



CONDITIONS IN BUSINESS

John River are only fair at this time, the notato market having quite a lot to do with this condition of affairs Last year the farmers were receiving high prices while this year the price is around \$1.75 and \$2, with no demand even at that low fewers. and even at that low figure.

Under these circumstances the farmers have practically no cash available, and as a result business generally has been more or less effected. Towards the head-waters of the St. John many of the merchants in the small towns on some goods being lower than in St. John) and thus endeavoring to augthis attraction not very much trade is ness, or you and the corporation you being enticed.

For a while a saving feature was the fact that pulpwood remained high, but prices have now lowered and this drop means that not so much will be cut as was at first anticipated. It is rumored that the Fraser Company's large pulp mill at Edmundston may soon have to close down, as there has been practically no demand for pulp and their warehouses are about full to capacity. Last week they cut down the time of the men by one day, only operating on Tuesday and Saturday, with Monday a day for repairing the mill, and Sunday a general rest day. If the Fraser concern should shut down for several months it would mean that times would be far from good in the town of Edmundston.

Under present circumstances labor is quite plentiful. Many of the men come out of the woods rather than accept the new wage schedule. On the American side lumbermen in the woods are getting around \$110 a month and these wages have now been cut to \$52 a month—a decided decrease.
