SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN IN BALTIC RENEWED: FIERCE FIGHTING ON THE AUSTRO-ITALIAN FRONT

Heaviest Fighting of War on Italian Front Now in

Stockholm, May 17—(Via London, May 18)—The German steamer Hera was sunk this morning off Landsort, in the Baltic. The sinking of the Hera marks the first activity of British submarines in the Baltic this season. The Hera left Stockholm on Tuesday to take iron ore to Oxloesund, carrying a cargo of 2,000 tons. Her captain was ordered on board the submarine with the ship's papers and made prisoner. Sufficient time was given the crew to leave the ship.

Although the weather was rough all on board were saved.

The report of the submarine activity has stopped the movement of namerous German vessels with cargoos of iron ore now at Oxloesund and other ports.

For myself the answer to that question is more than a hope, greater than a speculation, and there is but one answer. From what we know of those who have gone out from university and college; from what we know of the deals which actuated them in their going, from what we know of the lessons of the war which their trained minds cannot but assimilate and digest, we may with assurance reply, yes; they will return made and not marred for a better Canadian citizenship, and Canada will be greater Decause they have lived.

To quote a writer of the day: "One might well have supposed that we were independent of the heir to the Austrian throne. We in Canada did not even know his name. But one day in the year 1914 they killed him, and Europe fell to pieces." Since that time our thoughts with difficulty dissociate themselves from the events which followed in such startling rapidity, till in August England declared war in defence of the neutral laws of nations, in protection of the weak against the strong. The Empire at war, Canada declared herself at war; and then we in this country were privileged to witness a spectacle such as the world has rarely seen. For a moment all industrial activity seemed to halt. There was only one business. The flower of Canadian youth and manly intelligence gave themselves without hesitation or reluctance in defence of such an appealing cause. In homes of affluence and intellectuality, homes of affluence and intellectuality, in homes frugal and unpretentious, kindly family ties were severed at the call to arms. The workman's tools were left upon the bench, the student's books were closed upon the table.





Dealings in Reading issues amounted to fully 160,000 shares, or almost one-fifth of the day's total operations. The movement excited much goosign and surmise, but no explanation was vouchsafed in official quarters.

Reading common has been foremost of the rails for several weeks, but not until recently did the preferred issue develop any activity. Wall street believes developments of importance are impending and that a distribution of the company's valuable assets must follow in logical sequence.

Pronounced strength was displayed by other standard rails, especially Canadian Pacific, which advanced over three points, with 1 to 2 points for Lehigh Valley and other coalers, as well as New York Central, New Haven, St. Paul and the southern division.

U. S. Steel gave promise during the forencon of regaining its old time leadership, advancing a point to 85, but soon losing most of its gain, only to come forward again in the feverish activity of the close. Total sales amounted to 760,000 shares.

More gold imports from Canada ad ded to the steadiness of sterling and most other forms of foreign remittances hardened, with the exception of francs.

Bonds were firm, with total sales, par value, \$4,775,000.
