





Mr. Fisher was re-elected for the ew constituency of Cochrane in 1909, 1913, and again in 1917 and was elected speaker of the house at the first session of the Alberta legislature, re-elected at the opening of the first session of the second le gislature and again put in this term at the opening of the first session of the third legislature, and


