


THE COURSE MAN 1

Milwaukee, Sept. 20-Finishing touches are now being put to the Milwaukee race course, over which will be run the contests for the vanderbilt, Grand Prize, Wisconsin and Pabst tropies, Sept. 17-21. The circuit, which is 8.2 miles in length, has been improved at a cost of more than \$25,000, and it is judged by experts to be the speediest of any road course in America. With a host of crack drivers on the list for the big car races, a "whale" of a meet is assured. Mulford, Bergdoll, Hughes, Wishart, Tetzlaff and several others are to be seen in both Vanderbilt and Grand Prix events, while in the International Grand Prix Bruce-Brown and Bragg will team with Tetzlaff on the Flats and Boillot, winner of the French Grand Prix, and two other foreign pilots will have Petgeot mounts. Ralph De Palma is expected to enter both big races with Edward Schroeder's sensationally fast Mercedes. The Grand Prix will be run on Sept. 17 and the Vander-bilt cup race on Sept. 21.
