

RAINESCOURT HAVE BEEN ADVANCED

Since August 8th, French and British Troops Have Taken 30,344 German Prisoners

-French Continue To Hammer Lassigny-Noyon Line.

FRENCH CAPTURE GROUND. London, Aug. 15, 4 p.m.—The French have captured all the high ground on the Lassigny Massif and are working down the eastern and northern sides, so that a further retirement of the enemy in that sector is probable, according to advices received here this afternoon.

London, Aug. 15.—The British line has been advanced slightly east of Rainescourt, in the district northwest of Chaulnes on the Picardy battlefront today's war office statement announces.

Since August 8, when the Allied attack in Picardy began, the British and French have taken prisoners to the number of 30,344. British patrols were active throughout last night in the district between Albert and Ayette, where the Germans began their retirement vesterday. The patrols have maintained close touch the enemy in this region.

The British made further progress at several points along this front.

The text of the statement reads:

"Severe local fighting took place last night to our advantage east of Rainescourt. Our line was advanced slightly in this neighborhood.

"One of our patrols rushed a hostile post north of Albert, capturing a machine gun.

"Between Albert and Ayette our patrols were active throughout the night, and have maintained close touch with the enemy. Further progress was made at a number of points, and several prisoners and a few machine guns were taken.

"Hostile raiding parties were repulsed last night southeast of Arras, near Germille.

"The enemy's artillery was active east of Robecq and in the Scherpenberg sector (Flanders).

"The total number of prisoners captured by the British 4th army since the morning of August 8 is now 21,844. In the same period the prisoners taken by the French 1st army amount to 8,500, making a total of 30,344 German prisoners captured in the operations of the Allied armies on the Montdidier-Albert front."

QUIET ON NEW BATTLEFRONT FROM GURY TO THIESCOURT

With the French Army in France, Wednesday, Aug. 14.-Along the new battlefront, from Gury to Thiescourt Wood, the struggle came to a standstill today. In addition to the St. Claude and Ecouvillon far as, we hold ground to the north of Belval village and a footing in Plessier-de-Roye Park. The battle, therefore, has reached a natural conclusion and the danger of a counter-attack from Thiescourt Massif has been removed.

It is unknown whether the battle will be renewed or not, but if it is, it will be a new operation with stronger material and greater man-power on both sides.

Officials of the Salvation Army last night presented a long report to finance committee in defence of their charge to the city for patients who were cared for at their home and who were given as city patients.

Inspector J. W. McCallum found on investigating that some of the patients at the home said they had paid their own way. Others he could not find. Some of the aldermen got angry and said they would reject all the cases when they found that some had paid and the city was rebilled for them. Simply a Misunderstanding.

The Salvation Army report said that the situation was due to a misunderstanding. The matron at the home did not know that the per diem basis was in force and just supplied the city with a list of the patients regardless of where they came. It stated that in case the patient was supposed to each case the patient was supposed to pay \$35 for doctor and hospital care. Carbolic acid internally calls for Epsom salts: externally alcohol must be quickly applied. The hospital is usually the best place for all poison victims.

Paregoric, laudanum and opium all contain that dangerous poison and habit-forming drug, morphine. Coffee and belladonna are the physiological antidotes to be used until you reach the hospital with the sufferer.
