CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 3 .- It is reported Erie was run into by a freight train at Two sleeping-cars and the day coach took fire and were entirely destroyed. Nineteen bodies have been removed.

A day coach in the rear was completely telescoped and

NINETEEN PASSENGERS WERE KILLED and 38 severely wounded. The coach and two sleepers took fire, and were soon consumed, burning many of the bodies that they were almost unrecognizable.

A special train with surgeons and nurses has been sent from Youngstown. The names of killed and injured have not yet here ascertained.

Piteous cries for help arose from the heap of wreckage, and willing hands were tearing at the heap of broken and twisted timbers and iron, while screams arose from beneath the ruiss that sent a thrill of herror through the hearts of the crowd. Then here and there the darkness became lit up, as tiny tongues

of flame sprung from the crevices of the wrecked train. Fire had added a cruel terror to the wreck. There were very few injured who did not die, and very few died who were not bruised, broken, blackened and burned out of all human semblance. There was no delay in rendering assistance, but all efforts were frustrated until the arrival of the city fire department.

ROASTED TO DEATH.

In the first shock the front end of the boiler of the freight engine was broken in, and as the engine plowed along four poor fellows were actually scooped up in the caldron, wounded and helpless, and there they lay, slowly roasting to death before the eyes of the spectators who could not aid them. The bodies were afterwards fished out by piecemeal by the fishermen's hooks and covered with sheeting. As the remains were gathered the coroner and his assistants searched for means of identification. This was difficult. In half a dozen instances the entire head had been burned off. Names and other data could only be secured from surviving friends. Only two bodies retained anything resembling the features of a human being. One body was that of a woman clasping the burnt remains of a babe in her arms. The loss on property is \$100,000.

CREAT CALES IN GERMANY

Leave Death and Desolation in Their Track.

Berlin, July 3.—A terrible storm of thunder, hail and rain passed over a large part of Germany Wednesday night, causing immense damage to property and loss of life in the villages of Suchtelon, near Dusseldorf, Rade and Sittard. In the Crefeld district, also near Dusseldorf, the storm was especially severe, and the thunder and lightning terrific. Many houses were completely wrecked and the inmates buried in the ruins. There was some dreadful mistake or carelessness or fate. Suddenly there was the dazzling flash of a locomosive light in the bewildered eyes of the rear flagman, a cry of warning when it was too late, a whirl of wheels, an awful crash, and deep silence. But only for a moment. Nineteen human lives had been lost in a moment, and twelve persons were maimed and injured. A terrible rear end collision had occurred, and the flagman, throwing away his useless lantern, could only help to save the victims.

The first order of the day taken up was Sir John Thompson's bill to provide for the exercise of Admiralty jurisdiction within Canada, in accordance with the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890. The Min-

ister of Justice explained, on the House going into committee again on the measure, that he proposed that an appeal would be made from the Vice-Admiralry Court to the Exobequer Court; that the tenure of office of indeas shall be during good behavior; that there should be provision for the appointment of deputy judges where these presiding in the court were interested, and to abolish fees in respect of these cases payable to judges; that certain authority should be conferred on surrogate judges in pursuance of this act. The bject of having surrogate judges, he explained, was simply to facilitate processes being issued from a distance.

Amendments in accordance with these propositions were made in committee and the bill was reported to the House.

The remainder of the session was passed in Committee of Supply.

The whole of the supplementary estimates went through, and one-tenth of the appropriations on the general estimates

appropriations on the general estimates were agreed to on concurrence. This is to keep the services going until the remainder of the estimates are put through in the regular way.

When the Kingston graving dock tenders were called for in 1889, Mr. Gibson was not in public life, and he was a tenderer. With the other legitimate tenderers, he was somewhat astonished to find that the lowest tenderer for the work was a Mr. Bancroftperfectly unknown to himself or to any of the other contractors who competed Bancroft got the work at \$260,680 75, on a promise to take the Connollys in with him. These are the same men who figured as generous friends to Sir Hector Langevin in the Quebec and Esquimalt contrac scandals. The original specifications called for an entrance to the dock 48 feet wide. Then came an offer to widen the entrance to 60 feet, the work to be done at no greater cost than for a 48-foot entrance. equently the resident engineer, a son of Chief Engineer Perley, who is a witness in the other scandal cases, recommended that 55 feet be the width, and strange to relate the result of this change was the passage of an order in council by the Dominion Government authorizing the pay-ment of \$34,000 extra for the work.

Neither Sir Hector Langevin nor anyone else in the House could explain why, if a 60-foot entrance could be provided without additional cost, a payment of \$34,000 ald be granted for the 55-foot entrance. Here Mr. Gibson's expert testimony proved valuable, for he asserted, what seems en ly reasonable on the face of that there should have been 20 increase in price for widening the entrance. A deduction should rather have been made, for there is really less assonry required to make a 55-foot ing than a 48-foot entrance. But this is

not all: While the "Bancroft"-Connolly cofferdam at this work for \$25,000 they have been paid \$10,000 additional for that work, and there are other "extras" in connection with the dam that bring the total up to \$16,520, showing that for this porion of the job, contracted for \$25,000, \$41-520 has been paid.

It only remains to be stated that the engineers now assert that the work cannot be olished for less than an estimated cost of \$350,000, or \$90,000 above what it

The queerest feature of the case is that elating to Bancroft, the mysterious tenderer. Sir Hector Langevin and his associates ask it to be believed that they gave over this great public work to "Bancroft" without knowing one lota about his antecedents. Indeed, Bancroft must be ranked as the must mysterious personage that has been brought upon the public stage for many a day. He, or some one who passed for him, rented a box at the postoffice at Kingston about the time the tenders were received. After the enders were given out nothing more was heard of him, and to crown the mystery Postmaster General Haggart asks the pub-ic to believe that it is impossible, by the records of his subordinates at Kingston, to in any way trace Bancroft, or to learn how, when and by whom his postoffice hox was rented. They must either have a very loose way of doing business at Kingston, or the Minister in alarge of the office must have a warm sympathy for the afflicted managers of the Public Works Department. La Patrie says that there is in Ontario one distillery which puts upon the market every day 10,000 gallons of whisky. Its profit—the difference between 75 cents and 14 cents per gallon—is \$6,100 per day, or \$1,630,000 per year. 



Dentistry in Japan.

I learn the other day a curious fact that is probably unknown to most of my readers. A Japanese dentist never uses anything but his fingers in extracting a tooth. This sounds incredible to us, but after years of training it is acquired. When a Japanespires to enter this profession he begins by pulling out small pegs loosely inserted in a soft wood plank. He uses the finger and thumb of his right hand, and of course does not disturb the plank. Having succeeded with these, the pegs are driven more firmly in and the process repeated.

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

Prof. Wagner, in writing upon the subject of whipping horses, says: Many think they are doing finely and are proud of their success in horse-training by means of severe whipping or otherwise arousing or atimulating the passions, and through necessity crushing the will through which the resistance is prompted. No mistake can be greater than this, and there is nothing that so felly exhibits the ability, judgment and skill of the real horseman as the care displayed in winning instead of repelling the action of his mind. Although it may be necessary to use the whip sometimes it should always be applied judiciously, and great care should be taken not to arouse the passions or excite the obstinacy. The legitimate and proper use of the whip is calculate to operate upon the fear almost entirely. The affectionate and better nature must be appealed to in training horses as well as in training children, but if only the passions are excited the object is depraying and injurions. This is a vital principle, and can be disregarded in the magement of sensitive and courageous horses only at the risk of spoiling them. I have known many horses of a naturally gentle character to be spoiled by whipping once and one horse that was made vicious by being struck by a whip once while standing in his stall.

London Horse Breeder: "The Hanoverian Coach horse is a breed that has its home in the northern parts of the German Province of Hanover and the grand duchy of Oldenburg, districts that have been famous for the qualities of their horses for more for the qualities of their horses for more than two centuries. As early as in the beginning of the seventeenth contury Hanoverian horses were exported for the purpose of improving the stock of other countries, chief among them Great Britain, which later on furnished in return many thoroughbreds to the Hanoverian breefers. The infusion of this blood helped to futher improve the horses of the country by moderating their massiveness without a loss of strength. The Government lent encouragement to breeding, establishing as early as 1735 a Government stud, and the result has been a breed of horses more uniformly good, perhaps, than those of any other for the qualities of their horses for more

country in the world. Such is indicated, at least, by the well-known fact that the Hanoverian cavalry, since the early conquests of the great Napolean, has been conceded to be the best mounted of all Europe, the horses being large, strong, hardy, and full of courage. Indeed so little are they susceptible of fear and excitement that perfect chargers will stand with their noses close to the largest guns when fired and not twist their ears. If there is any weak point in the breed it is the tendency to slow development, an objection which in Europe has sometimes been raised against them. This, however, may be largely due to climatic influences, and is more than compensated for by the standard of excellence attained at maturity.





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
