BREAD GRIDDLE CAKES. BREAD GRIDDLE CAKES.
One and a half cupfuls of fine stale bread crumbs, 1 1-2 cups scalded milk, 2 tablespoons butter. 2 eggs, 1-2 cup flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder. Add milk and butter to crumbs and soak until crumbs are soft; add eggs well beaten, then flour, salt and baking powder mixed and sifted. Cook same as other griddle-cakes.

Soak two cupfuls of bread crumbs in two cups of milk till soft. Crumbs must be very fine when soft. Beat to a paste, add a tablespoon of butter-melted and two eggs, yolks and whites beaten separately. Sift together one cup of flour, two teaspoons of baking powder and one-half teaspoon of salt. Mix all together, fry on hot greased griddle. Serve with maple syrup.

LITTLE COOKING HINTS

If you rinee a plate with cold water be-fore breaking eggs on it, add to them a pinch of salt and then stand where there is a current of air, and you will have no difficulty in beating them to a froth.

BULLET IN HEART, HE LIVED THIRTY YEARS

Swiss Gendarme Dies at Age of Sixty-Three; Cause, a Cold

Geneva, Nov. 5—A Swiss gendarme Gottfried Fischer, who has "worn" a bullet in his heart for the last thirty years has just died at Zofingue, in the Canton of Argovie, at his home, at the age of sixty three—of a cold on the lungs.

At the age of thirty-three, while pursuing a criminal, he received a bullet in the heart during the chase, and was taken the hospital in a serious condition. The doctors did not expect him to recover, but Fischer, to their astonishment, gradually became well and healthy to such a degree that he was able to rejoin the police corpusand carry out his ordinary duties for the next twenty-five years, still carrying the bullet in his heart, as no surgeon would undertake the dangerous operation of removing it.
