The Belgian Queen.

LONDON, May 31.—The Queen of the Belgians is probably one of the fluest harpists now living. A few days ago on the occasion of her lady-in-waiting, Countess Marie De Limburg Stirum, becoming tess Marie De Limburg Stirum, becoming a nun, she acted as sponsor, and, after presenting the postulant at the altar, played a solo on the harp to the great delight of the sisters of the Holy Heart, who througed the convent chapel. Queen Marie Henrictta is to receive the Golden Rose as soon as Leo XIII's special emissary arrives at Brusseis. The marble hall of the palace has been converted into an oratory, but very few persons outside of the Ministers and the royal household are to witness the ceremony. Her predecessors during the present Positificate are the Empress of Austria, the Queen of Spain, the Queen of Portugal and the Countess D'Eu of Brazili all of them curfically enough, press of Austria, the Queen of Spain, the Queen of Portugal and the Countess D'Eu of Brazil; all of them, curiously enough, being connected with her either by blood or marriage. The Duke's House.

London, May 31.—The interior of the Duke of York's house has been entirely London, May 31.—The interior of the Duke of York's house has been entirely reconstructed since the death of the Duchess of Cambridge, who lived in it 38 years. On the ground floor is a suite of apartments looking out upon Cleveland Row, consisting of a dining-room, library and smoking-room. The dining-room is the most comfortable, and has a decidedly old-fashioned appearance. The fireplace is in a sort of alcove, with two recesses at either side of it. There is a high white wooden dado, with primrose paper. The smoking-room is in dark green. Above are two fine drawing-rooms connected by folding doors. The walls are divided in panels, which are filled with crimson silk on one side, and on the other with gold and crimson silk bracade. This room contains some rare French furniture, which belongs to the crown, and is lighted by electrolier of cut glass richly gilded, as well as by several brackets on the walls. The smaller drawing-room, which in the Duchess of Cambridge's time was known as the Chinaroom, is paneled with green silk brocade, and at one end there is a fine piece of tapestry. The boundor has blue paper and hand-painted panels, with mirrors between each of the three windows. The draw-back to this house is that all the rooms hand-painted panels, with mirrors between each of the three windows. The draw-back to this house is that all the rooms look out on Cleveland Row, a dreary street, and not a ray of sunlight ever penetrates to the windows. The principal bedroom, which adjoins the boudeir, is furnished and decorated in white and blue.

The Royal Wedding. London, May 31 .- The Chapel Royal in St. James' Palace has been closed in order to be prepared for the royal wedding. The to be prepared for the royal wedding. The interior will be entirely dismantled, and the arrangements are to be, as much as possible, the same as they were when the Empress Frederick was married. It is probable that the Princess of Wales and her daughters will occupy the royal gallery during the ceremony. The floor of the chapel is to be entirely covered with crimson carpet, and the altar is to be draped with crimson voivet, above which the magnificent gold communion plate is to be placed. All the pews will be removed and the chapel filled with scats covered with scarlet cloth. The pillars are to be painted blue and ornawith seats covered with searlet cloth. The pillars are to be painted blue and ornamented with gold shields. The state chair will be placed close to the altar for the Queen, and her Majesty will be surrounded by the royal family and royal guests from abroad. It is hoped there will be room for about 450 persons in the chapel. A paragraph is going the round of the papers which states that at the royal wedding the daughters of the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh, the sisters of the bridgegroom, and Princess Victoria of Schieswig-Holstein will be among the bridesmaids. This is entirely wrong. The eight bridesmaids will all be daughters of peers.

The missionary, unable to proceed up the Zambesi, went west into the interior. The difficulties of travel were enormous and the exponse great. The trade of Central Africa was in the hands of fanatical Mohammedans. They employed professional carriers, who each carried about 100 pounds and traveled from ten to twenty miles a day in the heat of a burning sun. Mr. Arnot escaped from the Zambesi territory when the king was away at war and succeeded in taking with him a number of deserters from the king's army. Every few days now countries were entered and different tribes of people met, the chiefs of whom were very jealous of persons traveling through their kingdoms. The explorer had to represent that he was a very unimportant man and attracted as little attention as possible. On one occasion he insulted a king who wanted to impose a very heavy fine. In each different country Mr. Arnot said he was urged to remain, but always managed to proceed on his explorations.

THOUGH in the past the Toronto Telegram has generally opposed the Ontario Government, it has now reached the con-clusion that the Administration, "while not perfect, is probably as nearly straight as any government on earth.

THRRE seems to be no doubt that the Geary anti-Chinese bill will be speedily set aside. Both political parties in the United States disclaim responsibility for its paternity. The fondling law is rarely permitted to reach maturity.

Two thousand and seventy immigrant were brought to New York by the North German steamship Weimar on her last voyage. One shudders to think of the fate of such cargoes if any disaster were to happen to a large ocean liner in midocean.

THE New York Recorder is certainly an enterprising newspaper. When the atmosphere is dry and the clouds are scattered, he sends a captive balloon charged with certain explosives into the nearest cloud, and invariably rain falls. Jewell declines to say what he uses, but the fact that the manager of the rail way has faith in his discovery and is preparing to send him into the drought-stricken sections has convinced the people of Kansas that Jewell possesses the true secret. If he can do what he says, he could have made a little fortune in Europe during the last few months. There is more interest in wholesale cirles in the coming crop and the prices which are likely to rule than many imagine. The fact is that we are all dependent on the success of the Canadian farmer, lumberman and miner for our daily bread. If these three classes are prosperous-and the farmer must be, first of all, for he is in the majority-then are we all able to make a living.

It is not very reassuring to find that during the past week, in the great market that largely fixes pricer, there has been a fall in the prices paid for three of our staple products—cattle, cheese and wheat. But such is the case. The market for live stock, it seems, has been glutted, especially at Glasgow, where the rule calling for the killing on landing of our stock has worked much to the detriment of Canadian dealers, who have lost heavily on consignments. There is hopefulness in the trade that some revival will soon take place, and that the embargo will be removed by mid-summer. It is reassuring to find that no disease has been traced in any of the Canadian cattle killed at British ports.

In new cheese the price at Liverpool has receded during the week from 54s to 51s. Under such discouragement it is probably as well that the marketing of May cheese in Western Ontario has been light. It has been shorter than for several year past; but, as the impression is that the product of the season will exceed that of all previous years, it is to be hoped that the prices will improve.

Locally, a great deal of interest is cen tered on the opening, next week, of the new pork packing establishment in Lon-It is an important industry, and it is to be hoped that it will be fraught with benefit to the farmers as well as to the enterprising business men who have established it.

The decrease in the price of wheat, which had previously reached a phenomenally low rate, may be traced to two prime factors-(1) the large quantity of last year's crop yet unsold, and (2) the more favorable reports regarding the grow-ing cereals. In England the cable informs us that the prospects have improved during the past week. The season has been abnormal, being phenomenally dry. Therefore it is difficult to give a forecast; but there will be a short crop. In Scotland and Ireland the season has been rather more favorable than in England, and in the former country the oat crop promises gen-erally to be good. But in neither country is sufficient wheat or barley grown to seriously affect the estimate for England.

One item of information from Great

City seed merchants report that trade has been moving along quietly. Plenty of corn is going out for planting, ensilage and fodder purposes, and farmers are busy planting. Hungarian and millet are now sought after, and turnip seed is beginning to move, though it is noticeable that farmers are not sowing as much turnips or mangels as formerly. They use corn chiefly now, because the work of growing it calls for less labor. Ten years ago, a prominent London seedsman told the writer, he could sell hardly a carload of ensilage; now it is no unusual thing to sell a dozen loads.

The trade in wool is quiet, 17 cents being the ruling figure. Farmers are now engaged in washing and clipping, and it will be the middle of June before the spring clip is on the market. Until the last few days it has been too cold to permit of even the washing

In wholesale circles generally, trade is not as good as might be, and collections are difficult to make, owing to a scarcity of money throughout the country. 
