Man Who Betrayed Camorra Lodged in Prison

Fought Nine Hours—Finally He Compromises With Captors, Who, However,

ROME, July 6—Another exciting episode was added yesterday to the history of the long and still uncertain offitory of the long and still uncertain official struggle against the supremacy of the Neapolitan Camorra.

Gennaro Abbatemaggio, whose betrayal of his fellow-accomplices in the murder of the Cuocolo couple at Naples enabled the government to track

His capture was effected under dramatic circumstances. Carabinieri and detachments of mounted troops set out at dead of night from Caserta and Capua and surrounded Abbatemaggio's residence and summoned him to surrender. The famous ex-Camorrist barricaded his house and kept the troops at bay for nine hours, vowing they would never capture him alive. His only revolver was, fortunately, knocked from his grasp by his wife and flung out of the window while he was preparing to dismiss the mounted men and allow Abbatemaggio to drive to Capua in his own carriage, the latter emerged from the house amid sympathetic cheers from the population.

When the prisoner, accompanied by the commander of the carabinieri, got well along the road, the cavalry lying in welt suddenly swooped down and LYONS, July 6. — Excitement has





Backed by the enthusiasm of private individuals the governments of the United States and Canada have taken up the question of preservation of the American buffalo, and strenuous efforts are to be made to encourage this patriarch of the western plains to propagate and live in contentment in specially-protected enclosures.

Fifteen of the finest buffaloes in the herd of the New York Zoological Garden were recently shipped and dumped down into the Wichita game preserve, a great range containing tweive square miles of grazing grounds formerly inhabited by the buffalo in the state of Oklahoma. To fence this vase enclosure the United States Government appropriated a sum of \$20,000.

PRACTICAL INTEREST.

Then during the last few months the Canadian Government has been busy transporting 398 of the buffaloes of the Pablo-Allard herd to Elk Island Park in Canada. The herd totals 628 animals, for which the Canadian Government set apart a sum of \$150,000 to purchase and transport them.


