am glad in reflecting even upon that matter, that Dr. Henderson came first, because he had the whole audience. I have not quite the whole audience to speak to. I am, therefore, glad that all who came to-night heard Dr. Henderson in con-

nection with this annual meeting. Now, Mr. Chairman, I want to speak particularly upon the great work of the Bible Society. I am sure there are many things in connection with a meeting of this kind that ought to be very pleasant to Bible-loving people. One is that we are engaged to-night in such a good work. I cannot conceive of a greater work, a more blessed work, than the work in which we are engaged to-night. We are here as members of the Upper Canada Bible Society to assist as well as we can the great parent Society in publishing and translating and circulating the Word of God in all languages and in all lands. I cannot conceive of a greater work than that. I know there is an equal work, and that is the preaching of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ; but it is the same work. I believe when the Saviour gave the command to His Apostles, - "Go ye into all they should not only carry forth the oral Gospel in sending forth the living voice to proclaim it, but He intended from the very beginning that they should carry forth wherever they went the living Word as well. And so He had in His mind the great work the Bible Society is doing as well as the work the Christian Church is performing. It is the same work, and therefore we rejoice in being helpers together in the circulation of God's Word Then again for another reason, because we know how interest in this work is increased, especially the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society and the Upper Canada Bible Society, and that is by getting more and more knowledge of the work. We have an interest in anything when we know about that thing, and the more we know about it the more interest we are bound to take in it, and so I do think at the present time the lack of interest in the Bible Society's meetings and Bible circulation comes largely because people do not know about the facts of the case, about the actual work which the British and Foreign Bible Society is doing, and which the Upper Canada Bible Society is trying to aid in. I remember a young man some years ago saying to me that he had just begun to take an interest in missions. He afterwards began to pray about missions, then he began to read about missions, then a little later he began to give as he was able to missions. I was not surprised

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to hear sometime afterwards that he had offered himself as a foreign missionary. And so this is God's plan. As we know about these things we are led ever to take a deeper interest and to help in a better way God's great cause. And so if I do nothing better than this to-night in detaining you here a little while to give you the actual facts connected with the British and Foreign Bible Society and the Upper Canada Bible Society, I feel sure I will do a good thing, and if it is not to bear fruit in the way of a collection to-night, it will bear fruit in increased interest next year. As you get these facts into your minds they will actuate you in this right direction, and make you take a deeper interest in Bible Society work. Let me therefore give you a few reasons why as Christian people, as Church people, we should do all in our power to support heartily the work of the Bible Society.

The first reason I would give is this : Because of the valuable and necessary aid given by the Bible Society to the missionary work of Christ's Church as a whole. It seems to me that in the providence of God this great Bible Society stands behind and at the back of all real missionary effort in connection with the various branches of Christ's Church to-day. You remember the Rev. T. Aston-Binns, when he visited Toronto some few "Have any of you noticed in one of the books of years ago, said : Chronicles how it is stated or implied in substance, that King Solomon, when the temple was in course of construction, went about to the workmen engaged on it, and asked them each one a question? He went to the carpenter and he said, 'Sir, who made your tools?' and the man said, ' well, your majesty, the blacksmith made my tools.' He went to the stonemason and he said, 'Well, sir, who made your tools ?' He received the same answer, 'Well, your majesty, the blacksmith made my tools; and so he went all round the building asking the same question and receiving the same answer, until he came at last to the blacksmith, and he said, 'Well, sir, who made your tools?' 'Well, your majesty, I made them myself, and I have made all the tools that are employed in the work on this temple.' Now," said Mr. Binns, "the relation of the blacksmith to all the workers on the temple of Solomon is just the relation of the Bible Society to all the missionary operations of Christ's Church. The Bible Society is making the tools by which the Christian Church in its branches is doing the work" For instance, to illustrate : The great Church Missionary Society, perhaps the greatest missionary organization at this time in the world, the income last year of that society was nearly \$2,000,000. That society (as set forth in the leaflet published by the British and Foreign Bible Society in 1891), required the Bible in sixty different languages or dialects, and for every one of these it had to go to the British and Foreign Bible Society for their supply. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel-another Church of England Societyrequires the Bible as stated in that same pamphlet, in thirty-five different languages, and Bible Society for the Bible in thi to go to the Bri don Missionary for every one o same is true extent of the H societies are in for their books in the city, he churches, from lands to preach this, every mis Japan, he mus Society, "Sen do the work h graciously sent these missiona

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languages, and for twenty of these it had to go to the British and Foreign Bible Society for the books. The Wesleyan Missionary Society requires the Bible in thirty different languages, and for every one of these it has to go to the British and Foreign Bible Society for their books. The London Missionary Society requires the Bible in thirty different languages, and for every one of these it has to go to the same source of supply. The same is true of the Universities' Mission; the same is true to a large extent of the Baptist Missionary Society. And so you see how all these societies are in a way dependent on the British and Foreign Bible Society for their books. Oh, we rejoice to hear of farewell missionary meetings in the city, held in the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Anglican churches, from which are going out our brothers and sisters to foreign lands to preach the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ ; but let us remember this, every missionary we send forth from home, to India and China or Japan, he must turn his face back towards England and say to this great Society, "Send me the Book in the language of this people, or I cannot do the work here for which I am sent out here." And the supply is always graciously sent. The Society recognizes that it is a great work to supply these missionaries with the Word of God.

Bishop Mitchinson at one time in England took little or no interest in the Bible Society, because he did not understand and knew little of the work; but when he was translated to his diocese in Barbadoes, and saw how his own work was dependent on the aid given by the Bible Society here, he returned to England, and at a meeting of the Bible Society held while he was there, he closed a most earnest address with these words, "The missionary work of Christ's Church to-day would simply collapse were it not for the aid given by the Bible Society." This is the society that is supplying the books to the missionaries to do their work in foreign lands, and the call for the Bible in the various languages published by this Society from the missionary field is greater to-day than ever it has been before. That is one reason, I say, why we should give and pray and heartily support the work of the Bible Society. We cannot support the missionary operations of our own Church in any better way than by seeing that this work is heartily and thoroughly supported.

Another reason is this: Because of the great work the Bible Society is doing on its own lines. Now, there are three ways in which the Society is doing a wonderful work. First, in the way of publishing the Scriptures and thus supplying the Word for the world at large. Some years ago they reached the large number of 4,000,000 copies from the presses of the British and Foreign Bible Society in one year. That was the largest output from the Bible Society in any one year up to that time. The year before last they surpassed that amount, and they turned out from the presses of the Bible Society some 4,387,152 copies of the Word, and I want to tell you that the output in the year just now closed has

even surpassed that. They turned out from the presses of the Bible Society some 4,479,439 copies, in whole or in part. Oh, can we conceive of that large number of Bibles, in whole or in part, going through those presses every year? Over 4,000,000 copies of the Word of God ! Let me help you with a simple illustration. Some few years ago I was sent to the Eastern Provinces in connection with our College work. I remember when the work was finished how gladly I stepped on board the train at Halifax and then turned my face back again towards Toronto, a long, weary, tiresome ride, and I was glad when I stepped off the train at Toronto. But I knew that that same line of railway went on and on, travelled away out west from Toronto, until it reached Vancouver ; a long line of railway, perhaps the longest under one systém in the world, a steel belt from the Atlantic to the Pacific, right across the continent, about 4,000 miles. Now, cover every foot of that railway with cars, the usual length, put the engine in the station house at Vancouver and the end of the train in the station house at Halifax, and put ten men in every car, and after you have done that, this one society, the British and Foreign Bible Society, as a result of one year's work, could put a copy of God's Word, in whole or in part, in the hands of every man in that long train, reaching from Vancouver in the west to Halifax in the east. Is it not a large work, and is it not a wonderful work which in the providence of God this Society is doing to supply the world in that way with the Word of God? This Society could supply almost the whole population of Canada with the Word of God, in whole or in part, in one year.

And some one will say, surely at this rate the need will soon be supplied! No, dear friends. It is estimated that there are about 1,500,000,000 of human beings upon the earth. Up to this time only a little over 250,000,000 copies of the Word of God have been supplied by all the Bible societies. Over half of these have gone to Protestant countries. Over 110,000,000 have been given to England and her dependencies, leaving for about 1,000,000,000 of heathen and Mohammedans and Jews only some 18 or 19 million copies of the Word. Surely we can say about these what the disciples said about the loaves and fishes-"What are these among so many?" No, the work is not done. It will take us, as some one has said, 300 years at our present rate to supply the world with the Word of God. Oh, I think we ought to do two things-we ought in the first place to get down on our knees before the Lord and thank Him from the bottom of our hearts for what He has been able to do up to this time, through this Society and other societies, in giving the Word of Life to the world. Thank Him for what He has done with the voluntary, consecrated gifts of His people, to give the Word to the world; but we ought to ask Him, in the second place, to lay upon our hearts, as never before, the sad condition of the heathen world and its cry for the Word of Life, so that we might increase our efforts, our prayers and our offer-

ings, so that this Society and other societies may do vastly more in hastening the end, when the Word of Life shall be given to the uttermost parts of the earth. (Applause). Now, the Society is doing a wonderful work in another way, and that is in translating the Scriptures, giving the Word of God to the nations and tribes of the earth in their own tongue. I am sure we do not realize, as we should, the great importance of that branch of Bible Society work. We are all familiar with this passage in the 2nd of Acts-" Behold, are not all these which speak Galileans? And how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born? Parthians, and Medes, and Elamites, and the dwellers in Mesopotamia, and in Judea, and Cappadocia, in Pontus, and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, in Egypt, and in the parts of Libya about Cyrene, and strangers of Rome, Jews and proselytes, Cretes and Arabians, we do hear them speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God." And it was a marvellous day for the infant church of Christ when, by the outpouring of the Holy Ghost these early disciples were able to proclaim the finished work of the Lord Jesus Christ, and offer for the first time a free and full salvation to their brethren the Jews gathered there. Yes, a wonderful time, when three thousand souls were born again, born into the Church of Christ. But how many languages were there? Only about 14 or 15. Now a book that has just reached our hand from the parent Society in the Old Land, gives the actual names of the languages into which the Bible has been translated up to to-day, by the aid of this Society and other societies. It has been translated into over 400 different tongues. Surely a great advance upon the day of Pentecost. We pught to thank the Lord for this wonderful work which He has been able to do through the agency of the Bible Societies. It is estimated that about 1000 persons are engaged in that work alone, in the work of revision or translation, and I was very much pleased with the wonderful exhibition of practical Christian unity that is given in that book with regard to the various helpers in giving these various translations of the Word of God to the world. The great Church Missionary Society, I notice, gives 16 translations, the Presbyterian Societies give 8, the Wesleyan Society gives 6. The Bishops of the Church give 5. The Baptist Society gives 4. Another Society, the London Missionary, gives 4. It is a practical illustration of Christian unity surely on the part of those who are born again and united in their effort to give the Word of God, in these various languages, to the world. It is indeed a most important work, the work of translation.

Dr. Buchanan has well said, "The man who gives the Word of God to a nation or a tribe in its own tongue performs a greater service for mankind than the prince who founds an empire." We cannot over-estimate the importance of giving the Word of God to a people in its own tongue. And so the Bible Society asks your aid and co-operation on that ground. Then there is the other work, and that is the colportage work of the So-

As our President has stated well and forcibly to night, they have an army of colporteurs, 725 in number, missionaries of the living word accompanied by the living voice; men who understand experimentally the contents of the Word of God, and who love it, and thus desire to give it to others. These colporteurs are travelling at this time through Norway and Sweden, through Russia and Siberia, through Germany and France, through Italy and Spain, through India and China, through Japan, through the islands of the sea, colporteurs of the Bible Society, carrying this word of God, back from the railway stations, down to the fishing villages, wherever man can be found ; selling it wherever possible, (because that which a man buys he values most), but where they find a person without the Word of God, who is unable to buy it, but yet anxious to have it, and will read it, giving it to him for nothing, so that there may be no home on the broad earth that can possibly be reached by the colporteur of the Bible Society really destitute of the Word of God. They are doing this work, and if time permitted, most encouraging testimony of successful colportage work from the interesting report referred to by our President, the British and Foreign Bible Society's report, could be given. Let me just give you one. A wife speaking for herself and her daughter, says : "We have not yet had courage enough to visit the cemetery where my dear husband ended a life so full of labor and so useful. You have no idea of the conflict in which he lived,-conflict with the elements and conflict with men's spirits. In summer and in winter, at daybreak, he was off to his loved work. Neither wind nor storm, neither snow nor rain, would prevent him from going out, and he would oftentimes return late at night drenched through with rain. Somehow or other, we feel he is on tour still, and we expect him back, but he does not come. He shall not come to us, but we shall go to him." That is a sample of the faithful colporteurs employed by this society: And then the Biblewomen, they are doing a work which the male colporteurs cannot do. They are entering the zenanas and homes of their sisters in heathen lands, and they are reading faithfully day by day the precious Word of Life to these heathen women, and they are the means in God's hands of bringing many of them to a saving knowledge of the truth. They are most successful in selling the Word of God and of circulating the Scriptures in these heathen parts. So then, this Society asks your hearty and earnest support on these three grounds-Because they are publishing the Word of God for the world; because they are translating the Holy Scriptures into these various languages; and because they are circulating, as well as they can, the Word of God throughout the whole world. (Applause.)

And now a brief word about the Upper Canada Bible Society. You will be glad to hear that the testimony which comes to us from over the sea is that the Upper Canada Bible Society is the best, the most efficient, and the mot the parent society auxiliaries in oth lead, it stands at support, ever occ Again, you

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cient, and the most successfully managed of the auxiliaries connected with the parent society. The British and Foreign Bible Society has other auxiliaries in other parts of the world, but the Upper Canada takes the lead, it stands at the head. God grant that we may, by your help and support, ever occupy that position in connection with this good work. Again, you will be glad to know, as supporters of this cause, that,

notwithstanding the serious financial depression which has prevailed over the country now for several years, the work of this auxiliary has steadily advanced, and that the past year has not been an exception to the rule. We have been able to send to the parent society the sum of \$8,159,04 on purchase account, and the sum of \$5,053,41 as a free contribution towards its work, We have been able not only to continue our usual grant of \$2,500 to the Quebec Auxilliary, but we have this year increased it to \$2,750.00, thus giving them all possible encouragement to go on in their difficult task of circulating the Word of God, in the face of great opposition from those in authority, among the Roman Catholic people of that Province. You will be glad to know also that we have been able during the past year to extend our work in the way of added branches. We have now connected with this Society 603 branches, covering a territory extending from Kingston in the east to Vancouver in the west. At each of these branch centres, as far as possible, a meeting like the one here to-night, is held every year. At each, stirring, earnest addresses are given, either by an agent from without or by the ministers residing in the neighborhood, officers are elected, collectors appointed, and in due time the respective districts are canvassed in the interests of the work. We have had thirteen colporteurs engaged in the work during the past year, and these men have rendered good service, travelling the remote districts of Ontario, and also in Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia. We have circulated through the depository in Toronto, 27,185 copies of the Scriptures, and these in twenty three languages.

part of God's cause. This great work, started in 1804, was born in prayer. That young girl who took her journey of 25 miles to the house of the Rev. Thomas Charles, to get a copy of the Word of God, and then walked back the 25 miles, delighted that she possessed it, was a praying girl. Thomas Charles was a praying man. So this work was born in prayer, and it has been continued in prayer. It is not what man can do. It is not the organization that can accomplish the end in view. It is alone as God will lay His hands upon all concerned, and use all for the setting forth of His glory and

Let us ask His help, and we can do it anywhere, in our homes and in our churches, as well as in the annual meetings of the Bible Society. Let us pray for this work. Everyone can co-operate in that. And then we ask you in the second place, to work. You can tell others about the work of the Bible Society. You can distribute the excellent literature that is placed freely in your hands from the Depository in Toronto, giving definite, real information, facts that cannot be gainsaid, about the work of the Bible Society. Take a part. Do something during the coming year in order to extend the knowledge of the Bible Society and its work. Then I ask you to give. Have some financial interest in sending the Bible to the heathen through the work of the Society. You remember that touching story told by the Rev. T. Aston-Binns. A little girl in England some years ago asked a present from her mother on her birthday of two Bibles, one in the English tongue and the other in the Telugu language. The mother thought it a strange request at the time, but she granted the child her desire. That little one took the English Bible and she wrote in the fly leaf her own name, that was to be her own Bible, and she took the Bible in the language of one of the tongues of India, and wrote, "From Annie, a little girl in England, who loves the Lord Jesus Christ, to someone in India, whom she hopes will learn to love Him too." That Bible was taken by a missionary and carried forth to India. It fell into a certain home. Years afterwards when that child grew up to woman's estate, the cause of missions was laid upon her heart. She was examined and accepted. Strange to say, India was her chosen field. She had taken an interest in that land from childhood. She was carried to her place of labor, and a certain family offered her hospitality. She went in, and a conversation with them ensued. She found they were all converted, every one knew and loved the Lord Jesus Christ. She asked how it came about. "Oh," said one, "we have a Bible which has been in our home a long time, and we trace the entrance of the light to that book." She brought it in while she was talking and put it in the hands of this young girl. What was her delight and surprise on opening that Bible to find in it these words : "From Annie, a little girl in England, who loves the Lord Jesus Christ, to someone in India, whom she hopes will learn to love Him too." God had taken that child's gift in His own hand. He carried it over the sea, He deposited it in that land, He placed it in that home, He made it a power of God unto salvation to those that dwelt there. Can we not believe that every gift, which is a real gift of faith, which we give towards this work of God, is taken in the same hand, is watched over by the same Divine eye, is blessed by the same omnipotent power to the end for which it is given? Yes, a cup of cold water, given in the name of a disciple, shall not lose its reward. Of financial intere ing year to the DR. GEIK

DR. GEIKIE moved the second resolution :—" That this meeting desires to express the intense gratification with which it has listened to the powerful and heart-stirring address of Dr. Henderson with regard to the value of the Bible, and the most interesting and practical address of the Rev. Mr. Bryan, and pray God that they may be, under Him, the means of greatly deepening the interest in this Society hereafter."

WARRING KENNEDY, Esq., (in the absence of Mr Doan) I have much pleasure in seconding the Resolution. (Carried.)

N. W. HOYLES, Esq., Q.C., moved the third Resolution :--" That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to Rev. Mr. Neil and trustees for the use of the building on the present occasion ; also to Mr. Lye and his choir for valuable services this evening."

W. J. ROBERTSON, Esq., seconded it, which was carried.

The Doxology was then sung, and the meeting closed with benediction by Rev. Dr. Sanson.

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
