> Lesson No. 230. POINTS TO REMEMBER

REMEMBER THAT:

Vacuum tubes should be removed from their sockets while changes are being made in the wiring of the set, as the wires leading from the plate battery may accidentally be connected to the filament circuit, in which case from 40 to 60 volts may be impressed upon the filament. This will result in serious injury to the filament due to the excessive flow of current. If several tubes are connected in parallel in an amplifier circuit do not remove one of the tubes without opening the filament battery circuit as the increase of current in the remaining filaments may be sufficient to burn them

Touching the surface of a crystal has the effect of reducing its sensitivity and consequently reducing the range of recetpion. Exposure to the air may also result in lowered efficiency due to the oxidization which takes place on the surface. A remedy for this condition is to scrape the surface lightly with a pen-knife.

It is important that the resistance of the antenna system be kept as low as possible, for the less resistance there is in the antenna the greater will be the strength of current which flows from the antenna to the receiving set. Provision should also be made for keeping the system practically stationary. This is particularly necessary in short wave C. W. transmission as considerable wave length variation results if there is swaying in the "lead in" or antenna wires. When a counterpoise is used it should be thoroughly insulated from the ground by the use of wooden supports.

In receiving sets employing regeneration, the effect of body capacity or other stray capacities may seriously interfere with the reception of signals. To eliminate this source of interference, the receptacle in which the apparatus is mounted should be lined with than sheet copper and this lining carefully grounded. If sheet copper is not available, a fine metallic mesh of brass or copper may be used. None of the fixed or moving parts of the set should be in contact with the lining which acts as a shield and practically eliminates the annoying effects of body capacity.

In receiving circuits employing several stages of radio-frequency amplification, the amplifier tubes have a tendency to oscillate due to back coupling. This may be avoided by connecting a potentiometer of 200 to 300 ohms across the filament circuit and so-regulating the position of the sliding contact of the potentiometer that the grids of the amplifier tubes may be adjusted to a small value of positive potential, thus preventing oscillation of the tubes and securing stability of operation.

A regenerative receiver employing a feed-back arrangement such as the "taned plate circuit," "tickler coil circuit" or similar variations, is practically equivalent, in the reception of radio signals, to a receiver using one stage of r dio-frequency amplification and a non-regenerative vacuum tube detector circuit. This is due to the fact that in the regenerative circuit the fication and flow in the plate circuit are coupled back to the grid circuit and cause reinforced grid voltage variations which result in greater variations in the plate current.

The range of a receiving station is exceedingly difficult to predict. Geographical and atmospherical conditions exercise powerful influences on the reception of signals and it is a matter of common knowledge that the range of a receiver is greater at night than in the daytime. Under normal conditions the average range of a crystal receiver used with an outdoor antenna is about 25 miles and with an indoor antenna about five miles. A single vacuum tube receiver with outdoor antenna has a range of approximately 75 miles and with two stages of amplification this distance may be increased to several hundred miles.

HARVARD TESTS KIDDIES' MINDS

Study of Development of Minds and Bodies-Children from Six to Eighteen Years to be Studied.

Cambridge, Mass., Feb. 12.-In order o find out exactly how the individual child grows in mind and body the Harvard School of Education, with the cooperation of public and private schools n the vicinity, has embarked upon an investigation of the mental and physical development of hundreds of individual schoolboys and schoolgirls. This investigation is expected to occupy twelve years, and is the first of its kind ever undertaken on so large is

scale.

The project is described by Dean Herry Holmes of the Harvard Graduate School of Education in his annua report as "a new research enterprise of major importance." It has been financed for the first year by a grant of \$10,000 from the Commonwealth Fund The hope is expressed that it will provide a new basis of fact for the discussion of a great many fundamental educational problems, of interestalike to teachers, physicians, psychologists, parents and social workers.

The plan of the investigation is to take several hundred children and submit them at intervals to measurement and tests over a period of twelve years from the age of six to the age of eight cen. This will give an accurate record of how each individual child is growing mentally and physically throughout that period.





Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 12—"Baby" tanks and machine guns now lying idle at Camp Jesup and army' posts near Atlanta' will shortly be requisitioned by the Federal prohibition enforcement squad in Georgia and used to fight the rum runners who are plying their trade between the Georgia mountains and Atlanta unless some more feasible scheme of meeting the critical situation now facing enforcement officers present itself immediately.

So declared Prohibition Director Fred D. Dismuke last week following the capture by a "train" of rum runners of two baliffs in Forsythe County.

"Georgia is facing an extremely critical situation," said Mr. Dismuke. "The rum runners, composing our most desporate lawless criminal elements, have thrown their armed defiance into our very teeth. Now we are helpless. I cannot ask two of my men to stop a train of from five to ten liquor cars, carrying from fifteen to thirty men, all armed with sewed-off shotguns. That would be suicide.

"It is impossible to increase the size of my force, because the Congressional appropriation will not permit it. The only thing to do is to give the men I have greater protection and make them more formidable.

"It would be possible to blockade every road leading into Atlanta with tanks, mounted with machine guns. It would salo be possible to mount machine guns on our automobiles. We can get these weapons from the War Department and I feel that unless some feasible plan of stopping the rum runners present itself, we must adopt some such method. Meanwhile my men believe the outlook for recovery to be




