BOLOGNA, Italy, Nov. 1 -Benito Mussolini has escaped his sixth assassin in four years, and today, undaunted, the man whose slogan is "Live in danger" still maintains his stronghold on the government and his blackshirted followers. His latest assailant

The Fascist Premier had a close call from death late yesterday afternoon when departing from the stadium here. A slenderly-built youth with blonde hair pressed forward toward his automobile and fired point-blank at him with an automatic pistol. Fifty thousand persons had been in the stadium and many of them witnessed the attack. When the shot rang out the cheering for Mussolini ceased. Silence pervaded. The youth, probably 18 years old, discerning that his bullet had missed its mark, raised his pistol to fire again.

SEIZED BY BLACKSHIRTS. Quickly he was seized by in-

furiated blackshirts, who felled him to earth, stabbed him 14 times, choked and beat him, and then dragged the body through a screaming, milling sea of humanity. The youthful would-be murderer

of Mussolini Are Adopted after the shooting, Signor Turati, secretary-general of the Fascist party, in a proclamation to the blackshirts, indicated that these would be vigilantly sought for and punished. "I'he first gesture of justice has been accomplished," said the proclamation. "Now the accomplices must be punished."

After a short delay, the Premier's car continued its way toward the railway station, with Mussolini sitting as calmly as if he were reviewing the walls of people through which he passed. They were screaming acclamations, such as "Long live the duce," "Death to the enemies of Fascism," and "Woe to him who touches the savior of



PARIS, Nov. 1 — Western Europe, from Holland to the Pyrenes, is a vast stretch of mud due to the rains which have fallen almost without let-up for several days. The ordinary affairs of life have been made unpleasant and in some regions serious damage has been done by the persistent downpour, par-ticularly in Belgium, in the Vosges, where some of the rivers have over-flown their banks.

Communications have been considerably interfered with in the region surrounding Belfort, while Strassbourg during the last 24 hours has experienced the heaviest rainfall ever recorded there is a similar period.

The land from Paris to the Atlantic coast, according to travelers as well as newspaper men and government despatches, is one vast stretch of water and mud. In Switzerland it is raining in the lowlands and snowing in the mountains to an unusual extent for such an early date.



When we ask that this port be nationalized we are asking no favor but the carrying out of the spirit of that Conference. It is on this basis the Federal Government should now be approached. To nationalize the port is simply to pay a debt. When the City Council takes the matter up at Ottawa, it should go behind the British North America Act to the Confederation agreement, without which the British North America Act would never have been passed.

TANGIER

TWO hundred and forty-one years ago Charles Russell wrote from Cadiz:

"When the English had got Tangier they, as well as all the world, believed they had a considerable and important place. The French covet, the Spaniards and the Hollanders dread it; one as to trade, the other from neighborhood." Now Thomas Hibben, writing in the New York

"Tangier, romantic, picturesque Tangier, of tur-, bulent history and changing ownership, is again a pawn watched by the covetous eyes of various European foreign offices. The Bay of Tangier, which would afford such an admirable lurking place for fleets of submarines, is the unfortified complement of Gibraltar, lying as it does, on the other side of the Straits and about thirty miles to the westward. The desire of Spain to have Tangier included in her Moroccan zone has brought to the fore again all the trade and military jealousies of Great Britain, France and Italy which might conceivably

be affected by the extension of Spanish influence." Tangler has been nominally Roman, Spanish, Portuguese and English, yet from the Eighth Century A. D. Morocco has been ruled by Moorish Sultans. France for many years now has been regarded as the paramount power in Morocco, with a northern sphere of influence allotted to Spain, which zone has given Spain infinite trouble. This was in return for recognition of Great Britain's free hand in Egypt. An attempted settlement of the affairs of Morocco was made by the signatories of the Treaty of Alegecinas, Great Britain, Germany, France and Spain being the chief. Prior to the War an international regime was designed for Tangier but has never been given full effect. Now

Spain wants Tangier for herself and has said so. Spain raised the question at the same time as she attempted to secure a permanent seat on the Council of the League of Nations. Then the claim was apparently dropped. Now there are reports that during the latter half of November the Spanish Government will conduct conversations with Paris, Rome and Lisbon, and that at a later stage the British Foreign Office will be consulted, and if these secret proceedings bear fruit the result will be communicated to the other signatories of the Treaty

of Alegeciras. This reversion to secret diplomacy is most unfortunate, and fraught with suspicion and possible misunderstanding. Great Britain is be admitted late and Germany informed "through the usual



Of course, Mr. Man, you can get through domestic life without sentiment, just as you can go a long, hard journey over arid plains and desolate deserts. But why choose the dreary route, that will take all of your endurance and courage to stand, when you may make a pleasure trip by way of silvery streams and verdant meadows, where birds are singing and the green trees wave above you? We always take the easy way in other things, why choose the hard way in matrimony?
