Official Allied Peace Terms

(Continued from page 1.) under the league, and various commissions for plebiscites in Malmedy, Schleswig and East Prussia. Among those to carry out the peace treaty are the reparations, military, naval, air, financial and economic commissions, the international high court and military tribunals to fix responsibilities, and a series of bodies for the control of international rivers.



France, Italy, and Japan described as the five allied and associated powers; and Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, China, Cuba, Ecuador, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, The Hedjaz, Honduras, Liberia, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Portugal, Rumania, Serbia, Siam, Czechoslovakia and Uruguay, who with the five above are described as the allied and associated powers, and of the other part Germany.

It states that: Bearing in mind on the request of the imperial German government an armistice was granted on Nov. 11, 1918, by the five allied and associated powers in order that a treaty of peace might be concluded with her, and whereas the allied and associated powers being equally desirous that the war in which they were successively involved directly or indirectly, and which originated in the declaration of war by Austria-Hungary on July 28, 1914, against Serbia, the declaration of war by Germany against Russia on Aug. 1, 1914, and against France on August 3, 1914, and in the invasion of Belgium, should be replaced by a firm, just and durable peace, the plenipotentiaries (having communicated their full powers, found in good and due form have agreed as follows):

To Our Readers

For the last two weeks we have mailed a supplement to our English weekly paper "The Courier", called "Der Plauderer" and printed in the German language, together with "The Courier" to all our subscribers. The Chief Press Censor for Canada has now called our attention to the fact that in his opinion we were publishing a newspaper partly in English and partly in the German language, which would be contrary to the provisions of the new amending Order-in-Council, dated April 2nd, 1919, and dealing with publications in enemy languages.

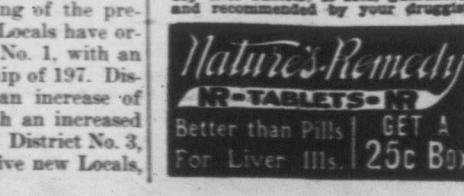

Peace Treaty Criticized

(Continued from Page 1.) PARIS, May 9. - The German delegates to the peace conference are considerably divided among themselves in their views on the peace terms submitted by the allied and associated powers, it was intimated today by a high British authority, a Reuter statement says. Other of the German delegates are quoted by the newspapers. Versailles despatches quote Herr Landsberg as stating: "The cruel announcements of the press have been exceeded. No Verbal objections can be handed over. We can do nothing but say yes or no. That is the quintessence of a peace of force."

Prof. Schuecking: "The document is simply awful." PARIS, May 8. - The Belgian delegation has issued a note relative to Great Britain being appointed mandatory for German East Africa, saying that it is (unable to believe that this action should be taken by the council of four.

Other points criticized were the failure to give Germany representation on the reparations commission and the omission of provisions for a progressive limitation of armaments by the other signatories to the treaty. The manifesto protested against the permanent separation of the Saar basin from Germany and advocated a plebiscite in Malmedy and other contested territories between Belgium and Germany.

BERLIN, May 9. - Condemnation of the peace terms is expressed by all the newspapers, those of extreme though opposing the conditions as unjustifiable and the treaty as "an instrument of robbery." The Tageszeitung says: "One thing is certain: there can be no question of this being a peace of justice. What a peace of justice after the entente pattern and in accordance with French desires looks like is shown by the conditions, which leave nothing of Germany but a torn and tattered territory."

Paris, May 9. - The Socialist press criticizes the peace conditions severely. One newspaper for example, under the caption of "A peace of oppression and injustice," says: "The capitalist and imperialist world as it exists could only produce a capital and imperialist peace which prepares the way for another war."

Danish representatives express deep satisfaction with the disposition of Schleswig-Holstein, but express surprise that the boundaries of territories which will be called upon to decide their own destiny were fixed, according to a summary of the treaty, considerably further south than either of the Danish government's parliamentary delegates of the Schleswig-Holstein Danes had proposed at the peace conference.

LONDON, May 9. - After meeting to consider the terms of peace imposed upon Germany by the allied and associated nations, the national executive committee of the British Labor party last night issued a manifesto declaring the treaty in some essential particulars "opposed to the declarations of President Wilson of the allied la-

NEW BOUNDARIES OF GERMANY BY TREATY OF PEACE

(Continued from Page 1.) Marlenwerder; thence generally east to the former boundary; thence southeast to the former boundary south of Neidenburg; thence from the former boundary to the River Niemen; thence from the River Niemen to a point near Nidden, and thence west by north to the Baltic.

Boundaries areas for plebiscites: Between the boundary of East Prussia defined above and the Marlenwerder area. A line running from a point on the Nogat south-west of Elbing eastward to the old western boundary of East Prussia and thence to the latter boundary southward; the Allenster area, the old western boundary of East Prussia on the west and then a line running generally east-northeast to include Regierungsbezirk Allenster and Kreis Gletzky; Saar basin; northern boundary, west of Merzig, a line east by north to a point five miles north of St. Wendel.

Boundaries of the free city of Danzig: On the east from the Baltic to the junction of the Nogat and the Vistula, the boundary of East Prussia as previously described; on the south and west the River Vistula northward to about fifteen miles southeast of Danzig; thence west by south for about sixteen miles, thence west-northwest for about eight miles to Lonkenetz, thence to Poillenzer, thence northeast for about twelve miles to about seven miles southwest of Danzig; thence north passing east of Olivia, thence northeast passing between Kolbein and Zappot to the Baltic about nine miles north-west of Danzig.
