Bridge Span Well On Its Way To Place

BATTLE LINE Operations Today Continued Successful-

Quebec, Sept. 18—Operations in connection with the placing of the central span of the Quebec bridge in its mal position linking up the two cantilever arms were commenced this morning. Yesterday's successful operations and the continuance of the ideal weather for the work gave the engineers hope that the end of today would see the span within fifty-eight feet of the floor of the bridge. They expected to elevate the span sixty-eight feet. Yesterday a raise of twenty-eight feet was made.

Owing to late start yesterday, the highest tide was missel and the span has 152 feet to travel, two feet more than expected.

STATEMENT BY PAINLEVE

No Lessening of Confidence to Be Read in Absence of Socialist Party Representative From The New Cabinet

Painleve drafted a ministerial declaraciples by which the government will be guided in its conduct of affairs. In the first place, the declaration af-firms the resolution of the government to pursue a vigorous "republican and social policy." The French democracy, it contends, has shown itself worthy of the confidence its leaders have had in it

the socialist party in the present cab-inet could not and must not be inter-preted as involving in any way a di-minution of that confidence. While carrying out its declared policy, continues the declaration, the government will endeavor to give the country proper guarantees that justice will be strictly administered. In this respect it will not allow itself to be influenced

As regards the conduct of the war the declaration expresses the resolve of the government to impart to this phase facture of materials for war purposes, and to close collaboration between the Allies and the pursuit of a more me-thodical diplomatic policy.

IDLE SHELL PLANTS TO BE CONVERTED

Imperial Munitions Board Makes Important Proposition Respecting Change; Orders to be Filled Ottawa, Sept. 18.—Many plants which have hitherto been engaged in the manuacture of 8 inch and 9.2 inch shells for the British government will be convert-ed into plants suitable for producing six inch shells. A recent announcement by the Imperial Munitions Board was to the effect that the manufacture of certain types of projectiles which can be turned types of projectiles which can be turned out in Great Britain in as large quantities as required would not be continued in Canada. It is also stated that certain other shells would be manufactured in reduced quantities and that still others would be manufactured in large quantities which would keep the factories running day and night. Plants that previously made the 9.2 and 8 inch sizes, of which there is a considerable number in Ontario and Quebec, have of late not been in operation.
