The case of the unfortunate Bridget Kelly is a sad one. While working for a living she was led astray by a man who won her confidence and affection, and who deserted her when she found him out. She followed him here, found him at the St. John House, and appealed to him to marry her, and was refused. What could the girl do? She could not go home to her friends, she could not seek employment, she had but little money, her betrays refused to marry her, so she sought a refuge from shame in death. The man in the case attended the inquest, coolly testified that he had refused to marry her, and did not appear to think he had done anything wrong. Is there no law to punish such as he?

Some good people take a great interest in the Unitarian movement in St. John, for or against, just as though it made any difference whether people believe in the existence of one God or three, so long as they live godly lives. Many people, we fear, subject themselves to the chances of eternal punishment by trusting their salvation to creeds. They should fear God and keep his commandments, and stop quarrelling over dogmas, gentooisms and millinery. If Christ had wanted his followers to have creeds as defined and explicit as the contents of a statute book, he would have drawn up the articles and signed them. And yet many people who profess to be Unitarians, Christ's work devote most of their time and talents to the discussion of dogmas and forms!

Those who go up and down the Bay in ships are now blessing everybody who had a hand in having a fog whistle placed on Cape DOR. It began to blow a short time ago, and is said to have been heard at the Parrobbio pier. It is worth a great deal more to the navigators of the bay than a half dozen light-houses. To Messrs. Lunt, of this city, must be accorded the credit of having taken the initiative in getting this whistle established. They say that it was the one thing absolutely necessary, and succeeded in convincing the Hon. Dr. Tupper that they were right. The Doctor, once persuaded of the importance of the work, did not rest until he had convinced the rest of the Cabinet of which he was a member of its necessity. Isn't it about time that mail arrangements were perfected so that some dependence may be placed on them?

We are somewhat surprised at finding the following in the *Register*, of which a signed copy is in our possession. The great bazaar scandal, even though it would end in the condemnation of some good by partly opening the eyes of pulp-worshippers to the fact that ministers are not necessarily "I religionists, and as such, are forced to wear an air of godliness, to perfume their hands with sanctity, and to season their meat with the salt of supplication. But the minister who has with all the passions of the natural man, all the confidence of the religious, and all the self-denial of the saint, is a man with all the weaknesses of the student of metaphysics. Coroner's Inquest on One More Unfortunate Victim of Suicide.
Coroner Earle, yesterday afternoon, held an inquest on the remains of Bridget Kelly, of Canterbury, a poor mortem examination having been held by Dr. T. J. O. Earle before the inquest. Mrs. Doherty, who lives in the St. John House, testified to seeing her in the morning, Thursday, and directing her to the post-office by her request. At breakfast she took suddenly ill and was assisted up stairs to her room, where she died in about ten minutes. Deceased had come to the house in search of Charles McCarron, who boarded there. Charles McCarron gave evidence as follows:

I am a house joiner and belong to Prince Edward Island. I know the deceased Bridget Kelly. I have known her for about sixteen months. I first met her in Calais. The deceased was living with Mr. Waite in Calais when I first became acquainted with her. I left Calais a fortnight next Saturday. I did not see her from the time I left Calais till she came to the Saint John House. I saw deceased every day. I saw deceased this morning. She told me she did not feel very well. She was now in bed. She told me she was in the family way. She came to see me at the Saint John House, (so she said). She asked me to marry her. I told her I would not. She told me she belonged to Canterbury. CITY POLICE COURT.
This promises to be a lively time in police circles within a few days, judging from the number of warrants that have been applied for. This morning the Clerk, Magistrate and Chief were all engaged listening to complaints, as one after another came to seek redress. The few prisoners in the dock were quickly disposed of.

[To the Associated Press.] New York, Aug. 13. Mrs. Jessie Pierce, Herbert Folts and George Demond, all young persons belonging in Boston, were crowded yesterday at Centre Harbor, N. H., while bathing.

The express train from Boston to Montreal was thrown from the track near Rockford, Vermont, this morning, killing Engineer Lancelotti, Road Master C. S. Harris, the fireman, and a little girl. Twenty passengers were injured.

Heavy thunder showers have prevailed to-day in various parts of the country. Beecher is giving his statement to-day before the investigating committee, with closed doors.

LONDON, Aug. 13, 4.30 p. m. The amount of bullion gone into the Bank of England on balance to-day is £84,000.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Aug. 12. SACKED BY NEGROES. The whites abandoned Austin last evening, and the negroes, after holding the place a few hours and sacking it, left for their homes. About four hundred men from Memphis arrived at 3 a. m., yesterday, and found only thirty negroes in town, eight of whom were arrested. Everything was quiet at 9 a. m.

(Special Telegram to Tribune.) Ontario Manufacturers on the Treaty - Is a Generally Condemned - A Demand for a Champion in its Favor Finds no Response.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13. At a meeting of Ontario manufacturers, held yesterday in Hamilton, one hundred representatives were present. Persons representing various manufacturers divided into sections to report upon the effect the Treaty would have on their industry. They all reported adversely to the Treaty. Speeches were made showing that from every point it would prove disastrous to manufacturers. Siding seals were unanimously condemned in the report of the committee on machinery.

The Treaty is objected to for not detaching whether goods manufactured from British or foreign material come within the scope of the Treaty. Our fears are warranted by the advantage taken of the former Treaty by the Americans in excluding seal oil from the free list. Nearly every committee expressed an opinion that the Treaty would lead to annexation. Some person was asked to address a meeting in favor of the Treaty and no one responded. A Central Committee was appointed to prepare resolutions amending, favoring or rejecting. Portions of treaty resolutions will be discussed to-day. More delegates are arriving.
