TORONTO, March 3.—In the Legislative Assembly to-day Mr. Mowat's bill to amend the act respecting mortmain and charitable uses was amended by providing that the bill should not be construed to take away any rights now possessed by any corporation and that the court should agt in a summary manner so as to avoid expense, the bill then passed the committee.

The bill to incorporate the Association of Ontario Land Surveyors was next taken up. Mr. Hardy said that the surveyors had considered some of the objections made to the bill, and were willing to allow certain changes, namely to drop the clause establishing fees for professional services in connection with surveying, reducing the fee of each applicant deriving a certificate to practice to \$30, provided the annual legislative grant of \$400 to the association was continued. The Leicestershire coal mine owners have given notice of a further advance in the price of coal. Three shillings per ton is the advance agreed on. This makes a total of 7s per ton within a month. The action of the miners in announcing that they would go on strike on the 12th inst, and the rapid rise in prices of coal following that announcement, is leading to a panic. The merchants declare that if the present demand is continued the stocks will last only for two days. The newspapers urge the public not to become panic stricken, as prices cannot make a much further advance owing to foreign competition. LONDON BEATS CALT.

His patronage shows a decrease compared with former years. In 1890 there were 754 prisoners committed, and in 1889, 1,042. Of last year's lodgers 476 were males and 103 females. Twenty-two were boys under 16 and two were girls also under that age.

The cost of maintaining the county jail for the year was \$7,305 80, against \$5,939 30 in 1890. Of this amount \$3,076.25 was paid out for food, fuel and clothing The average cost for each prisoner, including these three items, was therefore \$12.61 a year, or 33.80 cents per day. It cost only 6.3-10 cents per diem for each prisoner's rations. The salaries of the officials total \$3,493.34.

Of these 579 prisoners, 344 vere in for the first time, 118 for the second, 51 for the third, and 66 old-timers made their fourth visit or over—the twentieth for some of them. Two hundred and twenty-three were acquitted on trial and discharged; 69 were discharged without trial. Out of the remaining 216, who were found guilty and sentenced, 101 got off with 30 days and less, four were sent down for between two and three years in the penitentiary, eight for over three years in the penitentiary and eight to the Reformatory for Boys. The remainder got monthly sentences, 28 going to the Central Prison.

Nationally last year's prisoners were classified as follows: Canadians, 290; English, 101; Irish, 117; Sectch, 31; United States, 27, and other countries, 13. Their religious denominations are put down as follows: Church of England, 177; Roman Catholics, 177; Presbyterians, 128; Methodists, 63; other denominations, 34.

Two hundred were married, 379 were unmarried; \$4 could neither read nor write; 267 were temperate; and 312 were intemperate. The number committed for drunkeness was 213, a large decrease compared with 1890.



That great industry, agriculture, which lies at the foundation of all others and upon the welfare of which all the interests of the country so largely depend, has been neglected. It has been discriminated against for the benefit of the protected industries, and the injury has been aggravated by the imposition of useless duties upon a large number of agricultural products under the precent of such products, although the farmer has been assured that a similar tariff on manufactured articles would reduce the price of such products, although the farmer has been assured that a similar tariff on manufactured articles would reduce the price of goods he buys. A large part of the surplus products of the farm must be disposed of in a foreign market and the price of that surplus, fixed by free competition, regulates the price of the portion sold at home. If the articles necessarily used by the farmer in the harvesting of his crops are made dearer for him than for his competitors, he must bear the burden alone, for there is no one to whom he can transfer it. The tariff on binding twine cannot be justified except upon the principle that the taxing power should be used to prevent importations entirely; and that principle, besides being unsupported by constitutional authority, would destroy all income from imports and compelus to look to some other source for the necessary revenues.

There are in the United States 38 cordage and binding twine factories, 29 of which are owned and controlled by the National Cordage Company, of New York. The 29 in the trust, if it may be so termed, produce 60 per cent, of the total output. There were produced and consumed in the United States in 1890, 50,000 tons of twine, all but 7,000 tons of which were made from foreign-grown fibres. If the seven-tenths of one cent per pound is added to the price, as is probable, this tax cost the farmers of the United States in the year 1890 about \$700,000, and this does not include alarg

crease from other years of about \$1,000, and considerably over \$100 for, each member while attending to the county affairs. NEW RULES FOR SCORING.

WASHINGTON, March 3.— President Young has sent to Chairman Reach of the Playing Rules Committee of the Easeball League, with his approval, a scheme for a new system of scoring victories in championship games, by which a club's percentage will be determined by an aggregate of points depending on the lead it has over its opponents at the end of the game, according to the following table: to the following table:
A lead of one run and less than three

one point.
A lead of three runs and less than five, two points.
A lead of five runs and less than seven,

three points.
A lead of seven runs and less than nine,

three points.

A lead of seven runs and less than nine, if a roots.

A lead of nine runs or more, five points.

With this scheme in vogue it is claimed at the interest in the game will be main-ained from beginning to end by players, and that the spectators will be gratified by a contest that loses none of its intensity until the last man is out; hence, there will be no more grounds for complaint that patrons of the rame do not get the worth of their money. It is further claimed that the system is more just and fair to the clubs than the old one. Many a game is won by a "scratch," yet in making up the percentages it counts for as much as one where a club by superior all-around playing, well-sustained, gains a decided victory.

The Free Press on the Bogus List of Voters.

Three Months Ago Glad the Courts Had Declared the Bogus Names Off.

Three Weeks Ago the Names Declared Off and Not Counted by the Conservatives.

When the Court of Queen's Bench, consisting of Chief Justice Armour, Mr. Justice Street and Mr. Justice Falconbridge, gave their decision declaring the Liberal notices to bad Conservative votes to be perfectly valid, the London Free Press, on Nov. 16, 1891, said:

The remark that lawyers are likely to make upon the decision at Toronto is, that while it may not be strictly in accordance with the verbal require ments of the form of notice appended to the Franchise Act of 1885, it is in accordance with the equity of the case; and in this all who are not violent partisans will freely coincide Let us have fair play all round.

The party manipulators declined to accept the view of the Free Press that there should be "fair play all round," and took the case to the Court of Appeal. It was heard by the full Court, consisting of Chief Justice Hagarty, Mr. Justice Osler, Mr. Justice Burton and Mr. Justice Maclennan, and that court on Feb. 18 last unanimously sustained the Liberal notices, the quibbling about which enabled a few of the Conservative leaders to cause all the confusion, expense, ill-feeling, bitterness and uncertainty which attended the recent campaign. On Feb. 19, the Free Press, on behalf of the Conservatives, accepted the decision of the Court of Appeal as just what its party friends wanted, and expressed its assurance that they would win the election on the honest voters' list, and were most anxious that the names should be removed. Here are the remarks of the Free Press on this

The Liberals will seek to make capital out of the decision of the Court of Appeal respecting 220 names on the London voters' list. Let no one be deceived. The Conservatives never for one moment counted on those names, and it was they who pressed for an early decision of the pressed for an early decision of the court, as shown by the Globe's report the other day. Had those names re-mained on, the Conservatives would have stood 534 ahead of the Liberals on the list; but as it is they are quite

content with the net gain of 314. And that there might be no mistaking it verdict, the Free Press added:

Let every voter rest assured that the Conservatives wanted these 220 names out of the way before polling These statements and admissions, made

so recently by the recognized organ of Mr. Carling and his friends, may well be pondered by all fair-minded men in connection with more recent developments. They support the view to which every honest man must now be forced-that the bogus names should have never been placed on the list, and that, without them, and by the agency of legitimate votes alone, Mr. Hyman was fairly elected member of Parliament for the city of London.
