Petrograd, May 3 .- Via London, 5:05 p.m. - The Russian provisional government has sent to the Russian representatives in the Entente allied countries a note assuring the Allies that the change in government in Russia cannot afford a pretext for any slackening on the part of Russia in the common struggle of all the Entente Allies.

GOOD PROGRESS FIELD REPORT OF NEW SMASH

Heavy Fighting the Rule Everywhere On Extended Front.

British Headquarters in France, May 3—Via London, 2:55 p.m.—(From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press).
—Another of the continuing British attacks was launched against the Germans early this morning. Hard fighting is in progress under a warm spring sun. There has been no rain for more than ten days now, and the battlefields at times are enveloped in dust. British reinforcements moving along the roads toward the front look like millers under heavy layers of chalk-white powder.

At Bullecourt the British took another bite into the Hindenburg line just north of its point of junction with the Drocourt-Oueant switch. Good progress was also reported early Good progress was also reported early in the direction of Cherisy and Fresnoy. Fresnoy is just east of Arieux, which was captured last Friday by the Canadians. These two villages, having been looped about with intricate trench fortifications, form one of the strongest points on the Hericourt-Oppy-Gavrelle line, running slightly southwest from Lens to Scarpe and being one of the last of the older fixed positions protecting the Drocourt-Queant switch to the Hindenburg line.

The observance of the day in the schools partook of the character of a celebration of the new alliance with the United States. Emphasis was laid on the fact that all countries speaking the language of Shakespeare were now united for the first time in a war on behalf of the principles of democracy.

GEN. JOFFRE AND HIS AIDES ARE TO VISIT MONTREAL FOR "WIN-THE-WAR" CONVENTION

Montreal, May 3.—Gen, Joffr and the other members of the French mission to Washington are expected to be in Montreal during the week of May 21-26 when the National Unity Convention or, as it is better known, the "Win-the-War" Convention, is to be held.

This information was conveyed to the Chambre De Commerce at yesterday's meeting by Ludger Gravel, in explaining to his colleagues some of the program of the "Win-the-War" Convention.

Washington, May 3.—While members of the Entente missions shared the alarm of the American officials at the ingrowing inroads of the submarine menace, they do not regard the situation as in any sense fatal. SUBS FOE'S STRONGEST CARD, BUT REPRISALS FOR CANNOT WIN, SAYS NORTHCLIFFE; FOE'S OUTRAGES **WERE EFFECTIVE**

Bombing of Freiburg Was Fully Justified, Declares Earl Curzon.

London, May 3 .- In the House Lords yesterday, the Archbishop of Can-terbury raised the question of the recent bombing of Freiburg by French and British aviators in retaliation for outrages perpetrated by the German fleet. The archbishop declared there was a strong feeling throughout the entire country against such reprisals. Earl Curzon of Kedlestone, membe of the war council, replying for the Government, said that after the "abominable outrage" against the hospital ship Asturias, the war cabinet had decided to execute the threat of reprisals made

in January.

"We consulted the French upon the matter," Earl Curzon continued, "and they heartily approved of the plan and expressed a desire to co-operate. It was then decided to carry out the bombing raid on Freiburg. The Government, however, consulted the imperial war conference, which also concurred, and it was also decided that no reprisals would be undertaken after this if the Germans ceased their attacks on hospital ships." ital ships."

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BRITISH LEAP AT DAWN UPON GERMAN DEFENCES. TAKING STRONG POSITIONS

THE WAR SITUATION

Brazil has drawn one step nearer to war with Germany, and today is one of those countries hovering on the brink of the maelstrom which has convulsed two-thirds world. Norway and China are the two other countries which may shortly be added to the ever-lengthening list of Germany's foes. Dr. Muller Resigns.

Two events have happened in Brazil which may easily form the impetus to the last remaining step on the road to war. Dr. Lauro Muller, Brazilian foreign minister, has tendered his resignation on the eve of the day set for the Brazilian Congress to decide whether the republic shall draw its sword. Dr. Muller has been persistently reported as, if not actually pro-German at least a firm opponent of hostilities between Brazil and the Teutonic Empire. His resignation coincides with an order by President Braz, detaining the dismissed German minister. The order was issued on re-ceipt of news from Berlin that the Brazilian minister in Germany had been refused permission to leave

the country. Norway Next?

The possibility of Norway's entrance into the ranks of the Allies is based on the havoc wrought among the Norwegian mercantile marine by German submarines. Nor-way, prior to the war, fourth among the world's seafaring nations, has suffered so heavily from the rav-ages of the U-boats that their shipping is actually threatened with ex-tinction. The bitterness among the Norwegians over German war methods is growing many voices are urging that could not be worse off as a bellige ent, and might find compensation peace found her in the lists with the Entente.

China For War.

All reports from China agree that the advocates of war are in a majority at Peking, but apparently the president is still reluctant to take the fateful step. It has been re-ported that Japan was unwilling that China should enter the struggle, but the Japanese foreign office has officially denied this. In the meantime the entire situation in Europe remains obscure through conflicting reports and the exercise of the censors. The only definite fact in regard to conditions in Germany is that a political crisis exists, and that the antagonism between the parties has blazed out with a violence unknown since the beginning of he war. Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg is the target for all shafts, but apparently can rely only on a lukewarm support from the moderate Socialists, is no light whatever on the strike situation and no reliable news of any kind from Austria. New Attack Takes In Entire Front Engaged At Easter--British Jump Carries Them Close to Fresnoy, Cherisy and Bullecourt --- Drive Opened by Tornado of Fire.

London, May 3.—The British began another attack this morning. The war office announces that progress is being made.

A number of strong positions already have been taken by the British. The announcement follows: "Heavy fighting is taking place all along the front

from the Hindenburg line south of the Senze River to the Acheville-Vimy road. Our troops are making progress and have already captured a number of strong hostile positions.

The new British attack takes in virtually the entire front on which the battle of Arras was begun on Easter Monday, and evidently is a major operation. It is the fourth great attack which the British have made along this line. The attacking front is about twelve miles

MOVE TOWARDS FRESNOY.

London, May 3.-2:20 p.m.-In their new attack of today the British made progress in the direction of Fresnoy and Cherisy and also towards B llecourt, Reuter's correspondent at the British headquarters reports. The British attacked in the darkest hour preceding dawn this morning, striking at the German positions east of Arras. The infantry assault was delayed until half a hour after the half moon had gone down. The night was clear and star-lit, and the almost ceaseless flashing of guns gave definite shape to the shadowy outlines of the salient points. The correspondent says the attack was directed to the taking of certain points of considerable importance, and to improving the British line. The British desired to gain complete mastery of dominating positions whence their artillery would be able more effectively to devastate the fresh troops which the Germans continue to throw in.

TORNADO OF FIRE. There was the usual preliminary tornado of fire from weapons of all calibres, and then the equally familiar creeping barrage, working with absolute punctuality as the order to the men to go forward was snapped forth simultaneously down miles of trenches. Thousands of crouching figures formed into regular waves for the advance.

Then came the inevitable deadly rattle of machine gun and rifle fire, and the crashing of bursting bombs as the infantry reached the parapet of the first enemy trench. PROGRESS MADE.

As to the results obtained, the correspondent adds, reports thus far are vague, but the British made progress in several directions—towards Fresnoy and Cherisy, and also toward Bellecourt, which is a point on the The Germans counter-attacked heavily near Gavrelle and Loos.

These onslaughts were dealt with satisfactorily by the British gunners. FRENCH CAPTURE GARRISON.

Paris, May 3.-Noon.-The French made an important gain on the Cham-pagne front last night, reducing the position which was still being held by the Germans in the new lines east of Monthaut, and capturing the German garrison of more than 200 men, the war office announces.
