


# CONSISTENCY IN DISAGREEMENT.

Considering the difference of opinion between Mr. Monk and Mr. Borden, and the other members of the Cabinet, which led to the resignation of the Minister of Public Works, convincing evidence is on record in past debates in Parliament to show the consistency of the course which both Mr. Borden and Mr. Monk have purchadise received from the territories, amount-ing in value to \$74,000,000 and showing an increase of \$13,000,000 over that of the preceding year. The mer-bendise received from the territories during the same period had a value of \$97,500,000 as against \$80,500,000 last year. An interesting point in this connection is that the ratio of gain in trade between the United States and these territories has been far greater than that in the trade speal to the people. In moving an amendment to the Government's proposals on February 3, 1910, Mr. Borden maintained that they were weak and ineffective as they afforded no imnediate aid or assistance. He continued

"It would be a proper course to mature more horoughly those proposals, to take up all matters that concern our relations to the Empire in respect to co-operation in Imperial Defence, and in the mean-time to do that which, after all, is the most important thing, stand side by side with the Mother Count-ry under the conditions which confront her at the present time. The conditions which confront the Mother Countr at the present time make the sentiment then expressed by Mr. Borden even more applicable today. On that occasion the amendment which he moved at the close of his speech contained the following clauses:

That no permanent policy should be entered into involving large future expenditures of this character ntil it has been submitted to the people and received their approval.

That, in the meantime, the immediate duty of Canada and the impending necessity of the Empire can best be discharged and met by placing, without delay, at the disposal of the Imperial authorities, as a free and loyal contribution of the people of Canada, such an amount as may be sufficient to purchase or istruct two battleships or armored cruisers of the largest Dreadnought type, giving to the Admiralty full discretion to expend the said sum at such time and for such purpose of naval defence as in their judgment may best serve to increase the united strength of the Empire, and thus assure its peace and

TERRITORIAL TRADE OF THE UNITED STATES.

The "non-contiguous territories" of the United States, as Alaska, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Philippines are for-nally designated, do a large amount of business with the Republic. A recent report of the Federal Department of 'ommerce and Labor states that this trade during the

## TEACHING IN FRANCE.

M. Guist'hau, the French Minister of Education, re cently announced some of the reforms which the Govern-ment propose to improve the condition of the teachers in the Republic, of whom many have been in a state of re-It. The reforms will come into force in the course of e years and are estimated to cost 40,000,000 francs. They fall roughly into two groups. The first seeks to guarantee teachers against arbitrary treatment; the second to improve their financial position. It is hoped to secure protection against favoritism by increasing both the powers of the Departmental Councils, which immedi tely control the teachers, and the number of teache elected on the councils. The salaries of novices are to begin at \$240 instead of \$220 a year, and those of regular teachers at \$300 instead of \$240; the maximum for men will be \$500, for women \$470 a year.

These salaries are not large, but French teachers receive in addition advantages which are equivalent to a onsiderable sum of money. Among these may be mentioned free lodgings, half fares on the railway, and holi-days twice as long as those of other Government services. A teacher in the country is often secretary to the mayor and generally receives payment for holding adult classes. Guist'hau, in order to controvert the widespread belief that these concessions are the result of agitation, has stated that they are not new, but have been under consideration since the formation of the Poincare Ministry.
