FOUR YOUNG CHILDREN AND SERVANT GIRL PERISH IN FIRE AT MALTEMQUE

House and Barns of Adelard Savoie Destroyed in Blaze Which Broke out About 10 O'clock Last Night—Occupants Trapped in Upper Part of House and Escape Cut off by Flames—Contents of Building Lost.

Carnaquet, Feb. 28.—Grim tragedy visited the home of Adelard Savoie at Maltemque about eight miles from here last night when four young children and a servant girl—name unknown—perished in a fire which broke out in the Savoie home at about ten o'clock, completely destroying the house and outbuildings.

LARGE REDUCTION IN N. B. FIRE LOSS

Firing Sparks the Chief Cause of Destruction, Says Report

St. John, N. B., Feb. 22.—A report of \$1,000,000 in fire losses during 1923 is shown by the annual report of the New Brunswick Fire Prevention Board. The total loss was \$1,025,450 as compared with \$2,025,297 the year before. There were 523 fires as against 1,170 in 1922. The insurance loss was \$1,275,583 and in 1922 \$3,202,444. The loss sustained by insurance was \$477,266 as against \$505,618 the year before. The greatest losses recorded were from the destruction of farm houses, other dwellings, stores, followed by stores. Losses to lumber and mills were heavy but not relatively so, there being only fourteen fires in saw mills, with a total damage of \$29,708 and \$47,135 insurance. The greatest number of fires occurred in April when there were 109, and the lowest in December when there were only 25. The heaviest loss was reported in June when damage was done to the extent of \$451,441 more than twice that in any other month. The chief cause of destruction was flying sparks which caused 304 outbreaks. Defective or overhated chimneys came next with 145, and stores or barns next with 144, the list with 144. Incinerators caused 35 fires and tobacco ashes 3.

NO GASOLINE TAX IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Premier Veniot Says "We are not Ready for That Yet"

Fredrickton, Feb. 22.—New Brunswick will not at present have a tax upon gasoline used in the operation of motor vehicles, it was learned today.

Premier Veniot, who is here today, confirmed reports that the government would not propose a gasoline tax in New Brunswick amongst its legislative program for March 2nd.

"We are not ready for that in this province just yet," he said. Further than that he declined to forecast the legislative program for the year.

Premier Veniot will go from here to St. John enroute to Moncton where on Saturday he will attend the conference with Hon. A. B. Cope and the Liberal M. P.s of New Brunswick. He declined to make any statement respecting reports of his possible transition to the federal arena with an important portfolio of railways and canals.

ECONOMY SHOULD RULE

The St. John Correspondent of the Financial Post, Toronto, says: Severe criticism has been levelled at a recent increase in salaries given to all city employees at St. John, instead of a decrease as was expected. As in other parts of the country, the taxpayers are beginning to demand that the long promised economies will be effected."

At the present moment the Campbellton police force are demanding an increase of pay.

Citizens are asking when the increasing expense of town government is to cease. The present council has made a wise start towards economy in abolishing the office of collector of electric rates, but in our opinion there are other avenues leading to further economy, and still not cripple any public service.

Instead of an increase of pay for the police as requested, we would suggest that two active officers should be plenty to protect this town, if they attended strictly to their duties, and were prohibited from acting as constables in the serving of papers while on and off duty, or from carrying on any other business as a side line. The salaries now enjoyed by these officers compares favorably with that paid for like services in other towns and cities. We venture to say that there are many men who would make good officers who would be anxious to obtain the

position at the present salaries. It is also stated that the street department is over manned. If this is so, why not lay off one or two men, and when additional help is necessary employ a man or two temporary. The present fine weather has made it extremely difficult to find work for the men, and if the above plan had been followed, there would have been effected a considerable saving.

Last year, when the present Town Engineer was engaged his salary was fixed at \$250 per month, because it was felt the duties of his office during the summer and fall, with the street paving and water extension to look after would be very heavy. This work has been completed since early in December, yet the engineer is still enjoying his \$250 per month.

These are only a few suggestions where economy might be effected without in any way seriously impairing any public service. There may be others. Why not have a thought investigation and perhaps others might be brought to light.

EDUCATION IN N. B.

Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, informed the press last week that last year was the best in the educational history of New Brunswick. Some 7,000 more pupils have been registered in attendance and, in spite of the tremendous storms of last winter which was included in the school year, the regularity of attendance was remarkable. A larger number of teachers were employed during the school year of 1923 than ever before. The attendance at Normal School was the highest in its history and probably in no previous year were more school buildings erected or planned for.

In addition to this the Freshman Class at the University of New Brunswick was the largest in its history. Dr. Carter also spoke at some length of many other features of the year which will be noted in his annual report now in the hands of the printers and which will be presented to the legislature at its next sessions.

It is good to know this. Every conscientious citizen takes an interest in the opinion of our educational system. Education must be wisely managed if its rational evolution is

to be free from retarding influences for its progress is significant of our cultural development. Our system in New Brunswick may have its weakness but the record of the past year will be considered with justifiable pride.


