two clubs: "The trustees of the Stanley Cup communicated to the Ottawa Hockey Club the challenges of the Marlboro Hockey Club of Toronto and the Victoria Club, of Montreal, for the Stanley Cup. The Ottawa Club in reply have made representations that they were kept playing for the cup at the close of the season and were debarred spectators looked on the incident more like a simple exhibition of Rugby footags are gards the Victoria Club, it was given by the trustees a date, which was not taken advantage of. The Ottawas claim, therefore, that they should not be required to defend the cup at the opening of the coming season. The trustees think that there is force in the protest and have decided therefore that they ought not to compel the Ottawas to accept either challenge. If the Ottawas of their accord choose to meet either club, the trustees have no objection

New regulations will be formulated shortly to govern contests for the Stanley Cup. Instead of it being necessary to win two out of three matches, either one or two matches will be played, the majority of goals to count. Only one match will be played when the challengers are restdent within a reasonable distance of where the cup is held, but in the case of clubs coming from afar, such as the champions of the Manitoba Hockey League, two matches will be allowed. These new regulations are necessary by the number of challenges received in the past year, and if all the would-be cup lifters are to be given a chance, the old system must be abandoned.



## TRAPPER RETURNS FROM FAR NORTH

William Miller Back in Orkney After Thirty Years' Absence in Canada's Wilds.

London, Nov. 18.-No longer an explorer of the unknown Antarctic, but a prosaic trading vessel in the service of the Hudson's Bay Company, the famous Discovery has been berthed in West India dock, after her first voyage to the Arctic regions.

The Discovery brought home an in-

teresting personage in William Miller, a man of nearly 70 years of age, who has spent half a century in the employment of the Hudson's Bay Company, and returned home to live in retirement in his native Orcadian town

of Stromness. Miller has had charge for nearly 30 years of the post named Mistessinee, on Rupert's River. He was the only white man in the Indian settlement of 40 or 50 souls, yet the life was thoroughly congenial, and only failing eyesight has compelled him to give it up. His life was that of the hardy pioneer of the wilds of unknown Canada. The nearest settlement was twelve days' march, or 300 miles distant. In winter, journeys were accom-

plished on snowshoes, or by sledges, drawn by teams of Eskimo dogs. Black bears, reindeer, and numerous other kinds of game provided abundance of work for the rifle and food for the setlers. Miller made an annual journey down Rupert's River to Rupert's House, on the shores of Hudson Bay. The produce of this district was conveyed in a dozen large Indian canoes, manned by Indians, and on the return journey these were loaded up with stores for the coming winter.

With the exception of this brief interlude, Miller rarely saw a white man from one end of the year to the other; and until this week, when he arrived in London, he had not set foot upon the streets of a civilized town for nearly half a century, except for one

visit to Montreal. Under the command of Capt. Gray, one of a well-known Peterhead family of whaling masters, the Discovery left the Thames on June 15, bound for the company's trading station on Charles company's trading station on Charlton Island, at the extreme south end of James Bay, an arm of the greater building was made, and a complete list Hudson Bay.
